This is an online and mail-bid sale. **Absentee bids will be accepted by mail, fax, email and phone until the day before the live online sale.** On the day of the live online sale, only bids placed via the live online platform will be accepted: **no phone, fax, email or mail bids can be entered on the day of the sale.**
2. All lots will be sold to the highest bidder at the time of the sale. All bids (whether placed online or by mail, fax, email or phone) will be treated as limits and lots will be purchased below these limits where competition permits.
3. Absentee bidders should be mindful that **bids submitted in irregular increments may be rounded to a lower bid** to comply with the online platform's established bidding increments.

A 1992 Reminiscence

by Richard Margolis



I caught the collecting bug early—one look at a friend’s numismatic collection on a day in 1943 that I can still clearly remember, and I was hooked. (My friend’s name was Henry Kotzen, and 43 years later I catalogued his collection of medals of the French Revolution and Napoleon and of the French Pretenders for sale at Glendining’s). In 1952 I joined the American Numismatic Society and the American Numismatic Association, and that same year a course in the history of the French Revolution and Napoleon at New York University taught by the late professor Leo Gershoy led to a keen interest in the numismatics of this period. This interest has never waned, and in the intervening forty years I have been able to form a highly specialised collection, numbering some 3000 pieces, of French coins, essays, and private tokens from 1789 to 1815.

In 1954 I began a very lengthy and rewarding correspondence with a fellow specialist of the Revolutionary period, the late Raoul Kraft of Geneva. He had a marvelous collection, including a very important group of Augustin Dupré’s designs and documents now in the Musée Monétaire in Paris, and sponsored me in 1956 for membership in the Swiss Numismatic Society. My friendship with Mr. Kraft, whom my wife and I visited numerous times in Switzerland, continued until his death in 1987.

In January of 1958 a small advertisement in *Crown & Taler* (a periodical devoted to foreign numismatics which was ahead of its time, and which consequently survived for only a few years) marked my debut as a dealer. Almost from the beginning my business was styled “Richard Margolis—Coins & Medals of the World,” although initially the preponderance of activity was in coins rather than in commemorative medals. During the first twenty years or so I issued some sixty fixed price lists and conducted one public auction sale.

Despite a very active business, time was reserved for research and writing. To date some thirty or more articles have been published in *Archéonumis*, the *British Numismatic Journal*, *The Numismatist*, *Spink’s Numismatic Circular*, the *SAENF Bulletin* (the publication of La Société américaine pour l’Étude de la Numismatique française, of which I was a founding member in 1965), and other periodicals.

After eight years as a dealer I was accepted into the International Association of Professional Numismatists, and subsequently served on its executive committee for twelve years and as Second Vice President for eight years. During much of this time I was in charge of the IAPN’s advertising and publicity, and in 1986 I was co-editor (with Hans Voegtli) of the IAPN’s 35th anniversary commemorative volume, consisting of articles by members, *Numismatics—Witness to History (La Numismatique—Témoignage de l’Histoire)*. Upon retiring from the executive committee (although not from the IAPN), I was made an Honorary Member, the only American to be so designated to date.

Beginning in 1961 I made frequent trips to Europe, originally almost exclusively for commercial purposes, but in more recent years primarily to pursue various research projects, at the Archives Nationales and Bibliothèque Nationale in Paris, the British Library and Public Record Office in London, the Birmingham Reference Library, and numerous other museums, libraries, and archives. Without exception the curators, librarians, and archivists I have met have been exceedingly courteous and cooperative and have helped make my research a real pleasure.

During one of these early trips, probably in 1964, I first became acquainted with Helen Frizzell, in Newcastle, where she was then employed by Corbitt & Hunter, a leading provincial firm. Anyone who ever met Helen became a warm friend, and our friendship lasted some 25 years, until her terribly untimely death in 1990.

In 1964 my interest in French numismatics caused me to suggest to a customer of mine, George Sobin, who was actively collecting and studying the French ecu, that he prepare a book on the subject. We both thought that this project would take about five years, but this was unduly optimistic, and it was not until 1974 that my firm was able to publish his classic work, *The Silver Crowns of France 1642–1973*.

In the early 1970s, realising the need for a high quality annual gathering in New York City of collectors and dealers, I became one of the founders of the New York International Numismatic Convention, and ran it, with the indispensable collaboration of my wife Sara, for fifteen years, from 1972 until 1986. In 1987 the Convention was sold, and it has continued to be perhaps the most important annual numismatic function of its kind.

While collecting, dealing, writing articles, and convention organising occupied most of my time for many years, I was also able to present occasional papers, including one on the Swiss engraver Jean-Pierre Droz at the Berne International Numismatic Congress in 1979, another on Matthew Boulton and the Monneron frères at the London INC, and in 1989, on the occasion of the bicentennial of the French Revolution, a talk on the private merchants' tokens of the period to a class at the École du Louvre, part of a course conducted by Mme. Sylvie de Turckheim-Pey of the Cabinet des médailles.

In time my dealing focused increasingly on commemorative medals. Their infinite variety, their clear artistic superiority to coins of a comparable period, their reasonable price, the calibre of the people who collected them, all appealed to me. Gradually, almost imperceptibly, I began to collect them myself, concentrating on a period which particularly interests me, both historically and artistically, the late eighteenth century. This collection, still small in size, emphasises the outstanding civil and military (as distinguished from royal and religious) personages of the period and their accomplishments. It is an attractive and challenging series, especially when expanded to include ceramic portrait medallions (jasper and basalt by Wedgwood, porcelain of Sèvres and other European factories, terracottas by Nini and others). I find the work of some little-known but quite talented medalists of this period particularly intriguing—Chassel, Fontaine, Mastrellini, Monié, Peséz, Renaud—to name the principal ones. ...

As for ongoing research, I hope to be able to edit and publish in the next year or so a volume of correspondence between Matthew Boulton, his agent, Dr. Francis Swediaur, and the Monneron brothers of Paris (the first of a projected two-part work on Boulton and the Monnerons), as well as a volume of collected articles, both published and unpublished, on the 1789 to 1815 period of French numismatists.

Apart from numismatics, the writer of these notes is a general partner in the N.T. Hegeman Company, a Paramus, New Jersey real estate management firm founded by his maternal grandfather in New York City in 1910.

THE RICHARD MARGOLIS INTERNATIONAL NUMISMATIC LIBRARY PART ONE: BOOKS

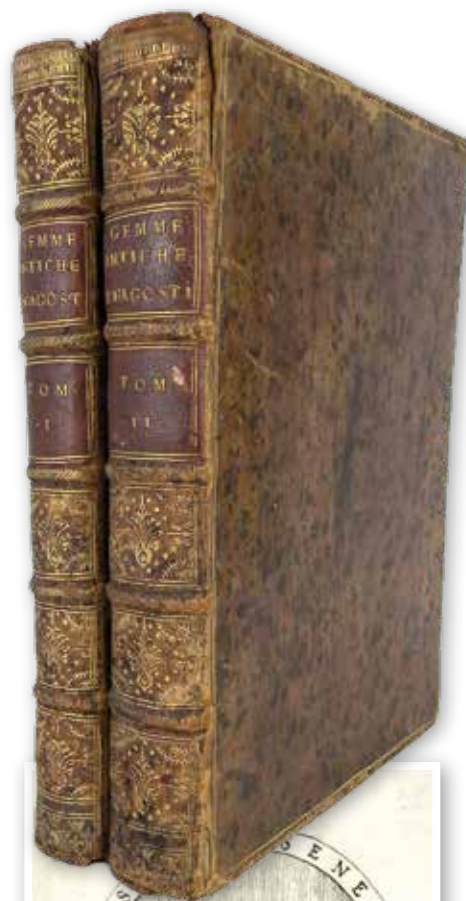
This section lists works on numismatics from all times and places. While it is strongest in those volumes devoted to the period of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, especially ones that relate to the French and American revolutionary periods, its scope is all-encompassing and reflects the intellectual curiosity of the owner. Auction catalogues, periodicals, art, and archives will follow in subsequent sections.

THE ANCIENT WORLD

Matthew Boulton's Set of Agostini on Engraved Gems

Two volumes, complete. 4to, 18th-century matching mottled calf, boards bordered in gilt; spines with five raised bands, richly decorated in gilt, each with two red spine labels lettered in gilt; board edges and turn-ins decorated in gilt; all page edges red. *Parte Prima*: finely engraved title signed by Galegnetti; 52 pages; engraved portrait of the author; 115 plates depicting engraved gems. *Parte Seconda*: (8), 72 pages; 152 plates depicting ancient cameos [numbered 1–151, but with two numbered 17]. Occasional spotting and staining; removed bookplates from both volumes; a few old marginal repairs, not affecting images or text. Very good. **\$750**

The second edition, first issue, of this very important work on engraved gems and other ancient carvings. This “second impression” was published posthumously by Agostini’s associates Battista Marinelli and Gian Pietro Bellori. The unsigned engravings are credited in the preface to Giovanni Battista Galestruzzi. The first volume is based on the collection belonging to Cardinal Francesco Barberini, a nephew of Agostini’s; it is felt that Agostini assembled much of the collection himself. Agostini (1593–1669) served as an authority of antiquities to several popes—this particular work is dedicated to Pope Alexander VII. He published, in 1649, a revision of Filippo Paruta’s 1612 *Sicilia numismatica*. Unlisted by Cicognara. Dekesel A6 (first issue, with *Seconda Impressione* misspelled *Secodna*). Sinkankas 29. The Very Rare Carlos de Beistegui Collection

One of only “80 exemplaires hors commerce” reserved for friends of Carlos de Beistegui, this copy was presented to Robert Doré. The original edition of the catalogue of this remarkable collection, part of the Cabinet des Médailles at the Bibliothèque Nationale. Predominantly comprised of superb gold coins from ancient to modern times and especially rich in important French coins. (The first 13 plates are devoted to ancient coins, hence its listing in this section.) Label of Nigrotti Gian Battista on inside front cover of the original portfolio. The Jameson example sold for \$7500 hammer at our 2014 sale of the Herb Kreindler library. It had also had a new box made for it, as the originals tend to become spotted and worn. Matthew Boulton's set of this scarce and still-important work, of which this is the best edition. Tassie was born of humble parentage near Glasgow in 1723. In the 1760s, he and Dr. Quin perfected an 'enamel' admirably suited by hardness and beauty of texture for the formation of gems and medallions. He moved to London to further his career as a gem-engraver and in 1775 issued the first catalogue of his works, a thin pamphlet detailing 2856 items. In 1791 the handsome catalogue offered here was published, enumerating nearly 16,000 pieces. At his death in 1799, the collection of Tassie's works numbered about 20,000 pieces. Rudolf Erich Raspe (1736–1794) was a German writer and antiquarian, to name two of his less colorful attributes. He ended up in England, where he published *The Surprising Adventures of Baron Munchausen* (1785) and was employed by Matthew Boulton at his Dolcoath Mine in Cornwall, where he served as an assayer. This connection to Boulton makes the provenance of this particular set all the more attractive. Brunet 29604. Sinkankas 5357: "The catalog is followed by a supplement of additional gems, a useful list of the cabinets in Europe with names of their proprietors, a list of celebrated gem engravers, inscriptions found upon gems, the principal subjects portrayed, paste replicas of portraits issued by Tassie, and a table of concordances. The plates present several to as many as a dozen examples per plate, ranging from Egyptian subjects through several plates of cylinder seals, into engraved gems of classic to modern times." The Medals of “Ostmark”

Rare. Published by a committee headed by medallist Ludwig Hujer to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Medailleur-Vereinigung der Genossenschaft bildender Künstler Wiens. Published after the Anschluss, the title *Die Medaille der Österreich* had to be changed to use the Nazi-approved term for Austria, *Ostmark*. A significant publication on modern Austrian art medals.

Memorial Volume for Charles Wiener

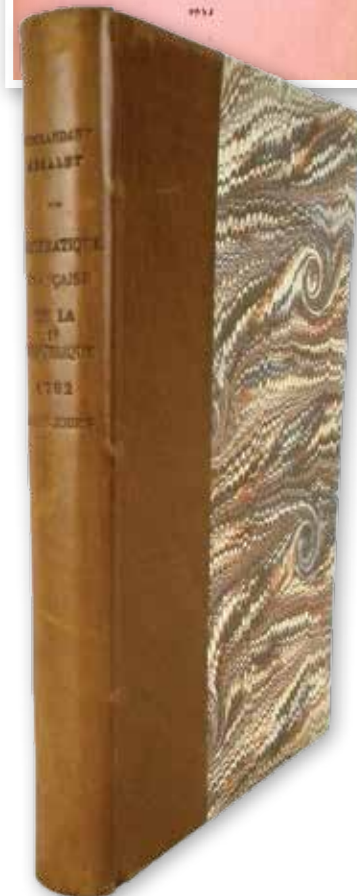

A very rare and mysterious production. Only the second copy we have seen, and the first to have the supplementary fascicle. This publication, issued in serial form between April and December 1937 and produced on a *nardigraphe* (somewhat similar to a mimeograph and widely used in France at the time), is lacking from every library we have checked, numismatic and otherwise. That it was printed (if crudely) and mailed implies that multiple copies were produced, but we have been unable to find others. Each fascicle is signed *Commandant Assalet*, with no first name. He is listed in the same manner as a corresponding member of the Société française de numismatique in the *Revue numismatique* for 1940. A Jean Assalet, born on June 22, 1901 in Chalon-sur-Saône, is included in a 1941 prisoner of war listing (*Liste officielle n° 99 de prisonniers français d'après les renseignements fournis par l'autorité militaire allemande*), where he is described as a *capitaine* imprisoned in an Oflag (a POW camp for officers). While a *capitaine* in the French military is a rank lower than a *commandant*, there is the possibility of a change in ranks with the outbreak of the war. While we cannot identify this person as the author of these works, there is at least a possibility that this is the case, with the shared name and town plus the fact that he was a military officer. The publication itself is a detailed guide to French coinage from the establishment of the *République*, and includes the colonies for the period covered. While it surely must have been based to some degree upon previously published works, it does not seem only to be a recapitulation of any of the guides of the time, and it appears to include original content. A highly interesting, if puzzling, work. A set in our Sale 141 (lot 358) brought \$800 hammer.

Le tribunal ordonna la saisie et la destruction du livre, qui est devenu très rare dans le commerce" (entry 1531). It may not come as a surprise that when the time came for Charvet's own collection to be sold, it was through Henri Hoffmann (see entry for the sale in Part Two of this catalogue).

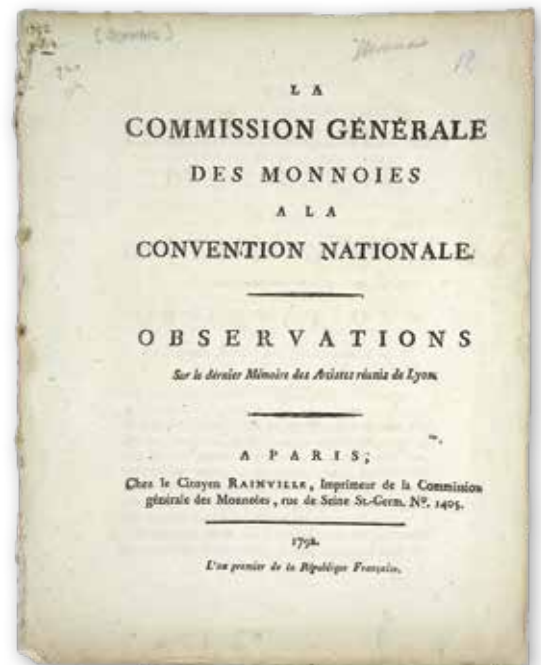

The printed limitation leaf states: "Exemplaire complet No quatorze / R. de P," (the italicized text is filled in by hand, followed by the author's signature, dated 26 mars 1841). Extremely rare: although Cumont states that 100 sets were printed, the list of subscribers appended to the second plate volume lists only 50. Truly a labor of love, this magnificent comprehensive work was begun at age thirty, and indeed, following his name on the atlas title, Conbrouse proudly confirms himself an *Amateur*. The author's name is variably given as Combrouse or Conbrouse; we are following Engel & Serrure in listing all of his titles under Conbrouse. This is the first set of this masterpiece of French numismatics that we have offered since Kolbe Sale 100 (2006). A previous description ascribes this binding to Petit (*successeur de Simier*), but we cannot confirm this. Cumont 483, giving the dates as 1839–1843: "Ouvrage tiré à 100 exemplaires." Engel & Serrure pages 207–208, uncharacteristically failing to accurately record the work at hand, though other works by this author seem also to have suffered the same fate. 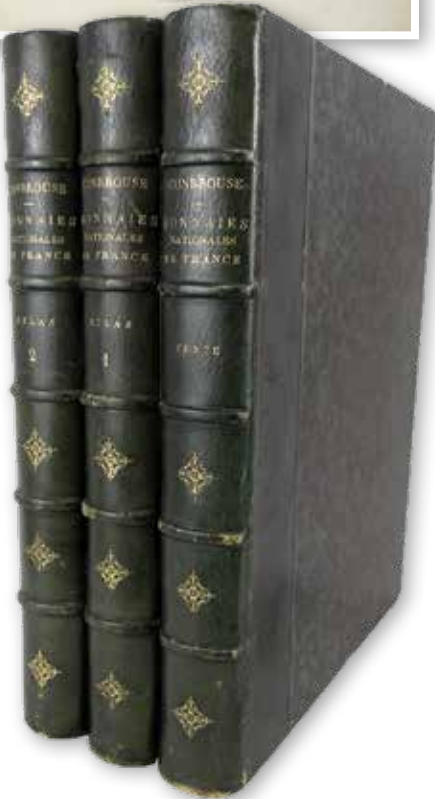

A rare treatise on coinage by this notable French intellectual. Complete as issued (the second pagination includes both the second and third *mémoires*). Marie-Jean-Antoine-Nicolas de Caritat, Marquis de Condorcet (1748–1794), was appointed as inspector general of the Paris Mint in 1775 by Jacques Turgot. One of his key assignments was to reform the system of weights and measures then being used by the kingdom. Among his correspondents was Benjamin Franklin, with whom he discussed much beyond their shared scientific interests. In a letter to Franklin written on 20 août 1783, Condorcet referred to the American Revolution as “la plus grande revolution politique dont on ait Conservé La mémoire, et La seule qui ait eu La conservation des droits des hommes pour motif, et le bonheur du genre humain pour objet” [“the greatest political revolution of which the memory has been Preserved, and the only one which had The preservation of the rights of men for motive, and the happiness of the human race for object”]. Condorcet came under the disapproval of the Montagnards in 1793, and he died in prison the following year.

