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Robert Wallace McLachlan

Montreal, Canada

The subject of this sketch was born in Hochelaga, an outlying suburb which has since become part of the City of Montreal, in the year 1845. He is of Scottish descent, his father William McLachlan having come from Lochwinnoch, a village of Renfrewshire, Scotland, in 1826; and his mother, Ann Stephen, from near Dufftown in Banffshire in 1834.

He began to collect coins about the year 1857, while yet a boy, having caught the hobby then prevailing among his school fellows. This hobby was taken up in a similar way to stamp collecting among the boys of to-day. The abundant and ever varying copper circulation of Canada before the coinage of 1870 afforded ample opportunity for such a pursuit. This collecting faculty having thus early germinated, soon showed signs of permanency, as our youth continued on while most of his associates one after another lost interest. There appears to have been some hereditary disposition, for as a reward for his continuity he was given a few coins that had been his father's share of a collection formed by his grandfather. In the course of years these numismatic inclinations began slowly to take shape until 1863, when his collection numbered 350, consisting mainly of such foreign coins as were from time to time picked up in circulation. During this year he became acquainted with Mr. J.L. Bronsdon, at that time the most enthusiastic numismatist in Canada, from whom he received such fresh impetus that before its close his collection had more than doubled, numbering 750.

Mr. Bronsdon gave much good advice and instructions, turning his disciple from a simple hoarder of odd coppers into paths which has made him a systematic and painstaking student of Numismatology. Among other things he was advised to turn his attention to the Canadian series, which advice was so steadily followed that Mr. McLachlan has formed the most complete collection of Canadian Coins and Medals known.

About that time the Numismatic Society of Montreal was organized, but Mr. McLachlan was believed to be too young for membership, so that it was not until 1865 that he was counted eligible. He at once took a prominent part in its proceedings, which activity he has continued ever since, hardly ever missing a meeting except when absent from the city.

In 1872 the publication of the *Canadian Antiquarian* was commenced, and Mr. McLachlan was nominated on the editorial staff, and many papers from his pen have appeared in the sixteen volumes that have so far been published; among the more noteworthy may be mentioned: A plea for an artistic coinage.—Henry VIII Crown.—Medals of the war of 1812.—The first water pipes laid in Montreal.—The Edward Murphy medal, also published in pamphlet form.—Cuvillier currency of 1837.—Canadian Temperance

medals, also as a pamphlet.—The Glastonbury penny, as a leaflet.—Our rarest Canadian coins.—Louisbourg medals, as a pamphlet.—Money and medals of Canada under the old regime, also as a pamphlet.—Canadian coins issued in 1892.

In the American Journal of Numismatics he published an addenda to "Sandham's Coins of Canada" and also in the same Journal a series of articles on Canadian Coins, which afterwards appeared in book form entitled "Canadian Numismatics." This work gives a better history of the coins and medals so far issued.

He has represented the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society at several of the annual meetings of the Royal Society of Canada, and at one of these meetings read a paper on "Annals of the Nova Scotian currency," which paper has been published in the proceedings of the Royal Society and also in pamphlet form.

His "Canadian Communion tokens" is considered a standard work on the subject.

In 1884 Mr. McLachlan was elected a corresponding member of the American Numismatic and Archeological Society of New York, and sent a paper entitled "A Montreal Indian Medal," to be read at its twenty-fifth annual meeting. This paper has appeared in the proceedings of the society.

He was also nominated as a Membre Associé Etranger de la Société Royale de Numismatique de Belgique, and sent a paper to be read before the Congrès International de Numismatique held under the auspices of that society in Brussels in 1891. This paper appeared in the proceedings of the Congrès and in pamphlet form.

Mr. McLachlan has also been a member of the Numismatic Society of London, since 1866.

He has ever continued to add to his collection, so that it now numbers over 8,000, being the largest in the Dominion; while it is peculiarly rich in rare Canadians, it is by no means wanting in other departments, as the coinages in all ages and countries are represented. Specimens of the Ancient Greek and Roman series are brought together in large numbers. In the latter only the rare families and Emperors are wanting, while in the English series many fine examples are to be found. The series in Continental Europe, South America and Australia is well advanced.

Mr. McLachlan's forte as a collector does not rest so much in brilliancy and dash, but in steady continuity. His love for the science has continued all along unabated, and now he stands at its head in his native country, being everywhere recognized as an authority.

A scarce and handsomely produced quarto edition of the collected works of Joseph Addison. Unlisted by Dekesel, who includes a number of different editions of Addison in his comprehensive bibliography of 18th-century numismatic works, including a 1721 duodecimo edition by the same publisher. The first volume features Dialogues upon the Usefulness of Ancient Medals. Especially in Relation to the Latin and Greek Poets at pages 429-559, which includes the six plates depicting ancient Roman coins featured in Three Setts of Medals Illustrated by the Ancient Poets, in the Foregoing Dialogues. This classic essay is a defense of numismatics written in the form of a discourse between Cynthio, Eugenius and Philander, and is followed by three series of woodcut plates of Roman coins, and preceded by Alexander Pope's "Verses Occasion'd by Mr. Addison's Treatise of Medals." These works are nearly ubiquitous in their smallformat duodecimo editions; they are decidedly more scarce in larger format, and the coin plates are more impressive at this greater size. Joseph Addison (1672-1719) was one of the most important English essayists of his era, and was, through The Spectator (which he published with Richard Steele), one of the guardians of good taste at the time. His opinions on the merits of coin collecting mattered. This edition unlisted in Hirsch, Lipsius and Dekesel. Ex Richard Hall Library, with his engraved bookplate in second and third volumes.

A classic essay, in Volume III of the collected 1753 edition of Addison's *Miscellaneous Works, in Verse and Prose.* A defense of numismatics written in the form of a discourse between Cynthio, Eugenius and Philander, followed by three series of woodcut plates of Roman coins, and preceded by Alexander

Pope's "Verses Occasion'd by Mr. Addison's Treatise of Medals." Two other essays are also included. Addison was one of the most important English essayists, and was, through *The Spectator* (which he published with Richard Steele), one of the guardians of good taste at the time. A complete set to 1996 of this most important series of specialized monographs, written on a wide variety of numismatic topics. Only six volumes have been published in this series since No. 166. Many of the early titles are scarce and sets have become increasingly difficult to complete. Particularly rich in works on ancient coins, the series also includes a number of titles on medieval and modern numismatics, American coins, orders and decorations, coin hoards, and other topics. Many if not most titles remain standard works in their respective fields. The series includes, for example: Newell's Alexander Hoards; Newell's Seleucid Coinages of Tyre: Vlasto's Tarentine Numismatics; Gillingham's works on orders and decorations; Milbank's Coinage of Aegina; Noe's Mende (Kaliandra) Hoard; Noe's Coinage of Metapontum; Ravel's Colts of Ambracia; Valentine's United States Half Dimes; Bellinger's series of publications on the Dura hoards; Noe's Thurian Di-Staters; Newell's Seleucid Coinages of Tyre; Bullowa's Commemorative Coinage; Gillingham and Scott's series on counterfeiting; Milne's Kolophon and Its Coinage; Noe's series on the coinages of Massachusetts; McKay's Early American Currency; Miles's Early Arabic Glass Weights; Grant's Aspects of the Principate of Tiberius; Miles's Rare Islamic Coins; Bedoukian's Coinage of Cilician Armenia; Morrison & Grunthal's Carolingian Coinage; etc. Grierson 19.

