33001 BRITAIN. East Anglia Region. Iceni. Ca. 60-54 BC. AV stater (17mm, 5.93 gm, 9h). NGC XF 4/5 - 4/5. Norfolk Wolf type. Devolved head of Apollo right / Wolf standing right, mouth open, teeth bared, bristles on back; pellets and crescent above, large pellet and crescent below, oval shape in front, beaded exergual decoration. ABC 1393. Mellow surfaces with minor chatter throughout the fields. Featuring a delightfully ferocious wolf on the reverse.

- 33002 EASTERN EUROPE. Uncertain Celtic Tribe. Ca. 3rd-2nd centuries BC. AR tetradrachm (24mm, 13.26 gm, 10h). NGC Choice XF 4/5 3/5. "Doppelkopf" type, imitating types of Philip II of Macedon. Janiform celticized head of Zeus / Celticized horseman prancing right, wearing helmet with long crest, horse with raised left foreleg; rosette before. Lanz 540-542. OTA 233/1. Attractive slate toning with light earthy silhouettes around the devices.
- 33003 EASTERN EUROPE. Burgenland-Slovak Tribes. Ca. 2nd century BC. AR tetradrachm (22mm, 12.37 gm, 12h). NGC Choice AU★ 5/5 5/5, Fine Style. "Kroisbach-Reiterstumpf" type, imitating types of Philip II of Macedon. Beardless male head right, with "broken" nose and pronounced jaw line, wearing diadem composed of triple-beaded strand / Rider emerging from back of horse trotting left, hair bound with diadem and tied into a topknot with three trailing curls. Lanz 743-5. OTA 469. CCCBM I 152-4. An exemplary specimen, deeply struck, with wonderful old toning.

- 33004 CAMPANIA. Neapolis. Ca. 275-250 BC. AR didrachm (20mm, 7.15 gm, 12h). NGC Choice XF★ 5/5 4/5. Head of nymph left, wearing broad, beaded headband, pendant earring and beaded necklace; club behind / NΕΟΠΟΛΙΤΩΝ, man-faced bull walking right, crowned with laurel wreath by Nike flying to right above. HN Italy 586. Firmly struck with sharp remnant detailing.
- 33005 SICILY. Acragas. Ca. 470-420 BC. AR tetradrachm (24mm, 17.21 gm, 2h). NGC XF 4/5 3/5, Fine Style. AKPAC-ANTΟΣ (the second half retrograde), eagle standing left on Ionian capital, wings closed / Crab, seen from above. SNG ANS 982 var. (orientation of legend). Naturalistically rendered creatures enhanced by moody charcoal toning with whispers of jade near the central devices.
- 33006 SICILY. Selinus. Ca. 540-480 BC. AR didrachm (22mm, 7.15 gm). NGC MS 5/5 5/5. Ca. 540-515 BC. Wild parsley (selinon) leaf / Incuse square composed of ten triangles, with four sections partially filled. HGC 2, 1209. Medium cabinet toning and subdued luster.

Situated on a vast plateau in southwestern Sicily, Selinus was founded in the late seventh century BC by Dorian colonists from Megara in mainland Greece. Named after a river god, Selinus was one of the earliest Sicilian cities to embrace the invention of coinage. Its first coins, struck on the Corinthian standard in circa 540 BC, bore a selinon (celery) leaf as a canting pun on the city name.

HGC 2, 1307. Boehringer 227-278 and 293-355. Boasting gorgeous apricot toning throughout the recesses, this lustrous piece is beautifully rendered and a delight to behold.
- 33008 SICILY. Syracuse. Deinomenid Tyranny, Hieron I (ca. 475-470 BC). AR tetradrachm (23mm, 17.33 gm, 9h). NGC XF 4/5 4/5. Charioteer driving quadriga walking right, kentron in right hand, reins in left; Nike flying right above, crowning horses, dotted border / ΣVRA-ΚΟΣΙ-ΟΝ, head of Arethusa right, wearing beaded taenia and necklace, hair looped up under band; four dolphins swimming clockwise around. Boehringer 101 (485-475 BC). HGC 2, 1306. Nice remnant detailing on a tight flan with touches of toning throughout the devices contributing to areas of bolder dimensionality.
- 33009 SICILY. Syracuse. Second Democracy (ca. 466-405 BC). AR tetradrachm (23mm, 17.35 gm, 12h). NGC Choice AU 4/5 4/5, Fine Style. Ca. 430-420 BC. Male charioteer, wearing long chiton, kentron in right hand, reins in left, driving walking quadriga right; Nike flying right above, crowning horses / ΣΥΡΑΚΟΣΙΟΝ, head of Arethusa right, hair in saccos decorated with zigzag patterns; four dolphins swimming around. Boehringer 641. HGC 2, 1319. Brilliant flashes of peachy light contrast the subdued charcoal toning.

The 'transitional' era of Greek numismatic art is perfectly exemplified by the dies of this Syracusan tetradrachm, which displays a blend of Archaic and Classical artistic conventions. The obverse image of a charioteer driving his quadriga to right retains some Archaic elements, notably the rather stiff pose of the charioteer and the slow, stately gate of the horses; the reverse head of Arethusa, on the other hand, exhibits the cool classicism of contemporary Athenian art, as seen on the famous Parthenon frieze.

Veiled and diademed head of Queen Philistis left, lit torch behind / ΒΑΣΙΛΙΣΣΑΣ / ΦΙΛΙΣΤΙΔΟΣ, Nike driving fast quadriga right; E below. SNG ANS 884. Burnett, Enna Hoard 48. Nicely centered with all details visible, and relatively crisp, despite the wear and softer strike.

33012 SICULO-PUNIC. Sicily. Lilybaeum (as 'Cape of Melkart'). Ca. 350-300 BC. AR tetradrachm (26mm, 17.16 gm, 7h). NGC XF 4/5 - 2/5, scuff. Ca. 330-305 BC. RShMLQRT (Punic), charioteer driving fast quadriga right, reins in left hand, kentron in right, Nike flying left above to crown driver / Head of Tanit-Persephone right, wreathed with grain ears, hair in rows of waves with loose spiral ends, wearing triple-pendant earring and beaded necklace; four dolphins swimming around. Jenkins Punic 68. HGC 2, 741. Light golden toning on lustrous metal around the bust and bright, matte surfaces around the quadriga, with a long scuff in the field.

After the destruction of Motya by the Syracusan tyrant Dionysius I, the Carthaginians relocated the surviving population to a new, well-defended fortress on the western corner of Sicily. The Greeks called the city Lilybaion, while the Carthaginians referred to it as Ras Melqart, or the "Cape of Melqart." A second Punic mint (after Entella) was established there producing coins closely modeled on the issues of Syracuse, usually featuring a charging quadriga backed with a female head surrounded by leaping dolphins. Coinage at Lilybaion ended in about 305 BC and was not resumed until the Romans took full control of Sicily a century later

Incredibly dynamic scene engraved with great care to the details that are emphasized by the cabinet toning and soft luster.

SNG ANS 10. Desneux 78 (D76/R71). Razor sharp detailing and sublime cabinet toning make the violent scene all the more dynamic. An imposing offering to be sure.
- 33015 MACEDON. Chalcidian League. Ca. 432-348 BC. AR tetradrachm (25mm, 14.41 gm, 5h). NGC MS 4/5 3/5, brushed. Olynthus, ca. 390 BC. Laureate head of Apollo left / X-A-Λ-KIΔ-ΕΩN, cithara with seven strings, the base bar decorated with crosshatch pattern. Robinson-Clement 71. SNG ANS 473. A beautiful portrait style accentuated by brilliant, wintry surfaces and a dimensionality in the design.

The Chalcidice is a three-fingered area of land extending from eastern Macedon into the Aegean Sea. Wary of Athenian imperialism and the rising power of the Macedonian Kingdom, the free cities of the Chalcidice banded together in ca. 432 BC to form a defensive coalition called the Chalcidian League, with its capital of Olynthus. The silver coinage struck at Olynthus was on the Macedonian standard, somewhat lighter than the Attic standard employed by most of Greece, and was legal tender at all cities belonging to the league. The standard design featured a head of Apollo, god of beauty, art and music, with a type of lyre called a cithara on the reverse. The heads of Apollo on these pieces are remarkable for the strength and beauty of their style. Sadly, the Chalcidian League's coinage came to an end with the capture and destruction of Olynthus by King Philip II of Macedon in ca. 348 BC.

The last independent king of Macedon, Perseus inherited the throne from his father Philip V after the latter had his pro-Roman son Demetrius executed. Thus the tone was set from the outset of his reign for an eventual clash, which proved fatal to the Antigonid monarchy and Macedonian independence. Perseus skillfully rebuilt the Macedonian army and a network of marriage alliances during the first years of his reign, which the Romans watched with rising alarm. The Third Macedonian War broke out in 171 BC, and for a time Perseus employed guerrilla tactics which gave him the initiative and kept the Romans on their heels. Like his father, though, he chose to risk all in a single pitched battle at Pydna and lost badly to the Roman general Lucius Aemilius Paullus. Perseus surrendered and was allowed to live out his life in comfortable captivity in Rome; the Macedonian Kingdom was divided into four theoretically autonomous Republics which were soon subsumed into direct Roman rule. The coinage of Perseus is one of the more attractive of the Hellenistic series, as can been seen here with the star designation for superior eye appeal.

The impressive cast bronzes of Olbia on the Black Sea in many ways presaged the development of the Aes Grave coinage in Italy, although the regions were separated by more than 1,000 miles. Olbia, a colony of Miletus located at the junction of the Hyspanis and Borysthenes rivers in the wilds of Scythia, grew prosperous on trade between the nomadic Scythians and the Greeks. It employed a unique form of coinage consisting of cast bronzes of various sizes and shapes. The smallest Olbian bronzes were made in the shape of dolphins; larger denominations bore a facing gorgon's head backed by a sea eagle clutching a dolphin.

According to legend, the Cretan artisan and scientist Daedalus built the Labyrinth on orders from King Minos, who needed a place to keep his wife Pasiphae's monstrous son, the Minotaur. Pasiphae had fallen in love with a beautiful sacrificial bull and the half-man, half-bull Minotaur was the result of her crossspecies passion. The Latin poet Ovid, drawing from tradition and oral history, said Daedalus built the Labyrinth so cunningly he nearly trapped himself within its winding passages. The Minotaur was placed at the center and Minos ordered that seven youths and seven maidens be sent by Athens, then subject to Crete, each year as a sacrifice offering to feed the beast. The Athenian hero Theseus volunteered as one of the victims and, with the help of Minos' daughter Ariadne, smuggled in a sword, which he used to slay the Minotaur, and a ball of twine to help him navigate the Labyrinth. The Labyrinth soon became the very symbol of Crete and is shown on the reverse of coins struck by Cnossus, its largest city and Minos' capital. Some coins show the Labyrinth in a circular form, while others depict it as square. Archaeologists have found considerable evidence that the Labyrinth was not entirely mythical. Sir Arthur Evans proposed that based on the remains of the huge, sprawling Minoan palace complex of Cnossus could have been viewed as an inescapable maze, making its way into the Greek mythology.

While the sequence of issues for the earliest electrum coinage is still imperfectly understood, recent discoveries have begun to clarify the picture. It is now evident that the first "coins" were pre-weighed electrum globules of no particular design but conforming to the weight standard prevalent in Ionia and Lydia, a "stater" of about 14 grams and its fractions. Next came pieces bearing simple punch patterns on the "reverse," but with a blank or rudimentary "obverse," as seen here. These were followed quickly by pieces displaying a series of parallel striations, the first example of something that could be termed an obverse "type." Thus this "typeless trite" issue is among the very first coins struck by any culture.

The ostentatious display of Egypt's wealth under the Ptolemies was not confined to gold coinage. Ptolemy I and his immediate successors also struck silver coins in larger denominations than any contemporary kingdom or city-state. Along with the vast outpouring of gold in the name of his sister-wife Arsinöe II, Ptolemy II also struck silver decadrachms displaying her veiled portrait backed with the cornucopia, symbolizing Egypt's agricultural abundance. Having died in about 270 BC, Arsinöe is shown as a goddess, with the tip of a ram's horn (symbolic of the god Ammon) poking out from beneath her veil, and the lotus-tipped scepter of the goddess Isis just visible above her head.

No other kingdom or empire in the ancient world at the time could produce such large gold coins, and this display of economic clout drew thousands of mercenary soldiers into Egypt's service. This large and powerful army was put to maximum use by the third king of the Ptolemaic dynasty, Ptolemy III Euergetes. Shortly after inheriting the throne of the Pharaohs, he launched a massive invasion of the neighboring Seleucid Kingdom of Syria. Easily crushing all resistance, he even reached Babylon, where he proclaimed himself King of Kings. Ptolemy III's powerful portrait appears on gold mnaieions struck by his son, Ptolemy IV Philopator, who succeeded him in 221 BC.

Cleopatra Selene (Moon), the last ruler of the Ptolemaic dynasty, was the daughter of Mark Antony and Cleopatra, born in about 40 BC; her fraternal twin was named Alexander Helios (Sun). After her parents' deaths in the Civil War (30 BC), Octavian, the future Augustus Caesar, brought Cleopatra and her siblings home and they were raised by Octavia, his sister. In 26 BC, Augustus arranged for Cleopatra to marry Juba II, king of Numidia, and provided a rich dowry in return for him making his kingdom a province of Rome. Juba and Cleopatra returned to Africa as client rulers of an adjacent kingdom, Mauritania, and began minting coins that alluded to the power of both rulers.

The date of Cleopatra's death is a mystery; she was thought to have died in AD 6 as Juba is known to have remarried around this time (to Glaphyra, a princess of Cappadocia), but coins bearing Cleopatra Selene's name are known that bear the regnal date equivalent to AD 17, indicating she was still alive and queen of Mauritania at this time.

The unusual elephant headdress worn by Demetrius on this tetradrachm recalls the similar headgear sported by Alexander the Great on early coins of Ptolemaic Egypt, referring to his conquests in northern India. Demetrius also campaigned in India while serving a long apprenticeship under his father, Euthydemus I, as recorded on a dedicatory stone recently discovered north of Ai Khanoum in Afghanistan. After succeeding to the throne, he launched an invasion of Northern India that extended Greek control into modern Pakistan. The historian Strabo claims "more tribes were subdued by [Demetrius] than Alexander."

Like many Greco-Bactrian and Indo-Greek rulers, Agathocles is a near complete mystery to us in terms of his origins, rise to power and the extent of his realm. On his rare "pedigree" coinage he claims the previous Bactrian Kings Diodotus, Euthydemus and Demetrius as his ancestors; however these were from rival houses, and Agathocles also claims kinship to Alexander the Great and an "Antiochus Nicator," possibly Antiochus II or III, to whom he almost certainly bore no blood relation. The evidence supports the conclusion that he was a usurper who seized control, or was appointed to rule, a portion of the vast, unwieldy kingdom along with his contemporaries Antimachus Theos, Panteleon and Apollodotus I, whose coins seem to have been struck in the same 20 year span in the early second century BC. Of his character we can deduce little aside from the personality hinted at by his extraordinary coin portraits, which depict a lean man with a head of tight, curly hair, a sharply pointed nose, compressed lips, and a bit of a mad gleam in his eye. Whatever his origins and personal qualities, his reign was cut short by the rise of Eucratides I, who seems to have suppressed his rivals and assumed full control of all Bactria in about 170 BC; Greek-ruled northern India remained independent, however, under the successors of Apollodotus I.

Of the immense Greco-Bactrian kingdom's rulers, we have only a handful of written accounts totaling about 500 words, along with the intriguing and often puzzling glimpses provided by the coinage of the realm. From the latter we can deduce that Eucratides, who reigned for about 25 years starting around 171 BC, arose from obscure origins to become the most powerful of all Greco-Bactrian kings, displacing several other claimants over a span of about 10 years. On this remarkable "pedigree" tetradrachm he pairs a reverse portrait of himself with the epithet Megas ("The Great" — he was apparently the first Greek ruler of any realm to give the title to himself without waiting for posterity to bestow it), with the dual portraits of his parents, named Heliocles and Laodice, on the obverse. Heliocles is shown as bare-headed — perhaps he was a powerful magistrate or general. Was Laodice the daughter of a previous Bactrian king, perhaps Euthydemus or Demetrius I? Or, as has also been suggested, a princess of the Seleucid ruling dynasty (the name Laodice being quite common among the women of this house)? Pending the discovery of some parchment or inscription that clarifies his lineage, we cannot but guess. However, this remarkable "pedigree" coinage of Eucratides makes it quite clear that he was proud of his parentage and that they could not have been mere "commoners," as expounded by some.

This coin displays the famous mythological scene known as "The Judgement of Paris" - a competition between three formidable goddesses: Hera the Queen of the Gods, Athena the goddess of War, and Aphrodite the goddess of Love. To settle this competition Paris was chosen to pick the fairest of them all. Each of the goddesses tried to bribe Paris while he was "inspecting" them. Hera vowed him power. Athena offered him wisdom and military prowess. And finally, Aphrodite promised him Helen, the world's most beautiful woman, an offer he couldn't turn down. Aphrodite was awarded the winning trophy, the golden apple, which became an attribute forever connected to the goddess. The result of this competition would kick off the events that led to the Trojan war and the eventual fall of Troy.

In the myth of the founding of Rome, Aeneas was the child of Venus and Anchises. With the fall of Troy, Aeneas, a Trojan warrior, was ordered by the gods to flee with a group of people including his father and son, Iulus. After Aeneas' own "Odyssey" through the Mediterranean, he landed in Italia, and his legacy would become the founding of Rome and his descendants would be Romulus and Remus. With this coin's imagery, Julius Caesar refers to the mythical founding of Rome and was used to link Julius Caesar's lineage to Iulus, then Aeneas, and finally to Venus. Caesar also used the obverse of this coin to lay claim to the goddess Venus over his opponent of the time, Pompey the Great. The reverse refers to the moment Aeneas fled Troy, carrying his father to safety with him. This story was later immortalized in Virgil's Aenead, under the auspices of Augustus, who used this story to link himself, by extension of his adoption by Julius Caesar, to the founding of Rome.