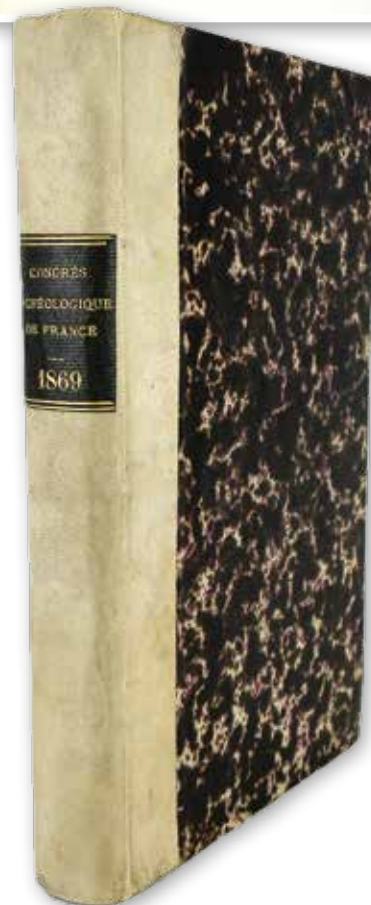
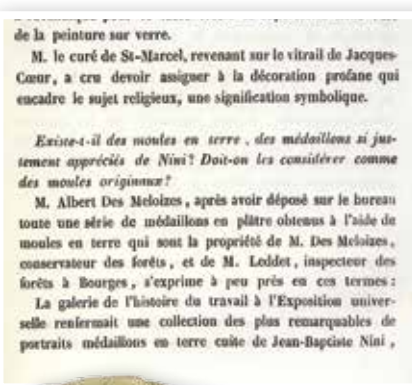

A very rare paper by Albert des Méloizes, in which he first discussed the moulds from which Jean-Baptiste Nini produced his terra cotta medallions. To quote Richard Margolis, “In this important paper, presented in 1868, the Marquis Albert des Méloizes describes at some length, and for the first time, the moulds from which Nini cast his medallions, insisting that the original moulds were made of terra cotta, rather than metal, which Villers had claimed. As part of his presentation he displayed (but didn't illustrate in his paper), a series of medallions in patinated plaster which had been cast from these moulds. A copy of this rare paper was examined in the library of the Musée Monétaire in Paris.” The actual title of Des Méloizes's contribution to the meeting is in the form of a question: “Existe-t-il des moules en terre, des médaillons si justement appréciés de Nini? Doit-on les considérer comme des moules origininaux?” We have used the more descriptive title used by Margolis when referring to it. Richard Margolis replied upon a photocopy of this paper (vide infra) when writing his *Benjamin Franklin in Terra Cotta*. The present volume is the only lot in this sale that was never actually owned by Margolis: as much as he tried, he never located an original copy. It has been posthumously added to his library secure in the knowledge that he would have eagerly purchased it had it been made available to him.

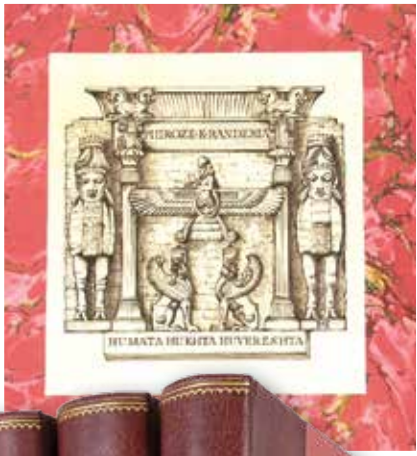

The first paper is discussed in the lot description above. The second paper first appeared in the *Mémoires de la Société des antiquaires du Centre* (Bourges, 1869, pages 307–325 and plates I–VI). To quote Richard Margolis, “This extremely valuable paper is insufficiently well known, due to the great rarity of the 1869 offprint, published following its original appearance the preceding year in a relatively obscure journal. It describes no fewer than forty of Nini’s moulds, illustrating thirty-eight of them on six plates of line drawings [lithographs]. Two of the moulds are Franklin portraits: the grand module long flowing hair type with Latin legend and Arabic date (des Méloizes 33), and a petit module high relief fur cap medallion (des Méloizes 34). The line drawings are portrayed as if they were medallions rather than moulds: that is, the legends are not retrograde, and the portraits face opposite to the direction that they face on the moulds.” Margolis searched for original printings of these papers for many years without success: the present volume is his working copy, and includes his annotations.

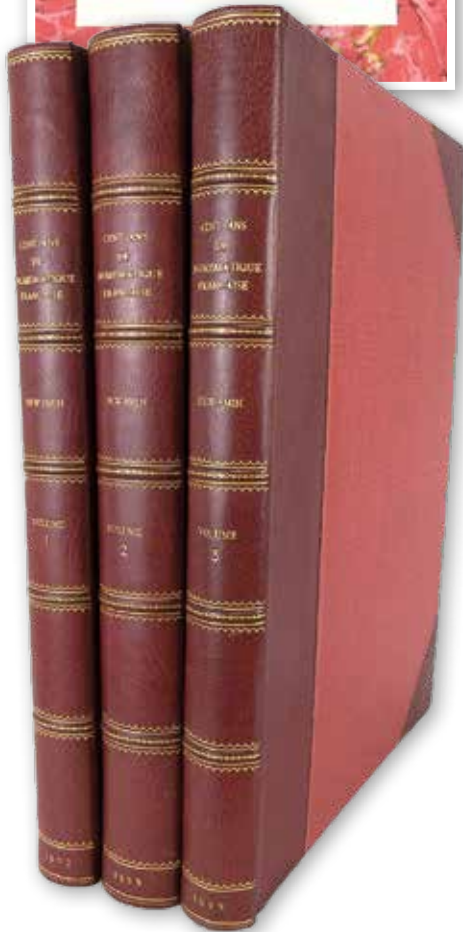

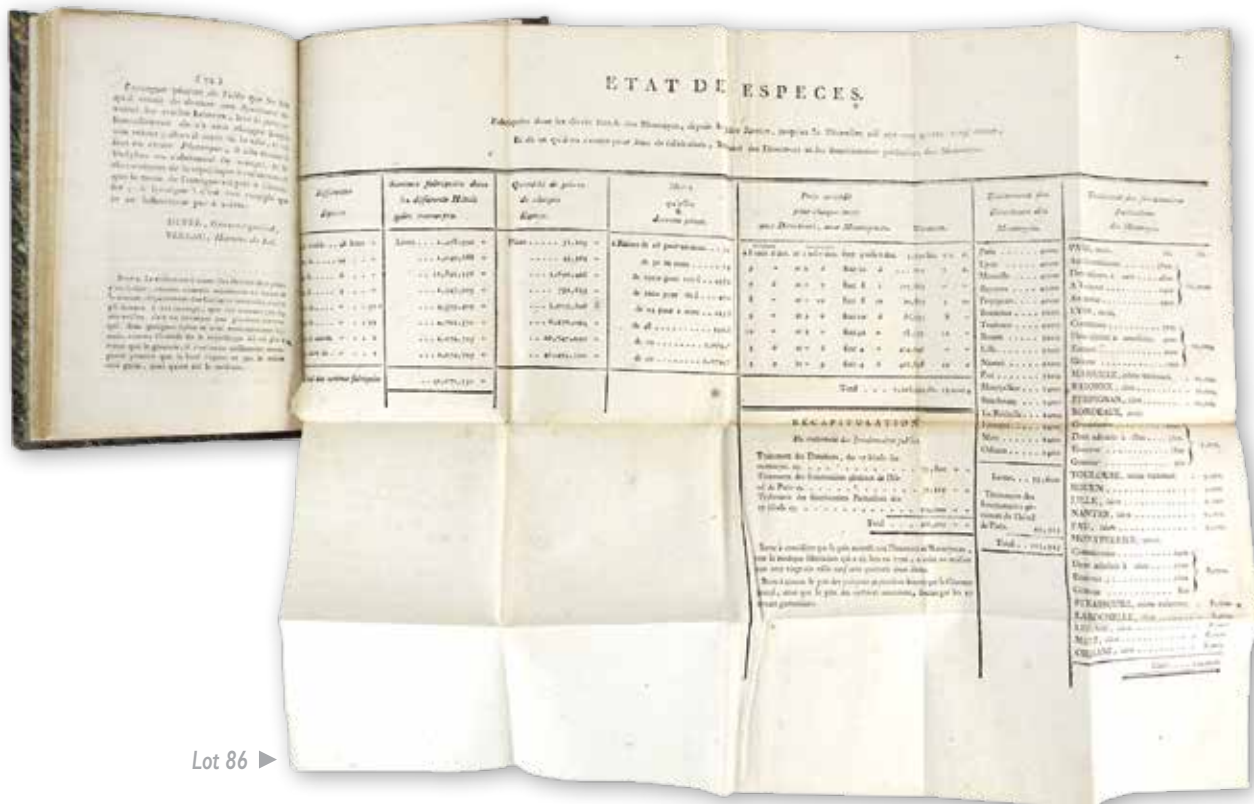

A remarkable volume of exceptional historical interest, from the library of Augustin Dupré. Bound together herein are three very rare publications by this renowned artist. Dupré (1748–1833), remains one of the most important engravers of French coins in modern history, and his designs for early U.S. medals (most notably the Libertas Americana) have ensured his lasting fame in the western hemisphere. An engraver by trade, Dupré began to work on medals in the early 1770s and quickly became adept. Notable works include several classic medals of the Comitia Americana series: those for Nathanael Greene, John Paul Jones and Daniel Morgan, as well as the related Diplomatic Medal and the Libertas Americana medal. Had the last been his only contribution to the field of American medals, he would justly have remained famous in this country. During the French Revolution, however, he became interested in applying his ideas to the new national coinage that was under discussion. On September 11, 1790, the National Assembly appointed a seven-member committee charged with studying the laws of coinage (Saunier, *Augustin Dupré*, page 48). Dupré wrote his October 1790 *Observations* addressed to the Comité des Monnoies de l'Assemblée Nationale, a short work that was printed at least three times, two of which should be considered drafts (only the final version is present in this volume). Richard Margolis has described this work as “Perhaps the best evidence of Dupré as advocate of change,” noting that in it, he “criticized the organization of the French Mints and suggested extensive changes in the existing Mint Administration.” The final lines of Dupré’s work call upon Newton as an example of the artist/scientist in service to his state: “L’exemple de Newton rendant sous ce rapport des services essentiels à sa patrie peut, je pense, servir d’excuse à ceux qui sont animés du même motif.” In early 1791, the Assembly adopted some of Dupré’s ideas and initiated a contest for new coin designs under the eye of painter Louis David. Dupré won the competition and became the 14th *graveur général des monnaies* on July 11, 1791: “L’Assemblée nationale, sur le rapport de son comité des monnaies, et après avoir entendu la lecture du procès-verbal de l’Académie de peinture et de sculpture, en date du 9 de ce mois, duquel il résulte qu’à la majorité absolue des voix, le sieur Dupré a

été jugé par cette Compagnie, le plus digne de la place de graveur général des monnaies, ordonne que le dit sieur Dupré se retirera auprès du Pouvoir exécutif pour se faire expédier une commission de graveur général des monnaies de France.” His neoclassical designs would win him fame and admiration that continue to this day. Dupré’s rise to prominence in a period of political upheaval made him enemies, however, and he was seriously threatened during the Terror when he was denounced by one Beyerlé, a former counselor to the parliament at Toulouse, who accused Dupré of poorly managing his responsibilities and producing inferior coinage. Dupré’s printed response is the second work present in this volume, and is of considerable importance. He not only defends himself, but insists on reforms he had proposed earlier. The final work present here was written with educational reformer Bertrand Verlac, an influential “homme de loi” and functionary with the Ministry of the Navy. It is a detailed response to a report to the Convention Nationale on the redesign of the coinage. Written at the height of the French Revolution, it is an important statement of Dupré’s beliefs and artistic vision, very much tempered by the practicalities of doing business in such an atmosphere without literally losing one’s head. Dupré managed to retain his position through these turbulent times, continuing in the role of *graveur général des monnaies* until being replaced by Pierre-Joseph Tiolier in 1803. All three of these works are rare, being known primarily from institutional holdings and being virtually unheard of on the secondary market. Little-known in the numismatic world, they are rarely listed in the usual bibliographies (Engel & Serrure list only a preliminary draft of the first work present here as 2376). They are unmentioned by Lipsius at the end of the eighteenth century and by Dekesel at the beginning of the twenty-first. O.-C. Reure’s *Bibliothèque des écrivains foréziens ou qui se rattachent au Forez par leur résidence ou leurs fonctions jusqu’en 1835* (Montbrison, 1914) lists all three works bound in this volume (pages 282–283), as do a few other specialized French bibliographies (though they remain unlisted by Brunet). They were virtually unknown to modern numismatists until the April 2, 2014 sale of the Dupré archives by Bonhams in New York, of which this was one of three similar volumes present. Our 2015 New York Book Auction included one of these volumes, a compilation of the three works present here along with two earlier printed drafts of the first work. It brought \$5500 plus the buyer’s premium. We sold the present volume privately to Richard Margolis from our 2014 Fixed Price Catalogue for \$4000. The final volume, very similar to the one here offered, brought \$4000 hammer in our Sale 146. One of the highlights of the Margolis library.

Edwards had a habit of biting off more than he could chew: his more commonly encountered *The Napoleon Medals* promises coverage to 1815 but stops at 1810; the present work claims to go through 1830 while in fact only six pages are devoted to "1816 to 1830," with 1824 being the latest date covered. 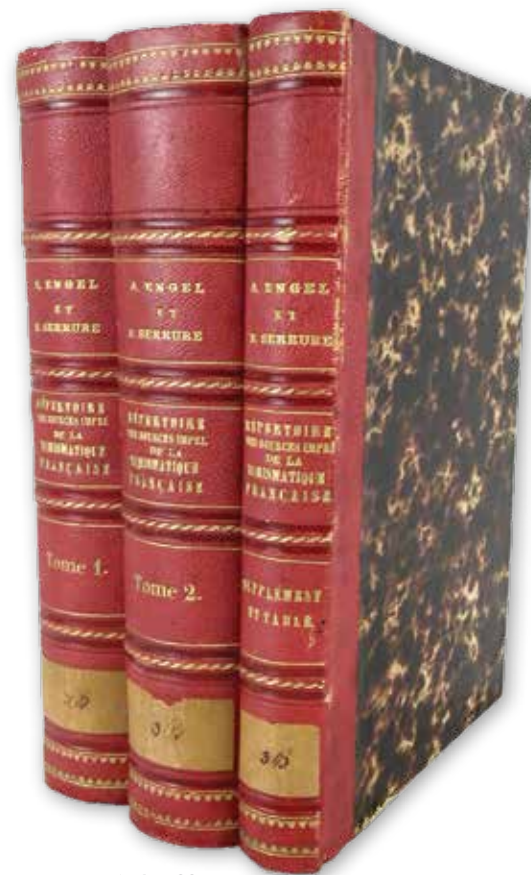

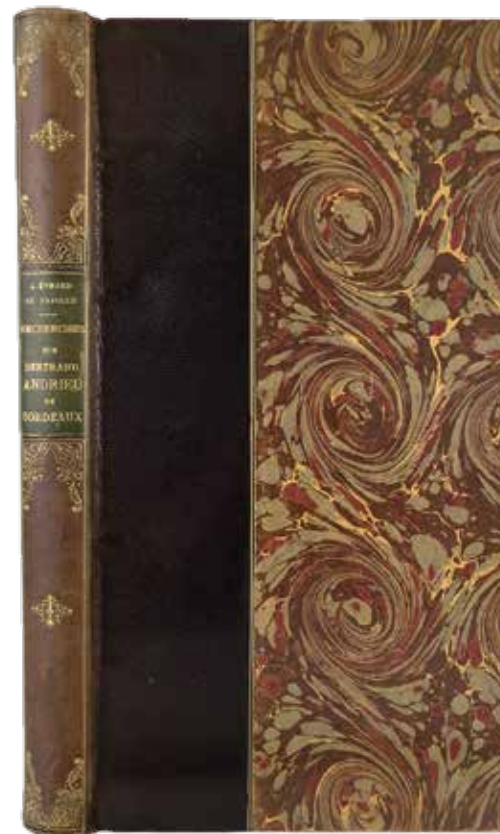

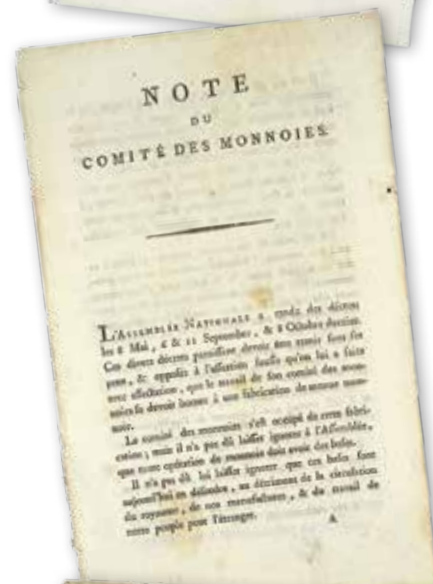

An extraordinary group of these primary documents, of unparalleled importance to those interested in the development of the French monetary system and of modern French coinage. Any one of these documents could easily be treated as a separate lot in this sale, and most of them were in fact acquired by Richard Margolis in piecemeal fashion. To break apart what took him decades to bring together, however, would be unconscionable. This is a rare opportunity to acquire an exceptionally focused group of French governmental documents concerning coinage from the period of the Revolution and extending into the early years of the Napoleonic era. The authors include a wide array of political figures of the day. The first pamphlet here present is by First Minister of Finances Jacques Necker (1732–1804), an occasionally popular and occasionally controversial figure remembered today for his efforts to make state finances more transparent and for his early warnings about the use of assignats. Other notable figures represented in this group of writers include: Étienne Clavière (1735–1793), an associate of Honoré Mirabeau, the subject of some of the essays here present; Charles-Maurice de Talleyrand-Périgord (1754–1838), the Bishop of Autun; René de Girardin (1735–1808); Anne-Pierre, marquis de Montesquiou-Fézensac (1739–1798); Jean-Jacques Duval d'Epréménil (1745–1794), who died on the guillotine; Jean-Pierre Couturier (1741–1818); François-Henri, comte de Virieu (1754–1793); Louis Marie Antoine Destouff de Milet de Mureau (1756–1825); Jean-Pierre Saurine (1733–1813); Charles Tarbé (1756–1804); Jean-Barthélémy Le Couteulx de Canteleu de Fresnelles (1746–1818); Jean-Baptiste Souton, the Mintmaster at Pau; Pierre-Joseph Cambon (1756–1820); Anne-Alexandre-Marie Thibault (1747–1813); and Nicolas-Bernard-Joachim-Jean Belzais de Courménil (1747–1804). Virtually every aspect of the coinage reform is discussed in these important primary documents. While the estimate given is very modest, this lot is in some respects the heart and soul of the Margolis Library, and it is worthy of serious consideration.