allegorical frontispieces, the first volume's signed by C.F. Ble-sendorff based on work by A. A complete set, rarely offered, of the comprehensive catalogue of the ancient coins in the extensive Electoral cabinet. Babelon traces the development of this collection in some detail: "The origins of numismatic collecting in Berlin can be tentatively traced back to the Margrave of Brandenburg, Joachim II (1535-1571), since we know that he was interested in both science and the arts. It is more certain that the Margrave Georg-Wilhelm (1619-1640), had a collection of ancient coins, which he had formed before he took the ducal title of Brandenburg. Under the great Elector, Friederich-Wilhelm I, the Brandenburg collection had, by 1649, increased to 4,936 coins, of which 122 were gold and 3,000 silver, some of them coming from the collection of pastor Erasmus Seidel of Cleef. We know that Spanheim dedicated the third edition of his book Depraestantia et usu numorum antiquorum to the Elector, whose collection had, by 1665, increased considerably. He owned 168 gold coins, and his series of silver and bronze coins ran to even greater numbers. Charles Patin, who visited Berlin in 1676, said that, thanks to the efforts of Christian von Heimbach, the Prince Elector's collection "deserves the attention of anyone who loves unusual things, and should be visited." The Count Palatine of the Rhine, Karl Ludwig († 1680), owned a coin cabinet. A catalogue of the collection was compiled by Lorenz Beger in 1685; it later went to Berlin where Beger added 12,000 coins to it. In 1686, Lorenz Beger presented this magnificent collection to the great Elector Friedrich-Wilhelm, entered his service, and published a catalogue of his collections" (Ancient Numismatics and Its History, pages 104-105, translated by Elizabeth Saville). A useful photographic record of Biaggi's astonishing collection of Roman gold coins. Important. Leo Biaggi de Blasys (1906–1979) assembled one of the greatest collections of Roman gold coins ever formed. Sold outright to Bank Leu in 1978, the coins were introduced gradually into the marketplace over a period of about thirty years. The reproduced illustrations are of rather high quality. Rarely offered.

An attractive copy of this very scarce and interesting work, with several coin plates. Caronni (1747–1815) was a Barnabite priest and antiquarian, with strong numismatic interests. He was close to Giovanni Battista Visconti (father of Ennio Quirino Visconti, who would go on the create the magnificent *Iconographie grecque et romaine*. The elder Visconti had been a student of Winckelmann's and he encouraged Caronni in his interests. Caronni travelled extensively in his antiquarian researches. In June 1804, his ship was captured by corsairs and he was held in Tunis. Even there, he managed to find time to investigate local archaeological sites and findings, and he was released from captivity fairly quickly. An adventurous life, which is discussed here in some detail.

Very scarce: one of only a few copies we have ever handled. Produced outside the numismatic sphere in very limited numbers (possibly only 100 copies were printed). Though a Renaissance medallist, we have categorized this work in the Ancient section due to Cavino's famous series of medals based on ancient Roman coins. Clain-Stefanelli 14329.

The main work is a very rare catalogue, and an important photographic record. It is one of only a few examples we have encountered in four decades. The second work is the catalogue of an exhibition held in conjunction with the 1961 International Numismatic Congress, at which the Treasure of the Via Alessandrina was presented, reconstituted in its entirety.



Du Choul writes in a light conversational style aimed at an audience of curious middle-class readers, and his book is still enjoyable to read today. Du Choul's ability to use ancient coins to illuminate ancient life and history make him an important figure in the history of antiquarian studies." The early editions of these classic early treatises on ancient Roman coins, religion, temples, rituals, and military camps, are sometimes, as here, found bound together. The superb woodcuts, attributed to Pierre Eskrich, are among the finest numismatic illustrations produced in the sixteenth century. Du Choul's works, termed "masterly and highly successful" by Richard Cooper, went through many editions, some extending into the eighteenth century. Du Choul's is the earliest documented coin collection in France; by the mid-1500s his holdings and the coin collection of Jean Grolier appear to have been without equal in France. A rare and impressive illustrated folio recording this great collection. The antiquities were catalogued by François Lenormant; the coins by Félix Feuardent; and the "objets divers" by Eugène Dutuit, the brother of Auguste. The numismatic material comprises pages 73–170 and catalogue numbers 160–536. This 1879 volume utilizes several illustrative techniques, the most impressive of which is Léon Vidal's *photochromie* process. The photochrome process was an early technique allowing the printing of photographic images in color; it was highly suitable for art books and catalogues, as a large number of plates could be printed from one photograph and color retention was good (most of them have held their color well to this day). The process was developed in the early 1870s by Léon Vidal (1833–1906), a French photographer who was awarded a gold medal at the Universal Exposition of 1878 for his work in this field. The color in Vidal's "photochromes" is not taken directly from life, however; it is indirect, using modified black and white negatives. It was the state of the art for only a short time, but it was an impressive technological advance and the prints remain attractive today. While the photochrome process was not used for the numismatic plates, three of the six numismatic plates are photographic, which is unusual in itself for an 1879 volume.





Sir Hermann Weber died at the age of 94 on the day of the Armistice, November 11, 1918. His great collection of 8593 coins was purchased *en bloc* by Spink & Son, and Leonard Forrer was commissioned to write this extremely important catalogue. The coins were dispersed privately in the 1920s (the British Museum being given first refusal), with a large number of the coins finding their way into the collection of Virgil Brand, now also dispersed. Nearly all of the coins in the collection are depicted on the excellent plates. Reviewing the first volume of this work in the 1922 *Numismatic Chronicle*, G.F. Hill wrote that "if such catalogues could be made of all great collections, there would be less cause to lament their dispersal." Clain-Stefanelli 2001*. Daehn 2042. Grierson 57. In the introduction he notes: "My experience in Roman coins was very limited when I made the observation—that probably every one has made and will make under similar circumstances—namely, that, starting with the rude and heavy As, and following the series of Coins leading up to the fine types that commence with the reign of Augustus, thence tracing the series down again to the small and badly-executed Coins which make their appearance in the time of Gallienus, we have, from an artistic point of view, an epitome of the rise and fall of the Roman Empire."

The massive collection of Count Dr. Alessandro Magnaguti (1887–1966), catalogued in twelve volumes from 1949 to 1965, was perhaps their greatest achievement.



An uncirculated 1793 wreath cent was featured, along with a "1815 Very good. This cent is the scarcest of all the American cents, and is only to be found in very few collections, extraordinarily rare and in fine condition, and a cent to be greatly desired." The cents sold as a set for \$200.00. Also included was a "Sommer Island shilling" with a long description, concluding with "The above coin may not be genuine." It sold for \$10. The highlights of the sale were three silver Jewish shekels, which brought, \$250, \$50, and \$300 respectively. Baker, First Twelve Years (entry 17). 

The fourth volume was produced by Frederick George Lawrence as a supplement to Batty (who died in 1896), and is devoted to copper coinage of the period 1860-1887. Pages 1179-1300 comprise the Canadian "Descriptive Catalogue of the Colonial Copper Currency," which is of continued interest. While Batty's work has had its detractors ("I know of nothing more likely to produce insanity than a serious attempt to use this monument to misdirected energy"-C.W. Peck), it has its admirers as well, who see Batty's recognition of the important role played by "non-regal coinage" as being ahead of his time. It is an incredible compilation of the most extensive collection of its type ever recorded. Especially useful for private tokens and tickets, etc., and of marked value to North American numismatists. Bronsdon was a charter member of the Numismatic Society of Montreal and, along with Adelard Boucher and James Rattray, was commissioned by the society to compile a catalogue of Canadian coins. This was the first catalogue of its kind ever put together but, unfortunately, only the first part was published: A Catalogue of the Silver & Copper Coins of Canada and of the Other British North American Provinces... Part of Bronsdon's coin collection was purchased by R.W. McLachlan and the remainder was acquired by Henry Laggatt and sold in this sale. Interestingly enough, the auction is far richer in American coins, medals and tokens than in Canadian equivalents, the latter series having apparently been already purchased by McLachlan. 