For two centuries, Rome had spurned the Hellenistic practice of placing the ruler's portrait on the coinage of the realm, much as they rejected the concept of kingship altogether. So early in 44 BC, many Romans must have been stunned to see the image of Julius Caesar on circulating silver denarii. Like a profusion of other honors and titles, the right to place his image on coins had been bestowed on Caesar by the Roman Senate. Caesar's enemies may have had an ulterior motive in approving the honor, as it almost certainly would fuel the growing suspicion that Caesar intended to name himself king of Rome. If this was the intent, it succeeded, for within three months a conspiracy had been formed and Caesar was duly assassinated at a meeting of the Senate on 15 March 44 BC. This rare silver denarius by L. Buca carries a realistic portrait of Caesar on the obverse and the seated image of the dictator's patron goddess, Venus, on the reverse. The obverse legend acclaims Caesar as "DICT(ator) PERPETVO," or "Dictator For Life," a title approved by the Senate in February, 44

This unusual issue was struck by Marc Antony during the confused interlude following his defeat by Senatorial forces at Mutina in Northern Italy in April, 43 BC. The short, sharp war was the result of the Senate having fallen under the influence of Cicero and other anti-Caesarian forces, even though one of the consuls, Aulus Hirtius, had been a supporter of Caesar. Caesar's nephew and heir Octavian masterfully played all angles during this period and ended up benefitting when Hirtius and his consular colleague were both killed in the battle, leaving Octavian in effective command of eight Senatorial legions. Defeated but not crushed, Antony and his legions retreated into Cisalpine Gaul and played a waiting game while Octavian returned to Rome and became ensnared in Senatorial politics. Antony greatly strengthened his position by forming an alliance with another Caesarian, Marcus Aemlius Lepidus, governor of Transalpine Gaul and Spain, giving them control of 17 legions. The dual portraits of Antony and Caesar on this denarius type were no doubt intended to remind soldiers and civilians alike of Antony's unswerving loyalty to Caesar and his memory. The interlude ended seven months later when Antony, Octavian and Lepidus made common cause against Caesar's assassins and formed the Second Triumvirate.

One of the main ringleaders in the plot to assassinate Julius Caesar, Gaius Cassius Longinus had been a survivor and hero of the Parthian War of Crassus (53-51 BC). Initially a backer of Pompey, he accepted a pardon from Caesar in 48 BC and loyally served him for the next four years. It soon became apparent the dictator had no intention of stepping down, and thus Cassius was one of the first to plunge his dagger into Caesar on the Ides of March, 44 BC. After fleeing Rome, Cassius returned to Syria and commandeered several crack legions and a fleet. He joined forces with Brutus in 42 BC and the two marched into Thrace to meet the pro-Caesarian legions led by Marc Antony and Octavian. At the first clash at Philippi in early October, Cassius suffered a reverse and rashly fell on his sword before he could be told that Brutus had counterattacked and saved the day. Demoralized by his friend's death, Brutus was easily defeated three weeks later and took his own life.

Marcus Junius Brutus was a blue-blooded Roman who had attained a fortune by lending money at exorbitant interest rates when he was suborned into the conspiracy against his former benefactor, Julius Caesar. As his distant ancestor had entered history as a great tyrannicide, Brutus soon became the de-facto leader and spokesmen for the assassins. After the Ides of March, Brutus induced a cowed senate to give him a governorship in northern Greece and promptly departed to raise money and arms for the brewing civil war against Caesar's adherents. He cut a brutal swath through Greece, Thrace, and Asia Minor, looting city treasuries and enforcing horrendous taxes at the point of a sword. He turned his ill-gotten gains into silver denarii to pay his growing army and navy, including this type. Brutus and his companions were soon maneuvered into battle against the Caesarians at Philippi in Greece, where Marc Antony proved to be much the better general. Brutus took his own life with the very dagger he had plunged into Caesar, earning this unattractive character the reputation as a martyr for the cause of liberty.

The identity of the veiled female bust on the obverse is uncertain. She may be Ceres, the Roman goddess of agriculture (suggested by her round hat, which resembles a modius or grain basket); Crawford suggested Diana, without explaining the lack of attributes normally ascribed to this goddess. Another possibility is Libertas, who appears veiled (but without hat) on other coins of Brutus.

As part of a pact at Brundisium in 42 BC, shortly after the Battle of Philippi, Marc Antony agreed to Octavian's arrangement to marry his widowed sister, Octavia. She traveled with Antony for several years and assisted in negotiating the renewal of the triumvirate in 37 BC, which would last until 33 BC.

The last Ptolemaic ruler of Egypt, Cleopatra VII was born in 69 BC and succeeded her father Ptolemy XII Auletes in 51 BC. She soon faced a succession crisis: Her weak-willed younger brother and co-ruler, Ptolemy XIII, was dominated by a circle of courtiers who feared Cleopatra's keen intellect and resolute will. Consequently, they ousted and exiled her in 48 BC, shortly before the Roman general Pompey the Great arrived in Alexandria fresh from his defeat by Julius Caesar at the battle of Pharsalus. Ptolemy ordered Pompey's murder, but this only outraged Caesar, who showed up days later and occupied the royal palace. Cleopatra had herself wrapped in a carpet and smuggled into Caesar's presence for a meeting. This display of spunk by the nubile 20-year-old enchanted the dictator. The two likely became lovers that night, and Caesar's bitter Alexandrine War, which ended in the defeat and death of Ptolemy XIII, was fought on her behalf. Caesar tarried a while longer in Egypt while Cleopatra conceived and bore him a son. Caesar returned to Rome in 47 BC and summoned Cleopatra to join him the following year. She was thus in Rome when Caesar was murdered on March 15, 44 BC. Returning to Alexandria, she was summoned to meet the Triumvir Marc Antony at Tarsus in 41 BC. Once again, a powerful Roman succumbed to Cleopatra's charms, and within a year she had borne Antony twins, a boy and a girl. Antony's adoption of "barbaric" Egyptian customs, his increasing dependence on Cleopatra and his promise to bestow most of Rome's eastern possessions upon her and her children led his partner in power, Octavian, to declare war in 32 BC. Antony fought a lethargic campaign and suffered a heavy naval defeat at Actium in September, 31 BC, after which he and Cleopatra fled to Egypt. On Octavian's approach in 30 BC, Antony committed suicide and Cleopatra followed suit days later, utilizing the poisonous bite of the sacred asp.

This series of coins celebrate Marc Antony's victory over Armenia, which was used as propaganda to bolster his image back in Rome after failing to defeat Parthia. During the Parthian campaign, Antony had enlisted the help of Armenia; however, when it became evident that their side would lose the war, King Artavasdes II fled back to Armenia. Antony viewed this abandonment as a betrayal. While, plotting his revenge on Artavasdes II, he played nice until he made it safely out of the Armenian region. In order to enact this revenge, Antony fled to his lover, Cleopatra, and in 37 BC, used the wealth of Egypt to depose King Artavasdes II. This monetary backing became known as the "Donations of Alexandria" and the resulting political fallout of this "donation" was swift. Octavian used Antony's entanglement with Egypt, and Cleopatra, as a reason for him to end his own politically tenuous coalition with Antony, turning the people against the couple and thereby sealing their fate.

In 41 BC, Octavian founded Legio IX Hispana in Eboracum (York, Britain), recalling the veterans of the previous 9th legion to battle Sextus Pompey in Sicily. This legion is also known as Legio nona Hispana and Legio VIIII Hispana.

Among the honors voted by the Roman Senate in 27 BC to Augustus was the Clipeus Virtutis, or shield of valor, which was given, along with branches of laurel, to a soldier who had saved the life of a comrade in battle.

A comet that appeared in summer 44 BC was held to signal Julius Caesar's ascension to the heavens, and proved quite useful in Octavian's effort to get the Senate to deify his adoptive father. The memory of Caesar's deification was revived in connection with Augustus' proposal to hold the Saecular Games in 17 BC, and the "Julian star" is featured on his coinage in the years leading up to the event.

The laureate male head on the reverse little resembles lifetime coin portraits of Julius Caesar, but the presence of the "Julian comet" above his head leaves little doubt as to the identity of the portrait. As Augustus was celebrating the commencement of a "New Age" with the Saecular Games of 17 BC, it is likely the elder Caesar is shown as "rejuvenated" (literally "made young again") to mark the occasion.

Already planning ahead for his succession, in 8 BC Augustus introduced his twelve-year-old grandson and adopted son Gaius Caesar to the Roman army in Gaul. Gaius subsequently accompanied the future emperor Tiberius on campaign against the Sicambri on the Rhine frontier, and two years later he became Rome's youngest consul to date at the age of 14. The bulla around Gaius' neck signifies that he was still a child and had not yet assumed the toga of manhood (J. Pollini, Gaius Caesar on horseback, Museum Notes 30, 1985).

As the stepchild and unwanted heir of Augustus, Tiberius had a difficult act to follow. Nevertheless, for the first few years of his reign, he did a commendable job running the vast empire bequeathed to his care. Cautious and frugal, he engaged in no wars of conquest and kept the Empire's finances in good order. However, he soon tired of the endless toil and began handing off duties to his unscrupulous second-fiddles, namely the Praetorian Prefect Sejanus and his eventual replacement, Macro. The resulting bloodbath among members of his own family, and their Senatorial supporters, tarnished his name throughout history. There are reports that in the end, Tiberius did not die of natural causes. Suetonius, himself, believed rumors that Caligula had poisoned, starved, smothered him with a pillow, and then he fell dead. He was deified upon death.

His cautious nature is reflected in his coinage - unlike the plethora of types employed by Augustus, Tiberius kept the same simple design for both silver denarii and gold aurei for almost the entirety of his reign. This uniformity of type makes it virtually impossible to date any particular aureus or denarius more precisely than somewhere within the last two decades of his reign. Hence, virtually any of his coins could have been struck in the same year as the momentous event he probably never heard about, the crucifixion of Jesus Christ in Judaea, likely between AD 30 and 34. The coin associated most closely to Tiberius is the "Tribute Penny," the silver version of this aureus, as they are mentioned in the Bible.

There is scholarly disagreement over the mint location for Caligula's precious metal coinage. C. H. V. Sutherland and R. A. Carson, writing in Vol. I of RIC, state their belief that the early, bare headed coinage of Caligula, like that of Tiberius, was struck in Gaul at the mint of Lugdunum, but that late in AD 37, minting operations were transferred to Rome and continued there for all subsequent issues, identified by a laureate head of the emperor. J. B. Giard, author of the Bibliotech Nationale catalog in Paris, believes all of Caligula's gold and silver issues were minted in Lugdunum, and this view is supported by David R. Sear in "Roman Coins and Their Values."

According to contemporary Roman authors, Caligula's tenure as Roman emperor was an abject failure; after displaying initial promise and popularity, he descended into madness, self-indulgence, and violence. Referring to himself as Jupiter or the New Sun God on official public documents, he named his horse a consul and declared war on the sea, forcing troops to stab the Mediterranean with their spears. He was said to kill for the fun of it and once ordered an entire section of the audience to be fed to the beasts for his own excitement. Caligula was assassinated in AD 41 at the age of 28, falling well short of the Roman people's early high expectations for him, based on the achievements and mystique of his father Germanicus, a titan of the Julio-Claudian age beloved for decades after his death.

Germanicus was fortunate to be connected by blood or marriage to nearly all the important imperial figures of his age: his grandparents included Livia, the first empress, Mark Antony, Caesar's most trusted lieutenant, and Augustus' sister Octavia. He was also the nephew of the second emperor Tiberius, and if that was not enough, he married Agrippina, daughter of Augustus' right-hand man Marcus Agrippa and granddaughter of Augustus himself. With such a pedigree and enormous inherited wealth, Germanicus could have enjoyed a life of leisure and hedonism, but he was a bold spirit and pursued life with an uncommon vigor and tenacity, becoming one of Rome's most celebrated and successful commanders. After displaying impressive success serving in Illyria, Augustus promoted Germanicus, only 28 years of age, to commander of all forces on the German frontier, Rome's most important border. For four years, Germanicus achieved victory after victory in an Alexander or Napoleonlike fashion, establishing his legacy as perhaps the greatest Roman general of the Imperial age. Only four years before, three Roman legions had been wiped out in the Teutoburg Forest by the Germanic chieftain Arminius. Germanicus soundly defeated him in battle, as Tacitus writes that "the enemy were slaughtered from the fifth hour of daylight to nightfall, and for ten miles the ground was littered with corpses and weapons." The Roman armies were even able to reconquer one of the lost legionary eagles from Teutoburg, and the men returned to the site to bury their former comrades bones, which had remained strewn about the battlefield. Germanicus was beloved by his men; he often paid the soldiers bonuses out of his own enormous personal wealth, and took great care for his troops' well-being.

His ever-jealous uncle Tiberius, surrounded by conniving advisors in Rome, ordered his recall and eventually dispatched him to the East, where he enjoyed still more success and popularity. In AD 19, at the age of 33, Germanicus died in the Syrian port of Seleucia. Many, including Germanicus himself, believed he had been poisoned either on the order of Tiberius or by the governor of Syria Calpernius Piso, a bitter enemy. In death, Germanicus was revered and worshipped as a great conqueror and benevolent leader. His beloved wife Agrippina, heartbroken over her husband's death, worked tirelessly to keep the case of his death alive and used her imperial connections to finally bring governor Piso before the Senate in a murder trial. Germanicus' great popularity and some potential remorse from Tiberius essentially condemned Piso, who committed suicide during the trial, though the was much gossip that Tiberius had murdered Piso to prevent him from disclosing Tiberius' own involvement in the murder.

Owing to Germanicus' stellar reputation, Caligula sought to associate himself with his dead father throughout his reign. This coin bears not only portraits of the father and son pair, but also the legend P C CAES for Germanicus, meaning "father of Caius (Caligula) Caesar," in order to make sure that people made the connection between the heroic conqueror and his son the emperor.

The Temple of Janus was one of the oldest structures in the Roman Forum. In keeping with the spirit of Janus, the two-faced god, the temple had large doors on two opposing sides. According to tradition, the doors were kept open in wartime and closed during times of peace. The closing of the Temple doors was a rare event, even during the Pax Romana. In AD 66, having recently concluded a favorable peace treaty with Parthia, Nero closed the doors with great fanfare and marked the occasion on his coinage.

Sear Millennium 1962 describes this arch as 'one decreed by the Senate in AD 58 to commemorate the Eastern victory of Cn. Nero had him executed because he felt threatened by the general's great popularity, and the fear that this act caused within the miltary leadership in part lead to its disaffection with the regime and eventual revolt.

Born in AD 32 to a nouveau riche family, Marcus Salvius Otho grew up as a pampered playboy with a taste for the finer things in life. He had a peculiar abhorrence for bodily hair and depilated every part of his body, including his head; to cover his baldness, he then wore a carefully made wig, clearly visible in this outstanding coin portrait. When Nero's regime collapsed in mid AD 68, Otho was governor of Lusitania and one of Galba's earliest supporters. He fully expected to be named the old man's heir apparent. Instead, Galba chose a young aristocrat of better breeding, and the furious Otho began plotting his removal. Playing on Galba's stingy reputation, he bribed the Praetorian Guards to murder Galba on January 15, AD 69, after which the Senate reluctantly confirmed Otho as emperor. But he immediately faced another rebellion, this time by Vitellius, the governor of lower Germany, whose sizeable army marched on Italy. Otho and the Praetorian Guard hurried north to hold the line at the River Po. The sharp clash at Cremona in northern Italy went decisively against him. Again, his generals urged him to keep fighting, but he decided to spare Rome further bloodshed. Retiring to his room with a dagger, he stabbed himself in the heart, the morning of April 16 or 17, AD 69. His noble end gained him a respect that had eluded him in life.

This reverse evokes the Founding of Rome Myth. Romulus and Remus were twins and children of Rhea Silvia, a Vestal Virgin, who was impregnated by Mars while she slept. Her uncle, King Amulius feared they would threaten his reign and ordered their deaths. So in order to protect her babies from him, Silvia placed her children in a basket and placed them in the Tiber river, hoping fate would guide them to safety. With the help of the river god Tiberinus, the baby boys wound up at the future sight of Rome and they were found by the she-wolf. She nursed them and raised them for a time until they were adopted by a shepherd, Faustulus. The image of Romulus and Remus with the she-wolf became an icon of Rome; it was continuously depicted in art throughout the years of the Empire and into modern times.

This reverse evokes the Founding of Rome Myth. Romulus and Remus were twins and children of Rhea Silvia, a Vestal Virgin, who was impregnated by Mars while she slept. Her uncle, King Amulius feared they would threaten his reign and ordered their deaths. So in order to protect her babies from him, Silvia placed her children in a basket and placed them in the Tiber river, hoping fate would guide them to safety. With the help of the river god Tiberinus, the baby boys wound up at the future sight of Rome and they were found by the she-wolf. She nursed them and raised them for a time until they were adopted by a shepherd, Faustulus. The image of Romulus and Remus with the she-wolf became an icon of Rome; it was continuously depicted in art throughout the years of the Empire and into modern times.

Liberalitas was the personification of generosity, particularly of the imperial kind. Her image is often used in conjunction with the regular distributions of cash and food to the Roman populace, and she is usually shown holding a cornucopia and an object sometimes described as an abacus. This is most probably a special shovel or scoop with slots cut into it, so that a specified number of coins would be delivered to each citizen.

This attractive gold aureus illustrates the monetary crisis about to engulf the Roman Empire. At 4.71 grams, this coin is only 3/4 the weight of aurei issued during the Severan era and points to the shortage of precious metals caused by a worsening spiral of inflation and debasement. Silver was also in short supply, which caused the venerable denarius to be driven out of circulation by its inflationary cousin, the antoninianus. Portraiture and overall artistry were still of a high standard, however, and the youth and innocence of Gordian are quite evident in his obverse image.

Here, Heracles is depicted in the throws of capturing the creature, which he would release back to the goddess upon his successful display to the King.