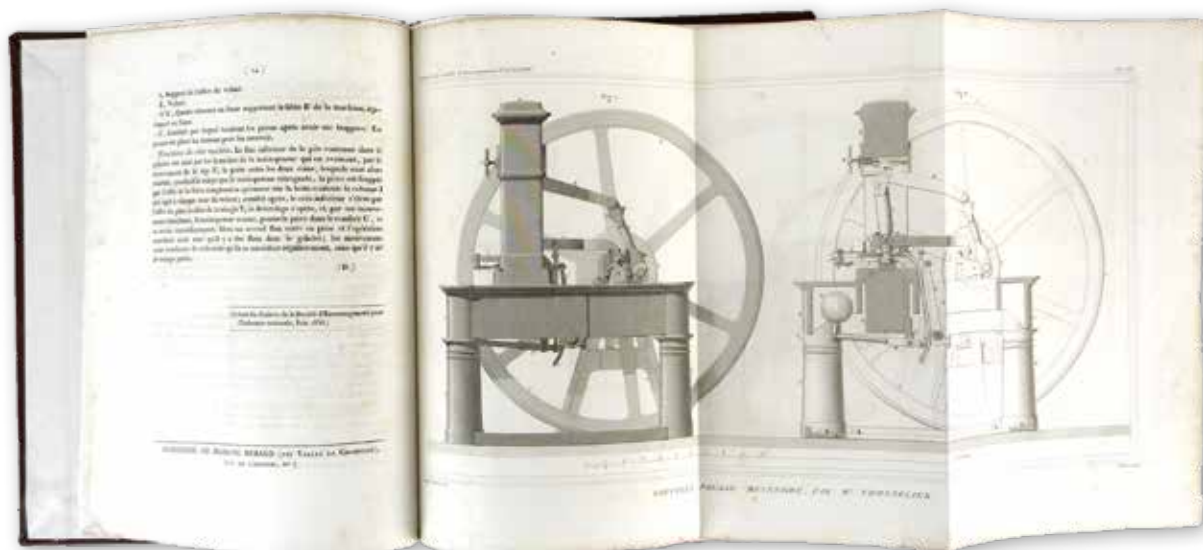

On September 11, 1790, the National Assembly appointed a seven-member committee charged with studying the laws of coinage. The present document discusses each of the primary mint positions, the qualifications for the offices, the chief job functions, and so on. Augustin Dupré (1748–1833), one of the most important engravers of French coins in modern history, submitted his ideas for a national coinage to the Comité des Monnoies de l'Assemblée Nationale, which adopted a number of them; on July 11, Dupré was named the 14th graveur général des monnaies. The process of reorganizing the French monetary system and mint was among the more onerous tasks facing the new government, and we can observe this process through these pages. Especially important volumes of this extraordinary twenty-volume work, the 19th century's outstanding contribution to medallic and glyptic art. The massive, extensively illustrated work has never been approached in concept or scope and, after the better part of two centuries, some sections have yet to be superseded and remain essential sources of information. The plates utilized a new process, perfected in France by Achille Collas. They were engraved with a pantographic ruling machine and, in addition to being of great visual appeal, the illustrations were the most accurate ever achieved. This technical innovation, widely heralded at the time, was, within a few decades, overtaken by photographic printing processes and is relatively little known today. Increased interest in medal collecting in recent years has made relevant volumes in the series, particularly those devoted to French medals, particularly sought after and, consequently, quite expensive and difficult to acquire. These particular volumes are devoted to French medals and coins, with the second volume focused on ones designed and engraved by Georges Dupré and Jean Warin. Babelon 143. Clain-Stefanelli 14551*. A rare survival. The complete French Revolution volume, as it was originally published, unbound, with loose plates and housed in paper wraps. The *Trésor* volumes are often enough seen in somewhat simple red boards with a lettered spine label that it seems safe to refer to that as the original binding, but it would seem that each separate fascicle was also distributed in wraps, as here, for those who wished to have their copies bound privately. David Block discussed this work in the Summer 1985 issue of *The Asylum*: "The great illustrated catalogs of Napoleonic medals are part of Charles Lenormant's *Trésor de numismatique et de glyptique*... The volume containing medals of the French revolution first appeared in 1836, followed several years later by a volume covering the First Empire ... the editors published for the first time many medals from imperial times." Leturcq mentions that not all works attributed to Pompadour ... are her own inasmuch as only five engraved gems can be certainly attributed to her hand. More important are her engravings of the Guay gems, some 52 to be precise, which are reproduced on the plates... Among other plates in this interesting work is the famous plate reproduced from Mariette showing a gem engraver at work, also a facsimile of Guay's handwriting, and a pair of sepia-tinted plates giving facsimiles of Boucher designs."

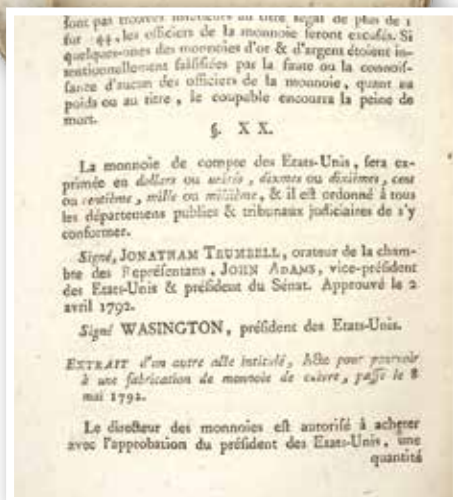

Very rare, and of the highest importance in illustrating the genesis of modern French coinage and the monetary system it represents. These two reports to the Convention Nationale, submitted by Pierre Loysel on behalf of the Comité des Finances, are detailed and wide-ranging, providing a clear account of the thinking behind the new French monetary system and coinage. Significantly, both of these *rappports* draw extensively upon the Mint Act adopted by the fledgling United States only the year before (*An Act Establishing a Mint, and Regulating the Coins of the United States*), citing it and translating it fully or in abridged form. The first draft decree is especially thorough, devoting chapters to discussing the purity and weight of coins, production and striking, essays, judging the correctness of coins, and providing for a minor coinage, all before proceeding to outlining a draft *projet de décret* that addresses all of these concerns in the form of proposed legislation. This is followed (beginning on page 29) with a discussion of the United States Mint Act of April 2, 1792, which shared the French interest in the decimal system and the use of devices emblematic of Liberty. In addition to the main Mint Act, the May 8, 1792 *Act to Provide for a Copper Coinage* is also discussed. The first draft decree closes with an extract from the registers of the Academy of Sciences, outlining the Academy's insistence on uniformity in the coinage. The second report is more condensed, with the opening chapters devoted to discussing the purity and weight of coins, and to production and striking, followed by a table giving the ratios of the weight and value of the projected currency with the currency of the day. The draft *projet de décret* is then laid out, followed by a detailed report by the commissioners of the former Academy of Sciences, who spend several pages outlining the rigorous experiments they conducted in order to conclude that striking precious metal coins with an alloy added was preferable to striking them in pure metal. The second report then closes with extracts from the 1792 United States Mint Act and the Act providing for a copper coinage. Pierre Loysel (1751–1813) served on the National Convention as deputy representing the department of Aisne. He is best remembered today for his unsuccessful attempt to save the chemist Antoine Lavoisier from the guillotine and for his legislative efforts to provide the new Republic with a suitable coinage. These are the only examples of these publications we have ever offered, and we believe they are of exceptional interest to both French and American numismatists.

As listed in the extended title, the *Miroir* covered a number of topics, "Contenant tous ce qui a rapport aux Sciences, aux Arts et au Commerce; des Prophéties, des Anecdotes et des particularités curieuses; les opinions de Fénelon, de Bossuet, du cardinal Mazarin, de Voltaire, etc. du grand Frédéric, de Louis XV, de Louis XVI et autres Souverains, sur les courtisans, sur les Ecrivains qui avilissent leur plume, sur les Pamphlets, et sur les moyens de connaître la vérité." Volume Two includes commentary on industry and commerce, merchants and money. The table des matières in the first volume claims a total of 116 plates, which is correct if one includes the two folding maps. Louis-Marie Prudhomme (1752–1830) was a writer, printer and bookseller who frequently found himself in trouble for his criticism of various regimes, before, during, and following the revolutionary period. The first two editions of the *Miroir* consist only of two volumes, and this much-expanded six-volume edition is preferred. 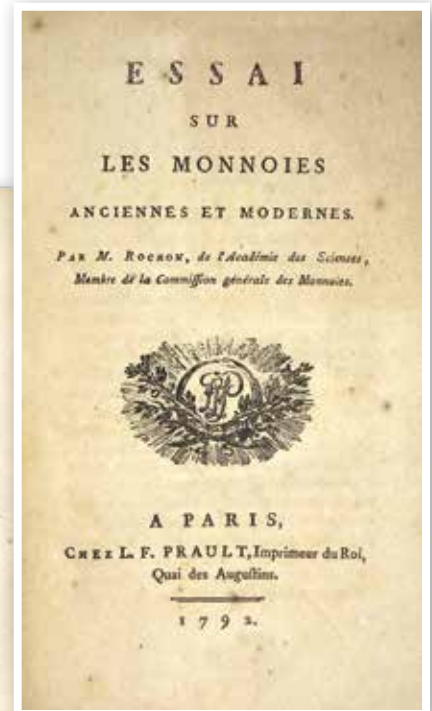

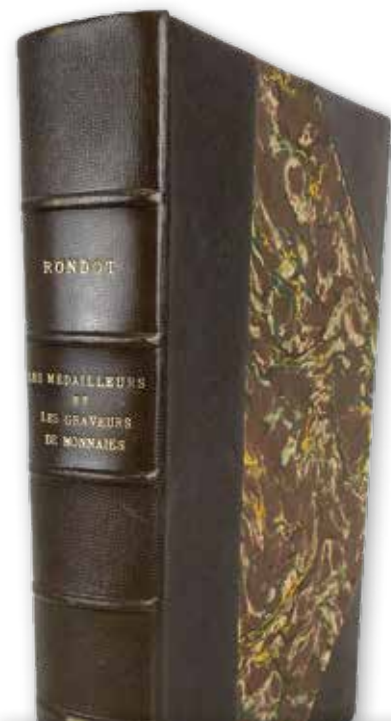

No. 91 of only 200 copies issued of this classic work, most of which have long since perished. Richard Margolis described the work as follows:

Storelli was for many years the standard work on Nini. Its usefulness was limited only by its rarity, a mere 200 copies having been printed. It added a number of important details to the known facts of Nini's life; particularly significant is the full text of the employment agreement of October 1, 1772 between Nini and Leray de Chaumont. It provides incontrovertible proof of Nini's existence, and of his engagement at the



Château of Chaumont, which the odd claims of the Vignerons on behalf of their ancestor, the ceramicist Claude Gautherot, had attempted to usurp. ¶ Storelli was the first to illustrate all (or nearly all) of Nini's medallions, although only at a stated two-thirds of actual size. While a total of one hundred and seven medallions are described, the great majority from the collection of the Prince de Broglie, thirty-seven of them are variants of basic types, so that seventy major portrait types are listed and illustrated. This is only six more than Villers had described but had not illustrated, many years earlier. ¶ Storelli lists nine different Franklin medallions, including three rarities which are omitted by Villers ...

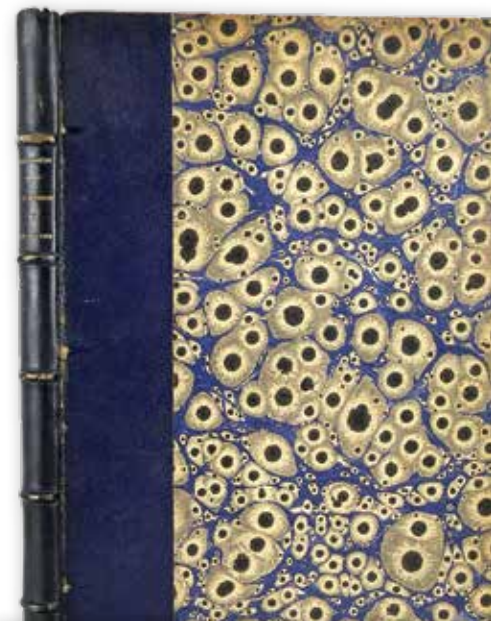

The earliest work devoted to Nini and his terra cottas. It seems appropriate here to quote Richard Margolis's own description of this work, taken from the annotated bibliography he appended to his *Benjamin Franklin in Terra Cotta* (page 209):

The author of this exceptionally rare sixty-three page pamphlet, which originated in the form of a presentation to the Société des Sciences et Lettres de Loir-et-Cher on November 8, 1861, was the first director of the Blois Museum. His slim pamphlet put Nini "on the map," so to speak. Villers collected information about Nini's life and work, aided by recollections of elderly workmen who either knew Nini or knew him by repute. He wrote a sensitive appreciation of his portrait medallions, and supplemented this with a descriptive catalogue of sixty-four of them (plus one additional variant), noting the public and private collections which included them. He donated some forty-nine of the medallions he had collected to the Blois Museum. Although there had been a few brief, earlier references to Nini in the literature, and a limited number of auction offerings and donations to museums of his portrait medallions prior to 1861, the Villers pamphlet is the first work of substance on Nini, and remains of considerable value to the specialist. ¶ It was Villers, however, who suggested that Nini's original moulds were metal rather than clay, a theory which was disputed and discredited by the Marquis des Méloizes a few years later. It is a matter of considerable regret that Villers died in 1887, before a second edition of this work, then in preparation, was to be published. According to a note in *l'Intermédiaire des chercheurs et curieux*, of 10 mars 1887, it was intended to be an illustrated edition. If Villers' manuscript still exists and could be located (there is no indication that it has survived), it would be of great interest, particularly since it would have been published a few years before Émile Balon began his activities. ¶ Villers lists six different Franklin medallions, three of *petit module*: 1) a normal fur cap, the variant with an incuse fleur de lis in back, hence most likely the circa 119 mm variety [Villers 43]; 2) a fur cap with spectacles, lacking legend and self-frame [Villers 44]; 3) a higher relief fur cap with a single date [Villers 45]; 4-6) and three grand module medallions, namely the long flowing hair type with legend in



Latin, dated 1779 [Villers 46]; the long flowing hair with legend in Latin, dated MDCCLXXIX [Villers 47]; and the long flowing hair with legend in French, dated 1779 [Villers 48].

This is the only copy of this very rare work we have ever handled. Indeed, it would appear to be one of only three copies to be offered at auction since 1949. It was acquired by Richard Margolis directly through Douglas Saville at Spink in December 1989, and was previously in the library of Étienne Page (Vinchon sale of 3 octobre 1989). A very rare opportunity.

Edited by the antiquary Richard Gough, this second, and preferred, edition was given a new printed title page (lacking in this copy), two additional plates, and notes by both Gough and Charles Combe with transcriptions of documentary sources.

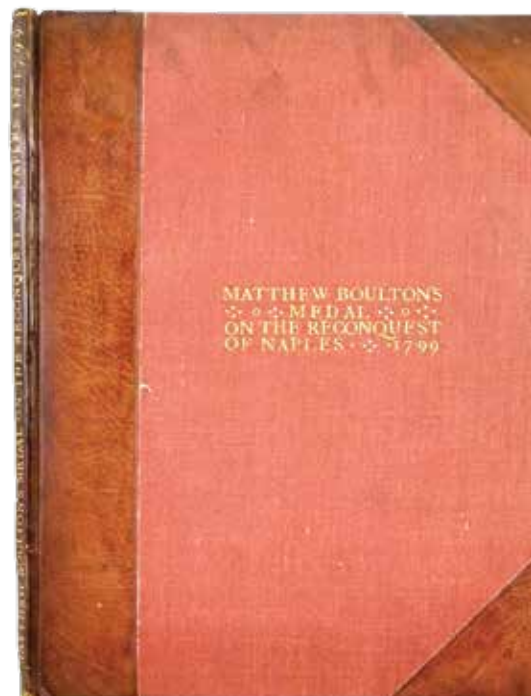

The noted Irish poet was Chairman of "The Committee Appointed to Advise the Government on Coinage Designs" authorized by the 1926 Mint Act for Saorstát Éireann, i.e., the Irish Free State. Designs were submitted by Jerome Connor, Paul Manship, Percy Metcalfe, Carl Milles, Publio Morbiducci, Albert Power, Oliver Sheppard and Ivan Mestrovic. A foreword in Gaelic is followed by Yeats's "What We Did or Tried to Do," a history of Irish coinage, a summary of the proceedings of the committee, and biographies of the artists. The appendix includes bilingual texts of *The Coinage Act of 1926* and the excellent photographically printed plates depict the various coin designs submitted, including Percy Metcalfe's "Designs as originally submitted" and "Designs as accepted for Coinage." Yeats's connection with numismatics appears to be little known in the literary world. In an explanation of the coinage committee's aims, he wrote: "As the most famous and beautiful coins are the coins of the Greek Colonies, especially of those in Sicily, we decided to send photographs of some of these, and one coin of Carthage, to our selected artists, and to ask them, as far as possible, to take them as a model. But the Greek coins had two advantages that ours could not have, one side need not balance the other, and either could be stamped in high relief, whereas ours must pitch and spin to please the gambler, and pack into rolls to please the banker." Apparently one of only 375 copies printed, copies of which are usually found with the cloth binding smudged and discolored, and the pages foxed and spotted; while this copy's binding is typical, its contents are somewhat cleaner than most.