Bowman's Encyclopedia on Communion Tokens Augmented with Original Photographs

One of the 29 volumes comprising Bowman's unpublished Encyclopedia: Canadian Coins, Tokens and Medals, his vast attempt to cover the entirety of Canadian numismatic material in one reference. Chris Faulkner's introduction to Bowman's Encyclopedia in the CNB (Canadian Numismatic Bibliography, edited by Darryl A. Atchison and published by the Numismatic Education Society of Canada in 2007) is worth quoting: "This enormous, unpublished compendium of coins, tokens and medals (and some scrip) of every imaginable description for every imaginable purpose, entered in twenty-nine ledgers in Fred Bowman's distinctive printed hand, remains his greatest work and an indispensable resource for all researchers in every field of Canadian numismatics except paper money. These ledgers (such as accountants used to keep company books in the old pen and ink days!) are from six to twelve inches thick and comprise many thousands of pages in total. Each page is devoted to a single coin, token or medal, or a single issuing authority (i.e. a particular merchant). The entry for each item includes: an illustration (usually a photograph often taken by Bowman himself or occasionally a rubbing or line drawing); a transcription of anything that may have been written about the item in available sources (published or unpublished), along with relevant newspaper clippings and/or articles (themselves attached to the entry page); the fixed-price catalogue or auction sale appearances for the item, with prices realized, from the earliest to the most recent listing; notes concerning known or alleged varieties; and occasionally a record of ownership, or a personal source for the information concerning the item. Taken as a single work, these twenty-nine volumes represent the greatest accomplishment in the history of Canadian numismatics." The originals of the Encyclopedia are to be found in the archives of the National Currency Collection at the Bank of Canada. This particular volume (here bound in two) is focused exclusively on communion tokens, and is of exceptional interest to the specialist. CNB page 50: "this volume contains entries pertaining to communion tokens and is arranged by province and issuing authority. Also included are stick tokens, foreign missions and communion cards." Bowman published a series of articles in the Canadian Numismatic

An Extraordinary Archive of Correspondence from Devins & Bolton

Devins & Bolton. APPROXIMATELY 230 LETTERS FROM DEVINS & BOLTON TO NEW YORK DRUGGISTS LANMAN & KEMP. A remarkable gathering of material, neatly arranged by date and individually housed within archival-quality plastic pages within two large-format [30.5 by 30.5 cm] red three-ring binders, which are in turn housed in two very attractive custom-made slipcases (red half morocco with marbled sides, spines with five raised bands, ruled in gilt, each with two black spine labels lettered in gilt). A few letters comprise multiple pages. Overall condition of the letters is very good to fine, with the usual folds encountered from mailing.

A highly important gathering of correspondence relating to the history of this firm, known to numismatists around the world for their extensive countermarking operation that made Devins & Bolton countermarks the most commonly encountered countermark in the Americas and important pieces of evidence in Canadian numismatic history. The archive derives from an enormous trove of some 2300 letters addressed to Lanman & Kemp that survived into the second half of the 20th century—the rest of the collection now resides in the Hagley Museum & Library (Wilmington, Delaware). That these records have survived is highly unusual and they allow us the opportunity to gain a much better understanding of the Devins & Bolton firm than would be the case without them.

Richard John Devins studied medicine at McGill University before leaving school to focus on becoming a druggist/chemist. After a brief stint in New York working for the firm of Lanman & Kemp, he was by 1861 able to set himself up in business on Notre Dame Street in Montreal. Toward the end of 1862, he made plans to go into business with Richard Bolton, publicly announcing the new firm on January 2, 1863. One of the more important letters here present is his January 5, 1863 letter to Lanman & Kemp in which he informs them of the new partnership, stating that they would operate under the name of Devins & Bolton. Devins had stayed in touch with his former employers, wishing to become the Canadian distributor for some of their products (as is attested to in an August 1861 letter to Lanman & Kemp, the first letter here present). As Devins & Bolton, the firm was extraordinarily successful. They heavily employed traditional marketing and advertising tools, but were willing to be creative in their attempts to get their name in front of potential customers, including striking tokens in 1867. Warren Baker, in discussing the firm in his *Marked Impressions* (Montreal, 2006), writes, "Ever willing to exploit the business to its fullest, their worm pastille token is an example of the risk they were willing to take in promoting their business. Designed by engraver John Henry Walker of Montreal, the majority of the coins, which bore a striking similarity to the newly issued Provincial cents of 1858 and 1859, were seized by customs officials. A clever gimmick had it worked!"


Well before striking their own tokens, however, the firm began an aggressive campaign of countermarking coppers. Devins is quoted by Horatio R. Storer in the October 1889 issue of the American Journal of Numismatics, as writing: "When I was first in business, owing to the numerous and endless oddities of coins (coppers) then in circulation, I punched every one I got hold of with the words 'Devins & Bolton, Montreal'. I kept count up to eighteen hundred dollars, but did not give up stamping, and kept on until I had them about most all thus labelled" (page 40). \$1800 would be 180,000 cent tokens, or 360,000 half cent tokens, giving some idea of the enormous number of coins involved. If the Devins & Bolton countermarking operation began with the establishment of the firm in January 1863 and ceased with the adoption in January 1869 of An Act Respecting Offenses Relating to the Coin, which prohibited countermarking, we can see that all of the enormous number of coins and tokens thus treated by the firm were countermarked in a span of about six years. Those pieces existing today with Devins & Bolton countermarks are evidence of what was circulating in Canada during a relatively short period of time—as such, they are highly informative and provide evidence of a sort that is otherwise rarely encountered. We can know today that all of the coins that served as undertypes for D&B countermarks were to be found in circulation in and around Montreal between 1863 and 1868 because of these marks. Without them, we could only speculate. Baker further writes in Marked Impressions: "The importance of the Devins & Bolton markings cannot be overstated. Their coppers are tangible evidence of the copper circulating medium of the years just prior to and after Confederation. ... The firm was a tireless advertising innovator, and their mark is surely the most well-known in North America. Besides the British Pear's Soap and Lloyd's Weekly marks, this may rank as the world's third most widely produced advertising countermark." A unique opportunity for the specialist. The offprint of Parsons's *AJN* article is at least as scarce: this copy is unusually well-preserved and includes the original printed card covers. An Agent de Manufactures or Manufacturers Agent at the time of publication (1911–1918?), Gravel formed a collection of Canadian coins and medals which, according to Fred Bowman, "was considered the most important on the continent at that time." Petrie (*CNJ*, October 1961), Jones dropped from the membership rolls soon after. 

His preface is dated October 1, 1890 and states that "The illustrations in this work were made at Lachine, by Mr. J. G. Armstrong's Photo-Engraving process from drawings by Mr. Geo. Bertrand, Artist, 1598 Notre Dame Street, Montreal." In a later work, Breton claimed to have sold 4000 copies of this 1890 publication, but its rarity today suggests a lower number. 




Richard Cooper Special Collection: Numismatic Correspondence of R.W. McLachlan

The lots that follow derive from the extensive archives of correspondence left by Robert Wallace McLachlan (1845–1926), whose comprehensive studies of nearly every aspect of Canadian numismatics have ensured his continued importance to this day. While his published works, ranging from the broadly defined *Canadian Numismatics* of 1886 to specialized studies such as *The Real Date of the Canadian 1820 Harp Tokens* (1907) are well-known and widely respected, his personal interactions with other numismatists are generally unrecognized. McLachlan carried out, however, an extensive correspondence with numismatists in Canada, England and the United States, and at times reached out to collectors as far afield as Mexico, Belgium, Germany and elsewhere. Most importantly, he retained the letters he received, allowing us a better understanding of the state of numismatics as a science in his day and the state of coin collecting as a popular hobby. This is an important offering and one that will not be repeated.