Gaius Valerius Licinianus Licinius was born in the early AD 260s. Like many other young men of low birth, he joined the Roman Army and rose quickly through the ranks. During his career he befriended Galerius, who became Caesar in AD 293, and then Augustus upon Diocletian's retirement in AD 305. At the Conference of Carnuntum in November, AD 308, Galerius appointed him as Augustus in place of the deceased Severus II, thus leapfrogging the legitimate Caesars Constantine I and Maximinus II. The death of Galerius in AD 311 left four men claiming the supreme title of Augustus: Licinius in the Balkans, Maxentius in Italy, Constantine I in Gaul and Britain, and Maximinus II in Asia Minor and Egypt. Another round of civil wars in AD 312-313 saw Constantine defeat Maxentius and Licinius victorious over Maximinus. Licinius launched a massacre of all potential rivals, including Maximinus' children, Galerius' son, and Diocletian's daughter. Yet he grudgingly accepted Constantine's edict of toleration toward Christians and came to a modus vivendi with his western counterpart. Tensions rose, with a final civil war erupting in AD 324. Constantine landed a series of crushing blows, and Licinius retreated with the remnants of his army to Nicomedia for a final stand. His wife Constantia intervened and negotiated an honorable surrender. Constantine at first allowed him to retire to Thessalonica, but executed him in AD 325. Although Licinius was a competent soldier and administrator, his many murders paint him as an unattractive character. The image of Jupiter on the reverse of this aureus shows his devotion to the traditional gods of Rome, while in the West Constantine's coinage was already beginning to show Christian influence.

The portrait of Christ on the obverse of this solidus is the first numismatic representation of Jesus and immediately followed the ruling of the Trullan Synod of AD 692 that Christ could be depicted in human form. Justinian II was ostentatiously devout and placing the divine image on his coinage was a reflection of this. The image is remarkably naturalistic and lifelike, and was likely based on the mosaic image of Christ in the apse of the Great Palace of Constantinople, which was itself influenced by Hellenistic depictions of Zeus. Some scholars have argued that Justinian's choice to produce this new type came in response to the Umayyad caliph 'Abd al-Malik's minting of Byzantine-style solidi bearing the Islamic statement of faith (the shahada) in AD 692, which he used in payment of tribute to the Emperor prior to the decisive Umayyad victory at the Battle of Sebastopolis later that year.

The brief sole reign of the Empress Irene was a milestone in both Roman and Byzantine history, as it marked the first time a woman ruled the Empire in her own right. Previous empresses had effectively wielded supreme power, but only by using a male figurehead as nominal ruler. An Athenian beauty of renowned intellect, Irene rose to prominence as the wife of Emperor Leo IV. When Leo died in AD 780, Irene ruled as regent for their adolescent son Constantine VI until iconoclast ministers forced her ouster. But when Constantine VI embarrassed the regime with a series of military blunders and public scandals, Irene had him ousted and blinded in AD 797, seizing sole power for herself. She won popularity with generous handouts and tax reductions, but the state's coffers soon emptied and she faced a series of military disasters that further undermined her position. Furthermore, the accession of a female promoted the Pope in Rome to declare the imperial throne vacant and the Frankish king Charlemagne was duly crowned "Emperor of the Romans" in AD 800. He in turn sent Irene an offer of marriage which might have united Eastern and Western Christendom under one government and changed the course of history, but it was not to be: In AD 802 Irene was ousted in a coup led by her finance minister Nicephorus, who exiled her to Lesbos, where she died the following year. Her devotion to icons led to her canonization in the Orthodox Church.

Theodora was one of two daughters born to the Emperor Constantine VIII (AD 1025-1028). Unlike her sister Zoe, whom she detested, Theodora was bookish and solitary, preferring the life of the convent to the company of men. She was not above involving herself in the imperial family's intrigues, however, and in AD 1042, she briefly reigned as co-Empress with Zoe. However, the sisters could not agree on anything and Zoe was hastily married off to the aristocrat Constantine Monomachus, who accepted the throne as Constantine IX. Having outlasted all other members of the Macedonian dynasty, Theodora accepted the purple as sole ruler after the death of Constantine IX, in January AD 1055. On the whole she ruled with frugality, caution, and competence, but her micro-management of affairs earned criticism. After 18 months on the throne, she fell seriously ill and chose for her successor the highly unsuitable civil servant Michael VI Bringas. Her death, in August AD 1056, brought the 187-year run of the Macedonian dynasty to a close.

#### **ALBANIA**

- 33337 Zog I gold "Prince Skanderbeg" 20 Franga Ari 1927-V MS66 NGC, Vienna mint, KM12. Mintage: 5,053. A smattering of russet toning adds charming bursts of color to the otherwise clear velvet fields. Additionally, the crisp high-points remain virtually untouched.
- 33338 Zog I gold 20 Franga Ari 1927-R MS65 NGC, Rome mint, KM10. Full mint bloom with lustrous burnt-orange hues. Always an attractive piece, but particularly so at this level of preservation. None graded higher at NGC.
- 33339 Zog I gold 100 Franga Ari 1926-R MS62 NGC, Rome mint, KM11.3, Fr-1. Variety with two stars below bust. A popular type, presenting sharp devices and lustrous, sun-gold fields with minor contact marks.
- **33340 Zog I gold 100 Franga Ari 1926-R MS62 NGC,** Rome mint, KM11.3. Two stars below bust variety. Enviable luster and the high relief on the obverse and reverse give the impression that this piece was freshly minted. Only minor abrasions prevent this marvelous specimen from scaling higher on the census report. Seemingly conservatively graded.
- 33341 Zog I gold Prova 100 Franga Ari 1926-R UNC Details (Cleaned) NGC, Rome mint, KM-PR15, Pag-784. One star below bust variety. Supremely brilliant surfaces lend themselves to more noticeable marks, despite their mild nature, on this imposing pattern rarity.
- 33342 Zog I gold "Independence Anniversary" 100 Franga Ari 1937-R MS63 PCGS, Rome mint, KM21, Fr-11, Mont-18 (R). Mintage: 500. Struck for the 25th anniversary of Albanian independence. A classic Albanian rarity that always comes highly contested due to its already low mintage, and even more so when found in Choice Mint State and finer. The present example is both conditionally and visually superior to most we have offered, imbued with flashes of brilliance at even the most subtle flick of the wrist, highlighting a paucity of grade-defining ticks. For comparison, the Paramount specimen was only an MS62, and brought \$5040 in March. Sold with old collector's tag and B. Max Mehl Farouk sale tag.

33343 Zog I gold "10th Anniversary of Reign" 100 Franga Ari 1938-R MS62 NGC, Rome mint, KM26, Fr-15. Mintage: 500. A coveted one-year type showcasing chiseled motifs and attractive, glossy fields with shades of mint bloom.

#### **ARGENTINA**

- 33344 La Rioja. Republic 4 Reales 1850-RB MS65 NGC, La Rioja mint, KM20. A delightful representative and conditionally very scarce, currently unchallenged at this certified grade level. Slightly softly struck in the central areas, dressed in attractive dove gray patination throughout and exhibiting choice luster swirling across the surfaces.
- 33345 Tierra del Fuego. Territory gold "Popper" Gramo 1889 MS65 PCGS, Buenos Aires mint, KM-Tn5, Janson-7. Large letters obverse and reverse variety. Produced by Julius Popper, a Jewish Romanian-born Argentine adventurer referred to as a "modern conquistador." An elusive state of Gem preservation for the type, tied with one NGC representative for the finest across grading companies. Neat, pondlike fields and crisp devices confirm this position.

33346 Rio de la Plata gold 8 Escudos 1828 RA-P AU55 NGC, La Rioja mint, KM21, Fr-2. An exceptional rarity, with this specimen the only known at either grading service. Possessing one of the more instantly recognizable motifs in Latin American coinage, this sun-face 8 Escudos is basked in luxuriant gold and displays only the slightest tinge of rub. The reverse presents more obvious handling and a slightly off-center strike. Specialists in Argentinian and Latin American series should watch this lot closely.

#### **ARMENIA**

33347 Cilician Armenia. Levon I (1198-1219) Denier ND (c. 1208) AU Details (Reverse Scratched) NGC, Sis mint, CCS-133b (under Antioch), Bed-10. 1.00gm. + REX ARMENOR (ME ligate), crowned head facing / + LEO DEI GRATIA, cross pattée. A seldom-seen Armenian portrait issue struck in concordance with the Antiochene rather than the Armenian standard. It has been supposed that this type may have been produced by Levon in anticipation of his capture of Antioch, at which he had nearly succeeded in 1203. Presenting bold, wholly-original surfaces with a dark gunmetal tone and earthen crevices.

#### **AUSTRALIA**

- 33348 Victoria gold 'Missing Berry' 1/2 Sovereign 1856-SYDNEY VF25 NGC, Sydney mint, KM1, Marsh-381A (R3). Although the normal 1856 Sydney 1/2 Sovereign is quite readily available to collectors thanks to the hoard discoveries, the offering at hand is the very rarely seen Type II reverse variant with missing berry above the 'L' in HALF, and one that is hotly contested whenever making an appearance on the marketplace. Whilst this is the first example of this exceedingly rare type we have had the pleasure of handling, we note that this specimen is conditionally vastly superior to the NGC VG8 graded piece that was sold elsewhere in August 2021 for approximately \$3,000.
- 33349 Victoria gold 1/2 Sovereign 1861/0-SYDNEY XF45 NGC, Sydney mint, cf. KM3 (overdate unlisted), Fr-10a, Marsh-386A (R3). From a low original mintage of 183,500 an unknown number of coins were minted with the 1/0 overdate which in this example is well observable under magnification. A brief study in comparable sales reveals limited few of these overdates appearing on the marketplace; the previous one we sold was a PCGS VF25 in January 2014, selling for \$2,820 - this specimen is conditionally vastly superior and in fact, is the finest graded in the NGC census with only one piece sharing the same technical grade in the PCGS population. An offering that admits honest wear from active circulation and projects the typical greenish tinge due to the naturally occurring silver in the alloy used in Australia which, incidentally, is the primary reason why these pieces are so rare, as they got melted down for their higher than face value intrinsic metal content.
- 33350 Victoria gold 1/2 Sovereign 1872-S AU58 NGC, Sydney mint, KM5, S-3862A, Marsh-461 (S). Victoria's nose points to 'T' in legend. Delightfully fresh and lustrous, with the light friction to the Queen's hair limiting this adorable example from Mint State designation; decidedly scarce when encountered this nice.
- 33351 Victoria gold 1/2 Sovereign 1879-S AU58 NGC, Sydney mint, KM5, S-3862C, Marsh-463 (S). A lovely and very collectable Young Victoria 1/2 Sovereign that offers wholly appreciable visual appeal owing to the generously cartwheeling mint luster; conditionally scarce at this level and higher.
- 33352 Victoria gold "Jubilee Head" 1/2 Sovereign 1887-S MS62+ NGC, Sydney mint, KM9, S-3871A, Marsh-485C (R4). Approximate Mintage: 16,750. - 33354 Victoria gold "Jubilee Head" 1/2 Sovereign 1887-S AU58 NGC, Sydney mint, KM9, S-3871, Marsh-485 (R4). Variety with wide JEB. Admitting signs of handling commensurate to the technical grade throughout the glassy fields.
- 33355 Victoria gold 1/2 Sovereign 1897-S AU58 NGC, Sydney mint, KM12, S-3881, Marsh-503A (R). An eye-catching, borderline Mint State specimen with a hint of lavender undertone embellished by the sweeping mint luster.
- 33356 Victoria gold Sovereign 1855-SYDNEY AU55 NGC, Sydney mint, KM2. Difficult even at this level of preservation, this young, fillet-headed Victoria portrait exhibits conspicuous signs of handling and some diminishment of its mint luster. Nevertheless, the issue is far superior to most encountered on the market and the rarity and collectability of the issue should generate considerable bidder interest. From the Mac and Rob Woodside Collection
- 33357 Victoria gold Sovereign 1860-SYDNEY UNC Details (Obverse Rim Filed) NGC, Sydney mint, KM4, Fr-10, Marsh-365. Arguably the rarest of the second type bust Sydney Sovereign dates, accompanied with an impeccable pedigree. In addition, the cataloger suspects this just might look like a 6/5 overdate which, if true, would make this coin an extremely rare (R3) piece according to the Marsh classification. Admitting obverse rim filing around 5 o'clock and a few instances of light contact, otherwise highly pleasing in appearance, displaying full-bodied struck designs over the profusely lustrous fields carrying the typical sage green undercurrent. Rarely seen in this state of preservation and an outstanding opportunity to acquire a piece of the famed Quartermaster Collection.

A pleasing Sydney shield only infrequently offered this Choice; currently bested by only 2 examples at NGC and tied for the finest at PCGS. A high-caliber example for the quality-conscious collector of Commonwealth Sovereigns.
- 33364 Victoria gold "St. George" Sovereign 1880-M MS64+ NGC, Melbourne mint, KM7. The top example at NGC, with none earning even a base 64. Wonderfully lustrous, engendering an impression of Prooflike surfaces. Bidders should be aware that this iconic type is seldom seen at this level of pristine originality.
- 33365 Victoria gold "St. George" Sovereign 1881-S MS64 NGC, Sydney mint, KM7, S-3858D, Marsh-118A. Short tail, no BP in exergue, WW complete in broad truncation. The delightfully satiny fields are graced by a tidal wave of luster. Currently unchallenged at this certified grade level across both the NGC and PCGS populations, sharing the top grade with only two other pieces.
- 33366 Victoria gold "Shield" Sovereign 1886-S MS64+ PCGS, KM6, S-3885B, Marsh-82 (S). The nicest example for this type we have ever had the pleasure of handling; the previous example we sold near this caliber, in base MS64, was five years ago and fetched \$4,080. The offering at hand exhibits beautiful, shimmering fields with only occasional wisps and marks. Judging from the minute die cracks at the base of Victoria's bust and in the surrounding legends, the dies were already in a later stage, perhaps also witnessed by the slight softness of the Irish harp on the reverse. Regardless, the sole finest specimen across both grading agencies and extremely desirable as such.
- 33367 Victoria gold "St. George" Sovereign 1886-M MS64 NGC, Melbourne mint, KM7. Tied between both PCGS and NGC for second finest, this graceful offering is capped by minimal handling marks that do little to detract from the regality of the brilliant honey devices.
- 33368 Victoria gold "St. George" Sovereign 1886-M MS64 PCGS, Melbourne mint, KM7, S-3857C. A splendid representative pedigreed to an elite cabinet, populating the second finest grade on the PCGS census. Flashy, semi-Prooflike fields embolden the meticulously rendered devices, a truly splendid combination. Only light wisps preclude a Gem designation. Accompanied by an old Seaby envelope.

The struck details are needle-sharp with nary a wisp of cabinet friction capping the grade, all laid out on valiantly shimmering fields, the obverse revealing a beautiful soft thistle undercurrent when viewed at an angle.

Of stunning quality and visual appeal, this imposing Double Taler exhibits bright surfaces, with remarkable ripples of brilliance displayed to the reverse against the razor-sharp detail across the eagle's torso and feathers the exacting end-result all the more impressive when considering this was produced with rolling dies, yielding the waviness of the planchet.
- 33378 Leopold I gold Ducat 1683 MS63 NGC, Vienna mint, KM1325, Fr-276. An highly impressive survivor of this conditionally challenging issue. Needle-point devices upon shimmering, lustrous surfaces make this an appealing piece in hands. When turned at an angle, one can truly see how semi-reflective the fields are. Unsurprisingly, this is the sole finest piece recorded by either NGC or PCGS.

- 33380 Joseph II gold Ducat 1787-A MS62 NGC, Vienna mint, KM1873, Fr-439. An inviting sun-yellow and lustrous uncirculated specimen, with exceedingly little actual wear visible across the bust.
- 33381 Franz II (I) gold Ducat 1822-A MS62 NGC, Vienna mint, KM2170. An above average survivor scintillating amply lustrous surfaces and the second highest grade recorded by NGC.

- 33382 Ferdinand I gold 4 Ducat 1848-A UNC Details (Cleaned) NGC, Vienna mint, KM2270, Fr-480. Though examination from an angle reveals fine hairlines across the open expanses, this desirable quadruple Ducat maintains the majority of it's Mint State appeal, with the gentle frost on raised motifs lending even a touch Prooflike appearance.
- 33383 Ferdinand I gold Proof "Salvator Mundi" Medal of 6 Ducats ND (post-1843) AU Details (Removed From Jewelry) NGC, cf. Forrer VIII-297 (for engraver). 34mm. 20.89gm. Plain edge. By K. Lange. An attainable rendition of this generally elusive and beloved Salvator Mundi type, featuring the profile of Christ and a detailed city-view over Vienna. Honeyed surfaces display a bold, high-relief bust and a detailed representation of the city. The amber re-toned crevices indicate long-ago cleaned surfaces.
- 33384 Franz Joseph I Taler 1855-A MS65 NGC, Vienna mint, KM2243.1, Dav-17. An absolute Gem shimmering glassy elements in the peripheries and hints of lapis lazuli in the steelygolden fields. Topped by a single MS65+ in NGC's census.
- 33385 Franz Joseph I Proof "Railway" 2 Taler 1857-A PR62 NGC, Vienna mint, KM2246.2, Dav-20. Wreath tips between 'AI.' Struck to commemorate the opening of the Vienna-Trieste railroad. Popular in any grade, this hefty type is offered with blast-white surfaces composed by deeply-engraved motifs upon highly reflective, glossy fields.
- 33386 Franz Joseph I gold Ducat 1851 (1898)-A MS60 NGC, Vienna mint, KM2268. Mintage: 2,292. Struck to commemorate Franz Joseph I's historic golden jubilee, marking the 50th year of his prolific reign. Among the scarcer Austrian issues of this vintage and only encountered for sale once every year or so. Confidently Mint State and dressed in a pervasive golden aura that intensifies on the reverse upon illumination. One of three currently occupying NGC's census.
- 33387 Franz Joseph I gold 4 Ducat 1906 UNC Details (Holed) NGC, KM2276, Fr-487. Mintage: 123,443. An impressive piece despite the obvious conditional modifier, maintaining aspects of its originality and Mint State appeal.
- 33388 Franz Joseph I gold 4 Ducat 1912 MS64+ NGC, Vienna mint, KM2276, Fr-487. An absolutely glorious specimen, invitingly Prooflike with reflective open expanses and gentle frost laid upon the raised designs. Fully deserving of the "Plus" designation and sitting comfortably as the current highest graded piece in NGC census, bested by only one example in the PCGS population.
- 33389 Franz Joseph I gold Proof "Lady in the Clouds" 100 Corona 1908 PR61 NGC, Kremnitz mint, KM2812, Fr-514. Struck to commemorate the 60th anniversary of Franz Joseph I's reign. Presenting frosty, chiseled motifs with a pleasing contrast to the pondlike-surfaces, this highly popular and conditionally challenging issue is offered here with strong peripheries and minimal bagmarks that prevented it from a higher grade.
- 33390 Franz Joseph I gold Proof "Lady in the Clouds" 100 Corona 1908 PR58 NGC, Kremnitz mint, KM2812, Fr-514. Celebrating the 60th anniversary of Franz Joseph I's impressive reign. Mirrored surfaces with minimal signs of handling occupy this high-relief, coveted piece.
- 33391 Franz Joseph I gold Prooflike 100 Corona 1909 PL61 NGC, Vienna mint, KM2819, Fr-507. A rarity in any condition, making this brilliant example a must-have for the serious collector. Ablaze in flashes of amber that shimmer across the surfaces. Full details remain on the crowned, double eagle. This coin merits serious consideration.