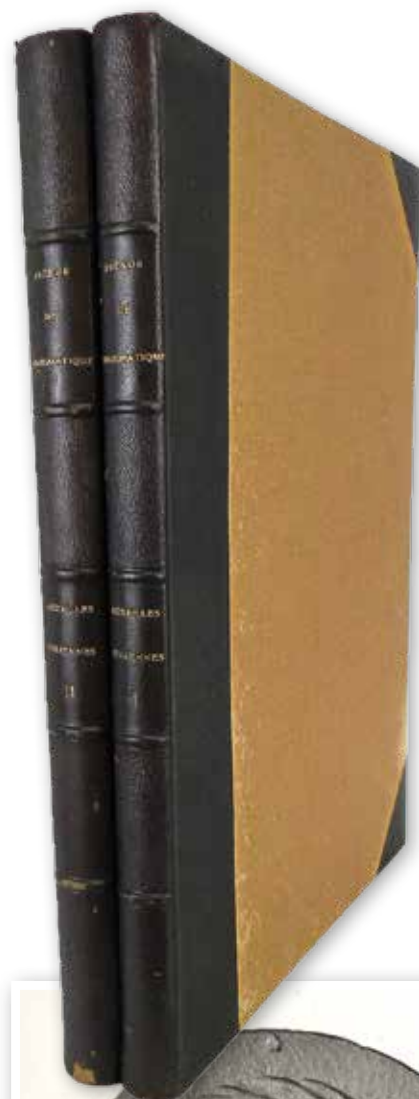
The volume devoted to Italian Renaissance medals, from this extraordinary twenty-volume work, the 19th century's outstanding contribution to medallic and glyptic art. The massive, extensively illustrated work has never been approached in concept or scope and, after the better part of two centuries, some sections have yet to be superseded and remain essential sources of information. The volumes were produced beginning in 1834; on the completion of the series in 1858, updated title pages were produced for the remaining unsold copies so they could be sold (as in the first volume here) under a uniform imprint. The plates utilized a new process, perfected in France by Achille Collas. They were engraved with a pantographic ruling machine and, in addition to being of great visual appeal, the illustrations were the most accurate ever achieved. This technical innovation, widely heralded at the time, was, within a few decades, overtaken by photographic printing processes and is relatively little known today. Increased interest in medal collecting in recent years has made relevant volumes in the series, particularly those devoted to French and Italian medals, particularly sought after and, consequently, quite expensive and difficult to acquire. 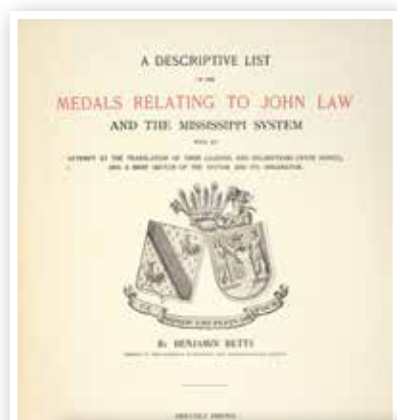
Numismata Typographica is the second, greatly improved, edition of Blades's numismatic magnum opus. It remains the standard work on the topic and is of exceptional rarity. The work is not recorded in Clain-Stefanelli (though a 48-page work, written in French and published in 1880 is cited), Grierson, nor the *Dictionary Catalogue* of the Library of the American Numismatic Society (the ANS acquired its copy only in 1989). It was originally issued in installments in the *Printers' Register* from July 1878 to February 1883. As the preface states, "a very limited number has now been reprinted, partly for friendly presentation, and partly to afford any one interested in the subject an easier means of reference than the pages of a serial publication." In Blades's obituary appearing in the 1890 *American Journal of Numismatics*, W.T.R. Marvin calls his collection of the medals of printers "probably unrivaled." Marvin mentions Blades's 1869 work but when referring to the 1883 edition underscores its rarity even at that time by stating: "The latter work we have not seen, but it is highly commended by those competent to judge." Comparing the 1869 with the 1883 edition, the *Dictionary of National Biography* terms the latter "improved and enlarged." It also notes that only twenty-five copies of the 1869 edition were printed (Jehne, in *Über Buchdruck-Medaillen*, says 100). Judging from copies known to be extant, however, the lower number may be correct. William Blades was a noted printing historian and was one of the best known and respected English printers of his time. His works on William Caxton, England's first printer, remain valuable even today.

Milford Haven’s son, Louis Mountbatten, wrote that “At that date the manuscript was complete, but the printing and editing had not been completed, so that for a time the work remained in abeyance... With my mother’s concurrence, therefore, my wife and I decided that the best form of tribute we could pay to my father’s memory would be to publish this final volume, thus completing the work that had been interrupted by the author’s death... To my father this work meant much more than the mere cataloguing of his collection of medals, and in truth he has produced a medallic history of all Navies; a perpetual memorial to the great traditions of the sea.” The first volume includes Milford Haven’s extensive listing of Admiral Vernon medals and other pieces of American interest. The final volume features over 150 pages of indispensable information, with numerous fine illustrations, on medals of the United States of America. Featured are chapters on Christopher Columbus medals, a chronological list of American medals, commemorative medals, life-saving medals, a general index, and an index of inscriptions. The final, and most complete, edition of this landmark of American numismatic literature. An early issue, apparently published to utilize a remaining quantity of text and plates, and accompanied by additional text not found in earlier editions. This 1851 imprint appears to have often included less than the full complement of plates and, sometimes, no plates at all. Seldom are copies encountered, as here, with all of Saxton's handsome engravings, plus the two added illustrations of pioneer gold coins. Indeed, the only items not included are the two actual samples of California gold on page 235, which are found only in a small number of copies published in 1849 without the final supplements present here. The scarce December 1849 supplement comprising pages 221–240 contains the attractive plate of California and Mormon gold coins (probably the earliest metallic embossed coin illustrations produced in this country) and the tipped-in Mormon plate. The actual gold samples included in some copies were never included in this (i.e., they have not been removed, but were never present to begin with). This copy also contains the rare two-page 1851 addenda, including a depiction of the new three-cent silver piece. At the time of publication, this was the only practical guide available to American coin collectors. It was the first work to illustrate the 1804 dollar and was one of the earliest works to combine daguerreotype photography, electrotyping, embossing, and the medal ruling machine for illustrative purposes. 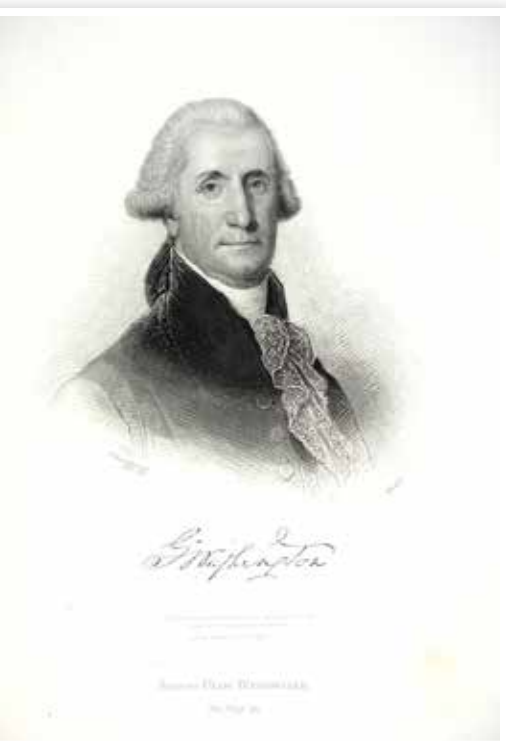

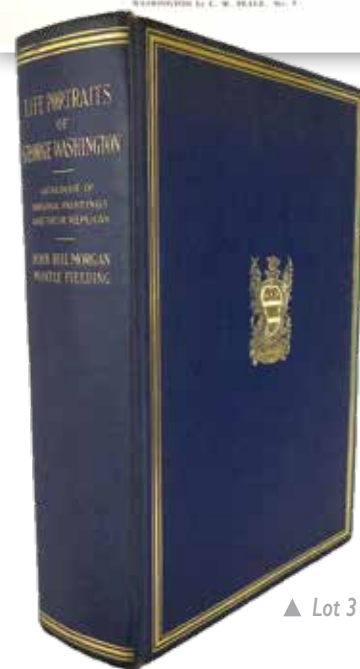
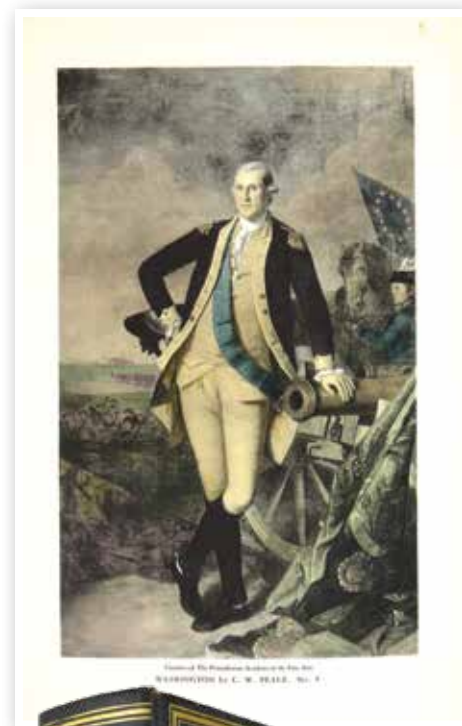

"Alexandre Vattemare is recognized among American numismatists as one of the fathers of the discipline in the New World, having assembled the first comprehensive collections of American coins, medals, and paper currency, and produced the first comprehensive catalog of American numismatics." — Alan Stahl, in *The Extravagant Ambassador: The True Story of Alexandre Vattemare, the French Ventriloquist Who Changed the World*. Vattemare developed the System of International Exchanges, initially aimed at the exchange of duplicate books between libraries, especially government publications, and later extended to include works of art, maps, natural history specimens, coins, medals and other similar objects. He came to America in 1839 and again in 1847, and was granted funds by Congress and by several state legislatures to further his scheme, which met with greater success here than in Europe. This elusive 1861 work describing American coins, medals and tokens from 1652 to 1858 was written to complement the collection given to the Bibliothèque Impériale (Nationale) in the name of the government and citizens of the United States. Following an interesting historical overview, from colonial issues to pioneer gold, some 381 pieces are described in detail. Scarce and important.

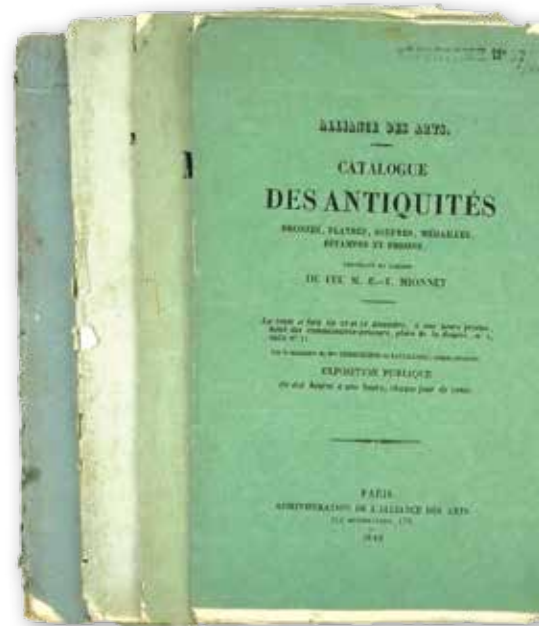

The present offering is strongest in auction catalogues issued by French firms, particularly those relevant to Richard Margolis’s personal collecting areas, but is also exceptional for its offering of British catalogues from the early 20th century, most notably the handsomely bound volumes of Sotheby’s catalogues from the library of Leonard Forrer. Other highlights include a nearly complete set of *Ars Classica* catalogues in matching bindings, early catalogues including one from 1799, important sales of Russian coins, and Margolis’s personal set of his own fixed price catalogues.

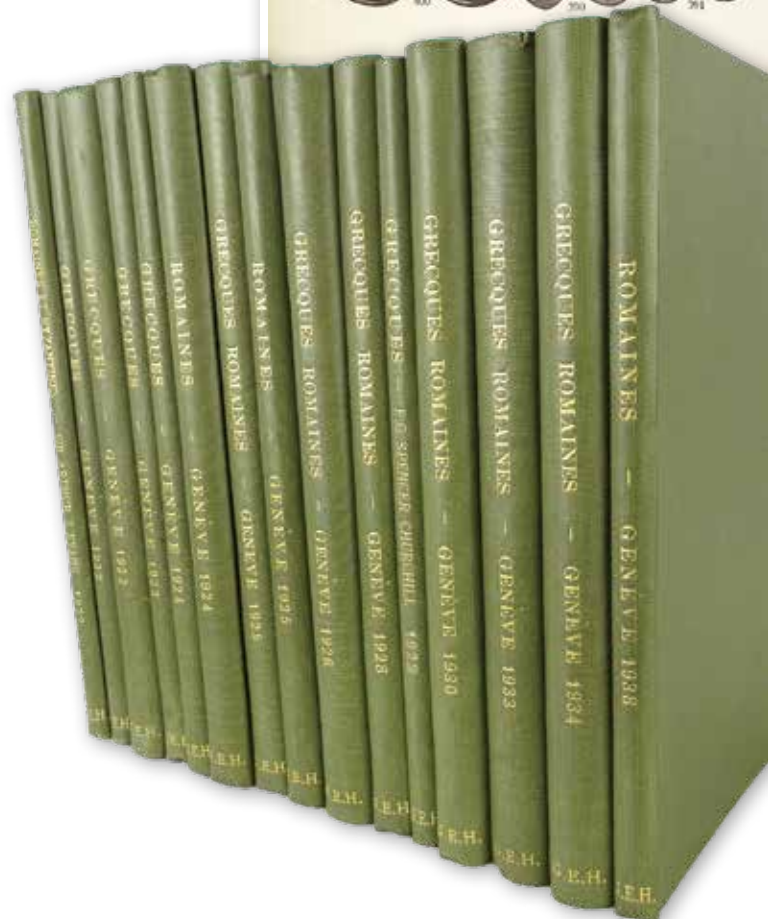

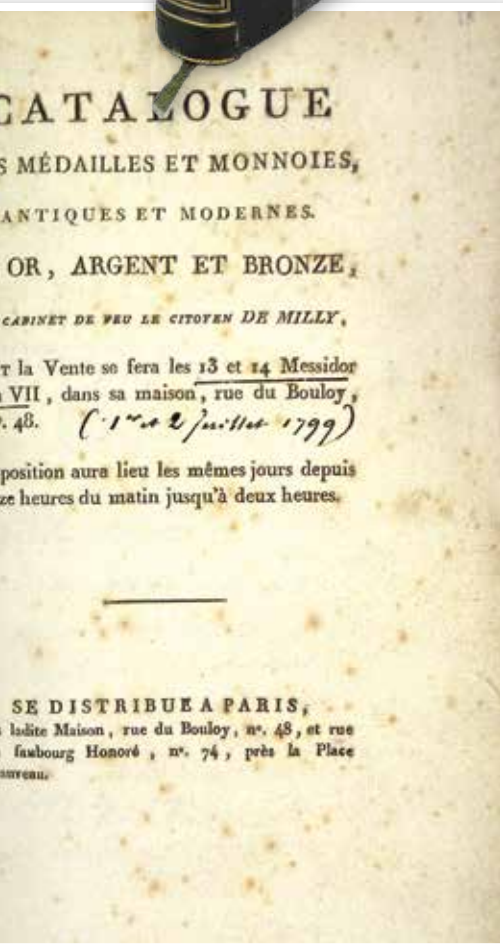
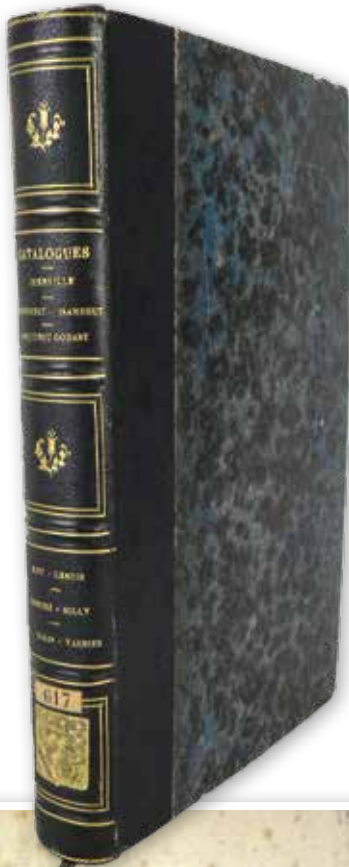