McLachlan Correspondence with J.W. Bastow

A Canadian by birth, or as he emphasizes in one of the letters, a "British Canadian," Bastow apparently was afflicted with wanderlust, spending an amount time in Chicago and traveling throughout Mexico for over twenty years, apparently as a practicing dentist. His articles on the numismatics of Mexico were, as he was keenly aware, pioneering works; from his 1886 effort in the *Canadian Antiquarian and Numismatic Journal* entitled "Mexico: Its coinage and difficulties attending it, at the period of its conquest by the Spaniards" to the monographs which appeared in the *American Journal of Numismatics* in the years preceding his death on the Spanish American coinage of Mexico, Proclamation Pieces, the coins of Morelos, etc. In the first letter to McLachlan, dated October 6, 1886, Bastow writes: "your book on C. coins &c. recd last night... I have some varieties of Bank tokens you don't mention (trifling variations) and probably some Sous, the latter, I have I think over 40, and remember a token with head of Brutus, sold me by Hasseltine (*sic*) as Canadian... I like the style of publication of your work, it is similar to

Marvin's Masonic Medals, (of which I have a copy beautifully bound). Those Roman numerals may look more tony but the(y) engross considerable space and (are) not so easily called off as Arabic numerals. Your descriptions are certainly all or even more than could have been expected and fills the requirements about as well as the most fastidious could desire... At my first leisure I will give everything I can from my coll. it is certainly not much, as, with the exception of a sou or two, I don't think I have increased my Can. coll. since leaving Chicago (1875)... As soon as possible I will make out a list of my wants and if you desire Mex. Coins or medals in exchange it would be more convenient for me and probably so for you." Subsequent letters discuss Canadian and Mexican coins, the article Bastow was writing or hoped to write, McLachlan's own publications, the financial difficulties of the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal, the content of the Canadian Antiquarian and Numismatic Journal and the American Journal of Numismatics, etc. Extensive quotations from this group of letters was provided when it was sold in 1997 as lot 207 in Kolbe Sale 70 (available on the Newman Portal). Many of the letters comment on the U.S. dealers of the day (Low, Frossard, and Woodward, the last of whom, he says, was nearly blind by August of 1887). A remarkable correspondence file with important content on the numismatics of Mexico, Canada and the United States. It extends up to the very time of Bastow's unexpected death in 1898. Bastow's collection was sold by Lyman Low in an October 20, 1902 sale. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

McLachlan Correspondence with Eugene Courteau

Dr. Eugene Courteau (1868-1934) requires little in the way of introduction to anyone interested in Canadian numismatics. His various publications on the die varieties (and, frequently, die states) of Canadian colonial tokens are well-known, and his numbering systems for many series remain in use among specialists. Courteau was Life Member 15 of the American Numismatic Association and served as the ANA's Local Secretary for Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland—one of the letters here present is encouraging McLachlan to submit his application for membership and is on Courteau's secretarial letterhead. Most of the rest of the correspondence deals with Canadian tokens, as might be expected. On 13 January 1908, he writes, "I intend to have a monograph published on the bouquets, with plates given photographic illustrations of each variety. For this reason, I am coming to ask you if I can rely on you, as by the past, for the correction of my manuscript. Do you think the combination of dies of B. 675-679, as given in LeRoux, in existence? Mr. Thomas Wilson have written to me two or three years ago mentioning that variety in his collection. Do you believe a monograph on sous, given the exact illustration of every specimens known, to be useful and remunerative to the publisher?" Courteau wrote to McLachlan in English, though as his "Dr Courteau, Numismate" letterhead indicated, he was a French speaker. Letters here present include discussion of Betts medals, jetons, Wellington tokens, and, of course, other numismatists: "I should also be pleased to read an article from you in The Numismatist in answer to that of Heal. This man is very strange in his manners. It is pretty hard to understand him. He always has something to grudge against someone (confidential)." A notable group of letters. 

A tightly focused series of letters from the Belgian numismatist Alphonse de Witte (1851–1916) and the medallists Fernand Dubois and Charles Wiener. De Witte's letters of 7 and 25 juin 1887 concern McLachlan's search for a medallist capable of producing an artistic medal to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Numismatic Society of Montreal. De Witte suggested Charles Wiener as the man for the job ("c'est un homme des plus capables"), though Fernand Dubois is proposed as a less expensive alternative. (Dubois got the job.) Many of the subsequent letters pertain to this project, and they form a small archive documenting the production of this particular medal. Some of de Witte's letters are on the letterhead of the Société Royale de Numismatique de Belgique and the writer regularly promotes the Society to McLachlan, and particularly their journal, the *Revue belge de numismatique*. Dubois's letters are often revealing and give information on the costs associated with producing the medal. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

King's 1930 book *Masonic Chapter Pennies: The Albert M. Hanauer Collection*. According to the *Canadian Numismatic Bibliography*, "Gibson's immense collection of mark pennies was housed in the Masonic Hall after his death, and was completely lost when that building burned" (page 516). Rev. John Milton Goodwillie (1844–1917) was a Presbyterian minister and ardent hobbyist, credited by Breton with being the first to record a number of Canadian tokens. In addition, he was an amateur geologist, advanced enough to have published "A Geological Sketch, with Notes on the Geology of the Manitou Islands of Lake Nipissing, Ontario" in the August 25, 1893 issue of *Science*. Ted Banning included Goodwillie in his excellent article on "Early Numismatists and Coin Collectors in and around Ottawa," in the July–September 2022 issue of the *Canadian Numismatic Journal*. Goodwillie's letters to McLachlan discuss some of the pieces in his collection that he had not seen described in the literature. Generally speaking, the descriptions of tokens and other piece are detailed enough to be useful for identification purposes today. Medals are also discussed, with Goodwillie's concern seeming to be having them included by McLachlan in his publications than anything else. That said, the two did exchange pieces and at times sold them to each other. In addition to the usual Canadian tokens and medals, communion tokens, Indian Peace Medals, bridge tokens, and British coins are also discussed. Goodwillie's 1886 letters ask McLachlan to hold off on publishing his *Canadian Numismatics* until he can provide information on additional pieces. A highly interesting group. McLachlan Correspondence with S.S. Heal

Two handwritten letters, with five photographic items being: 1) postcard portrait of Heal, dated 1907 on verso; 2) photograph depicting Frank Duffield with two others; 3) small portrait photograph of Albert Frey; 4) a postcard photograph depicting Howland Wood, Albert Frey, and a third gentleman sitting on the back of an elephant (really); and 5) photograph of Albert Frey and Howard Gibbs. Materials generally near fine. \$300

While the letters from Heal are not particularly notable from a numismatic perspective, the photos accompanying them are rather wonderful. Heal has written on the back of the portrait of him, "I got another man to press the bulb for me. If I'd had my pipe in my mouth I would look more natural." McLachlan Correspondence with Joseph Hooper

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. **CORRESPONDENCE WITH JOSEPH HOOPER**. Port Hope, 1884–1913. Nineteen handwritten letters, some of them on Hooper's personal letterhead. Most of the letters are near fine or so, with a few being a bit more worn. **\$300**

An energetic correspondent, Joseph Hooper (1832-1919) was a charter member of the American Numismatic Association and contributed a series of biographical articles about numismatists of the day to the early volumes of The Numismatist. This series, which ran as "Numismatic Headlights," is important today for providing information about some of the late 19th-century dealers and collectors that would otherwise have been lost. Hooper's series was reprinted in booklet form as Numismatic Foundation Stones, but this is extremely rare. Hooper's correspondence with McLachlan begins in December of 1884. One has to assume that much correspondence between McLachlan and Hooper was lost at some point, as nearly all of the present lot is from 1884 and 1885, with only one letter present from 1913. Hooper's letters are detailed, often somewhat lengthy, and jump from subject to subject with rapidity. One can only wonder what McLachlan made of this energetic and obsessive newcomer. From the start, Hooper is trying to acquire anything he doesn't have: "I am perfecting the 'Coins of Canada,' 'SANDHAMS' and lack a few pieces. Your name has been given me as one who perhaps would furnish pieces or give me information where I can get them." His second letter tells of spending \$100 in the previous two weeks on coins, \$60 of it with Rev. Goodwillie, whose correspondence with McLachlan is also present here. Hooper frequently adds sketches of coins or tokens to his letters (including a charming little drawing of a side-view), later augmenting his letters with rubbings. In his November 14, 1885 letter, Hooper writes that "I had a very enjoyable 1/2 day with Dr Maris of Philadelphia who called on me and took tea at our house. He is a Quaker. Well posted on coins, he went through my cabinet." This is a group that will keep the buyer busy for a while, and entertained as well. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

An interesting letter from the author of *The Ships, Colonies & Commerce Tokens*. Lees writes, "Dear Mr. McLachlan, I recently had a letter from an Eastern collector who says he once had B. 991, the R. H. farthing, as illustrated by Breton and LeRoux, without the flag at stern, and that those he has seen lately have the same ship as the penny and halfpenny, B. 989 and 990. He referred the matter to two other collectors, one of whom was Mr. Doane, and neither had ever noticed that the ship in Breton's cut of the farthing differed from the other two and neither remembered having seen the farthing with the ship lacking flag at stern. I have two and they both have the same ship as 989 and 990 and I do not remember having seen a different ship. This piece first appeared in the supplement to LeRoux's *Atlas Numismatique* and I gather from a note there that you furnished the rubbing from which the cut was made. That is my only excuse for troubling you to ask if your specimen has ship with flag at stern or same ship as in LeRoux's cut. An answer at your convenience will be greatly appreciated. Yours sincerely, [signed] Wm. A.D. Lees." Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

On Purchasing the Château de Ramezay

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH W.D. LIGHTHALL. N.p., 1893–1894. Two postcards, accompanied by a draft dated October 1893 for a subscription to purchase the Château de Ramezay to be used as a public library owned by the Numismatic & Antiquarian Society of Montreal. Draft folded; near fine.