LVDOVIC' o DEI | GRA : COMES Z | DnS : FLANDRIE, armored knight on horseback galloping left brandishing a sword / + XPC : VIICIT : XPC : REGUAT : XPC IUPERAT, cross fleurée in quadrilobe with leaves at angles and trefoils in spandrels. A coveted example of a seldom-seen type, coming to market in anything considered appreciable once every so often. Here crisply struck and well preserved, displaying a mellowed golden appearance throughout.

33399 Charles II "Royal" 4 Reales 1683 P-V AU Details (Plugged) NGC, Potosi mint, cf. KM-R25 (Rare; this date unlisted), Cal-503, cf. Cay-7458 (for standard Cob type), Asbun-Karmy-C358 (R; same). 13.82gm. Pedro de Villar as assayer. An outstanding survivor of the famous "Galano" presentation pieces, also known as Royal. These special issues were carefully made with prepared high-quality dies and flans, to be presented to the Spanish royalty and likely the King himself. The great majority ended up holed and worn as pendants or uniform medals, the example offered presenting its plug expertly repaired. Initially thought to be unique and now one of two known, both from the same dies, the other sold by Sedwick (Auction 26, November 2019, Lot 528), it's undeniably the best preserved example, exhibiting deeply-engraved devices and enhanced by a subtle gunmetal toning that occupies the recesses. Such an alluring piece, adding its famous pedigree, will likely engage the most serious Spanish Colonial collectors.

- 33401 Charles III gold 8 Escudos 1787/6 PTS-PR AU58+ NGC, Potosi mint, KM59, Cal-2073. Scarce in any condition and assigned a coveted "Plus" designation, this ebullient overstrike variety straddles the border of Mint State preservation. This is a popular bust type struck shortly before the death of the long-lived Charles III, whose reign is often considered the apogee of the Spanish empire. From the Mac and Rob Woodside Collection
- 33402 Charles IV gold 4 Escudos 1793 PTS-PR AU58 NGC, Potosi mint, KM80, Cal-1524. Attractive old-gold patination captures the eye from the first instance looking at this piece, admitting a light dispersion of friction from circulation and somewhat softly struck bust, regardless this is a coin rarely encountered this fine and and problem-free.
- 33403 Charles IV gold 8 Escudos 1790 PTS-PR MS61 NGC, Potosi mint, KM68, Cal-1693. Topped by a single MS62, this scarce survivor has chiseled peripheries with semi-glossy fields.
- 33404 Charles IV gold 8 Escudos 1801 PTS-PP AU58 NGC, Potosi mint, KM81, Cal-1707. Shy of a Mint State designation, proving bold motifs and abundant mint bloom.
- 33405 Charles IV gold 8 Escudos 1808 PTS-PJ AU55 NGC, Potosi mint, KM81, Cal-1714. The final year of this long series under Charles IV represented here by a lightly circulated specimen with a prestigious pedigree.

- 33406 Republic gold 8 Scudos 1835 PTS-JM AU58 NGC, Potosi mint, KM99. Bordering on Mint State preservation, this conditionally scarce issue presents mellow hues of carmine-infused gold atop smooth surfaces. Some weakness on Bolivar's cheek and lapel, but an otherwise pleasing example.
- 33407 Republic silver "Battle of Ayacucho" Medal ND (c. 1825) AU55 NGC, Potosi mint, Barac-3, Fonrobert-9449, 42x35mm. Instituted 11 August 1825. Obverse: Bolívar standing on Potosí holding Liberty Cap, radiant sun in background, pillar decorated with cannons and flags below. Reverse: "La Republica Bolivar Agradecida Al Heroe Cuyo Nombre Lleva" (The Bolivar (Bolivian) Republic [Is] Grateful to the Hero Whose Name it Bears). An attractive offering of this rare Medal produced for the Bolivian victory at the Battle of Ayacucho, despite Ross and Stahl noting that few Bolivian troops were believed to have fought in the battle. Presenting lustrous surfaces with little to no signs of handling to the deeply-toned motifs.

33408 Republic gold Matte "Independence Centennial" Medal 1925 MS66 NGC, 47mm. 55.92gm. Edge: 18k. Struck on the 100th anniversary of Bolivian independence and displaying the bust of Antonio José de Sucre, Lieutenant of Simon Bolivar and second President of Bolivia. Produced in a matte finish and softly toned to an honeyed marigold; in gorgeous Gem preservation, graded appropriately and conditionally very rare.

# **BRAZIL**

- 33409 Pedro II gold 4000 Reis 1700/699-(R) AU55 NGC, Rio de Janeiro mint, KM98, LMB-32a, date between crosslet and dot variety. Showing little to no signs of handling to the crisply-struck motifs, this luminous piece retains an attractive peach patina over the underlying luminous fields. Tied with the RLM example for the highest grade recorded by NGC.
- 33410 João V gold 800 Reis 1733/27-M AU58 PCGS, Minas Gerais mint, KM120, cf. LMB-262 (unlisted overdate). A particularly nice rendition of this scarce denomination displaying soundly-engraved peripheries with hints of mint luster to the fields. Standing as the sole finest recorded by PCGS and NGC combined.
- **33411 João V gold 4000 Reis 1720-B MS62 PCGS,** Bahia mint, KM106, Fr-30, LMB-66. A conditionally scarce type, more often than not encountered in details grades. This problem free specimen presents deep and exact motifs, while original bloom splashes around in the expanses. A lone MS62 at NGC ranks finer.
- 33412 João V gold 4000 Reis 1725-R AU58 NGC, Rio de Janeiro mint, KM102, LMB-177. Virtually free of wear surfaces with a satin-look and few marks to the fields that prevented it from a higher designation.

- 33413 João V gold 6400 Reis 1729/8-R VF, Rio de Janeiro mint, cf. KM136 (Rare; overdate not listed), LMB-190 (same). An exceedingly rare issue, and the first example we have handled of this date, presented here with evenly handled motifs and antiquegold toning. Elusive in any grade, the specimen offered is only the second we've managed to locate outside the BES (Banco Espirito Santo) Collection (ex. Hewitt and Pagliari, struck with the same dies), with none in major collections such as the Norweb, Eliasberg, or RLM. From a 5-year series, of which all dates are rare, we would note that PCGS has a single 1728/7-R (AU58) in their census, which realized \$50,000 in our auction #3056 (August 2017, Lot 30147), while NGC has a single 1727-R (AU Details) in their registry which brought \$125,000 in January 2012. A prized piece, and absolutely a unique opportunity that will likely engage Brazilian type collectors.

- 33415 João V gold 10000 Reis 1725-M AU55 NGC, Minas Gerais mint, KM116, Fr-34, LMB-245. A problem-free offering from this conditionally challenging 1/2 Dobrão issue showing minor highpoint wear to the toned surfaces.
- **33416 João V gold 12800 Reis (Dobra) 1729-R AU58 NGC,** Rio de Janeiro mint, KM140, LMB-195. A near-Mint State Dobra with appealing, crisp peripheries lacking the usual weakness from the issue and showing a seldom-seen glossiness to the fields.

Among the finest Brazilian gold issues in terms of preservation this cataloger has witnessed, produced to exacting precision, resulting in near-medallic features that project boldly towards the viewer. Golden expanses light ablaze with aurous luster at the slightest tilt, confirming this piece's status as a top-tier specimen.

A seldom-seen host for the popular 960 Reis types, this well-struck piece presents even highpoint wear to the ash surfaces and presents a bold stamp on the host, with George's bust amply discernible. First we have handled, and apparently also first to hit the market in recent decades.
- 33430 João Prince Regent 960 Reis 1817-R MS62 NGC, Rio de Janeiro mint, KM307.3, LMB-427. Struck on a Spain Joseph Napoleon 20 Reales 1811 M-AI. Scintillating luminous fields with a light cabinet patina, this Mint State offering has virtually the entirety of the 20 Reales' shield visible in the reverse, much of the host's legends and bits of Napoleon's bust. A scarce host that will likely engage 960 Reis collectors.
- 33431 João VI 960 Reis 1820-R UNC Details (Cleaned) NGC, Rio de Janeiro mint, KM326.1, LMB-478. Struck on a Colonial 8 Reales with British Honduras 6 Shillings 1 Penny block letter "GR" counterstamp (KM-Unl., Prid-Unl., cf. Roehrs Collection Part 1 Lot 6 (same stamp), Levy-RG.10). An extremely elusive host, of which only a handful have been auctioned in the last couple of decades, while Levy suggests 5-7 pieces are known as hosts for 960 Reis. Only the second example we have located other than Levy's plate coin. A very important issue for British numismatics, since it's said to have authenticated the once doubtful block letter stamp, after it was spotted under a Brazilian type. Previously, the far more common cursive GR was thought to be the only authentic stamp, the example offered being one of the survivors that changed such belief. Presenting long-ago cleaned surfaces with well-defined motifs and a subtle cabinet tone.
- 33432 João VI 960 Reis 1820-R AU58 NGC, Rio de Janeiro mint, KM326.1, LMB-478. Struck on a Mexico Ferdinand VII 8 Reales 1818-JJ with British Honduras 6 Shillings 1 Penny cursive-letter incuse "GR" ND (1810-1818) counterstamp (KM-4.2, Levy-RG.11). A coveted and scarce host for 960 reis collectors offered here shy of Mint State with a clear host-stamp, luminous surfaces and a lovely ash cabinet patina.
- 33433 Pedro I 960 Reis 1825-B AU58 NGC, Bahia mint, KM368.2, LMB-510. Struck on a Mexico Republic "Hookneck" 8 Reales 1823 Mo-JM (KM-A376.2). A chiseled representative of this popular Brazilian type where an elusive trifecta can be appreciated: a fully-struck overtype, an amply visible and scarce host, and an impressive grade. This crisp piece shows little to no signs of handling, the highest grade assigned by NGC and a tasteful cabinet tone which enhances the host: the coveted "Hookneck" 8 Reales, with the eagle's head quite visible to the left of the "960" and the radiant rays underlying the Brazilian shield.

33434 Pedro I 960 Reis 1825-R AU Details (Cleaned) NGC, KM368.1, LMB-506, Levy-Unl. Struck on a Minas Gerais countermarked 960 Reis. From a scarce date with a mintage of just 18,000 pieces, the present offering rises above in rarity. According to Levy, in his book "The 960 overstrikes"—the most complete study about 960 Reis and its hosts—the combination of an 1825-R overstrike on a Minas 960 Reis stamp is unheard of. To put into perspective, he lists 6-8 known for 1826-R specimens and a single 1824-R piece over Minas stamps. Dressed in an even gunmetal tone with lavender hues, this piece was likely cleaned decades ago and, despite the imperial 960 evenly-rendered, the elusive host is clearly discernible on both sides. A piece sure to entice advanced 960 Reis collectors.

The Minas Gerais 960 Reis stamp was struck for a few months in 1808, a way the Portuguese found to both regulate the Spanish 8 Reales that amply circulated in Brazil and make a profit on top of the intrinsic silver value. The Napoleonic invasions led Joao VI, then Prince Regent, to decide it was best to flee the country and re-stablish the Crown's reign from one of the colonies. In means of collecting funds to pay the expensive transfer of the Royal family from Portugal in that year, the 8 Reales—which circulated in Brazil with a value of 720 Reis—were overvalued to 960, leaving the 140 Reis on top of the silver value for the Crown. The undertaking was so successful that it was decided a new coin should be created: the beloved 960 Reis, struck primarily upon 8 Reales hosts.

33436 Republic gold 20000 Reis 1921 MS65 NGC, Rio de Janeiro mint, KM497, Fr-124. Mintage: 5,934. An irresistible Gem Mint State survivor of an already low mintage, currently unchallenged at this certified grade level. Extremely covetable in fine marigold toning and delicate luster.

- 33437 Ferdinand I gold 20 Leva 1894-KB AU58 NGC, Kremnitz mint, KM20. Bordering on Mint State preservation, which is common for the type. Retains original luster with only traces of minimal handling.
- 33438 Ferdinand I gold Proof Restrike 20 Leva 1912-Dated (1967-1968) PR68 Deep Cameo PCGS, Sofia mint, KM33, cf. Fr-3 (original issue). National Bank issue. A smaller denomination in this series of restrikes, brilliantly struck and blessed with an orpiment tone that flashes from the mirrored surfaces. Affordable at this grade, as the PCGS census drops precipitously after PR68.
- 33439 Ferdinand I gold Proof Restrike 100 Leva 1912-Dated (1967-1968) PR69 Cameo PCGS, Sofia mint, KM34, cf. Fr-5 (original Proof). Mintage: 1,000. National Bank Issue. Bearing the highest grade across certification companies, the finest quality for this popular restrike one could hope to acquire. Pristine mirrors beam from the flan, subsiding only to allow the impressive frosted motifs to showcase their meticulous rendering. A piece just short of technical perfection, predestined for capable hands.
- 33440 Ferdinand I gold Proof Restrike 100 Leva 1912-Dated (1967-1968) PR68 Cameo PCGS, Sofia mint, KM34, cf. Fr-5 (original Proof). Mintage: 1,000. National Bank Issue. A superior representative of this ever-popular restrike issue, captivating the eye with strobing expanses that stop abruptly for the sharp, frosted motifs. Approaching the terminal grade on the PCGS census, and affordable thus.

This specimen's toning palette has left a semi-frosty feel to the devices, a feature which couples with an already watery finish to produce a Prooflike appearance. An instantly recognizable type that becomes increasingly scarce in Proof finishes and even more so with this Deep Cameo designation. The champagne flan is outfitted with hard mirrors that throw the frosted Art Deco devices into sharp relief, accentuating the outstanding precision of their form. With only ten representatives across all dates and designations ranking higher across PCGS and NGC, we expect this lot to command eager bidding activity.
- 33633 Republic 10-Piece Certified Essai 100 Francs Set 1929 NGC, An elusive complete set of the 1929 Patterns solicited by the Paris mint for the new 100 Franc coin. Presenting mostly Gem grades and counting with the Bazor Essai: the accepted Pattern which would later become one of the most coveted 20th century French types. (Total: 10 coins)
- 33634 Republic gold Piefort 10 Francs 1974 PR68 Ultra Cameo NGC, Paris mint, KM-P508. Mintage: 172. Mirror-like fields accentuate the sharp devices.

## **GERMAN EAST AFRICA**

- 33635 German Colony. Wilhelm II gold 15 Rupien 1916-T MS64 PCGS, Tabora mint, KM16.1, J-728a. Arabesque below the T in "OSTAFRIKA" variety. Among the most instantly recognizable issues of African origin and one of the more visually compelling, notable for its employment of the elephant. At the very cusp of a Gem Mint State designation and as such is worthy of premium bids.
- 33636 German Colony. Wilhelm II gold 15 Rupien 1916-T MS63 PCGS, Tabora mint, KM16.1, J-728a. Arabesque below the T in "OSTAFRIKA" variety. A visually gratifying selection from the German Colonial series and one that always spurs intense interest. Decidedly Choice Mint State with characteristic textured granularity throughout, we anticipate elevated bidding for these high-end survivors.

**33637 German Colony. Wilhelm II Mark 1894-A MS66 PCGS,** Paris mint, KM5, J-705. A covetable example displaying pristine surfaces shimmering in radiant champagne luster.

A scarce emission issued from a numismatically speaking relatively short-lived principality, and a type that was purportedly missing from both the Brand and Köhlmoos collections. Appreciably patinated in pewter gray with few dark spots, the reverse blessed with underlying brilliance.

#### **AUGSBURG**

33639 Augsburg. Udalschalk von Eschenlohe (1184-1202) silver Brakteat (1184-1202) MS66 NGC, Berger-2632. 24mm. Mitred head of the bishop facing in a ring of crescents, stars and lis. Laudably boldly struck and fully-defined, on an elephant gray flan.

## **BAVARIA**

- **33640** Bavaria. Maximilian II Emanuel gold Maximilian d'Or 1716 AU55 NGC, Munich mint, KM388, Fr-226. Evenly worn across the raised designs, with a slight green tinge to color and remnants of luster nestling in the legends.
- 33641 Bavaria. Maximilian II Emanuel gold Maximilian d'Or 1719 AU58 NGC, Munich mint, KM388, Fr-226. With slight friction across the highpoints in accordance with the technical grade designation and quietely shimmering surfaces, this is a handsome representative of the trade coinage issue.
- 33642 Bavaria. Ludwig II gold 20 Mark 1872-D MS65 NGC, Munich mint, KM894. Sharply defined devices are backlit by glassy fields of marigold mint luster on this stunning exemplary specimen. Tied for second-finest certified by NGC, and no finer examples seen at PCGS.
- 33643 Bavaria. "Midwifery Skills 2nd Prize" gold Proof Medal 1848-Dated PR63 Ultra Cameo NGC, Brettauer-4958 var. (27mm). 10.34gm. Struck to a 3 Ducat weight. Awarded as a 2nd prize in the art of midwifery.
- 33644 Bavaria. "Midwifery Skills 3rd Prize" gold Proof Medal 1855-Dated PR63 Ultra Cameo NGC, Brettauer-4958. 25mm. 6.84gm. Struck to a 2 Ducat weight. Awarded as a 3rd prize in the art of midwifery.