Superbly illustrated and meticulously catalogued by Dr. Jacob Hirsch, the *Ars Classica* catalogues comprise one of the most important series of auction sales of choice ancient Greek and Roman coins ever issued, and they remain indispensable in establishing and tracing pedigrees. The original plates, which have few peers for the period, are of exceptional quality and allow one to definitively plate match coins for provenance purposes. Fifteen of the *Ars Classica* sales offering ancient coins are present here (lacking only Sales I and II; Sale IX offered rare Swiss coins). Most of the catalogues present here are in above average condition, with several including original printed prices realized lists (which are infrequently encountered). All of these sales are listed in the Clain-Stefanelli and Grierson bibliographies. Rather than providing a tedious listing of numerical citations, it may be worth pointing out that John Spring, in his *Ancient Coin Auction Catalogues*, includes 11 of these catalogues in his listing of “Most important sales of ancient Greek coins,” 2 in his listing of “Most important sales of Celtic coins,” 4 in his listing of “Most important sales of aes grave,” 1 in his listing of “Most important sales of struck Roman Republican coins,” 8 in his listing of “Most important sales of Roman Imperial coins,” 2 in his listing of “Most important sales of Byzantine coins,” and 1 in his listing of “Most important sales of coins of the barbarian migrations.” A strong partial set of this most important series of catalogues. 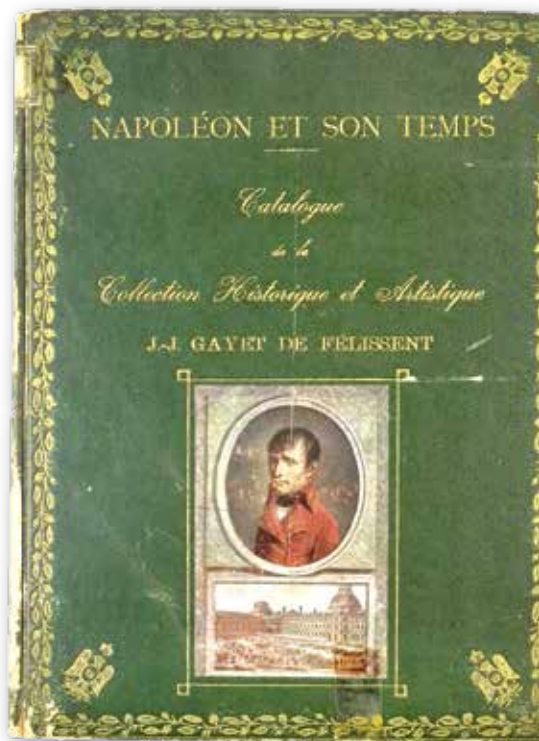

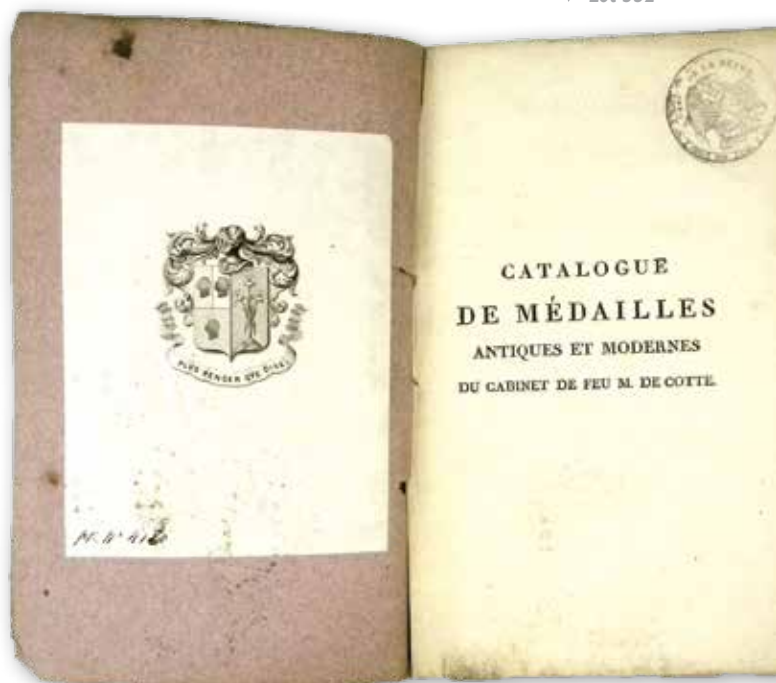

Jules-François de Cotte (1721–1810) was *Directeur et contrôleur de la monnaie des médailles* from 1767 to 1803, a remarkable span of time encompassing both the reign of Louis XVI and the revolutionary era. As such, he corresponded with Benjamin Franklin about the famous Libertas Americana medal. In an important letter sent to Franklin on 26 mars 1783, de Cotte wrote of these medals that "Les 2 d'or, 20 d'Argent et 20 de bronze, que vous avez demandé, seront demain en Etat d'être livrées à la personne que vous chargerez de les retirer des mains du S. Roger principal Commis de la Monnoye des Médailles" (*The Papers of Benjamin Franklin*, Volume 39, page 391). This fixes the date of the production of the gold Libertas Americana medals and is of the highest importance to American medallic history. While perhaps secondary to the catalogue at hand, it illustrates the importance of the person whose collection was here offered. The collection offered was very large, but unfortunately it was mostly grouped into large lots, reasonably well described, but still extensive (the bulk of the Roman collection, some 6119 pieces, comprises lot 143; the previous lot offered 660 sestertii). 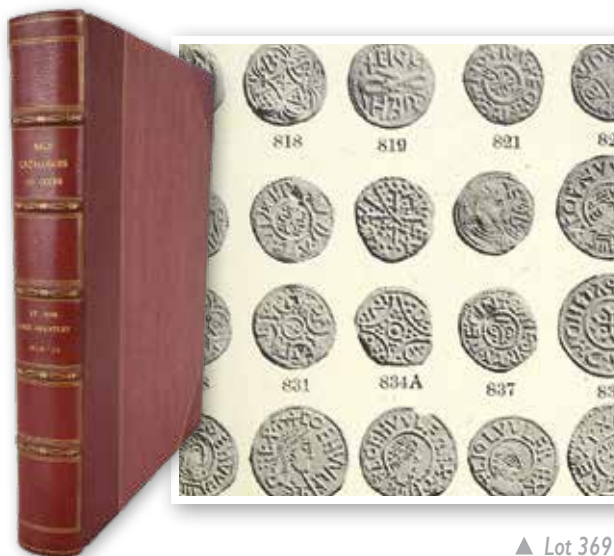

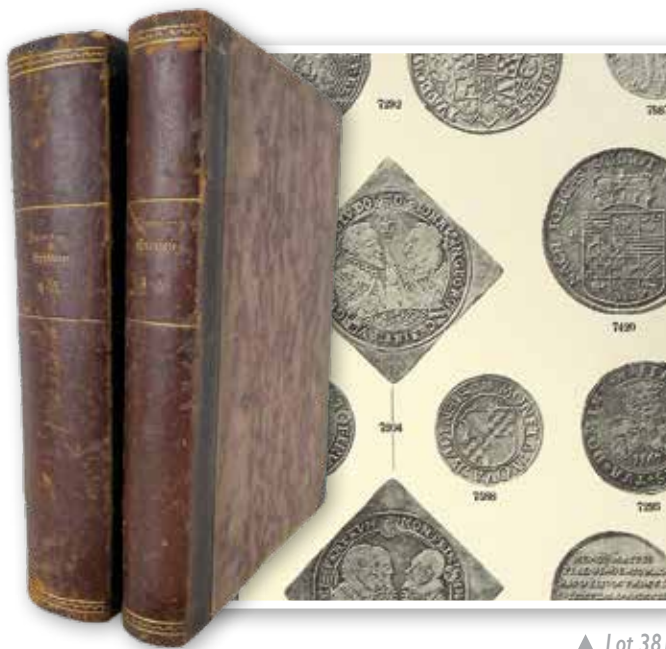

Published in a modest duplicated format, the early Margolis lists are rarely encountered. Introducing himself in his first list, Margolis wrote, "I am at least as anxious to buy good foreign material as to sell it, not only choice crowns and talers, but interesting minor coins, essays, medals, tokens, etc. I will pay really good prices for above average material, and believe it will be worth your while to write me if you have anything for sale." Even in his first four-page listing (1958), Margolis comes across as a careful cataloguer and a meticulous professional. The later lists are more professional in appearance and are illustrated. The main series ended with No. 59 in 1979. Margolis revived it, however, twenty-one years later, issuing a modestly produced list of numismatic literature for sale as Fixed Price List No. 60. A remarkable run of publications.

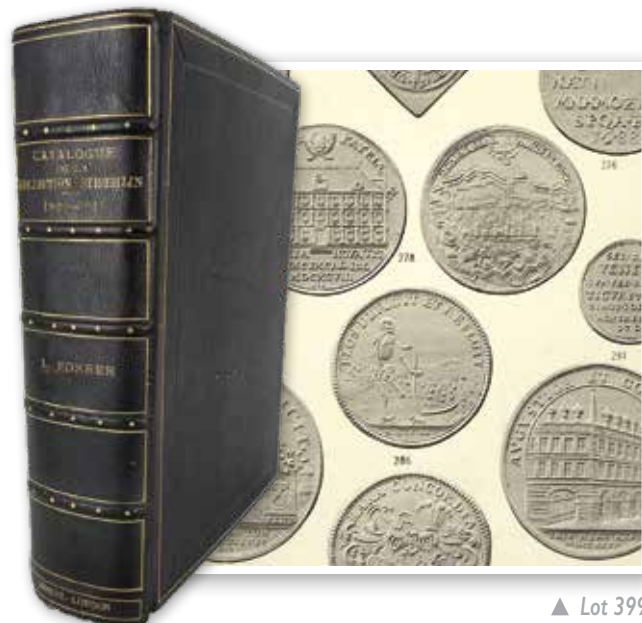

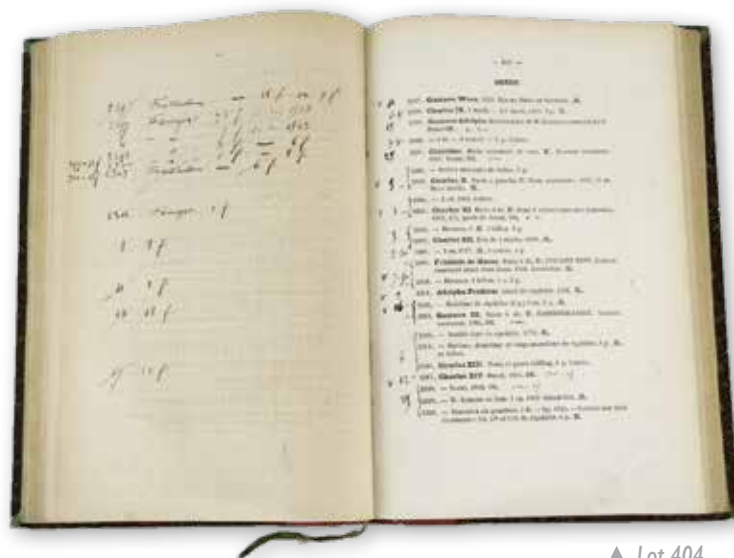

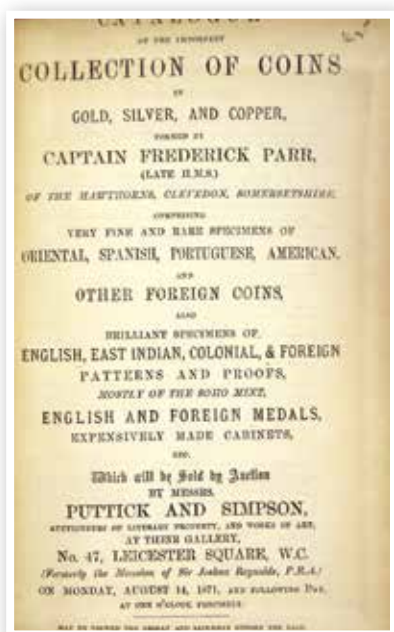

A substantial group of Schulman catalogues, mostly from before the Second World War, offering an enormous range of ancient, medieval and modern coins and medals. The Schulman firm began with Jacques (Jacob) Schulman (1849–1914), who was the primary cataloguer during his lifetime. His sons Maurits (1876–1943) and André (1877–1936) continued the firm and constituted the second generation. Their respective sons Hans (1913–90) and Jacques (1906–91) were the third generation. Laurens and Robert, sons of Jacques, were the fourth generation. These earlier catalogues are truly remarkable for the wide variety of coins offered and the expertise with which the firm handled them. The descriptions are thorough and often scholarly, and the firm clearly relished offering unusual pieces, with colonial coins and obsidional pieces frequently included, along with Islamic and Asian coins and other *numismatica* rarely encountered in other catalogues of the period.

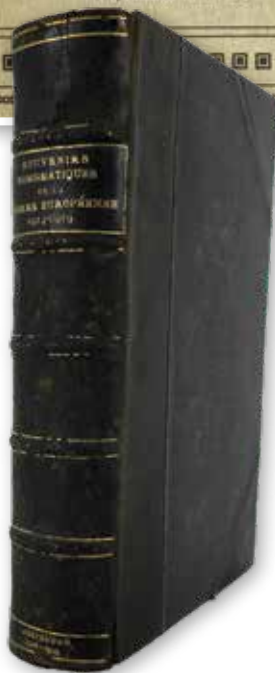

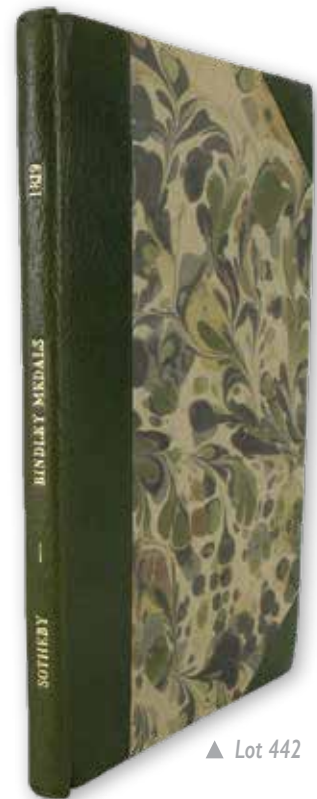

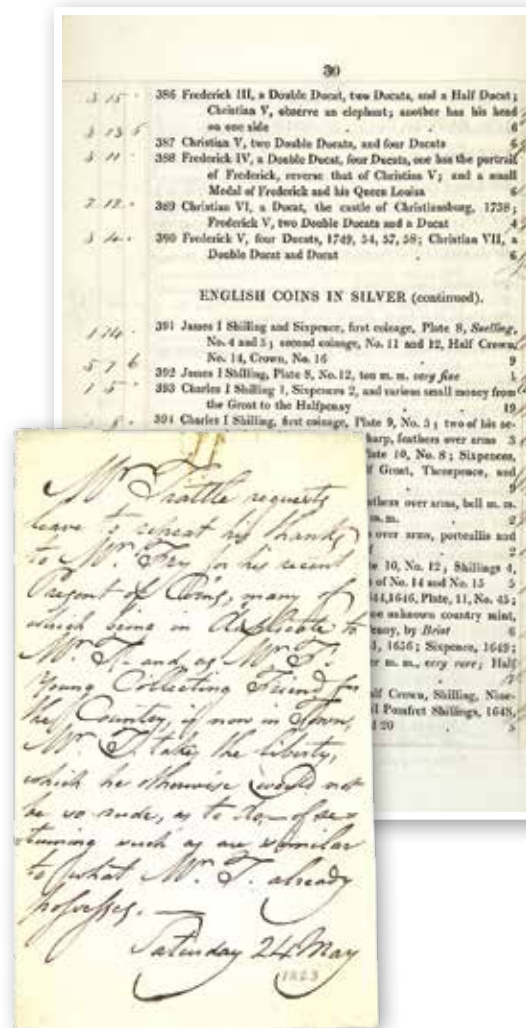

The sale as a whole brought over £10,900, an amazing sum. The letter reads: "Mr. Trattle requests leave to repeat his thanks for Mr. Fry for his recent Present of Coins, many of which being in duplicate to Mr. T, and as Mr. F's Young Collecting Friend from the Country, is now in Town, Mr. T. takes the liberty, which he otherwise would not be so rude, as to do, of returning such as are similar to what Mr. T. already possesses." A modicum of descriptive and narrative content suggests that the *Circulaire* could be considered a periodical, but the overwhelming emphasis is on listing coins available for purchase, hence its presence in this section. Published in eighteen issues over the course of twenty-six months, Stroehlin found the rigors of the work involved rewarded with diminishing returns: “Parvenus à la fin de la seconde année de notre *Circulaire*, qui elle-même était la suite, paraissant à intervalles d’abord mensuels, puis bi-mensuels, puis plus ou moins irréguliers, de nos catalogues de vente, nous nous sommes demandé s’il convenait de continuer cette publication. ... s’il était de notre intérêt de nous imposer un travail considérable, qui suppose une grande somme de connaissances scientifiques et pratiques, mais qui pour une grande partie profite uniquement à des tiers qui sont nos concurrents, et nous avons conclu par la négative. Il nous paraît que le temps que nous avons consacré depuis deux ans à préparer, à rédiger, à corriger et à expédier notre *Circulaire* pourrait être employé d’une manière plus utile, nous voulons dire plus utile pour nous, c’est-à-dire plus lucrative, à développer nos relations et à multiplier nos ventes par d’autres procédés, et nous annonçons à toutes les personnes avec lesquelles nous avons eu des rapports que le présent numéro est le dernier de notre *Circulaire*.” While strongest in its listings of modern European coins and medals, the breadth of the *Circulaire*’s offerings is impressive,