The early 1890s saw the Château de Ramezay, which was built between 1705 and 1706, threatened with demolition. The Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal began a concerted effort to save the historic building, with the aim to use it as a museum and library. The postcards in this lot make reference to the historical tablets erected around Montreal by the Society, and the draft reads: "We the undersigned subscribe the amounts opposite our names for the purpose of purchasing the Château de Ramezay, to be fitted up for a public library & museum; the property to be held by the Numismatic & Antiquarian Society of Montreal, until such time as a Board of Directors shall have been properly constituted." McLachlan Correspondence with Lincoln & Son


A fascinating lot, as nearly all of these letters date from the 1860s, and hence shed light on the early years of Robert W. McLachlan's numismatic activity. That McLachlan felt that he had to conduct business overseas reveals the limitations of the nascent numismatic marketplace at this time in Canada; it also suggests that McLachlan saw an opportunity to make progress as a coin dealer by importing coins. The Lincoln firm routinely sent McLachlan coins on approval and it is clear from these letters that he in turn ordered fairly large quantities of certain items—Maundy Money, for instance—on which he felt he could make a quick and satisfactory return. Robert's brother William traveled to England for business on a regular basis at this time and sometimes served as his brother's representative. W.S. Lincoln & Son was among the foremost dealers of its day, and it is impressive that McLachlan was entering into such business arrangements with them when only twenty years of age. McLachlan Correspondence with W.R. McColl

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH W.R. MCCOLL. Owen Sound, 1884–1903. Handwritten letters, some on W.R. McColl letterhead, one on McColl & Lee letterhead, and some on W.R. McColl memoranda sheets. Twenty-nine items. Generally folded but near fine. \$500

Arguably one of the most important groups in the McLachlan correspondence. William Robert McColl (1855–1933) is best known today for his 1903 *List of Canadian, British, United States and Foreign Coins and Pattern Pieces, Paper Money, etc. Offered at Private Sale.* This list, compiled by McColl in a simply attempt to sell his collection, remains highly important today for its listing of trade tokens not covered by earlier works. These letters from McColl are most interesting and revealing (once one gets used to his handwriting, which can be a bit tough). Much of the correspondence regards trades or purchases being made between the two, and McColl comes across as being rather demanding, and frequently unsatisfied with the condition of the tokens and medals he is sent. It would seem that most of the letters once accompanied numismatic objects. The letters present in this lot were instrumental in the research conducted by Len Buth and Scott Douglas for their *W.R. McColl Remembered* (2003), a privately published numismatic and biographic treatment of the man. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

Victor Morin Writes to Mrs. McLachlan

McLachlan, Mrs. R.W. [recipient]. LETTER FROM VICTOR MORIN. Handwritten letter, signed, in English, on Morin & Mackay Notaires letterhead. Montreal, October 7, 1913. Near fine.

Reads in its entirety: "Dear Madam, Mr. McLachlan authorized me to send a messenger to your house and get a catalogue of an auction sale of coins to be made by B.G. Green at Chicago on the 10th instant—It is a small pamphlet with green cover, on his desk. Will you kindly send it by the bearer. Yours truly, [signed] Victor Morin." Morin is best remembered today for his works on Indian Peace Medals, most notably his 1916 Les médailles décernées aux Indiens. Étude historique et numismatique des colonisations européennes en Amérique and his 1932 Les traités du gouvernement canadien avec les Indiens du nord-ouest. The Ben Green sale being referred to is the tenth and final sale of the Charles Morris collection, rich in communion tokens. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

McLachlan Correspondence with Henry Mott

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH HENRY MOTT. Montreal, Quebec, and Brooklyn, 1875–1896. Fifty-six items. Generally near fine. \$600

An unusually extensive correspondence, running for over twenty years and covering a great many topics. Coin sales are discussed, including Edward Cogan's later auctions ("By the bye poor Cogan has been very ill for the past few weeks with gout, I fancy, but he is now I think a little better but believe not able to attend the sale today [the Col. M. Cohen sale]"). Mott's December 14, 1872 letter is particularly notable. In it, he writes, "I now want to tell you something which I do not wish you to repeat for fear it should come back here and defeat my object. You must know that old Mr. Cogan has been very sick for many weeks and almost entirely unable to attend to his business, and I have catalogued for him, very nearly all of a collection of Col. Jewett's, which will be sold during the month of January, and I may here answer one part of your letter by saying that I shall attend the sale and will very willingly execute any commissions you may entrust me with. I presume that you would just as soon pay me the commission as to Cogan, it has no Canadian pieces worth notice except one fine Silver Indian Medal, like (as to size) the 1814 full bust of George III but much earlier and different from any other I have yet seen, it is a beauty and if I had the funds I would have it at any price in reason, but of course that cannot be. ... There is another large collection to be sold after this and I think I shall get the job to catalogue it also. @ \$5 per day for a competitor of Cogan's named Strobridge. Now I come to what I want to tell you. Cogan is very feeble 73 years of age and past work and Strobridge is losing his eyesight and I really do think that I can at no very distant date fall into their place not in the shape of buying them out because probably they would have too exalted an opinion of the value of their business but I mean gradually to slide into it. Do you think I am competent to do this? Give me your candid opinion. It is a much more important affair than I should have expected and Cogan has a considerably long list of clients. It has paid me pretty well so far and I have been daily picking up information about it. Neither Cogan nor Strobridge are particularly clever but C. (with whom I am the more intimately acquainted) has had 20 years experience and is very much liked. He is very truthful and his word is universally accepted by collectors, his accurate description of all pieces commands their confidence. I believe that he would not knowingly tell an untruth..." Later letters show Mott serving as a proofreader for McLachlan, who apparently sent him advance copies of some of his articles. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

The Numismatic & Antiquarian Society of Montreal

Includes the receipt for McLachlan's 1890 subscription to the *Canadian Numismatic & Antiquarian Journal*. Five pieces are addressed to McLachlan by Gerald E. Hart, whose outstanding collection was sold by Ed Frossard and the Scott Stamp & Coin Company. While a number of these letters and postcards served only to invite McLachlan to various meetings, or to notify him of his being appointed to committees, they are of interest as a record of the proceedings of the organization, McLachlan's own participation within the more formal numismatic world, and his interaction with other famous numismatists of his day. McLachlan Correspondence with the Numismatic Society of London

Includes requests for and receipts for annual dues and letters to McLachlan written by Society Treasurer Alfred E. Copp. The Copp letters are substantive, and address a number of queries forwarded to him by McLachlan. They also touch on Henry Mott, who owed the Society nine guineas in past dues, which McLachlan apparently assured them they would not receive (Mott says in his next letter that Mott's name was struck from the rolls). Letter from Ulex to McLachlan