## **HAMBURG**

33646 Hamburg. Free City silver Medal ND (1728) MS63 NGC, Gaed-1793. 40mm. By Wahl. An immensely popular and rare medallic "1/2 Portugaloser" seemingly more frequently encountered in gold with this being the only certified silver example certified at NGC. Boasting two wonderful compositions engraved with a skillful hand and imbued with a light reflectivity that elevates the overall aesthetic quality.

## HARZ

33647 Harz. "Baptismal" Taler 1741-IBH MS61 PCGS, Zellerfeld mint, Dav-2935, Katsouros-18. By Mintmaster Johann-Benjamin Hecht (1739-1762). Depicting John baptizing Jesus in the Jordan River. Intricately styled on a broad flan exhibiting rich iridescent toning.

## **LORRAINE**

33648 Lorraine. Karl III Teston 1628/7 AU Details (Cleaned) NGC, KM45. Displaying a handsome portrait of Karl III sensitively imbued upon this lightly cleaned pewter-tinted planchet. Despite the qualifier, the piece remains a desirable piece of French numismatic history.

The champagne-gold surfaces are gloriously satiny and virtually flawless. A breathtaking jewel of a coin, and we anticipate a fierce bidding contest over this sublime, genuinely tempting piece.
- 33650 Nürnberg. Free City gold Restrike 2 Ducat MDCC (1700)-GFN MS61 NGC, KM259, Fr-1882. Later restrike issue. 6.90gm. A praiseworthy near-Prooflike piece bathed in glossy resplendence, with the technical grade capped from attaining loftier heights by occasional wisps and handling marks throughout, the crevices somewhat silty and the flan enlivened by the often seen slightly wavy appearance.
- 33651 Nürnberg. Free City gold 3 Ducat ND (1703)-GFN MS61 NGC, KM262, Fr-1880. 10.42gm. Struck on a wavy flan as is often the case for this type, this ever-popular issue features the iconic Lamb of God representing Nürnberg. The surfaces are profusely gleaming underneath the fully-defined raised depictions, complimented by the innate waviness of the sun-yellow planchet.

## **PRUSSIA**

- 33652 Prussia. Friedrich Wilhelm IV gold Frederick d'Or 1841-A MS63 NGC, KM442, Fr-2432. An eye-catching Choice Mint State piece awash in swirling mint luster, admitting only few instances of contact across the luminous, lemon-yellow planchet.
- 33653 Prussia. Wilhelm I gold Proof Coronation Medal of 12 Ducats Weight 1861 MS60 NGC, Marienburg-2588 var. (in gold). 42mm. 41.30gm. By C. Pfeuffer. A massive, gold coronation medal featuring the conjoined busts of the Wilhelm I and Queen Augusta with various coats of arms around the royal sword, scepter, and orb. As one would expect on a medal of this size, minor handling is noted in the form of faint wisps; however, the deeply-engraved and sculptured designs remain awe-inspiring, and on the reverse the Cameo-like contrast is particularly stunning.
- 33654 Prussia. Wilhelm I gold Specimen "Kaiser's Speech" Medal 1870 SP65 PCGS, Marienburg-Unl. 2.94gm. Quoting Emperor Wilhelm I's opening speech at the North German Parliament in Mainz, on August 2, 1870. "AN DIE ARMEE (to the army) / MAINZ D. 2 AUGUST 1870, his bust facing right. Mounting loop on top. Fine patination on this admirably preserved little Gem.
- 33655 Prussia. Wilhelm I gold Specimen "Golden Wedding" Medal of 10 Ducats 1879 SP62 PCGS, Marienburg-Unl. 42mm. 34.41gm. By E. Weigand. Struck as a gift from the Victoria Masonic Lodge to brother J. Grabowski and his wife, P. Moores, in memory of the golden wedding of Emperor Wilhelm I and Augusta. A glassy gift fit with razor-sharp high relief motifs, sitting on the cusp of choice preservation and bound to its designation by only a light scattering of minor wisps. Seemingly quite elusive, and apparently missing from the Marienburg collection.

- 33657 Prussia. Wilhelm II Proof 5 Mark 1888-A PR63 PCGS, Berlin mint, KM512, J-101. An aesthetically stunning specimen, meticulously rendered and now toned in a flurry of electric magenta, cobalt, and emerald on the obverse while the reverse mostly preserves its argent face, allowing the mirrored surface to enjoy its day in the sun.

- 33658 Prussia. Wilhelm II Proof 5 Mark 1894-A PR67 Ultra Cameo NGC, cf. KM523, cf. AKS-129, cf. J-104 (date unlisted in Proof). An unexpected and wholly spectacular Proof encrusted with sharp wire rims, practically jet-black fields sharply contrasting the thick layers of icy white frost glistening on the raised designs. A quick research revealed no comparable pieces of this date in Ultra Cameo, and we anticipate this jewel becoming a target of ferocious bidding before it ends up ensconced in an elite tier collection for many years to come.
- 33659 Prussia. Wilhelm II Proof 5 Marks 1907-A PR66 Cameo NGC KM523, J-104. Flashy mirrored surfaces, with blue iridescence along the peripheries, give this coin a great look. A type rarely encountered, this is actually our first time handling one.
- 33660 Prussia. Wilhelm II Proof 5 Mark 1913-A PR67 Ultra Cameo NGC, Berlin mint, KM536, J-114. An always popular type, especially when located at the absolute peak of the conditional census, with none certifying finer.
- 33661 Prussia. Wilhelm II gold 20 Mark 1898-A MS65 NGC, Berlin mint, KM521, J-252. Exceptional Gem quality that places the piece at the top of the NGC census. Mirror-like fields encase a bold strike, exemplified by no discernable weakness to the imperial eagle, which is rarely seen.
- 33662 Prussia. Prince Heinrich gold Matte Specimen "Frankfurt Golden Jubilee Shooting Festival" Medal 1912 SP65 PCGS, Peltzer-1151. 22.13gm. By K. Korschann and L. Lauer. Edge Stamp: GOLD 585. Neat, frosted fields host Gem-preserved devices designed to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the annual marksmanship festival in Frankfurt.

## REGENSBURG

- 33663 Regensburg. Free City "City View" 1/2 Taler ND (1745-1765) B-ILOE MS62 PCGS, KM266, Beckenbauer-6251. Small bust type. With the portrait, name, and titles of Franz I. A indisputably stunning fractional issue, rendered with masterful exactitude and preserved as such. Teal and lemon hues have crept into the fields, enlivening the city view as if it were painted by number. Occupying the apex of the certified population with one other example at NGC.
- 33664 Regensburg. Free City "City View" Taler 1775 MS62 PCGS, KM428, Dav-2626. With portrait, name, and title of Joseph II. From the upper ranks of the certified population, a stunning piece arguably deserving of a choice designation, stifled by scattered wisps. A pervading cabinet tone lets up at the peripheries, allowing champagne and lemon hues to shine forth. The meticulously rendered devices are beneficiaries of this bold coloration, their clarity owed to centuries of preservation in an advanced cabinet.

## **SAXONY**

33665 Saxony. Friedrich August III gold Ducat 1796-IEC AU58 NGC, Dresden mint, KM1030, Fr-2873. Crisply rendered devices and an appreciable contrast on the reverse between the pronounced motifs and the scintillating canvas.

## **SCHAUMBURG-PINNEBERG**

33666 Schaumburg-Pinneberg. Ernst III Taler ND (1607) AU58 PCGS, Altona mint, KM30, Dav-LS474, Wilmersdörffer-Unl., Popken Collection-Unl., Vogel Collection-1586, Weinmeister-150, Lange-831c. Henning Hanses as mintmaster. A piece of remarkable quality for this already challenging issue. Essentially absent from auction records of the last several decades, the only other specimen that we are aware of was sold as part of the Vogel Collection in 1927. Showing evidence of a minor die shift over both sides, which in no way hinders a full appreciation of the struck detail, this specimen unsurprisingly is the only of its type yet certified. Its true condition appears very much on the cusp of Mint State, bolstered by a salt-gray patina over mild cabinet iridescence. As is stated in the description for the corresponding 2 Taler of the same type in this sale, the paucity of auction appearances of large-size emissions from Schaumburg-Pinneberg points to an immense rarity for such coins. It follows, then, that this present offering will likely garner the attention that it deserves, as collectors may not be afforded a second chance to add a piece like this to their collection for years to come.

- 33668 Ulm. Friedrich II (1215-1250) silver Brakteat ND (c. 1235) MS66 NGC, Berger-2602. 0.45gm. Crowned bust of a left-winged angel-emperor with his hand extended in blessing. A Gem with wonderful patination; comes with a dealer ticket.

# **GERMANY**

33669 Weimar Republic gold Specimen "Paul von Hindenburg" Medal 1932 SP65 PCGS, Kienast-475. 79.66gm. 60mm. By Karl Goetz. A substantial gold Medal boasting the sensitively rendered portrait of von Hindenburg which we usually encounter on much small emissions, and generally in silver. Struck in commemoration of Hindenburg's first presidential term of the Weimar Republic and elevated in velveteen resplendence. A prize for the collector of German Medals with only a scant few appearances at auction in the last two decades.

We have been unable to locate any moneyers remotely close to the "HERR/ILMON" to the reverse, combing the BNS and Fitzwilliam Museum archives. As such, we anticipate fervent interest.
- 33671 William I, the Conqueror (1066-1087) Penny ND (1066-1087) MS63 NGC, Winchester mint, Leowold as moneyer, PAXS type (BMC VIII), S-1257, N-848. 1.38gm. An attractive specimen, full flan and richly patinated in stormy lilac tone.
- 33672 William I, the Conqueror (1066-1087) Penny ND (1080-1083) AU58 NGC, London mint, Eadwig as moneyer, S-1256, N-847 (R). 1.19gm. Profile right type. An impressive survivor to say the least, well balanced and defined, the argent highpoints stubbornly gripped by original bloom. The finest certified and from a distinguished pedigree, we expect no lack of excitement toward this offering across the block.

A heavenly Gem, presently among the absolute finest-graded and bested by only one example in the PCGS census. Splendidly sharp practically throughout, slightly irregular in shape and blessed by an even, bountiful and aureous shimmer.
- 33674 Edward III (1327-1377) gold 1/4 Noble ND (1361-1369) MS62 NGC, Calais mint, S-1514, N-1246. Voided quatrefoil in center of reverse, with cross over shield. A sparkling little treasure, struck slightly off-center and therefore partially cutting off the legends, otherwise beautifully produced and decidedly lustrous.
- 33675 Edward III (1327-1377) gold Noble ND (1361-1369) UNC Details (Saltwater Damage) PCGS, London mint, Fr-95, S-1503. 7.65gm. (annulet) ED | WARD: DEI: GRA: REX: AnGL: DnS: hyB' x Z (retrograde) x AQ | T' (double saltire stops), Edward crowned, standing facing in ship, sword in right hand, shield in left / + IhC: AVTEm: TRAnSIEnS: PER: mEDIV: ILLORVm: IBAT (double saltire stops), large floriate cross with E at center (on side), crowned lions in angles, all within polylobe with trefoils in spandrels. An affordable example for this Treaty Period Noble type that witnesses a significant hike in demand in Mint State condition. Somewhat soft in the center of the King's body and similarly on the reverse, the rose and details of the ship quite magnificently produced on the fine round flan of good quality; an impressive Gem representative currently unmatched in NGC census.
- 33678 Edward IV (1st Reign, 1461-1470) gold Ryal ND (1464-1470) AU Details (Reverse Scratched) NGC, Tower mint, Crown mm, Light Coinage, S-1950, N-1549. 7.68gm. €D | WΛRD' DI: GRΛ' R€X ΛnGL' Z (retrograde) FRΛnC' | DnS I B' (trefoil and double trefoil stops), crowned, armored figure of Edward standing facing in ship with large rose on hull, sword in right hand, shield in left / (crown) IhC' ΛVT' TRΛnSI€nS P€R m€DIVm: ILLORVm IBΛT' (trefoil and double trefoil stops), Rose in radiant sun over floriate cross, crowns and lions in angles, all within polylobe with large trefoils in spandrels. Despite the noted qualifier, the piece at hand retains ample originality and wonderful mellowed golden patina.
- 33679 Henry VII (1485-1509) gold Angel ND (1504-1505) AU58 NGC, Tower mint, Cross-Crosslet mm, S-2183, N-1697, Schneider-Unl. 5.09gm. (cross-crosslet) hEnRIC': DI': GRA': REX: AGL': Z: FRA' | : (double saltire stops), crowned, nimbate figure of St. Michael the Archangel with both feet on the dragon (Satan), spearing with cross-tipped staff / (cross-crosslet) PER: CRVCE': TVA': SALVA: nOS: XPE': REDE' (double saltire stops), Tudor shield over ship, h-(rose) above. A stunning entrant to Henry VII's coveted Angel coinage, witnessed here as a borderline Mint State survivor. While striking weakness is evident throughout, consistent for the type, the eponymous angel motif remains crisp and fully rendered.

A fine example of the last series of coinage of Elizabeth I.

- 33686 Charles I silver Pound (20 Shillings) 1642 VF Details (Damaged, Tooled) NGC, Shrewsbury mint, S-2917, N-2396. 50mm. 119.37gm. Plume without band mm. Armored King on horseback left with upright sword, walking over arms and armor, plume behind King, beaded circles and legend surrounding, :CAROLVS: D: G: MAG: BRIT: FRA: ET: HIBER: REX:. On the reverse two line Latin motto at center, RELIG: PROT: LEG / ANG: LIBER: PAR, three plumes over value of XX above, date below, beaded circles and legend surrounding, legend commences at left, initial mark five pellets, EXVRGAT: DEVS: DISSIPENTVR: INIMICI. The largest English silver coin ever produced, and a direct link to the British civil war of the 1640s. Due to their post-war curiosity value, many Pounds saw cleaning or tooling to keep them brilliant, as is the case here with conditional modifiers affecting the surfaces, still with plenty details remaining of the instantly recognizable motifs, and very rare thus.
- 33687 Charles I gold Crown ND (1629-1630) AU53 NGC, Tower mint (under Charles I), Heart mintmark, KM136, S-2712. 2.26gm. CAROLVS [MA BR] | FR' ET HI' REX, crowned, ruffled bust of Charles left, denomination (V) behind / CVLTORES SVI DEVS PROTEGIT (heart), crowned royal shield. A champagne gold, quite well-centered piece with nearly fully legible legends, admitting the typical weakness in the portrait.
- 33688 Charles I silver "Death and Memorial" Medal ND (1649) MS62 NGC, Eimer-162b, MI-I-347/201. 34mm. Dies by J. Roettiers. These Medals were struck under the order of Charles II as a memorial to his father, who was beheaded in 1649 for treason, and are more commonly found in the bronze format. The obverse features the draped and armored bust of Charles I facing right. EX•ME•FORTVNAM•EX•ALIJS•VIRTVE (translates from Latin to "Learn virtue from me, good fortune from others."); the Hand of God extending a crown above an English landscape. Darkly patinated with underlying brilliance.
- 33689 Commonwealth Crown 1653 VF35 NGC, KM392, S-3214. 29.13gm. A well-struck example with only even wear and blue toning throughout. An attractive specimen, despite the relatively modest grade.
- 33690 Oliver Cromwell Shilling 1658 MS64 NGC, KM-A207, S-3228, ESC-1005. A truly remarkable specimen with glassy surfaces that crackle with khaki and jade. Thomas Simon's delicately carved engraving is preserved beautifully in this Choice example.
- 33691 Oliver Cromwell Shilling 1658 MS63 NGC, S-3228, ESC-1005. An enthralling specimen with alluring, glassy surfaces in lilac and teal yielding to the meticulously textured bust of Cromwell. Labeled as "Pattern" but unlisted as such, nevertheless scarce and decidedly covetable in this state of preservation.
- 33692 Oliver Cromwell Crown 1658/7 MS61 NGC, KM393.2, S-3226, ESC-240 (prev. ESC-10). Dies by Thomas Simon. An immense beast of a Crown in covetable Mint State without conditional modifiers. The infamous obverse die crack is already well formed and traversing nearly all the way across, indicating this coin originates from the later life-stage of the die. Regardless, this piece greets the viewer with resplendent patination and an enviable quantity of struck detail, all complimented by a beguiling and cautious underglow when viewed at an angle.
- 33693 James II Crown 1687 MS62 NGC, KM463, S-3407, ESC-743. TERTIO edge. A highly collectible example of this brief period of mintage before the Glorious Revolution that would overthrow the monarch in 1688. The soft pewter patination is backlit with champagne luster and boasts a great deal of remnant detailing, despite the shallower engraving common for the type.

- 33694 William & Mary Crown 1691 AU58 PCGS, KM478, S-3433, ESC-820. TERTIO edge. A type for which high-grade examples are few and far between, this specimen represents one of the great rarities of the British Crown series. Tucked away by a discerning collector, the selection developed a most pleasing coral, teal, and chartreuse tone that saturates the expanses, a polychromatic display that elevates a resolute strike and considerable bloom. With only five examples ranking higher across the major certification companies, we have no doubt this beauty will draw fierce competition on the auction floor.

  left. A type decidedly seldom available to marketplace. A commendable selection with appreciable luminosity to the underlying

- 33696 William III gold Guinea 1695 AU Details (Cleaned) NGC, KM488.1, S-3458. Here, the famed William of Orange is awash in shades of peach-gold while the evenness of the strike on the reverse shield reveals the skill housed within the Royal Mint. Faint evidence of a prior cleaning via light hairlines, but the appearance remains more lustrous than muted. Minimal faults in the planchet do nothing to limit the eye appeal of this scarce and desirable type.
- 33697 Anne copper Pattern 1/2 Penny ND (1702) PR63 Brown PCGS, Peck-730. A thoroughly stunning rendition and among Anne's most beautiful 1/2 Penny Patterns, showcasing a sensitively rendered portrait of the Queen and thistle reverse, imbued with glossy, reflective appearances and deep reflectivity.
- **33698** Anne "Vigo" Shilling 1703 MS61 NGC, KM517.1, S-3586. A captivating example of this iconic and collectible series, showcasing what, at first, seems to be a stone gray patina, but quickly crackles with terracotta toning when tilted in hand.
- 33699 Anne Shilling 1707 MS64+ PCGS, KM523.1, S-3610. Third bust. A spectacular Anne shilling, in nearly unheard-of condition. Indeed, the PCGS census seems to confirm this, with just 3 graded MS64 (and this presumably the only with a plus designation, making it the finest graded example). Wholly original surfaces with deep toning throughout makes this coin a delight in hand.
- **33700** Anne Shilling 1708 MS65 NGC, KM517.7, S-3610. A Gem of this recognizable type displaying a moody patina that transforms into fields of amber and honey when tilted in the light.