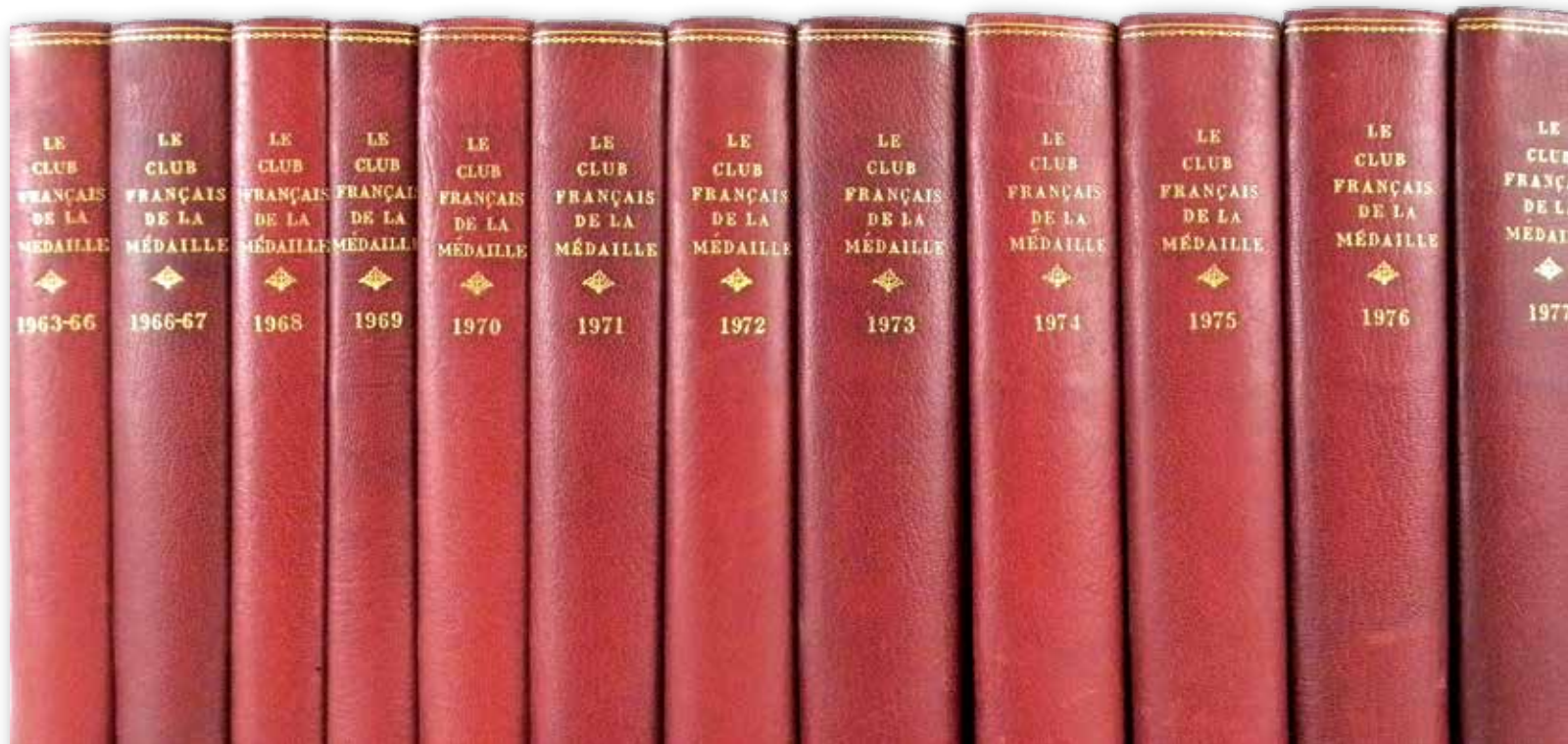

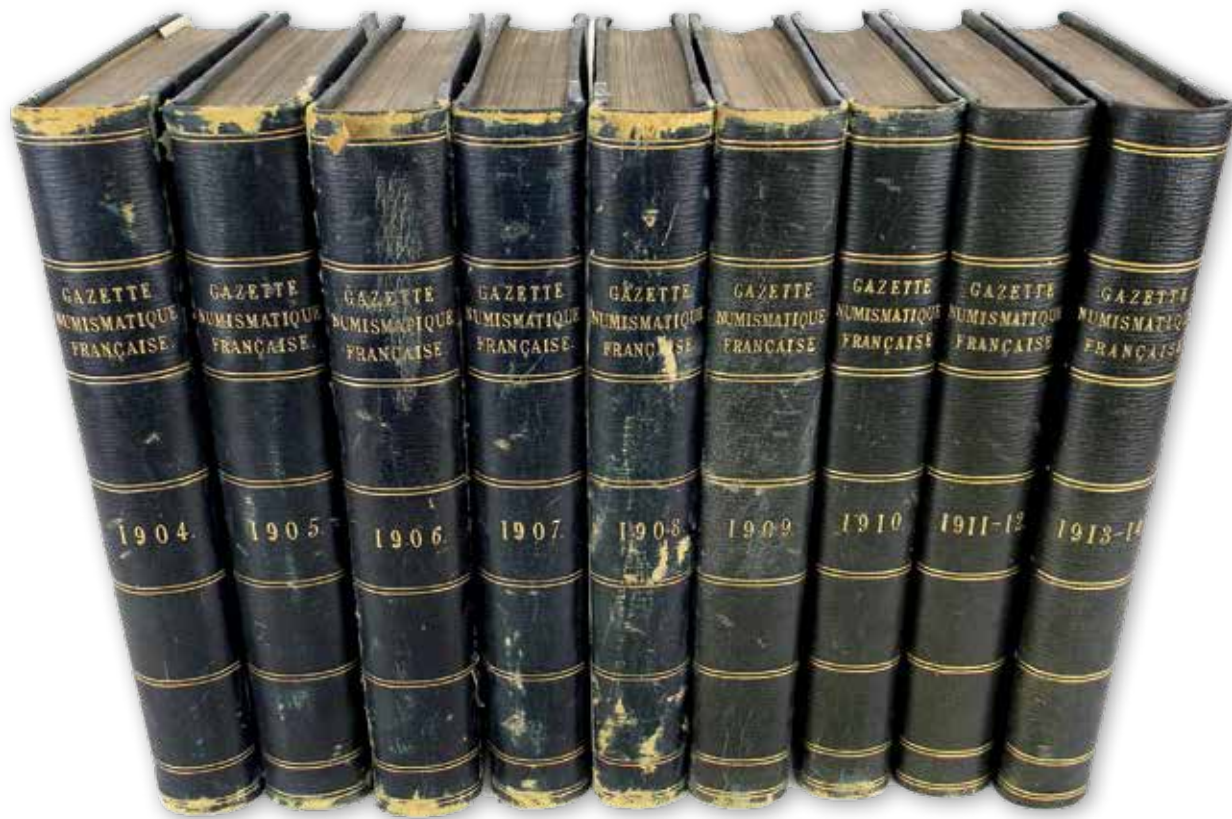

Volume VI began with No. 2, though an unnumbered publication dated July 1, 2003 may constitute 6/1. After that, things become more normal, though the number of issues per volume changed often and occasional issues were misnumbered. This set is lacking only four (or possibly five) issues for the period covered.

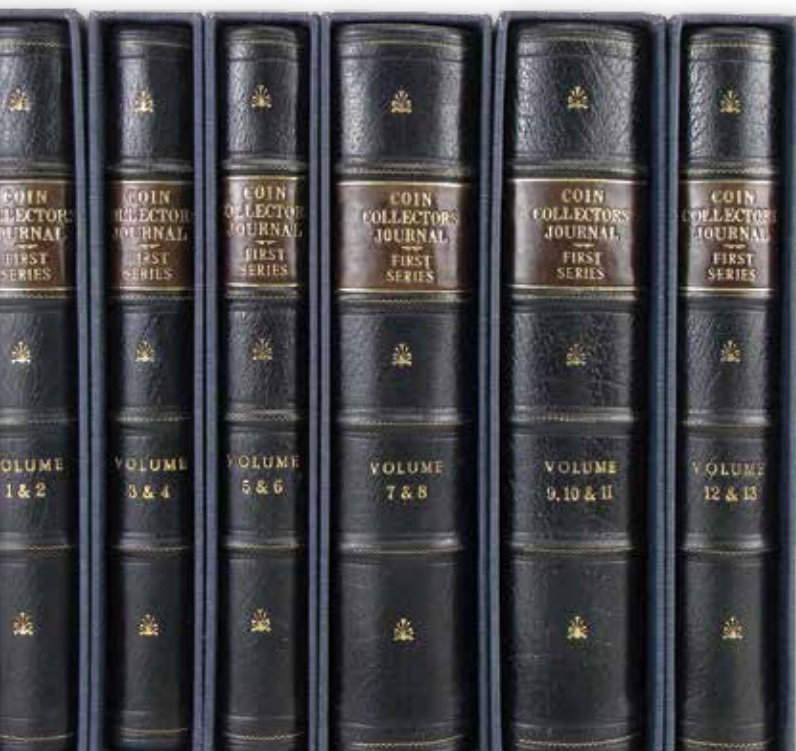

An important, if insufficiently well-known, English-language resource for French numismatics. Rarely encountered, the *Bulletin* published much information that simply wasn't available elsewhere. The first issue is dated June 1, 1965, and is a single typewritten sheet distributed by Pierre Palmentier, the founder; accompanying this was a single-page membership roster listing all of nine members—including our consignor, Richard Margolis. No. 38 was the first to feature card covers, and the first to include a Volume number (in this case, IV). The earlier issues were reproduced via photocopy, making it difficult to say with any certainty that a copy is original or a later copy—but given Margolis's status as a charter member, we feel confident in calling these originals though they were clearly produced in a variety of photomechanical ways. Two issues were accidentally numbered 41, with the second coming to be known as 41A afterwards. The present set is essentially complete, though some later issues are not present (there were at least 115 issues published).

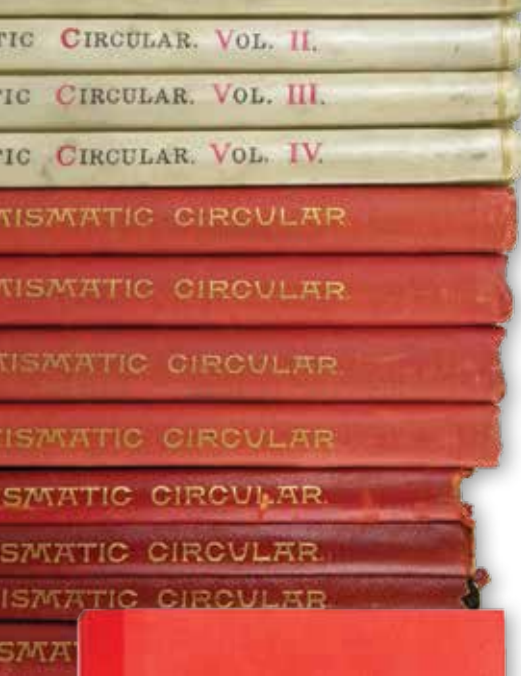

Nos. 8 and 9 were devoted to publishing the Society's *Catalogue des émissions officielles françaises de papier-monnaie (1797–1952)*; Nos. 10–12 (comprising one large issue) published *Catalogue des papiers-monnaie français de la Guerre de 1870 (Période 1870–1873)*. Much more than a simple fixed price list, the *Circular* published substantive articles throughout its existence, featuring many important works primarily on ancient and British coins, but also on other areas (Forrer's *Biographical History of Medallists*, for instance, was originally published in its pages). Substantial runs of early volumes are infrequently offered. When encountered, they tend to be poorly preserved, with the large-format volumes being prone to encountering abuse. Manville page 695: "arguably the most important and certainly the longest-lived of the commercial numismatic 'house organs'—essential for notes and shorter studies of British-related subjects but also including all other aspects of world numismatics." Included in this section are 19 lots of numismatic wall art. All of the items included in this section were on display in the Margolis Family home until recently. Included below are original drawings by engraver Jean-Pierre Droz, British Government Acts relating to Matthew Boulton's coinage projects, an extraordinary broadside publication of the 1791 French coinage reform, the original hand-drawn architectural plan of the Russian Bank Mint planned for Saint Petersburg, and portraits of Boulton, Droz, John Law, Josiah Wedgwood, and others.

Original Portrait of Prince Charles de Lorraine

The military officer Charles Eugène of Lorraine (1751–1825), Prince de Lambesc, Duc d'Elbeuf, fought for the Bourbon cause in the French Revolution and the Napoleonic Wars, and was the last male representative of the House of Guise. The present portrait is by French artist Charles Clément Balvay (1756–1822), known as Bervick or (as here) Bervick. The work is very subtle—at first glance, it appears to be an engraving or a later photogravure, but closer examination reveals it to be a very finely executed original work of art, with carefully delineated details and exquisite shading.

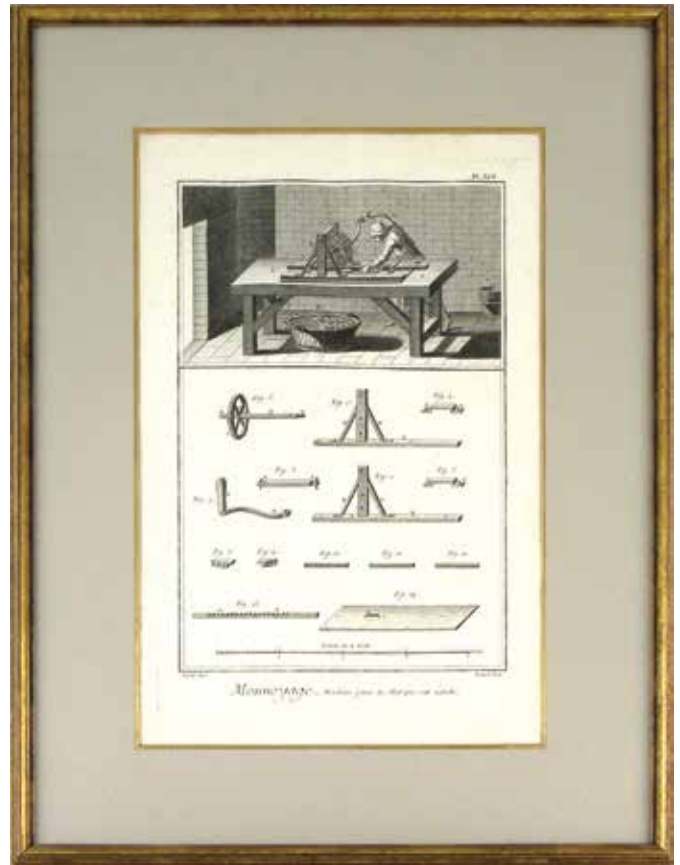

A historically important Act of Parliament which allowed Boulton to “export any Machinery, Tools, Utensils, Implements, or other Things, of what Nature soever” to Russia for the establishment of the first steam-powered Mint at St. Petersburg. A significant document, discussed on pages 90–91 of Richard Doty's *The Soho Mint and the Industrialization of Money*.

As explained in Richard Doty's *The Soho Mint and the Industrialization of Money* (page 132), "every time Soho wished to export what it had learned about the art of moneying, a special Act of Parliament had to be passed for the purpose; and the Danish case was no exception." This is the Act granting the necessary permission for Boulton to sell coining technology to Denmark and supply personnel for its use.

It was first engraved in 1801 and has become a well-known portrait of Boulton through these engravings—indeed, it was the basis for the portrait of Boulton on the 2011 Bank of England £50 note.

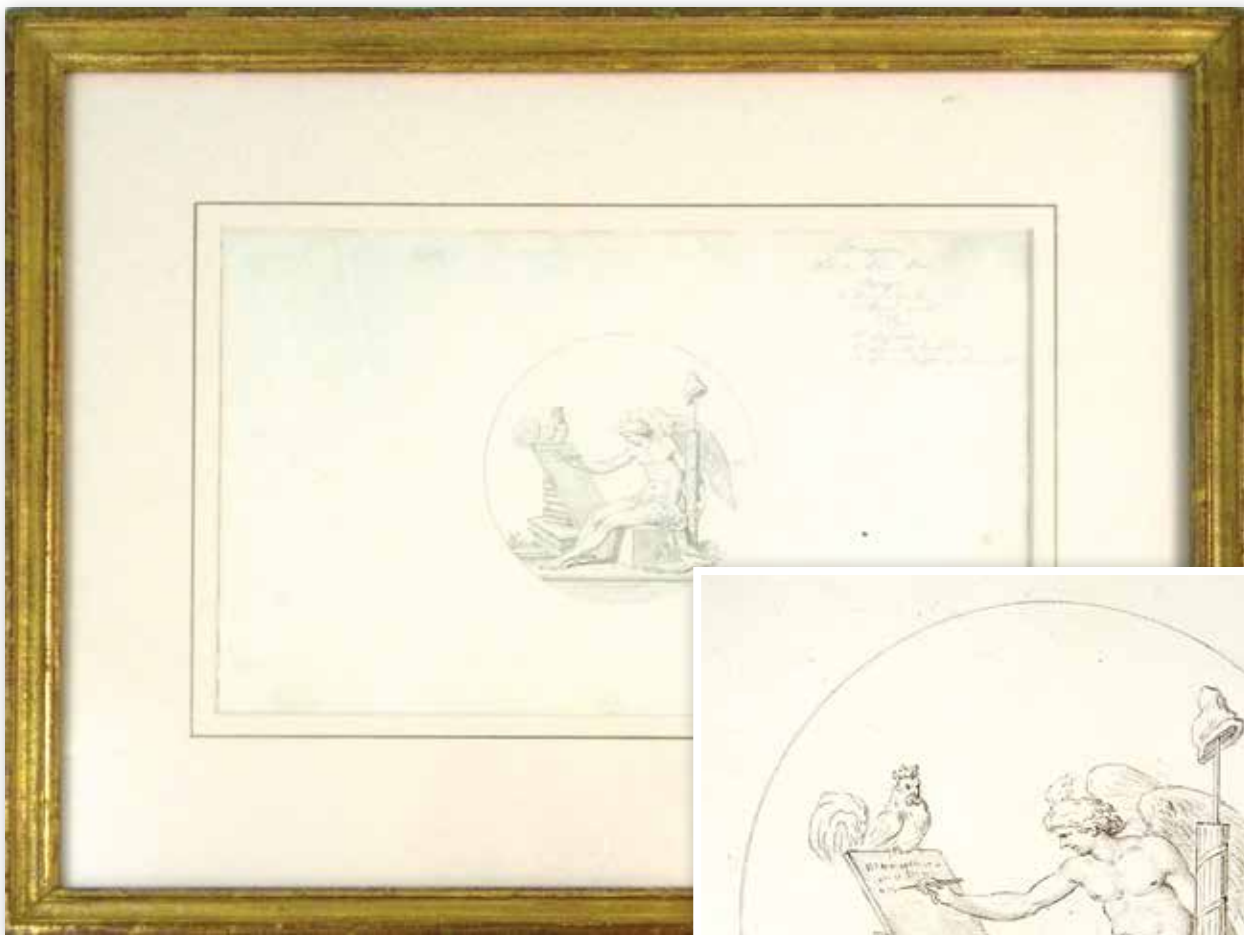

The plates here present depict the use of the casting machine to add edge lettering to struck coins, various annealing and smelting equipment and techniques, and other aspects of the coining process.