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH GEORG ULEX. Hamburg, 23 Januar 1898. Handwritten letter, signed, on all four sides from a folded sheet of letter paper, with accompanying rubbing. Folded for mailing. Very good or better. \$100 Georg F. Ulex, of Hamburg, Germany, assembled one of the great collection of coins of the Americas in the late 19th century. His monumental cabinet was sold in 1908 by the firm of Adolph Hess (Lyman Low had sold part of it in 1902). The knowledge exhibited in this letter by Ulex is impressive, and he cites Breton, LeRoux and Zay, all of whose works he is clearly familiar. Much of the letter is about the "Holey Dollars." McLachlan Correspondence with James Verity

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH JAMES VERITY. Earlsheaton, Dewsbury, England, 1873–1886. Twenty-two items. Folded for mailing; generally near fine. \$300

James Verity (1845–1910) was a British coin dealer who operated out of Dewsbury, Yorkshire during the years covered by these letters. Verity first wrote to McLachlan in January of 1873, introducing himself and sending him his coin catalogues. Noting that "there is keen competition in England for any coins or medals appertaining to America," Verity nonetheless offers to serve as McLachlan's agent in that country. McLachlan, in turn, sent copies of the *Canadian Antiquarian and Numismatic Journal* to Verity and tried to use him to promote the Society in England. The correspondence here present covers 1873 and 1874, with one printed "notice of removal" dated 1886 also included. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

McLachlan Correspondence with Adolph Weyl

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH ADOLPH WEYL. Berlin, Germany, 1884–1888. Seven items, on Weyl's business stationery. One letter includes a rubbing of a medal, with an accompanying printed description. Folded for mailing; very good or better. \$200

The Adolph Weyl firm made a specialty of offering important collections of *überseeischer Münzen*, often featuring extensive selections of North, Central and South American coins, tokens and medals. The famous 1879 Fonrobert sale, for example, featured over 6,000 lots of North American coins, tokens and medals and several thousand Central and South American lots. The firm was prolific in its production of auction catalogues, fixed price lists and periodicals (they were the publishers of the *Berliner Münzblätter* starting in 1880), but died with the man himself in December 1901. McLachlan was one of several advanced collectors and dealers from North America who corresponded with Weyl, with Weyl noting Lyman Low in his June 1, 1884 letter here present (a letter that is important for mentioning his upcoming autumn sale, which is well-known today for including what is now known as the Dexter example of the 1804 dollar). McLachlan appears mostly to have purchased jetons (some of which are described as Canadian, implying their being Franco-American jetons) through Weyl. McLachlan Correspondence with Thomas Wilson

McLachlan, R.W. [recipient]. CORRESPONDENCE WITH THOMAS WILSON. Clarence, New York, 1870–1885. Eighty-two items, some addressed to "Sir," and including a three-sheet listing and description of various coins. Folded for mailing; typical minor wear. Generally near fine. \$900

Arguably the most important group of letters in the McLachlan correspondence. Wilson (1824–1919) was a major collector of Canadian coins, medals and tokens, and was a confident and friend of McLachlan's (though their correspondence retained a rather formal air). He did not begin collecting until around 1870, when he was 46 years old, but made up for the late start through a combination of alacrity and longevity. In his obituary notice for Wilson, written for the February 1920 issue of *The Numismatist*, McLachlan wrote, "On every occasion when he came to Montreal he never failed to wind up the day by spending the evening with me, talking coins, and to see if I had made any new acquisitions since his last visit, and if he did not possess a specimen he noted it and never rested contented until he had obtained one for himself, his object being to complete his Canadian series, if possible. So nearly did he arrive at his goal that there were only ten or twelve wanting of the known Canadians, and most of these unobtainable or unique." P.N. Breton included Wilson's photograph and biography in his 1894 *Illustrated History of Coins and Tokens Relating to Canada*, writing that "taking into consideration the condition of each coin, his collection has no equal." The letters present in this lot focus almost exclusively on coins, frequently discussing specific die varieties and occasionally including rubbings. Some of the early letters discuss making restrikes from a set of bouquet sou dies, and the difficulties they were encountering in so doing. This correspondence would be well worth the effort involved in editing and publishing it. Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.



This large lot of correspondence, being almost entirely numismatic, is of considerable importance for the snapshot it gives us not only of McLachlan himself but of active Canadian numismatists during McLachlan's life. In lieu of a biographical synopsis of McLachlan (we reprint Breton's biographical statement of him elsewhere in this catalogue), what follows are comments on a small number of correspondents whose letters to McLachlan particularly struck us. A 1916 letter from the American Numismatic Association informs McLachlan that "Your name has been placed in nomination for the office of President of the American Numismatic Association." Writing in 1879, D.T. Batty writes, "Before I can commence with the Colonial Copper I must first get rid of the 'Regal,' which will occupy some time... I have not seen Neumann's work but it is I believe very extensive & expensive." S.H. Hamer, writing in 1917 on Conder tokens, writes, "Anglesey 377a. is rare because of the edge only, as are many tokens, but, unless some very special circumstance or event is connected with the specimen, I should not give an extravagant price for simply a specimen struck on a blank which was never intended to be used with the dies in question." Barclay V. Head, of the British Museum, passes along apologies: "Mr. Park desires me to inform you that his official time is so fully occupied that he is utterly unable to comply with your request as to the Coins and Medals of Canada. The only coin catalogues at present in course of publication by the Museum are those of the Greek, Roman, and Oriental series of coins and medals." Ralph Heaton, of Birmingham, writes two interesting 1879 letters pertaining to work conducted for Canada by the famous Birmingham firm: "With regard to the Canadian Cents 1858 it is quite possible these were struck at the Royal Mint London, from blanks supplied by us to that establishment." Charles Morris, in poor health after the death of his wife, offers in 1904 to sell his collection of "about 1255" communion tokens to McLachlan for \$1050; He also writes that "I am going to have my first sale before long by the Chapmans but cannot tell when yet but there will be but very few Canadian coins in it. My second sale will be

Stainsfield, of London, discusses the upcoming Fonrobert sale in Berlin, held by the firm of Adolph Weyl, the Canadian coins in the British Museum, the role of the Heaton firm in striking Canadian coins, and much else (Stainsfield handled McLachlan's bidding in the Fonrobert sale, and he reports upon the poor results—from McLachlan's standpoint, that is). H.R. Storer writes, "I have but very few Canadians, & those unimportant, collected but incidentally, as part of a general cabinet." Storer goes on to discuss various items in his collection and asks McLachlan if he knows of "a Nova Scotia 'cholera token'" that was catalogued in H.P. Smith's 1885 sale of the Burleigh collection. Any attempt to truly catalogue this massive amount of material would be fruitless, but there is an enormous amount of interesting information to be found in this collection of letters from nearly 150 numismatists active in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Richard Cooper Special Collection: Numismatic Manuscripts of R.W. McLachlan

Robert Wallace McLachlan was born in Montreal on March 9, 1845. A lifelong resident, he completed his education at McGill University and served as an official in the archives department of the Montreal Court House and also as a notary public for many years. At age twelve be began collecting coins while attending McGill Model School and five years later came under the tutelage of Joshua L. Bronsdon, a well-known early Canadian numismatist. He was elected a member of the Numismatic Society of Montreal in 1864, acting over the years in every official capacity save that of president. He was also a member of the Royal Society of Canada, serving as president in 1915. Bowman considered him to be "without doubt the foremost authority on Canadian numismatics." His prolific oeuvre spans half a century; Bowman records over 100 titles and 77 citations are found in the American Numismatic Society catalogue. McLachlan's entire collection of some 20,000 pieces, and his numismatic library of about 500 volumes and 5,000 pamphlets, was acquired by the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal in 1922, partly by gift and partly by purchase. Subsequently the collection was placed in the home of the Society, remaining in the Château de Ramezay museum for many years after McLachlan's death in 1926. The opportunity to acquire original numismatic manuscripts of such significance is indeed an unusual and special occurrence.



The Canadian section now includes a "Not in Sandham" section. In the American section, the 1793–1796, 1799, 1804, 1813 and 1814 cents are no longer included though the relevant spaces have been left open. On the last page, the holdings of the Society are given as of December 11, 1877: "1055 coins / 100 medals & medalets / 60 books." 1878 and 1879 holdings are given also. 