A perennially popular type, struck with silver captured from the defeated Spanish fleet at the Battle of Vigo Bay. - 33702 George I Shilling 1720 MS66 NGC, KM539.2, S-3646. Fully original, with deep toning throughout, overlaid on lustrous surfaces. As the single finest graded example between NGC and PCGS, there is sure to be competition from condition-conscious collectors for this gem piece.
- 33703 George I 1/2 Crown 1720/17 MS61 NGC, KM540.1, S-3642. Evenly toned and original, the overdate on the reverse is clearly legible. A scarce type, a mere 16 examples have been graded between NGC and PCGS, with just 4 pieces finer than the present specimen.

- 33704 George I Crown 1716 AU Details (Reverse Spot Removed) NGC, KM545.1, S-3639, ESC-1540. Plumes & Roses type. SECVNDO edge. Exhibiting minimal points of wear, with high points of steel amplified by a deeper gunmetal patina in the recesses
- 33705 George I gold 1/4 Guinea 1718 MS65 NGC, KM555, S-3638. Scarce one year type and first of the only two dates of this denomination ever minted (the other under George III dated 1762). The nearly fully satiny fields are mercifully free from haymarks, leading to an exceptionally pleasing eye-appeal. Currently only a single example grades higher, turning this into a rare opportunity for an avid Guinea-collector.
- 33706 George I silver "Entry into London" Medal 1714 MS63 NGC, Eimer-467. 47mm. By J. Croker. GEORGIVS D G MAG BRI FRA ET HIB REX F D His laureate and draped bust right, signed I.C. below / LAETITIA PVBLICA The King, in carriage before the Royal Exchange, presented with the City keys by Londinia, in exergue ADVENTVS REGIS / IN VRBEM / 20 SEPT / 1724. Battleship gray patination with some underlying iridescence, accompanied by two tray tags.
- 33707 Westminster Fire Office gold Proof Medal "1717" (1817) PR63
  Deep Cameo PCGS, MI-437/38 (Plate CXLII, No. 8). Minted in gold only for the directors and auditors of the Westminster Fire Office, an apparent two-year appointment as all other extant examples we have located bear a similar term. This piece was awarded to Henry Robins, Esquire, whose term as director lasted through 1816 and 1817. Deep mirrors and expertly executed devices make for an acute Cameo effect, a mechanic supremacy rivaled in appeal by the calligraphic inscription, which adds an intimate quality to this otherwise boisterous offering.
- 33708 George II copper Proof Pattern Restrike 1/2 Penny 1797 PR65
  Brown NGC, Soho mint, Peck-1172. An impressive Gem whose glossy appearances clearly set this piece apart from its contemporaries, showcasing needle-point, meticulous designs and largely untouched surfaces.
- 33709 George II Crown 1734 AU58 NGC, KM575.1, S-3686, ESC-1663. Roses & Plumes reverse. A wholly respectable example with remarkably well preserved raised features that admit gentle dispersion of friction from circulation, supported by appreciably patinated fields. A type rarely seen in higher tiers of preservation, the offering at hand presents an inviting opportunity.
- **33710 George II Crown 1743 XF45 NGC,** KM585.1, S-3688. Evenly worn, with grey-blue toning throughout, this example has good character and presents much better than most would that are graded similarly.
- 33711 George II "Lima" Crown 1746 MS63+ NGC, KM585.3, S-3689.

  Among the most coveted types from the reign of George II and one of instantly recognizable origin due to the not so subtle placement of "Lima" below George's coiffed bust. Embellished by a pervasive slate patina, the piece at hand will surely draw the viewer in for additional consideration.

A scarce type, with just 15 pieces graded between NGC and PCGS, with this being the sole second-highest graded, with the finest being a single point higher. Highly lustrous, the coin presents very well in hand. From our research, it seems that this is the first time an example in such fine condition has come to market in a number of years.
- **33714** George II gold Guinea 1740 AU55 NGC, KM577.1, S-3676. Intermediate laureate head. Lightly handled with some wisps and even wear over the high-points on this goldenrod piece dotted with hearty amber toning around the legends.
- **33715 George II gold Guinea 1740 AU53 NGC,** KM577.1, S-3676. A charming example absent of the central weaknesses common for the type. Minimally handled with surfaces illuminated by radiant goldenrod light.
- **33716 George II gold Guinea 1759 AU50 NGC,** KM588, S-3680. A pleasing, busy "Rose Guinea" with more luster than usual for the assigned grade. Admitting a scratch across the portrait, this specimen is blanketed in a brooding honeyed gold hue. *From the Mac and Rob Woodside Collection*
- 33717 George III Penny 1797-SOHO MS66 Brown NGC, Soho mint, KM618, S-3777. 11 leaves variety. The finest example in the NGC census, this mahogany Gem specimen emits a majesty from within its depth of color.
- 33718 George III "Northumberland" Shilling 1763 MS63 PCGS, KM597, S-3742. From a posited mintage of only 2,000 pieces, an elusive Choice specimen that has matured with gunmetal peripheries and glimmering cabinet patina in the expanses. Combined with a pervading silkiness, these traits communicate a pensive, nimbus-like aura that dramatizes impressively sharp motifs.
- 33719 George III "Small Bust" 1/2 Crown 1817 MS66 NGC, KM672, S-3789. Small bust type. Impeccably sharp designs with nearly pristine surfaces; the pearlescent patina of this stunning piece crackles with russet and sapphire toning.

- 33721 George III gold Guinea 1764 AU53 NGC, KM598, S-3725. Second issue. Peach-gold surfaces adorn this scarce two-year issue with no known Mint State survivors. Light rub to the portrait hardly detracts from this satisfying piece. From the Mac and Rob Woodside Collection
- **33722 George III gold Guinea 1775 MS62 PCGS,** KM604, S-3728. An attractive and problem-free example. A surprisingly scarce date; we have only offered four other 1775 Guineas (in any condition) in the past five years.
- 33723 George III gold Guinea 1776 MS61 NGC, KM604, Fr-355, S-3728. Fourth issue. Hints of bronze around the peripheries, accentuating the lush gold that fills the fields and devices. Some evidence of die rust and friction limit the grade, but this is a decidedly pleasing Mint State example. Popularly known as a "Rose Guinea" because of the shape of the shield on the reverse, this 1776 offering should draw attention from collectors of British and American Revolutionary material.
- **33724 George III gold Guinea 1776 AU53 NGC,** KM604, S-3728. A popular year for especially American collectors, this coin has light, even rub on the high points but is otherwise problem-free and attractive.

33725 George III Proof Bank of England 18 Pence (1 Shilling 6 Pence) Token 1811 PR67 PCGS, KM-Tn2, S-3771, ESC-970. An outstanding and highly impressive piece delighting the spectator with needle-point motifs across the fully-reflective flan. With an intricate cabinet tone infused by rainbow hues, this appealing piece stands as the sole finest recorded by PCGS and NGC combined.

- 33727 George III Proof Bank Dollar of 5 Shillings 1804 PR62 NGC, Soho mint, KM-Tn1, S-3768, ESC-1926. An especially soughtafter and collectible issue regardless of finish, but especially so when located in rare Proof striking. Though officially regarding as a token issue, these so-called Dollars circulated alongside regular coinage due to the shortage of silver coins during the period. The lavender tinted obverse fields admit few hairlines surrounding the bust, whereas the reverse is simply stunning owing to the old rose and ice-blue toned reflective backdrop to the spectacular Coat of Arms engraved by Jean Baptiste
- 33735 George IV Crown 1821 MS64 PCGS, KM680.1, S-3805. SECUNDO edge. Sublimely sharp, matte designs are accentuated by glassy fields of iridescent toning. Razor-sharp high points contribute to the unblemished appeal of this highly collectible specimen.

- 33736 George IV gold 1/2 Sovereign 1825 MS65 NGC, KM689, S-3803. Laureate bust. A true Gem Mint State example, with red toning along the periphery that serves to highlight the legends. Tied with two others (one at PCGS and one at NGC) for the finest graded example.

Indeed, looking at the population reports from both NGC and PCGS, there are a mere 3 pieces at the 66 level between the two services, with none finer, out of over 100 pieces graded. In addition, this is the first time Heritage has handled an example in such condition. Wholly original and lustrous, this is sure to be a very competitive lot from collectors who want the best available.
- 33744 William IV gold Proof 1/2 Sovereign 1831 PR64 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM716, S-3830, W&R-267 (R3), Marsh-409E. Plain edge. Estimated Mintage: 225. An immensely pleasing for such a small emission and one whose depth is seeming endless. Flashy and fully resplendent, awash in honeyed surfaces that elevate the exactly portrait and reverse arms of William. Accompanied by an old B. Max Mehl flip.
- 33745 William IV gold "First Bust" Sovereign 1832 MS61 NGC, KM717, S-3829, Marsh-17A (R3). A popular type and a cause for celebration particularly when encountered in the 'first bust' type, where the King's nose points directly at the 2nd 'N' in BRITANNIAR. A great opportunity for any advanced Sovereign collector..

- 33746 William IV gold Sovereign 1835 AU55 NGC, KM717, S-3829B. William IV Sovereigns often exhibit evidence of handling and this example is no exception. Admitting a rim ding on the reverse, this piece possesses only minimal wear and rub to the devices and fields.
- 33747 William IV gold Proof "Coronation" Medal 1831 PR61 Cameo NGC, BHM-1475, Eimer-1251. 33mm. 27.65gm. By William Wyon. Only 1203 examples of this medal were produced in gold, and of this low mintage 238 were subsequently melted, leaving just 965 surviving pieces. Enthralling Cameo effect on both facets with the sculptured portraits of the King and Queen rendered in exacting precision, and highly covetable as such.

- 33748 Victoria silver Moore pattern Penny 1860 PR62 NGC, Peck-2127 (ER). Britannia reverse without surrounding legend or inner beaded circle. Rated extremely rare by Peck. Razor-sharp raised motifs adorn the lavishly patinated fields that exhibit underlying iridescence; the reverse open expanses are slightly uneven, presumably as a result of rusted dies and carry ample die polish lines.
- 33749 Victoria Penny 1882 VF35 Brown NGC, KM755, S-3954, Freeman-112 (R17). No H in exergue, dies 11+N. Plain edge. A key rarity in the Victorian Bronze Penny series; exceedingly rarely encountered in any meaningful condition and the first we have had the pleasure to offer. Espresso brown patination permeates throughout the facets that exhibit honest, even wear from circulation and are all but free from visually detracting marks. - 33752 Victoria "Godless" Florin 1849 MS63 PCGS, KM745, S-3890. Deep russet toning, with a few scattered contact marks commensurate with the grade. A small carbon spot at the edge of the crown is noted for accuracy, though it doesn't distract the eye at all in hand.
- 33753 Victoria Proof Florin 1893 PR67 PCGS, KM781, S-3939. A fantastic example of this type, with turquoise and mauve iridescence throughout. A type that is oftentimes patinated in a way that dulls the Proof surfaces, here the metallic fields and glossy devices are brightened because of the charcoal traces along the peripheries. A decidedly first-class example at the assigned grade.
- 33756 Victoria Proof "Gothic" Crown 1847 PR55 NGC, KM744, S-3883, UN DECIMO on edge. Only lightly circulated, this piece presents very well with even gunmetal grey toning throughout and blue highlights around the periphery.
- 33757 Victoria Proof "Gothic" Crown 1847 Proof Details (Cleaned) NGC, KM744, S-3883, UN DECIMO on edge. At one point polished, this example still retains some of its original luster, and has since begun toning over the prior cleaning.

- 33758 Victoria silver Uniface Obverse Trial Pattern Crown ND (c. 1860) MS65 NGC, ESC-Unl., L&S-Unl. 33mm. 26.24gm. By L. C. Lauer of Nuremberg for Adolph Weyl. A highly enigmatic piece, cloaked in considerable intrigue. Unlisted in every major reference work, this has been attributed as a Crown by NGC; however, it is the incorrect weight for this denomination or indeed any other. Its size and thickness matches that of a copper Penny, and as Adolph Weyl made his attempts at presenting Patterns for both homeland and colonial use in 1860 (the date large copper pennies switched over to bronze) and again in 1887, this could accordingly be a silver Pattern for a Penny dating from 1860, rather than 1845 as listed on the holder. However, this same punch is noted on the gold Pattern Crown we offered in our January 2013 NYINC sale, and as it is known that Lauer's uniface Patterns rarely conformed to British weight standards, we must conclude that the intended denomination for this piece is uncertain. The mystery aside, the offering exhibits undeniable charm, toned a gentle dove-gray with a golden halo to the devices and light steel-blue patina in the fields; clearly a trial which was treated with reverence, remaining in gem-level grade with no wear nor hardship at all. Interestingly the reverse, although blank, has been given a beaded border. Presumed unique, we have no doubt that this piece will attract considerable interest from British numismatists for its eye appeal and the enigma it represents. Struck in 0.9774 silver.
- 33759 Victoria Mint Error Reverse Brockage gold 1/2 Sovereign 1876 AU58 NGC, cf. KM735.2 (for type). Of an increasingly popular and dramatic class of brockage errors that have seen greater sums in recent years when brought to auction. Here on offer is a borderline Mint State specimen from the 1/2 Sovereign series boasting two obverse designs with substantial residual luster despite signs of light handling.

- 33764 Victoria gold "Shield" Sovereign 1871 MS64 NGC, KM736.2, S-3853B. Die #29. Smooth luster pervades the fields on both the obverse and reverse of this precisely struck near-Gem piece. Displays the typical #29 die crack that runs from the base of Victoria's neck through the "1" in the date.
- 33765 Victoria gold Sovereign 1887 MS65 NGC, KM767. S-3866. Jubilee head. Normal J.E.B. variety. An absolute Gem, the unblemished velveteen fields caress the devices, and a shift of light seems to halo around the Queen's portrait.

- **33769** Victoria gold 5 Pounds 1887 MS60 NGC, KM769, S-3864. A bold Mint State representative, admitting wisps from handling throughout the open expanses, the reverse carrying beautiful mint luster.
- 33770 temp. Victoria gold "First Opium War Captured Bullion" Medal 1842-Dated UNC Details (Cleaned) NGC, BHM-2070 (R4). 16mm. From an extremely rare and historically important issue, this Medal is a true testimony from the Opium War. For centuries, European trade with China was essentially a one-way acquisition of goods by the former—such as porcelain and spices—from Chinese merchants; an exchange-balance that completely changed when the British introduced and massively supplied Chinese markets with opium. The addictive substance led China to the verge of societal collapse, forcing the Qing to ban it and confiscate the stocks. British merchants revolted against such imposition and the two nations ended up in war. After the brutal defeat of the Qing armies—which had substantially outdated war gear-the period known as the "Century of Humiliation" began, set by the Treaty of Nanjing. The Chinese were forced to cede Hong Kong and pay an indemnity of 21 million Dollars. Such an enormous amount of Sycee ingots was paid to the British that, when processed at the Royal mint, enough gold was extracted to permit the striking of these fleeting medals.
- 33771 Victoria gold Proof Pattern Medal ND (c. 1887) PR63 Cameo NGC, 10.16gm. By L. C. Lauer for Adolph Weyl. Presumed unique, a Pattern in gold for an uncertain denomination; attributed by various sources at different times as being a Two Pounds, Florin, Halfcrown, or Penny. However, being uniface and unsigned, this will likely remain a question unanswered.

The blank reverse shows minute engraving of a number, presumably related to the clear trial status of this piece. Lauer's patterns often did not correspond to British weight standards, and this piece could simply be a portrait trial produced for the Queen's approval. The portrait of Victoria featured here is rather different to the adopted design in 1893, representing the Queen in three-quarters with her head slightly turned. It is the same depiction as featured on the 'Spink & Son' patterns of 1887. Designed for Victoria's jubilee and yet bearing a greater similarity to the 1893 portrait, this type can almost be said to be the 'missing link' between the two portraits. Thoroughly glossy fields draw in the eye, Victoria's portrait delicately frosted above, the production quality extremely high; beautiful in its design and execution, and of highest rarity.

# **GREECE**

33819 George I copper Proof Essai 10 Lepta 1869 PR62 Brown NGC, Paris mint, KM-E7, Divo-P88 (RR), Karamitsos-T.49. No mintmarks. The first opportunity we have had to offer this rare Essai. Dutifully struck, its surfaces bear hints of original red and soft violet tones that peer through the glossy, deep brown patina. A gentle peppering of marks confirms the grade.

## **GREENLAND**

33820 Ostgronland. A. Gibbs & Sons brass Daler Token 1863 MS64 NGC, KM-Tn14, Sieg-11. An elusive token in any state of preservation, let alone at near-Gem quality, used by the British company A. Gibbs & Sons to conduct trade with Danish settlements on the east coast of Greenland in 1863. Expansive fields are toned in pale gold and chartreuse hues, with some deeper patination accentuating the inscriptions.

#### **GUATEMALA**

- 33821 Ferdinand VII gold 8 Escudos 1817 NG-M AU58 NGC, Nueva Guatemala mint, KM71, Cal-1752, Onza-1209 (Rare). A fantastic example of a type that infrequently comes to auction in better form. An intriguing independence medal, struck in commemoration of the September 15, 1821 declaration of independence that broke Central America from Spain. Seldom-seen and desirable in silver, the example offered here endures in a highly appreciable and never-seen quality. Certainly among the finest of this vintage and deserving of advanced bids.