Unidentified studies for medallic works that appear never to have been produced. The attribution to J.-P. Droz is tentative and is not guaranteed: Forrer notes that Droz signed some of his work “D.F.” (for *Droz fecit*), as two of the three sketches here are signed. Further, the handwriting in the upper left corner (the only writing not in block capitals) is stylistically similar to the example of Droz’s handwriting shown in Gallet’s study. The artwork appears to be of the period, and the pieces are dated 11 août 1792 (Mazers de Latude), 28 août 1792 (ruines de la Bastille) and 4 juin 1793 (la présidente des négresses de Paris). The text, “Convent. N.ale Seance du 4 Juin 1793” is written in the field: the Convention Nationale did in fact meet on this day, which followed in the immediate wake of the insurrection of 31 mai–2 juin 1793 that saw the end of the Girondin faction—the last of the major uprisings of the French Revolution. The only reference to the President of the Negresses of Paris that we have found is in the second volume of J. Peltier’s 1794 *Dernier tableau de Paris, ou Récit historique de la révolution du 10 août 1792, des causes qui l’ont produite, des événemens qui l’ont précédée, et des crimes qui l’ont suivie* (page 335). Acquired by Margolis from Spink June 1991.

The *physionotrace* was a semi-automated method of portraiture developed in the 1780s by Gilles-Louis Chrétien (1754–1811). The subject sat in a box connected to a pantograph, through which a tracing of the subject's physiognomy was produced, both on paper and on a prepared copper plate. The paper tracing would be enhanced by hand by an artist; the plate also required finishing. The result, however, was a profile portrait that was not only remarkable for its accuracy but which was reproduceable, with the sitter generally receiving a dozen or so engraved aquatint prints. Chrétien worked with various artists, with French miniaturist Jean-Baptiste Fouquet (c. 1761–1799) assisting him with the present work. A physionotrace of Swiss engraver Jean-Pierre Droz (1746–1823), given to Richard Margolis by the great-great-grandson of J.P. Droz, during a visit in Chantilly on January 31, 1984. Droz was the subject of considerable research by Richard Margolis, who was particularly interested in Droz's short-lived employment by Matthew Bolton and in Droz's participation in the French monetary competitions in the late 18th and early 19th centuries. Richard Margolis recalled receiving this gift in the *Bulletin of the Société Américaine pour l'Étude de la Numismatique Française*: "Michel Kampmann, at the time president of the IAPN, and a director of the Paris firm Maison Platt, had catalogued some outstanding items (dies, drawings, trial pieces, etc.) owned by descendants of the famous engraver, Jean-Pierre Droz, for a March 1, 1982 auction sale in Paris, at which I acquired a few unusual items... Subsequently, knowing of my interest in Droz, and being acquainted with the family, Michel was good enough to drive me to Chantilly, where they lived. There I was able to meet the then head of the family, also named Jean Pierre (no hyphen) Droz, who was the great-, great-, great-grandson of the engraver. During this visit he was kind enough to give me the physionotrace portrait of Droz ... which was drawn and engraved in Paris, no doubt in the 1790s, by Fouquet and Chrétien." We believe, based on comparing the signature here with that published in Gallet's study of Droz and available elsewhere, that this was signed by Droz himself, though in the absence of better evidence this cannot be guaranteed.

A single-sheet arrêt postponing the date by which old specie had to be converted into new coinage, as required by the King's decree of 14 mars.

A rare broadside printing of this French coinage law, of considerable historical importance. The redesign of 1791 was the first to break with centuries of royal tradition. Even while the king remained (for the time being) on the coins, the stipulated design included many Republican attributes: "Le revers de la monnoie d'or, des écus et demi-écus, aura pour empreinte le génie de la France debout devant un autel, et gravant sur des tables le mot Constitution, avec le sceptre de la raison, désigné par un oeil ouvert à son extrémité. Il y aura à côté de l'autel un coq, symbole de la vigilance, et un faisceau, emblème de l'union et de la force armée." The coins were also to depict the "bonnet de la liberté" and give the year both in Arabic numerals and expressed in "l'année de la liberté." A rare and wonderful item.

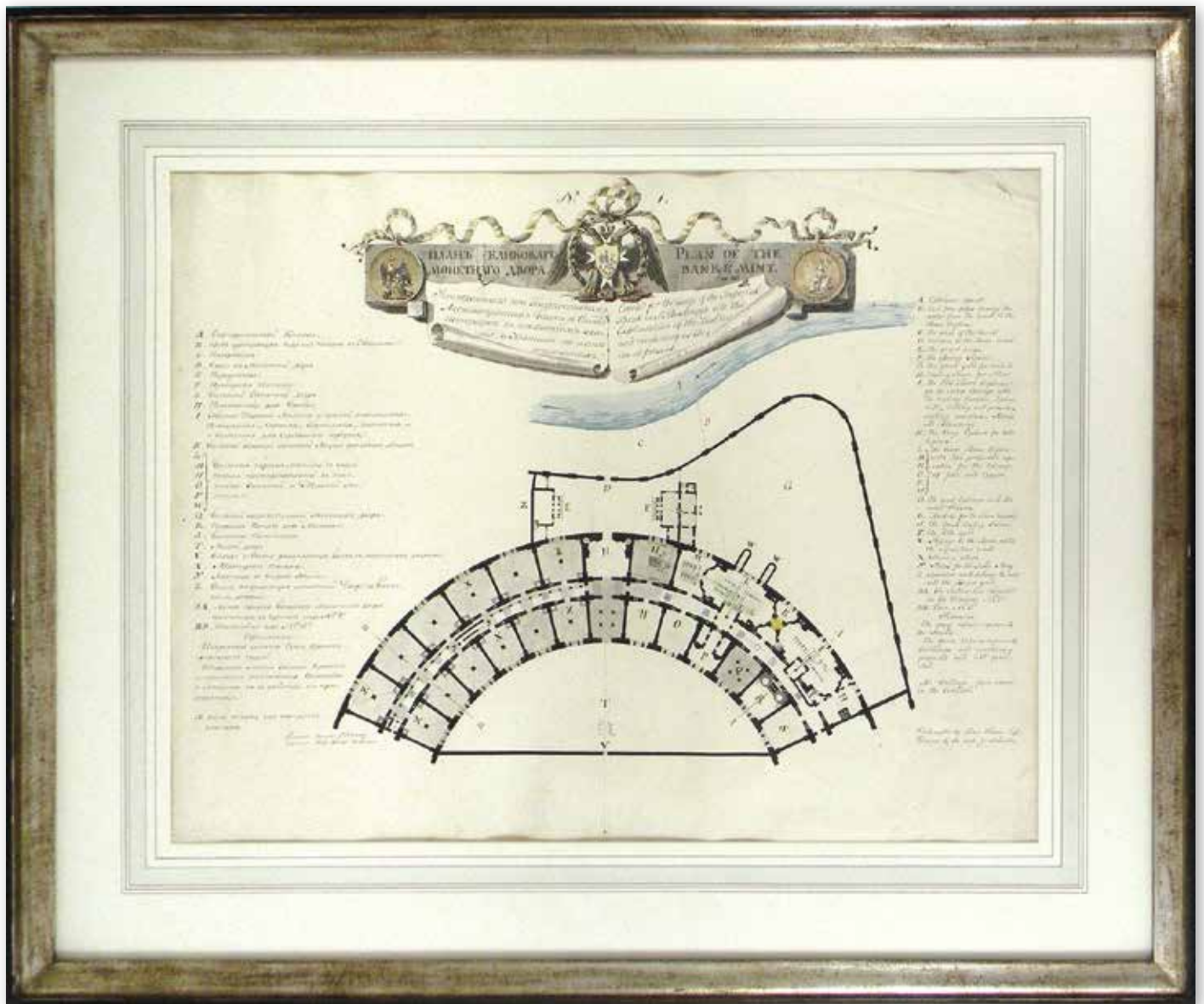

A striking ink rendition of this famous design, used by the Society for the Purpose of Effecting the Abolition of the Slave Trade in its publications and promotions. The design was the work of a craftsman with the Wedgwood firm, and Wedgwood's heavy use of it made it the single most recognizable piece of political art in its time. It was used on British trade tokens of the 1790s, as well as elsewhere. Unfortunately, no provenance information accompanies the item.

The highly detailed original architectural plan of this failed attempt on the part of Tsar Paul I's administration to bypass Matthew Boulton's proposals for a modernized mint (developed during the reign of Catherine II). Given the elaborate headpiece and the use of tinting, this was presumably made for presentation to one of the more notable parties involved in the project. 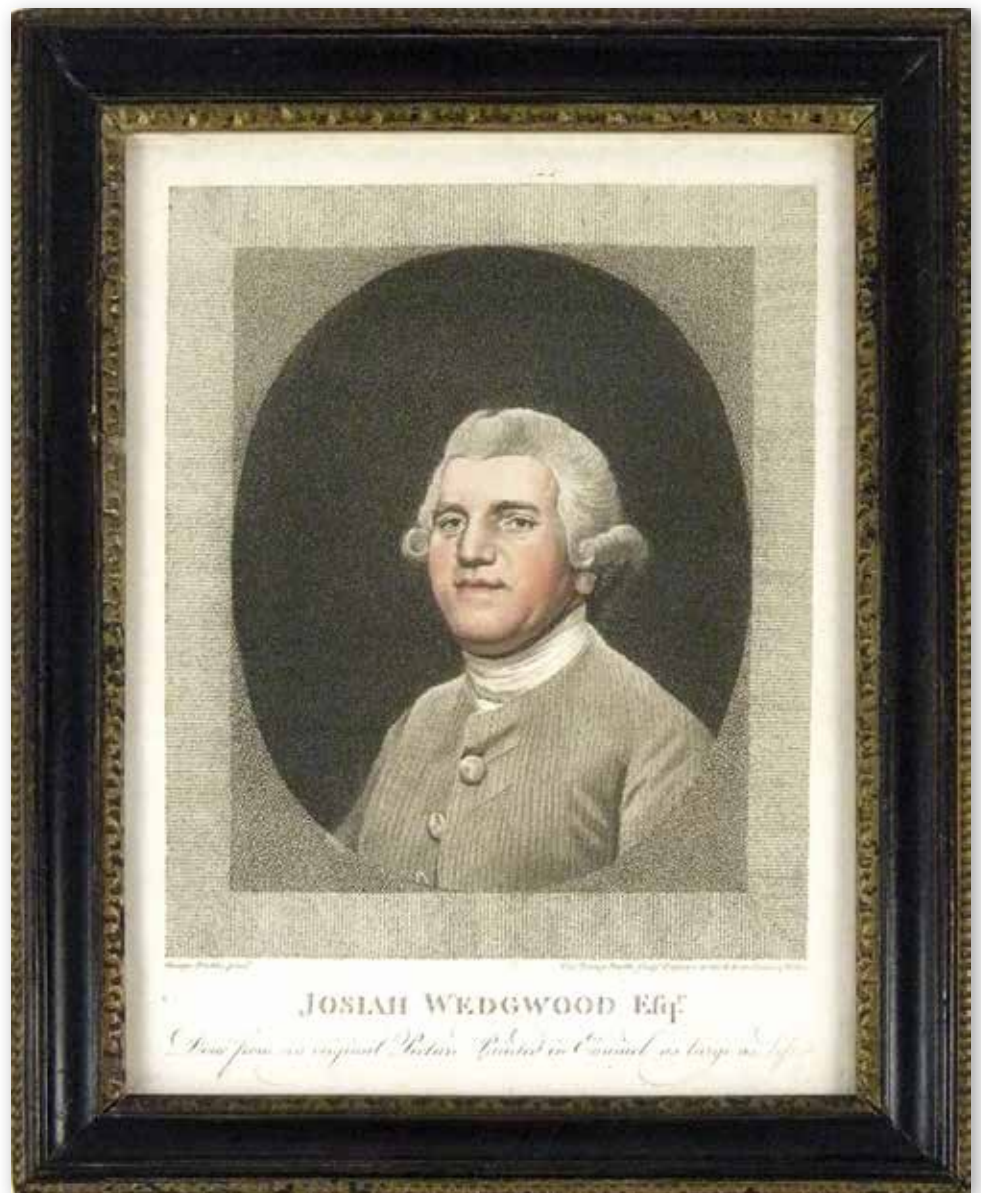
A particularly fine portrait of Boulton. Carl Frederik von Breda (1759–1818) painted both Matthew Boulton and James Watt in 1792, when the artist visited Birmingham. The National Portrait Gallery now owns the James Watt portrait, while the Boulton portrait is in the Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery. It is featured on the jacket of Richard Doty's *The Soho Mint and the Industrialization of Money*.

The full-length engraved copperplate depiction of John Law from *Het grootte tafereel der dwaasheid* (*The Great Mirror of Folly*), the famous early 18th-century Dutch satirical work that ridiculed the extravagances and follies of the South Sea Bubble and Law's Mississippi Scheme. The book was initially published in 1720 or shortly thereafter, almost certainly in the Netherlands (as most of it is in Dutch), probably in Amsterdam. The compiler and publishing history of this farcical work remain uncertain and the actual contents of extant copies vary. It is most famous for its engravings, many of which are comical and a number of which are more or less obscenely so. As John Law is the heart of the volume, this is in some ways the most important of the plates, though it is admittedly more straightforward (and straightlaced) in its depiction than others. At the peak of his power, Law controlled the French mints and the bulk of the French economy. His escapades were the subject of a number of rare medals that are avidly sought today (and about which John W. Adams has written an excellent monograph).

Josiah Wedgwood (1730–1795) is perhaps the greatest English potter of all time, known for bringing the principles of the Industrial Age to the manufacture of pottery and related art forms. Numismatists have long been enamored of his portrait medallions, many of them created by artist John Flaxman, Jr. (1755–1826) using Wedgwood's processes. This engraving of Wedgwood is based upon a 1780 painting of him by George Stubbs (1724–1806); Stubbs's son George Townly Stubbs (1756–1815) produced the engraving.

THE RICHARD MARGOLIS INTERNATIONAL NUMISMATIC LIBRARY PART FIVE: ARCHIVAL MATERIALS

Richard Margolis recognized early in his career that papers that might at first appear to be ephemeral—letters, the inventory of a collection, drafts of research projects—had value to posterity and were worth preserving. In particularly notable instances, he carefully arranged the materials and had them bound. In this section, we offer many of these curated archival materials, together with a virtual treasure trove of photocopied documents from several archives in different countries, all relating to Matthew Boulton and the Soho Mint.

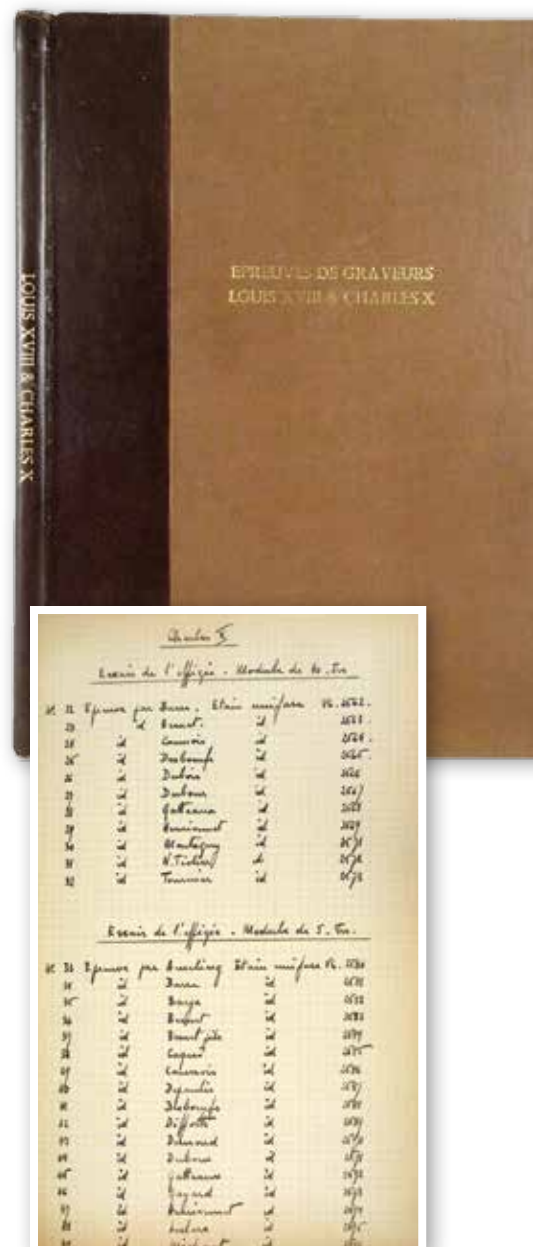

There are 76 pieces listed in this catalogue, which was prepared by Mr. Kraft, but according to my letter to Mr. Kraft of May 1, 1957 there were 79 pieces in the group, of which I kept 27 (all Louis XVIII except 3 Mint visits) and HK took 52 (all Charles X plus three Louis XVIII Mint visits)."

The collection was sold to M. & M. who, much to Mr Kraft's dismay, selected the 'cream' of the coins & essays to sell in their Nov. 1961 auction sale & dispersed the rest of the collection privately. The designs & documents were sold to the Musée Monétaire, Paris, & REM was able to purchase from M&M en bloc Nov. 27, 1962 a large group (some 146*) of 'lesser' essays & trial pieces including most of the uniface white metal ones. *some 24 are cast concoctions (fakes)."