All but the index leaves are used to accommodate hundreds of ephemeral items primarily devoted to the early years of the hobby in Canada, including: newspaper clippings; coin and medal illustrations from printed sources; advertisements for coins, medals and numismatic publications; a few specimens of cloth and leather with identifying information; drawings, including Sandham's sketch of a design for a medal commemorating the 227th anniversary of the founding of Montreal; photographic plates from Edward Cogan's catalogue of the Mortimer Mackenzie collection, including the plate of ancient gold coins, a plate of early large cents, a plate of Washington medals, and a plate of European medals; clipped photographs from the 1863 Catalogue of the Silver & Copper Coins of Canada and of the Other British North American Provinces published by the Numismatic Society of Montreal; clippings from publications such as Bushnell's An Historical Account of the First Three Business Tokens Issued in the City of New York; tables taken from the American Journal of Numismatics; circulars and other mailed items, including sale announcements (e.g., Cogan's announcement of the Mackenzie sale), invitations and receipts; "rough sketches used by the artist (Mr. Manning) as designs for the head of the Address presented by the City Council to H.R.H. Prince Arthur on his arrival at Montreal 1869"; a handwritten "List of Coins &c presented by Alfred Sandham to the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal," with entries dated 1866 to 1869; and much else. Binding falling apart, with spine lacking and both boards detached; occasional items have been removed from the scrapbook, though the vast majority of what was ever included herein remains in place. A handful of later clippings are laid in. Front pastedown and flyleaf with ink stamp of P.. Belanger. Contents very good, overall.

A wonderful compendium of ephemera from the early years of organized numismatics in Canada, with much of it devoted to material pertaining to the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal. The scrapbook begins with clipped reviews of Sandham's 1869 *Coins, Tokens and Medals of the Dominion of Canada*, with the sources and dates recorded. Hundreds of coin and medal illustrations are found throughout, clipped from a wide variety of mostly unidentified sources. An assortment of printed matter is included, generally of an ephemeral nature: announcements, advertisements, invitations, receipts, acknowledgments, etc. The photographs include some very early instances of numismatic photography, including clippings from the first photographically illustrated numismatic work published in North American (the 1863 Montreal catalogue listed above) and the first photographically illustrated numismatic auction catalogue from North America (Edward Cogan's 1869 Mackenzie sale). Enough of the items bear Sandham's name or have some immediate connection with him to make, in the absence of indications to the contrary, attribution to him rather firm. An important piece of numismatic history. Sandham's 1869 Foundational Work on Canadian Coins

The copies listed below of Alfred Sandham's *Coins, Tokens and Medals of the Dominion of Canada* comprise a unique assemblage of special presentation copies and highly personalized examples of the first catalogue of Canadian coins published in Canada. Reference is made to Warren Baker's *The First Twelve Years: Canadian Numismatic Publishing 1863–1875* (Montreal, 1989), which discusses in detail the earliest Canadian numismatic works.

The first substantial work on Canadian coins and tokens. Very scarce. An early member of the Montreal Numismatic Society, Sandham initiated publication of the Canadian Antiquarian and Numismatic Journal in 1872 and served as its editor for several years. In many ways, Sandham's work resembles that of Crosby for the United States. Not only is it foundational and of continued importance, but even its genesis was similar. Warren Baker told the story well in his November 2014 list (item 46): "This work was intended to be that of a committee of the Numismatic & Antiquarian Society of Montreal, formed to replace the work that had been started in 1863, but abandoned due mostly to the death of James Rattray. Finding it difficult to get members together in support of the new project, particularly as a result of Bronsdon's withdrawal, Sandham determined on a self-publication using the Society's printer, Daniel Rose, a dedicated numismatist himself. ... The book was sold by subscription, five hundred copies having been printed, a rather large production at that time, and perhaps even for today considering the specialization of the subject. Ninety-three subscribers accounted for 110 copies of the book, and there were thirtyseven complimentary copies. Five dealers were consigned seventy-one copies, of which Mason & Co. of Philadelphia had sixteen. Dawson Brothers of Montreal were given eighteen copies to sell. The work is still necessary for any collector of the Canadian colonial coin series, and for anyone interested in the first completed numismatic catalogue published in Canada." An extraordinary copy of this groundbreaking work, being the interleaved copy used by the author to record changes and additions in case of a second edition. A detailed note in the hand of the author explains: "Note. This work was commenced in 1867 but difficulties having arisen in the efforts made to procure information and also with reference to arrangements with Mr. Bronsdon (who was originally associated in the work but whose business engagements prevented his aiding in the work) delayed the issue of the book until April 1869. Since the publication of the work some omissions have been discovered and some new coins have been issued. In this copy the additions

are made for the purpose of aiding the author should a second edition ever be issued. The present edition consists of 500 copies and as the title page shows was printed by Mr. D. Rose. The lithographed plates were drawn by the author and printed by Messrs. Geo. Bishop & Co., Great St. James St. and the binding was executed by Mr. John Parslow, St. Paul Street. The cut on page 7 is by Mr. H. Sandham, brother of the author. Those on the frontispiece and on pages 55 & 59 by J.H. Walker, Engraver, Montreal. The balance are by a new process known as Leggotypes and were made from drawings by the author. Since the issue of the work several favorable notices have been given by the press and many flattering letters have been received from prominent numismatists in the U. States & other places. 



"This book is now (1873) out of print," writes Sandham beneath his inscription. Adélard J. Boucher was one of the founders of the Numismatic Society of Montreal, which was established in December 1862, and served as its first president. Early the next year, Boucher was appointed to a committee with J.L. Bronsdon, L.A.H. Latour, and James Rattray tasked with compiling a catalogue of the coins of Canada and other parts of British North America. Toward the end of 1863, the committee published the first—and, as it turned out only—installment of their work, focusing on the coins of Lower Canada and the Province of Canada. According to Warren Baker (3), "the ill health and subsequent death of James Rattray, the senior member of the group, dampened the ardour of the others to continue and the project met the same fate as its senior participant." The work conducted by the committee was impressive for its time and reflected the care taken by the members. It was not surpassed until Sandham's work was published in 1869. CNB page 42. 



An interesting copy, acquired only two months after publication by a figure little-known to the numismatic world, but rather prominent in other areas of life. Dr. William H. Stennett was born in 1832 in the Province of Ontario. He emigrated to the United States at age 17 and commenced medical studies that led to his being graduated from the Medical University of St. Louis in 1859. He practiced in Bloomington, Illinois, but undertook a change of career in 1867, giving up the medical practice for a position with the Illinois Central Railroad Company at St. Louis, later working for the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company and being associated with the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha Railway Company. An amateur historian, he published two major works on the railways, including A History of the Origin of the Place Names Connected with the Chicago and Northwestern Railway, and the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha Railway (1908). He was a book collector and a horticulturist; while his acquisition of Sandham's book so soon after its publication indicates some level of enthusiasm for the topic, there appears to be little record of him in the numismatic literature. 

Haven on American Antiquarian Society stationery (Worcester, 1872), thanking Sandham for his donation of several works written or published by him; 6) a six-page letter to R.W. McLachlan from Sandham (1896), with final page mostly given over to sketches by Sandham of eight coats of arms which he is asking McLachlan's help in identifying; 7) a further letter to R.W. McLachlan from Sandham (1897), on arms and other topics; 8) a letter from Sandham written to an unidentified recipient on Canadian Historical Journal letterhead (Toronto, 1897), on seals, heraldry, etc., and 9) a letter to one Mr. Benjamin from Sandham (Toronto, 1906). The very scarce Special Leatherbound Edition, the best issue of the first comprehensive work on the numismatic history of the California Gold Rush. Edgar Adams (1868–1940) dominated American numismatic research in the first quarter of the twentieth century. His other landmark works on patterns and storecards and his famous series of illustrated notebooks on various series, many of which reside in the library of the American Numismatic Society, eloquently attest to his virtuosity. In his obituary, Farran Zerbe noted: "In the passing of Edgar H. Adams ... numismatics loses a grand character, one who starred in its literature for many years." Only a small number of special leatherbound copies of *Private Gold Coinage of California* appear to have been made from "the first complete edition of one hundred copies," the great majority of which were apparently bound in crimson cloth. Several versions of the book were published, with introductions of 16, 20 or 24 pages. Most of the few existing copies of the leatherbound edition are well-worn, and this example is better than most. Joseph Florimond Loubat's Medallic History of the United States is the spiritual ancestor of the present volume. Elegantly printed on sumptuous paper, Loubat's magnum opus sets a standard of scholarly excellence that has not been matched and to which, immodestly, we aspire.