According to Rubio Sanchez and Stickney, local authorities in Guatemala authorized the striking of only 100 silver and five gold medals celebrating Guatemala's (Central America's) independence. Bancroft, in his History of Central America (vols. VII and VIII, pg. 44), reports that the five gold medals were supposedly awarded to give key members of the city council most responsible for issuing the declaration of independence.

## **HAITI**

33825 North Haiti. Henri Christophe silver Specimen Pattern 30 Sols 1808 SP64 PCGS, Birmingham mint, KM-Pn8. Quite Prooflike, yielding a hard flash at the turn of the wrist from the slate gray fields, adorned by the seated Lady Liberty.

Commercial agent of Henry Christopher Jean Gabriel Peltier contacted Matthew Boulton on January 25, 1808, to manufacture dies for three denominations, 30, 15 and 7.5 sols, equivalent to the English 1 shilling, sixpence and threepence. The dies, while differing from the original sketches furnished by Peltier which stipulated an obverse with a four-line inscription "ETAT-d'HAITY - PIECE DE - 30 SOLS" encircled in a laurel wreath, were skillfully made, as evidenced by the present specimen. They were manufactured at a cost of 105 guineas and delivered to Peltier by John Woodward (agent of Boulton, Watt & Co. in London) on August 3, 1808.

# **HONDURAS**

33826 Counterstamped 'Comayagua' Cob 8 Reales ND (1824) VF25 PCGS, KM-Unl. 26.08gm. Host: Bolivia Charles III 8 Reales 1760 V-Y, Potosi mint, KM45; Counterstamp: Comayagua Royal Crown (VF Details) on cross side. Only a small handful have appeared on the market and many of those with an additional contemporary counterfeit countermark. The Royal Crown countermark was mentioned in 1824 decrees stating that proper countermarks were ordered from Guatemala but did not arrive, so they had to use old Spanish colonial "royal fifth" punches instead. A rare opportunity to obtain a straight graded counterstamped Cob, possibly the finest extant.

33827 Republic copper-nickel Pattern 5 Reales 1870 PR64 NGC, Paris mint, KM-PN12. In the name of José María Medina Castejón, President of Honduras holding the office on three different occasions between the years 1864 and 1876, and was subsequently arrested for treason and executed in 1878. Quite a captivating Pattern, with a tinge of steel-blue hue adorning the luminous fields and an ample layer of frost on the raised motifs.

Wonderfully expressive designs and highly pleasing appearance.
- 33831 Ludwig II silver "Death of the King in the Battle of Mohacs"
  Medal 1526-DATED AU55 NGC, Doneb-984, Horsky-727.
  44mm. By Christoph Fuessl. A cast silver medal commemorating the death of Ludwig II at the Battle of Mohács against the Turks in 1526. The obverse features the capped busts of the King (1506-1526) and of his wife, Mary of Austria (1505-1558), the Hapsburg granddaughter of Holy Roman Emperor Maximilian I.
- 33832 Leopold I Taler 1660-KB MS63 NGC, Kremnitz mint, KM148, Dav-3524. A scarcer Taler-type featuring a youthful portrait of the Austrian emperor, characteristic sharpness preserved in the design elements, largely dove-gray patinated with cautious underlying shimmer. Presently the finest graded in the NGC population and conditionally rare thus.
- 33833 Leopold I gold 5 Ducat 1703/2-NB AU Details (Plugged) PCGS, Nagybanya mint, KM-A257, Fr-137. Produced on a fascinatingly large-surfaced and wafer-thin planchet by using half taler dies. Somewhat wavy in appearance, the imperial eagle intricately rendered and mighty impressive on this gently shimmering honey-gold piece.
- 33834 Horthy Miklos Regency gold Proof Piefort Restrike 100 Pengo 1938 BP-UP PR66 Ultra Cameo NGC, cf. KM-XPn41 (Piefort Unlisted), Fr-595. Patterned edge. A simply tempting Restrike originally commemorating the 900th anniversary of the death of St. Stephen, first King of Hungary, later reproduced by a US numismatic firm in Ohio. The only representative on NGC's census of this Piefort variety, the first of its kind we have encountered as well. Deep mirrors flit around the exactingly rendered devices, a splendor of the faces equaled by the delicate pattern adorning the flan's edge. Of the upmost quality, expected to command bidding activity commensurate with that caliber.

- 33836 Sultans of Delhi. Muhammad bin Tughluq gold Tanka AH 727 (1327) MS63 NGC, Qutbabad mint, Fr-448. 11.00gm. Struck with a covetable depth and displaying an abundance of inspiring die polish and rose-gold accents that surely propel the visual caliber to an elite tier.
- 33837 Sultans of Delhi. Firuz Shah Tughluq gold Tanka ND (AH 752-790 / AD 1351-1388) MS62 NGC, Hadrat Delhi mint, Fr-482, G&G-D463. In the name of Caliph Abu'l Fath al-Mu'tasid. An exceedingly alluring Tanka from this series that has seen a significant increase in demand in recent years when located comparable, appreciable preservation. Characteristic flatness does little to hinder the overall resplendence seen here and will demand the interest of collectors.

33839 Sultans of Gujarat. Shams al-Din Muzaffar III (First reign, AH 968-980 / AD 1560-1573) gold Tanka AH 975 (1567/1568) MS63 NGC, cf. CIS-565 (date unlisted), cf Hull-1085 (same). 11.86gm. A promising representative of a seldom-seen type and the first of this ruler we've encountered in recent decades. Fully brilliant and dressed in aurous luster, enshrining the notably deep legends.

## **SULTANS OF MALWA**

33840 Sultans of Malwa. 'Ala al-din Mahmud Shah I (AH 839-873 / AD 1436-1469) gold Tanka ND MS63 NGC, Shadiabad mint, G&G-M21. 11.06gm. The second instance of this coveted type we've had the pleasure in handling, both instances just in this past year. Few issues of Malwa can claim to match the level of aesthetic quality seen here, distinguished by a firm strike that yields a nearly full expression of the legends throughout.

An amazing rarity among the series and the second we've handled in the last year, here certified Choice Mint State. While lacking the technical designation compared to our MS66 from may, the piece displays more attractive centering, allow the view to easily appreciate the full legends to both faces.

Nearly Prooflike in appearance via an exacting strike and prominent reflectivity, we note that the piece at hand is tied, for the finest submitted to grading.

33854 Patiala. Karam Singh gold Mohur ND (AH 1229-1261 / AD 1813-1845) MS64 NGC, KM-C35. 10.72gm. Among the finer of this small emission we've handled, showcasing blooming golden fields and sharp legends.

## SIKH EMPIRE

- 33855 Sikh Empire. Diwan Mulraj gold Rupee VS 1905 (1848) MS63 NGC, Multan mint, KM87, Fr-1395. Plain edge. An emergency emission, issued by the Mulraj during the siege of Multan to pay his troops. Mustard-yellow, with light handling marks from what must have been a tumultuous and troubled brief period.

Chiseled strike and perfectly preserved, presumably a hoard coin deposited not long after it was first minted, as are most known examples, this specimen emits a characteristically mirrored flash with no serious marks to speak of.

## ISLE OF MAN

- 33876 British Dependency Proof "Peel Castle" Penny Token 1811 PR64 Brown PCGS, KM-Tn6. A type that is highly appreciable in this Proof designation. The pondlike flan is saturated by an oceanic tone, mimicking the waves rendered on the obverse. Emerald and magenta flash in the silhouettes of the reverse inscription, further elevating the piece's appeal.
- 33877 Douglas. Douglas Bank silver Proof 5 Shillings Token 1811 MS63 PCGS, Birmingham mint, KM-Tn14, Prid-46. By T. Halliday. A seldom-seen rendition of this short-lived issuer well represented by a razor-sharp piece. Seldom available; the portrait evenly worn but with boldly rendered and fully readable legends and date, all laid on a slightly uneven, mustard patinated planchet.

- 33889 Milan. Maria Theresa gold Zecchino 1778 MS62 Prooflike NGC, Milan mint, KM194, Fr-735. Struck over a period of only three years ranging from 1778-1780 and rarely encountered in any meaningful condition, this scintillating representative projects an aura of careful preservation. Lavishly and carefully struck on a brilliant, fully Prooflike planchet, allowing the well-defined motifs to raise in admirable contrast. Currently unchallenged at this certified grade level.

S PETRVS | ATOR VRBIS, doge kneeling left before St. Peter (standing right), receiving banner with rose at base, SEn (upwards) to right / ROMA CAPT MVNDI S P Q R (vernicle) •, Christ in glory (surrounded by mandorla), book of Gospels in left hand, raising right in benediction, four stars to left, five to right. A neargem struck on a blooming flan, slightly doubled on the obverse with the reverse facing up sharper.
- 33891 Papal States. Nicholas V (1447-1455) Ducat ND MS62 NGC, Rome mint, Fr-6, Berman-326. + NICOLAVS | PP QVIUTVS •, Papal arms in quadrilobe / + S PETRVS | ALMA ROMA •, St. Peter standing holding a key and the gospels within a quadrilobe. Slightly soft in the legends and struck somewhat off-center, nevertheless exhibiting a fantastic shimmer to the flan and the portrait of St. Peter is particularly expressive.
- 33892 Sardinia. Vittorio Amedeo III 1/2 Scudo 1792 MS63 NGC, Turin mint, KM72. Glistening surfaces are complimented by closely cropped cabinet toning in certain areas of the recesses. The minimal distractions in the fields are counteracted by sharp devices.
- 33893 Sardinia. Vittorio Amedeo III 1/2 Scudo 1793 MS62 NGC, Turin mint, KM72. An icier obverse is complimented by the atmospheric toning of the rose and indigo dancing across the reverse.

Produced on an invitingly shimmering dove gray planchet, demonstrating adjustment marks on both facets. Currently at the top of the graded population at NGC.

A treasured Sicilian gold denomination of the late 13th century, produced with a level of quality and attention to detail so characteristic of the type.
- 33902 Sicily. Pietro de Aragon & Constanza de Hohenstaufen (1282-1285) gold Pierreale d'Oro ND (1282-1283) AU58 NGC, Messina mint, Fr-654, MEC XIV-756. 4.35gm. + P DEI GRA ARAGOn SICIL REX | + SUmmA POTEnCI'A EST In DEO (annulet stops), arms of Aragon / + COSTA DEI GRA AR'AG Z SICIL REG | + XPS VInCIT XPS REGnAT XPS IMPAT, uncrowned Hohenstaufen eagle. While precluded from the desirable Mint State assignment by gentle handling to the eagle's feathers, the piece retains ample brilliance among the protected recesses.
- 33903 Venice. Lodovico Manin Osella 1790-MB (Year II) MS65+NGC, KM-Unl., Paolucci-273. Mint master Matteo Badoer. 31mm. Commemorating the victories of the Venetian fleet against Mediterranean pirates. Somewhat reflective surfaces with light sepia toning, and currently the highest graded example in NGC census.
- 33904 Venice. Provisional Government 10 Lire 1797-AS MS62 NGC, Venice mint, KM776, Dav-1576. Rare type when encountered in Mint State. The die crack is already progressing at around 2 o'clock and the dies are somewhat worn. Overall, a full-bodied piece enlivened by crackling peripheral luster sweeping over the steel-blue legends.

- 33909 Vittorio Emanuele III gold "Fascist Anniversary" 100 Lire 1923-R MS61 Matte NGC, Rome mint, KM65, Fr-30. Struck to mark the first anniversary of Fascist rule in Italy, this Matte issue remains popular due to its unique finish and intricate rendering of a lictor's fasces. This specimen carries the usual remnants of light handling, which blends into the satiny surfaces rather harmoniously.

33910 Vittorio Emanuele III gold Matte Proof 100 Lire 1925-R PR63 NGC, Rome mint, KM66, Mont-17 (R2), Gig-8 (R), Pag-645. Mintage: 5,000. Struck in commemoration for the Silver Jubilee of Vittorio Emanuele III. An attainable offering of this iconic Italian type, struck in visually dramatic matte finish that leaves the surfaces entirely cloaked in velveteen frost, with only minute occasions of friction that spark up from the evocative designs.

## **JAMAICA**

33911 British Colony Counterstamped 10 Pence ND (1758) MS62 NGC, KM3, Prid-7. Host: Ferdinand VI Real 1758 LM-JM from Peru (cf. KM52); Counterstamp: GR in oval (UNC Standard). Stunning to say the least, to encounter this miniscule countermarked piece in such an advanced preservation across this wholly coveted "GR" series. Imbued with a myriad of attractive blue hues backlit by a champagne glow and ample reflectivity that will propel this piece into an elite collection.

- 33912 Meiji gold Yen Year 4 (1871) MS63 NGC, Osaka mint, KM-Y9. Low dot variety. A much scarcer Choice example bathed in honey gold with just a hint of weakness around the border.
- **33913 Meiji Yen Year 36 (1903) MS66 PCGS,** KM-YA25.3, JNDA-01-10A. Deeply toned, with orange and blue coloration being particularly prominent. Certainly well above average for most 66s we have handled of this type, which is not many to say the least. The first time we have offered an example of this date in such a grade in over 2 years.
- 33914 Meiji gold 2 Yen Year 3 (1870) MS65 PCGS, Osaka mint, KM-Y10, JNDA 01-4. A wonderfully flashy Gem elevated by meticulously rendered devices. A satiny butter tone adorns the reverse periphery, but the surfaces remain consistent otherwise.

- 33917 Meiji gold 10 Yen Year 4 (1871) MS62 NGC, Osaka mint, KM-Y12, JNDA 01-2. With border variety. A keenly sought after variety presented here in mustard yellow tone and appreciably bold strike, weaving a fleeting flash at the turn of the wrist.
- 33918 Meiji gold 10 Yen Year 4 (1871) MS62 NGC, Osaka mint, KM-Y12, JNDA 01-2. Variety with border. A highly respectable representation of this type featuring the iconic Meiji dragon motif. Refined aurous luster with *bona fide* Mint State quality to the strike. Some friction limits the assigned grade.
- 33919 Taisho gold 20 Yen Year 6 (1917) MS66 NGC, Osaka mint, KM-Y40.2, Fr-53, JNDA 01-6. Enchanting in its artistry and preservation, this essentially flawless example seems designed to show-off its satiny fields and cartwheel luster.

Among the rarest post-war issues of Japan and one that was apparently not released for circulation with only a few surviving to this day. Beautifully preserved with a subtle patina enlivened at the turn of the wrist as cascading luster traverses the largely pristine expanses.

33921 Showa gold Proof 100000 Yen Year 62 (1987) PR70 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM-Y92. Struck to commemorate Emperor Hirohito's 60 years of rule. An utterly perfect specimen that one could expect no more from.

## LIECHTENSTEIN

**33922 Johann II gold 20 Kronen 1898 MS64 NGC,** KM-Y6. Mintage: 1,500. An old gold patina lends this scarce, one-year type a sumptuous *object d'art* appeal. The pin-point definition in the intricately styled reverse design merits admiration.

# **MARTINIQUE**

33923 British Colony 3 Escalins ND (1797) VF30 PCGS, KM26, Prid-1. 6.15gm. An instantly recognizable and coveted Caribbean issue we haven't handled in more than 6 years, distinguished by the serrated cut edge on the Mexican 8 Reales. A fine specimen of the type and one that is sure to interest the quality-conscious collector of this unusual series.

## **MAURITIUS**

33924 British Colony. Elizabeth II gold Proof "Flycatcher" 1000 Rupees 1975 PR70 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM42. Mintage: 716. Deep, watery fields encase frosty devices, including a young portrait of Elizabeth II. One of only four flawless examples at either grading service. Collectors seeking to add numismatic quality to their precious metals portfolio should pay careful attention to this offering.

## **MEXICO**

- 33925 Charles & Johanna (1504-1555) "Early Series" 4 Reales ND (1541-1542) M-P AU55 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM0017, Cal123. Variety with plain circles above and below the mintmark and assayer's initial, and panel leaning left. Always a treat to encounter these "Early Series" issues with their unique appearances compared to what we generally see from the greater Mexican series. Especially well-preserved and tied for the finest submitted to NGC, boasting a reverse face that is essentially unimpacted by exchange.
- 33926 Charles & Johanna (1504-1555) "Late Series" 4 Reales ND (1542-1555) M-G MS63 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM0018, Cal-127. 13.56gm. A superb Choice Mint State rendition of this covetable and instantly recognizable "Late Series" type, bathed in a cabinet tone that permeates every inch of this small treasure. Crisp central devices yield to only minor, characteristic weakness in the legends yet does little to hinder the advanced eye appeal here. Tied with two others for the finest certified at NGC.
- 33927 Charles & Johanna (1504-1555) "Late Series" 4 Reales ND (1542-1555) M-G MS63 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM0018, Cal-127. 13.53gm. Expertly struck yet just slightly off-center, presenting sharp devices and an inviting patina with more than usual amounts of flash indicating an expert preservation.
- 33928 Charles & Johanna (1504-1555) "Late Series" 4 Reales ND (1542-1555) M-L MS62 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM0018, Cal-135. 13.49gm. A highly respectable representation of this pleasing type showcasing impressive centering and the majority of the legends struck on-flan. Bestowed a deep pewter patination likely the result of long-term storage in an advanced cabinet and is best appreciated when viewed in-hand. None ranked higher at NGC.
- 33929 Charles & Johanna (1504-1555) "Late Series" 4 Reales ND (1542-1555) M-L MS62 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM0018, Cal-135. 13.50gm. An admirable representation of the type with slate gray toning and tremendous eye appeal, sure to land in a quality-minded collection as one of the finest currently certified.