Purchased (for 20,000 Swiss francs) from Mr. Kraft by Richard Margolis (Rolle, October 1978)."

It was presented to REM in Rolle, June 2, 1979, & subsequently bound."

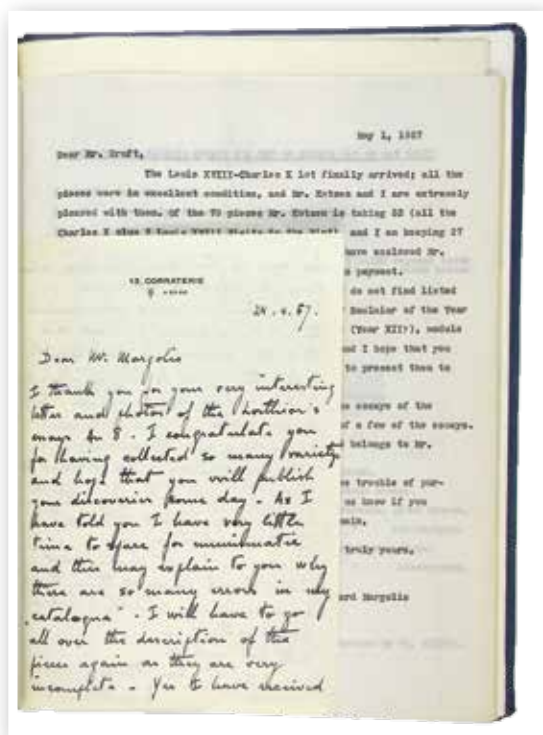
A college paper written by Margolis on the subject of the numismatics of the French Revolution. Researching this paper did much to attract his interest to this area, as he discussed in *The Medal* (No. 20, 1992): "In 1952 I joined the American Numismatic Society and the American Numismatic Association, and that same year a course in the history of the French Revolution and Napoleon at New York University taught by the late professor Leo Gershoy led to a keen interest in the numismatics of this period. This interest has never waned, and in the intervening forty years I have been able to form a highly specialised collection, numbering some 3000 pieces, of French coins, essays, and private tokens from 1789 to 1815." While not a mature numismatic work, a very important paper indeed for Margolis.

Richard Margolis's working copy of this inventory, itemizing and recording 367 pieces, each described and priced in type, with some provenances recorded, and with extensive additional provenances recorded in Margolis's neat, if diminutive, handwriting. Many of the coins described are from the collections of Howard Gibbs or O.P. Eklund. There are annotations on every page of this record, with most of the pieces bearing notations recording their subsequent disposition over the years as Margolis upgraded his personal collection and moved pieces to stock. The typescript itself is likely unique, and this annotated copy is certainly so.

Richard Margolis's handwritten note at the beginning of this volume reads: "Correspondence between Raoul Kraft of Geneva (& later of Rolle) and Richard Margolis, primarily on the numismatics of the French Revolution (& including a letter from Mr. Kraft to Erich Cahn of Münzen und Medaillen, to whom he sold the bulk of his collection." Of considerable interest to the specialist.

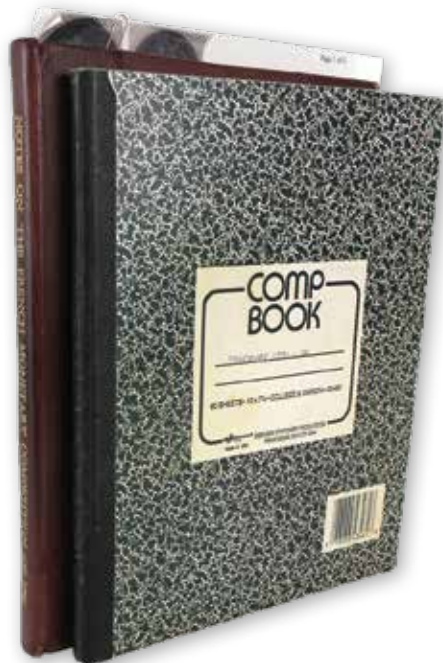
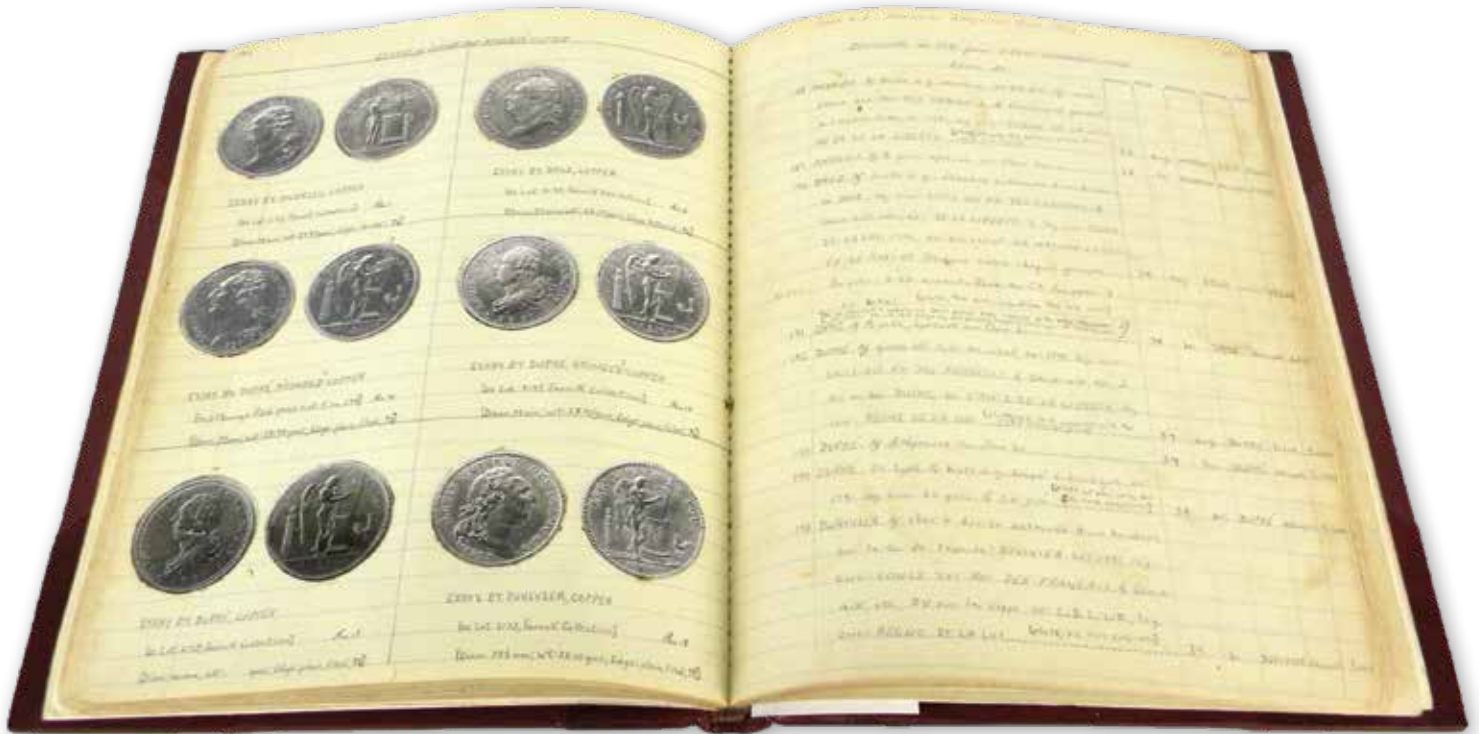

According to Richard E. Margolis's typewritten introductory note: "Photos sent to Raoul Kraft of Geneva, Switzerland by R. Margolis of New York City, accompanying their correspondence on the numismatics of the French Revolution and Napoleon. Subsequently mounted and labeled by Mr. Kraft. [handwritten addition by Margolis: 'The descriptions don't always match the photo.'] With the exception of six uniface trial pieces in the collection of the American Numismatic Society, all photos are of specimens in the Margolis collection (including the piece at one time in the Kotzen collection)." Richard Margolis purchased Kraft's remaining collection of material relating to the French Revolution in October 1978, at which time the present mounted photographs were presumably returned to Margolis, who subsequently had them bound. Margolis, Richard. NOTES ON THE FRENCH MONETARY COMPETITION OF 1791. Two ruled composition notebooks, the first bound in later brown half morocco, spine lettered in gilt, the second in the original tape-backed printed cardboard covers. The first notebook consists of 91 leaves, which have been numbered 1–90 on the rectos and 1a–90a on the versos, with the first leaf serving as a title page and frontispiece. Every one of the resulting 182 pages includes handwritten text or illustrations, or frequently both. The text of the first volume is primarily given to copying relevant information from literally hundreds of sale catalogues as well as from various numismatic books and articles. Much of this material is annotated by Margolis, with notes on the importance of the material as well as its accuracy. A bibliography is provided as well. Relevant details taken from his extensive correspondence is also cited, particularly letters from Raoul Kraft. Later photocopies and printouts are laid in. The second notebook consists of 80 leaves (160 pages), of which only 64 pages were used, strongly indicating that this was the final notebook used on this particular project. It continues from the first in much the same vein, recording various appearances of the essays associated with the 1791 competition and drawing conclusions from them. Having increasingly exhausted the supply of older catalogues containing relevant material, Margolis is here responding mostly to more recent offerings. In addition to extensive handwritten text, much of which was revisited over the years and revised, augmented and occasionally corrected, the notebooks include numerous illustrations, some of them photocopies, but many of them cut to size from various coin catalogues and pasted in place. In addition to halftone illustrations, the notebooks contain photographically printed colotypes depicting coins and even original photographic prints. In some cases, illustrations and other materials that have been pasted into place are starting to come loose (though they are generally intact), but overall the notebooks are in very good or better condition. **\$750**

The 1791 French Monetary Competition was a subject of recurring interest to Richard Margolis, who kept notes about the competition itself and the essays prepared for it over the course of many years in these composition notebooks. It is difficult to date the notebooks to a particular time period, though we can say that the first notebook was bound in 1977 (suggesting that it was full by that point). The amount of information gathered together in these notebooks is remarkable. Margolis's natural handwriting was very small, making it possible for him to fit quite a bit on a page. The devotion exhibited by him to this project, maintained over the course of decades, is very impressive, and there is much here that is of considerable interest to the specialist.

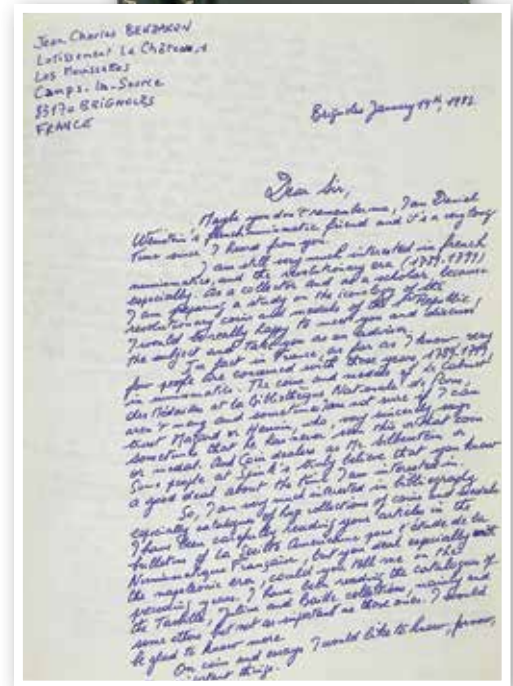
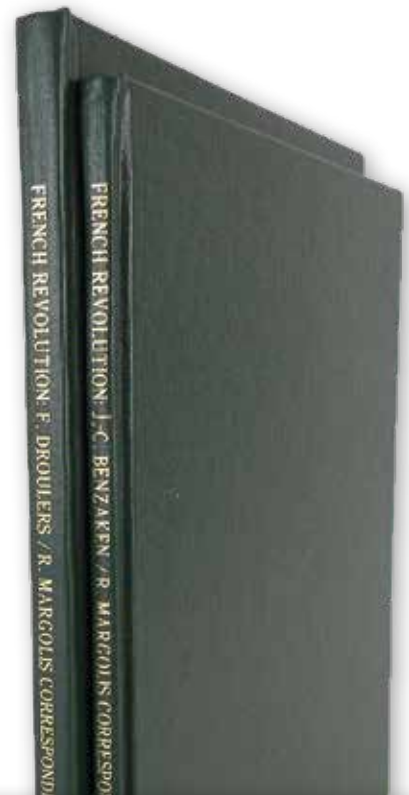

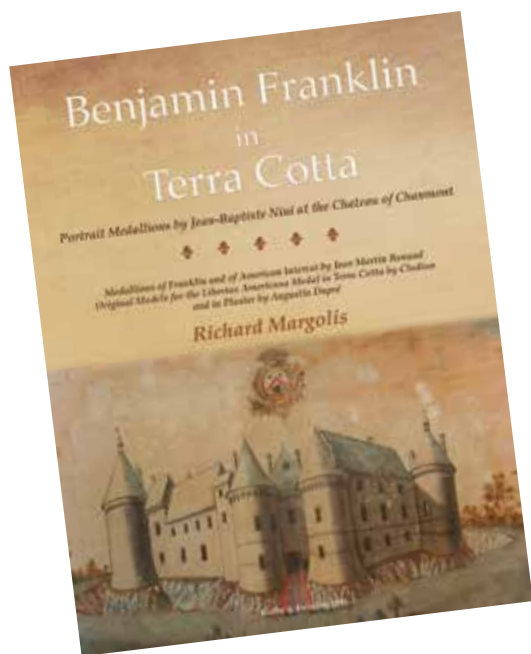

Two interesting groups of letters, faxes, emails and other correspondence, mostly on the subject of the French Revolution and Napoleonic coinage. Much of the correspondence is commercial in nature, though the conversation is numismatically advanced. The correspondence with Michel Prieur (of the Compagnie Générale de Bourse) and Laurent Schmitt (of Comptoir Générale Financier) is partly on the subject of their publication *Le Franc*, and specifically on their efforts to trace particular rare French coins of the Revolutionary and Napoleonic eras.

A unique archive, bringing together Richard Margolis's archives from his long-term project on the terra cotta portrait medallions of Benjamin Franklin produced by Jean-Baptiste Nini. The project resulted in the book *Benjamin Franklin in Terra Cotta*, which our firm was proud to publish in 2015. Margolis's volume was chosen as a Book of the Year Award winner by the Numismatic Literary Guild, and received strong reviews not only in the numismatic press but in the academic press as well. Collectors of these medallions will find much of interest in these papers, as will those with more scholarly interest in the subject. The photos alone are a valuable archive, given the rarity of many of the individual varieties and the paucity of publications on them. The contents of the archive take up about two and a half bankers boxes.

All bound volumes are in modern brown cloth, gilt, and unless otherwise indicated comprise bound volumes of single-sided photocopies made by or for Richard Margolis at the library or archive indicated. Titles cited are based on the spine lettering. Occasional annotations in pencil in Richard Margolis's handwriting throughout; a number of volumes feature detailed Tables of Contents in Margolis's hand. Also included is one volume of bound printouts (119 pages) of database listings made available by Adam Matthew Publications, on archival resources on Matthew Boulton and James Watt. Materials are generally fine. **\$5000**

Highly important archival materials, and the backbone of Richard Margolis's personal research. Any doubts about the value of these materials—being “merely” photocopies—is quickly dispelled by closer examination. They bring together a remarkable array of documents stored in various archives, mostly in England and France: most substantially the Birmingham Reference Library, but also the Archives de la Seine, the Mauritius Archives, the Bibliothèque de l'Université (Paris), and even the Droz Family's archives. Many of the thousands of pages here present bear pencil annotations by Margolis, and a number of the volumes have been indexed by him. The correspondents whose letters are gathered together here include: Zachaeus Walker, Sr. and Jr. (Junior was Matthew Boulton's nephew, sent to Russia to assist with the Russian Mint project); the engraver Jean-Pierre Droz; John Roberts, a bookkeeper of Boulton's; James Lawson, an early Soho Mint employee; one of Boulton's engineers, John Southern; Rudolf Erich Raspe, employed by Boulton at his Dolcoath Mine in Cornwall as an assayer; Soho Mint employee John Phillip; Dr. Francis Swedieur, Boulton's Paris agent; Boulton's physician and friend Dr. William Withering; various parties affiliated with the Monneron Frères firm; Philip Parry Price Myddelton, who had Boulton strike tokens for use in a proposed Kentucky settlement; Matthew Robinson Boulton, Matthew Boulton's son; and many others. In addition to letters, several extremely important volumes of Soho Mint business records are present, including a December 1790 inventory, the coinage daybook for 1791–1795, a 1782–1795 cash book, and an extensive coin and medal ledger. More personal Boulton records include his 1788 coining journal and a notebook from the following year on the Mint. It is obvious that Richard Margolis had long-term plans for an extensive and far-reaching Boulton project (he mentioned work in progress on multiple occasions), but sadly this was not to be. His annotations in these volumes, assembled by him over the course of many years, need to be preserved for future study.

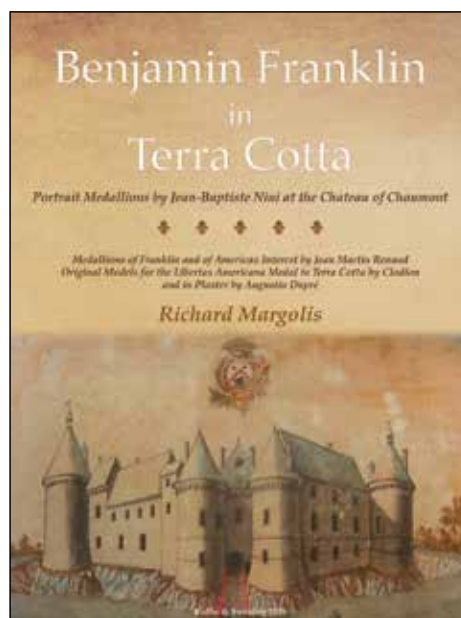