- 33930 Philip V "Milled" 8 Reales 1733 Mo-MF AU53 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM103, Cal-1439. Small crown variety. Among the rarest emissions from the Mexico City mint and only the second milled date of the type. A laudably full strike lends a complete and deep outline of the engraved devices and a clearly superior quality than earlier hammered and even "royal" types. Imbued with a wonder cabinet tone via pewter and lavender tones, the piece at hand will surely entice quality-conscious collectors of this highly coveted series.
- 33931 Philip V gold 8 Escudos 1741 Mo-MF AU58 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM148, Fr-8. Bordering on Mint State preservation, this opulent specimen is ablaze in a generous honey-gold that is nearly Prooflike and produces a finish that is flashier than the muted surfaces often seen on this type. Minimal rub on the obverse portrait hardly detracts from the overall appeal of this extraordinary piece.
- 33932 Philip V gold 8 Escudos 1746 Mo-MF AU55 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM148, Fr-8. Bright mint luster remains with shades of fiery red clay fanning out around the peripheries. Striking weakness remains to the center of the obverse and reverse, which is not uncommon in this type. A challenge to find in higher grades, with only one designated as Mint State at NGC.
- 33933 Ferdinand VI 8 Reales 1754 Mo-MM MS63 PCGS, KM104.2, Cal-487. Imperial crown on left pillar variety. An engaging blast-white choice specimen, exhibiting frost in the fields that contrasts with glistening highpoints. The imposing devices are free of any major impediments, allowing the design to be appreciated in full. The finest of the type we have offered to date and tied for the highest grade across certification companies.
- 33934 Ferdinand VI 8 Reales 1754 Mo-MM/MF MS63 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM104.1, Cal-486. Imperial crown left pillar variety. Although not designated on the holder, a portion of the "F" remains visible underneath the "M" on the lower right of the reverse, making this the more desirable MM/MF variety. A charming argent tone adorns the surfaces, with only a die crack on the obverse detracting from the otherwise splendid visual appeal.
- 33935 Ferdinand VI 8 Reales 1754 Mo-MM MS62 PCGS, Mexico City mint, KM104.2, Cal-487. Imperial crown on the left pillar variety. A handsome Mint State survivor with icy white appearance gracing the satiny fields with only barely noticeable handling and adjustment marks traceable throughout.
- 33936 Ferdinand VI 8 Reales 1754 Mo-MF MS62 NGC, KM104.1, Cal-482. Radiant dove-gray surfaces give way to abundant underlying luster in this lovely and increasingly popular large type. A scratch above the crown serves to limit the assigned grade, but this remains a marvelous example.

A breathtaking specimen, presently among the top 10% of graded populations across NGC and PCGS. - 33944 Charles III gold 8 Escudos 1762 Mo-MM AU Details (Cleaned) NGC, Mexico City mint, KM155, Cal-1981. First date of the famed "rat nose" variety. No known Mint State examples at NGC. Cleaning evidenced through muted luster and some hairlining, though the sharpness of the reverse strike and indications of retoning make this an attractive piece. More pleasing than many straight-graded examples.

33945 Charles III gold 8 Escudos 1772 Mo-FM AU58 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM156.1, Cal-1998. Upright mint mark. Rare in any condition approaching Mint State. Issued during the reign of Charles III at the height of Spanish empire, this example boasts honeyed surfaces and a sharper strike than what is usual for the type. Omitting evidence of scant handling, a case could be made for a Mint State designation.

- 33946 Charles IV 8 Reales 1805 Mo-TH MS63+ NGC, Mexico City mint, KM109, Cal-983. Among the more stunning representatives of a series with an abundance of Mint State survivors, yet here bestowed considerable flash and semi-Prooflike appearances. Nearly untoned and brilliant, showcasing decidedly crisp motifs, qualities generally unfound to comparable examples, making for an especially fine opportunity.
- 33947 Charles IV 8 Reales 1808 Mo-TH MS63+ NGC, Mexico City mint, KM109, Cal-988. An especially flashy offering from this well-represented series and date, and among the easiest dates to locate in decidedly Mint State designations, nearly plateauing at MS63 with only 6 in comparable or finer designations. As such, we expect ample collector interest when this nearly Prooflike offering crosses the auction block.
- 33948 Charles IV gold 4 Escudos 1806/5 Mo-TH AU50 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM144, Cal-1504. A surprisingly scarce fractional gold issue of Charles IV, and the last of which handled by our firm was the AU58 Rudman example offered in 2015. Ample residual flash decorates the reverse while ambered silhouettes are apparent throughout, making for a wonderful addition to any Mexican specialist's collection.

- 33952 Charles IV gold 8 Escudos 1807/6 Mo-TH MS60 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM159, Cal-1652, Onza-1043. This piece boasts a firm strike upon near-reflective surfaces glazed over by an even, peach tone. Some rub to the devices limits the assigned grade to the lower tiers of Mint State, but this remains a rare opportunity at this level of preservation.
- 33953 Charles IV gold 8 Escudos 1807 Mo-TH AU50 PCGS, Mexico City mint, KM159, Cal-1653. Despite a designation indicating light handling, the visual caliber of the piece at hand remains unmatched, punctuated by a mottled mulberry patina that so many collector covet on colonial issues of this vintage.
- 33954 Zacatecas. Ferdinand VII "Royalist" 8 Reales 1821 Zs-RG MS63 NGC, Zacatecas mint, KM111.5. "HISPAN" variety. Unique appearance with charcoal tones that intensify to obsidian along the periphery. This example carries a particularly strong central strike on the reverse, a feature often lacking in representatives from this branch colonial mint. Relatively scarce at this level of preservation and thus should attract bidders' attention.
- 33955 Ferdinand VII gold 8 Escudos 1809 Mo-HJ MS64 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM160, Cal-1782, Onza-1253. Pellet between the ET and IND variety. - 33958 Ferdinand VII gold 8 Escudos 1820 Mo-JJ MS61 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM161, Cal-1799, Onza-1271. Glassy in appearance with honey-gold surfaces fanning out into shades of walnut along the peripherals. Slight weakness to the reverse center strike and possessing the wisps expected in the designated grade.
- 33959 Ferdinand VII gold 8 Escudos 1820 Mo-JJ AU55 PCGS, Mexico City mint, KM161, Cal-1799. The penultimate date of the type, always sought after in near-Mint State preservation and finer. A slightly muted obverse is bolstered by a flashier reverse, all dressed in an old world tone. Lightly handled devices are rearticulated by deep charcoal tone, particularly on the coat of arms.

A popular and endearing one-year type, the eagle softly struck as is typical for this issue. Faint evidence of a prior cleaning is visible via light hairlines and a muted appearance to the fields which are now evolving into a light amber tone.
- 33961 Republic 8 Reales 1847 Mo-MF AU Details (Cleaned) NGC, Mexico City mint, KM377.10, DP-Mo31. The key date of the entire Mexico City production, and among the most sought after in the entire Caps and Rays series. While displaying a characteristic soft strike to the central devices, with Dunigan and Parker noting "softness (of strike is) .. the norm," the piece at hand endures as an impressive survivor of an exclusively low-grade series, with only a minute handful in or near Mint State.
- 33962 Maximilian gold 20 Pesos 1866-Mo UNC Details (Cleaned) NGC, Mexico City mint, KM389, Fr-62. Featuring the portrait of the Austrian archduke who reigned as Emperor Maximilian I of the Second Mexican Empire. Struck shortly before Benito Juarez ordered the emperor's execution. A precisely struck representative in a short-lived series that should appeal to type collectors interested in Mexican or European history.
- **33963 Republic 8 Reales 1887 Zs-FZ MS66 NGC,** Zacatecas mint, KM377.13, DP-Zs73. Tied for the finest grade of the type by NGC. The warm, antique toning of the reverse is complimented by the cartwheeling gradient luster of the reverse.
- **33964 Republic gold 10 Pesos 1904 Mo-M MS63 NGC,** KM413.7, Fr-128. Mintage: 694. Admitting minor blemishes on the obverse and reverse, this extraordinarily scarce date showcases Prooflike surfaces and possesses full mint brilliance.
- 33965 Republic gold 20 Pesos 1878 Mo-M MS62 NGC, Mexico City mint, KM414.6. Mintage: 7,000. A scarce date of this popular type, with only one known at NGC in a higher state of preservation. Admitting only a few flaws even to the scrupulous eye, an appealing amber tone amplifies the aesthetic caliber of the piece.
- 33966 Republic gold 20 Pesos 1890 Mo-M MS63 Prooflike NGC, Mexico City mint, KM414.6, Fr-119. Mintage: 7,852. 34012 Charles III gold 100 Francs 1882-A MS61 NGC, Paris mint, KM99. Mintage: 5,000. The first and lowest mintage issue of a three-year type. Flashing surfaces of mellow gold ripple with luster on this stately piece.

- 34013 Charles III gold 100 Francs 1886-A MS64 NGC, Paris mint, KM99, Fr-11. Mintage: 15,000. Appealing harvest-gold specimen with gentle touches of striking amber that blend effortlessly into the generous mint planchet. Only three examples at NGC are in a higher tier of preservation.
- 34014 Charles III gold 100 Francs 1886-A MS64 NGC, Paris mint, KM99, Fr-11. An imposing piece in hand, the regal design radiates with sunny light amplified by the sharp devices.
- 34015 Charles III gold 100 Francs 1886-A MS62 NGC, Paris mint, KM99, Fr-11. Exhibiting no weakness on the devices, this is a fine example for the designated grade. An enticing opportunity for a Mint State gold set.
- 34016 Albert I gold 100 Francs 1904-A MS63 NGC, Paris mint, KM105. Lowest-mintage date in this short-lived series. Russet fields adorn the golden flan of this key date. A difficult type to find in Gem state, with only four graded higher at NGC.
- 34017 Rainier III Pair of gold and silver Specimen Essai "Princess Grace" 10 Francs 1982 SP69 PCGS,
  - 1) gold 10 Francs KME74, Gad-MC158. Mintage of 2,000 pieces.
  - 2) silver 10 Francs KME73, Gad-MC158. Mintage of 30,000 pieces.

Paris mint. Popular and near-flawless Gems. Accompanied by the green cases of issue and a COA #001206 (for gold). These Specimen issues feature the American actress Grace Kelly, who had retired from acting to marry Prince Rainer III and become Princess of Monaco in 1956. As a result of injuries sustained from a car accident caused by a stroke, she passed away in 1982, for which this commemorative issue was struck. (Total: 2 coins)

Produced with exacting clarity and sharpness; the first we have offered, rare and highly desirable thus.

34019 Shah Dynasty. Prithvi Bir Bikram gold Mohar SE 1825 (1903) MS66 PCGS, KM673.1. Intricately woven designs in high relief highlight this spectacularly preserved specimen that shares the top spot in the PCGS census.

## **NETHERLANDS**

## **AUDENARDE**

34020 Audenarde (Oudenaarde). City tin Uniface Siege Klippe 5
Stuivers 1582 AU58 NGC, Vanhoudt-557 (R2). Ornate cross variety. A very scarce siege coinage struck under Alexander Farnese, Duke of Parma, between May 30 and July 5, 1582 to satisfy the Spanish garrison besieging the city, which had threatened to mutiny. These tin pieces could then be exchanged for silver following the siege. Notably bright over the surfaces for the usual dark tone of tin coinage, the coin at hand possesses a superb eye appeal.

The piece at hand endures as the lone occupant at NGC and as such certain to draw the attention of type collectors.

34023 Groningen & Ommeland. Provincial Piefort 6 Stuivers 1691 AU58 NGC, KM-P22. A promising Piefort issue and one that's seen at auction once every few years, seemingly seldom-seen in anything considered appreciable. Witnessed at the cusp of a Mint State assignment with ample residual luster and finely rendered motifs, resulting in a fully desirable addition to any specialists cabinet.

As the long occupant between both censuses for this date, we anticipate fervent bids from interested Dutch collectors.

34100 Kingdom of Holland. Louis Napoleon gold Ducat 1809 MS64 NGC, St. Petersburg mint, KM38, Fr-322. Crowned arms reverse type. Admitting a blemish on the reverse, this magnificent Ducat radiates sun-gold brightness, which justifies its place in the upper echelons of the census. A compelling addition to Dutch type collections as well as any Napoleonic series.

- 34101 Willem I 3 Gulden 1819 MS62 NGC, Utrecht mint, KM49, Schulman-241. Covetable when brought to market, and especially scarce as confirmed by the paucity of those submitted to NGC. Embellished throughout by a thick satin sheen as the result of a definitive strike, illuminating boundless mint brilliance at the slightest flick of the wrist. Of those submitted to NGC, this ranks as the finest and is certainly deserving of attention consistent with this fact.
- 34102 "United States Commercial Contract" silver Medal 1782-Dated MS62 Prooflike NGC, Van Loon-575. 45mm. By Holtzhey. Among the more interesting Medal compositions, showcasing a skilled hand via expressive depth and meticulous detail. Certain to inspire collectors of early American-related Medals.
- 34103 Willem II 2-1/2 Gulden 1848 MS64 PCGS, Utrecht mint, KM69. A late year of the type and the finest we have offered to date. Lemon and chartreuse in the targets add a splash of color to this argent near-gem, fit with active cartwheeling luster and crisp devices. Tied for the finest across both PCGS and NGC for the date.
- 34104 Willem II gold 5 Gulden 1843 MS63 NGC, KM72, Schulman-503 (RR). Mintage: 1,595. An exceedingly scarce type in anything appreciable and one witnessed in Choice states of preservation with greater frequency in recent years. Blessed with semi-Prooflike appearances throughout like the result of a resounding strike and advanced preservation, punctuated by reflective expanses and gently frosted devices.
- 34105 Willem III gold Proof 5 Gulden 1850 PR64 Deep Cameo PCGS, KM94, Fr-341, Schulman-547 (RRR). A rarity from the Dutch series in gold, and one that always excites when seen come to market. The honeyed-gold canvas lays host to deep mirrors and a fully frosted bust of Willem III. Wholly deserving of its advanced "Deep Cameo" superlative, the piece at hand is a most coveted survivor with only three currently ranking finer.
- 34106 Willem III gold 5 Gulden 1851 MS66 NGC, Utrecht mint, KM94, Schulman-548 (R). Mintage: 10,000. An ever-collectible, low-mintage piece from Willem's reign, garnering substantial interest at auction regardless of preservation, but especially so as the finest certified. Watery appearances abound this Gem, whose boundless aura framed precisely-struck motifs throughout. A promising entrant into an advanced cabinet.

A popular Restrike issue produced to a mintage of just 50 pieces, represented here by a selection certified at technical perfection. Sold with original case of issue, a handpainted Delft earthenware holder decorated with a blue and white windmill scene, and COA. An acclaimed design, shown here in technical perfection.
- 34109 Willem-Alexander gold Proof "Ducaton Restrike" (Silver Rider) Medal (1 oz) 2022 PR70 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM-Unl. Reeded edge. Certain to pique the interest of the price-conscious type collector.
- 34113 Dutch Colony. Willem III Cent 1855-(u) PR64 Brown NGC, Utrecht mint, KM307.1. A flashy survivor of a notoriously difficult issue to find without environmental qualifiers, seen here fully struck-up with silhouettes of original mint red throughout.

  handling. Bursts of original red and periwinkle manifest in the
  peripheries, sweeps of color that imbue the coin with personality.
- 34159 Stephan Bathory 3 Groszy (Trojak) 1580 AU Details (Damaged) NGC, Olkusz mint, Iger-Unl. A wholly unassuming rarity among Stephan Bathory's minor coinage seemingly unpublished in Iger's seminal reference of the type, boasting an obverse of O.80.5a (R7) and reverse of O.80.7b (R6). While minor evidence of damage to both faces is apparent, this does little to obscure what is most appreciable about the type: Bathory's strong bust and interesting reverse legend layout. Sure to excite collectors of a series whose scarcity is always confirmed by impressive auction results in much lesser designations.
- 34160 Alexander I of Russia 10 Zlotych 1820-IB XF Details (Cleaned) NGC, Warsaw mint, KM-C101.1, Dav-248. Mintage: 534. A coveted issue from the period of Russian dominance in Poland offering minor highpoint wear to the bold peripheries and a dove tone which indicates a long ago cleaning.

34161 Alexander I of Russia gold 50 Zlotych 1817-IB AU50 NGC, KM-C103, Fr-105. The first year of this short-lived series, soughtafter in any state of preservation. The devices admit a fair bit of rub but are redefined by deep silhouetting. A surprising amount of luster still grips the flan; this, combined with the fact that only a handful of examples grade higher, elevates the desirability of the type.

The finest of this lower denomination issue one could hope to obtain, with none grading higher at NGC. This gem takes on a steely appearance, draped in a metallic patina that rests on a bed of whirling luster, while the devices present with captivating precision.
- 34163 Nicholas I of Russia 40 Groszy (20 Kopeks)-MW 1850 MS64 NGC, Warsaw mint, KM-C130, Bit-1263. An exceedingly scarce type, one that we have not witnessed since 2013, and that, an AU55. This near-gem is wholly impressive, wearing semi-Prooflike fields draped in an almost translucent olive-gold tone. The crisp, expansive devices are gripped by a light frost, providing a nice contrast to the neighboring flash. Of the upmost quality one could hope to obtain, with only one 64+ ranking higher.

#### **SCOTLAND**

34220 Scotland. Dumbarton Burgh Academy "Classics Award" gold Medal ND SP63 PCGS, Unl. 38mm. 27.55gm. THE RIGHT HONOURABLE LORD OVERTOUN, his bust facing half-left. DUMBARTON BURGH ACADEMY / DUX IN CLASSICS, surrounding shield with elephant and castle. Awarded to David Walker in 1928. Hallmarked as 15 karat gold, assayed in Birmingham. Sold with an contemporary case by J. Dunlop, Dumbarton; in somewhat worn condition.

David Walker was born in Dumbarton, Scotland on 6 Nov 1909, the son of David Walker who was an iron turner. He received his education at Dumbarton Academy, gaining prizes in all his classes and gained the Overtoun Gold Medal for Classics as the best pupil in his year.

According to RSE, Professor Lawson received this award 1916-1918.

The Makdougall Brisbane Prize has been awarded bi-annually, preferably to people working in Scotland, with no more than fifteen years post-doctoral experience, for particular distinction in the promotion of scientific research and is awarded sequentially to research workers in the Physical Sciences, Engineering Sciences and Biological Sciences. The prize was founded in 1855 by Sir Thomas Makdougall Brisbane, the long-serving fourth President of the Society. Professor of Botany Abercrombie Anstruther Lawson was elected Fellow to the Royal Society of Edinburgh in 1910. He passed away on March 26, 1927 in Australia, a mere half a year after the new Botanical Department in Sydney University, that was designed after his own specifications, was formally opened.