Between the timeless craftsmanship of Bird & Bull Press and the actual leaf

from Loubat, the authors seek to reinforce the message that our early medals were intended to convey. It is a noble message. We hope that this special edition

Its founder, Dr. George Francis Heath, was, in essence, a collector, and the publication has always endeavored to serve first the needs of coin collectors. About the time that the *American Journal of Numismatics* became exclusively a scholarly journal, *The Numismatist* unfurled its banner. It is filled with vignettes of collectors of the day, results of important sales, and fascinating gossip on a wide variety of topics. Numismatic scholars will also find much of interest in its pages, with significant articles on a wide variety of subjects appearing through the years. It is an unparalleled, comprehensive chronicle of coin collecting in America from the turn of the century to the present. 

Originally, George Heath titled his little publication *The American Numismatist*, but after the first issue the name was shortened to *The Numismatist*, perhaps to avoid conflict with C.E. Leal's *The American Numismatist*, which had appeared two years before (interesting commentary on both publications may be found in Joel J. Orosz's "The Printer's Devil," appearing in the Winter 1997 issue of *The Asylum*). While the first two volumes of the publication are extreme rarities, the third through sixth volumes are infrequently offered. 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to Adelson's The American Numismatic Society, 1858-1958, this first printing of the Constitution of the longest surviving numismatic society in the United States was adopted at the April 6, 1858 meeting of the Society. He goes on to relate that the "Constitution which had been adopted so quickly at the first regular meeting was duly published with the list of officers and members of the standing committees, but no sooner was this done than proposals were made to revise that document and the By-Laws. At the fifth meeting on July 13, 1858, some modifications were suggested in the wording of the first article of the Constitution which would have removed the emphasis that had been placed on American coinage and medallic productions... At the meeting of September 14, 1858... the new Constitution was adopted." Indeed, this first printing includes the phrase, "its objects shall be the collection and preservation of the coins and medals struck in this country, with an investigation into their history..." This is the first publication listed by Belden in his Medals and Publications of the American Numismatic Society with an Historical Sketch (1915). The only copy of this rarity sold in the modern era that we recall was in the Armand Champa Library (Davis/Bowers Sale I, lot 34), where the bidders failed to adequately appreciate it—it sold under estimate. On March 8, 1866, resident member Joseph N.T. Levick proposed the establishment by the American Numismatic and Archæological Society of a journal of "numismatic and archaeological intelligence." His suggestion was quickly adopted and the inaugural issue appeared in late May of the same year. Many of America's greatest contributions to numismatic scholarship first appeared in the pages of this most important publication. Crosby's classic works on large cents, parts of his Early Coins of America, Frey's Dictionary of Numismatic Names, Edgar Adams's extensive work on California pioneer gold coins and, later on, the scholarly, still indispensable studies on ancient Greek coins by Newell, Baldwin Brett, and others are but a small sampling. The version of the Levick plate here present is the second version, with Levick's name typeset, without the Rockwood blindstamp. A notable set of these scarce publications. The *Proceedings* are an under-utilized source of numismatic information, featuring notable monographs (highlighted perhaps by Zabriskie's classic work on Lincoln medals in the 1901 issue), information on the Society itself, and obituaries of famous American numismatists that routinely include information found nowhere else. Before 1878, the *Proceedings* were printed in the *American Journal of Numismatics*; a separate *Index* to the *Proceedings* may be found in the *American Journal of Numismatics Index*, published in volume 51 of that publication and also separately. Unfortunately, the paper on which many of the early *Proceedings* volumes was published is very acidic and has become brittle with age. This is especially true of the paper used for the covers. As a result, most extant copies of the early *Proceedings* are much the worse for wear, and they have survived in small numbers. Only the third example we have handled in over half a century of experience. Barra's innovative work comprises most interesting descriptions and a "List of Coins" in the collection of a '49er. The author credits Dickeson's 1861 edition of the *American Numismatic Manual*, and notes that coin prices were derived from Thompson's *Coin Chart Manual*. A delightful two page account of "The United States Branch Mint, San Francisco" is also included. Ezekiel I. Barra arrived in San Francisco in late 1849 aboard the *Urania*, and lived in the city at least into the 1890s. Much interesting information on Barra's activities can be found in Q. 



Several school books owned by Virgil M. Brand as a teenager, with five of them bearing his signature and one with a signed piece of school-assigned art by him. Brand was born in 1862, and the books here present that are both signed and dated are dated 1877 or 1878, when he was 15 or 16 years old. As such, they are likely the earliest extant books that can be attributed to his library. While obviously not numismatic, they are of considerable interest for biographical reasons.

The very rare first edition, one of perhaps half a dozen in private hands. A prominent citizen of Philadelphia, Breck (1771–1862) was the author of many historical addresses and dissertations. This essay on the paper currency of the Revolution is considered by the *Dictionary of American Biography* to be his most notable work. Reissued in 1863 by the important early American coin collector A.C. Kline, it is one of the earliest American numismatic works to be reprinted. In his preface of his reprint, Kline states: "This pamphlet has now become of such rarity that its purchase is an utter impossibility, while at the same time an almost universal desire to obtain everything connected with the History of Continental Money, has caused considerable inquiry to be made for it." Very scarce. Burleigh's seventh and final sale, and the only one issued with photographic illustrations. Most notable for Conder tokens, the plate depicts a 1633 Gustavus Adolphus medal, 1791 English Sedition token, 1796 Buonaparte lead medal, the Baltimore Harrison Log Cabin Medal, and four 18th-century English tokens. Little appears to be known about Burleigh. He is not listed in Mercer's *Numismatic Directory for 1881*, nor is his name found among the officers of the Numismatic and Archaeological Society of Baltimore. Apparently, the competition from the auction sales conducted in Baltimore at the same time by Dr. George Massamore proved to be too strong. This does not reflect particularly well on Burleigh, however, since John Adams notes in his work on 19th-century American coin auctioneers that "Of all the catalogers chronicled in these pages, Massamore is the most easily forgotten." Indeed, Burleigh's cataloguing seems uninspired at best and the text is riddled with typographical errors. All of Burleigh's sales appear to be scarce if not rare. Ex Donald M. 

The text in this second edition has been significantly augmented, and the appendix, "showing the prices which the tokens described in this work have realized, at various times, at public auction, in this city," has been updated to include results from the November 2, 1859 H. Whitmore sale, the Bangs, Merwin sale of December 15, 1859 (referred to as belonging to Ezra Hill by Bushnell), and the December 19, 1859 J.N.T. Levick sale. It was almost certainly printed after 1859, probably a few years after, despite retaining the July 1, 1859-dated Preface. The advertisement leaf has been deleted from this edition. This text was also included in most copies of Bushnell's 1864-dated compendium *Crumbs for Antiquarians*. 
Adams 9, with plates. One of the landmarks of American numismatic literature. The Bushnell collection was the stuff of fables, being well-known, yet little seen. After Bushnell's death in 1880, a number of prominent dealers attempted to obtain the collection, but it was the Chapman brothers who, to the surprise of many, made off with the prize. Of the five hundred copies of the Bushnell catalogue printed, one hundred were supposedly issued with plates. Judging from their frequency of appearance on the market, it is probable that fewer were actually distributed. Five of the plates depict colonials, along with early patterns; three illustrate medals; one depicts Washington pieces; one illustrates rare United States gold and silver coins; and two depict cents and half cents. The Bushnell sale was the first large format auction catalogue issued by the Chapmans with plates. It established the brothers as the dominant force in American numismatics, a position they were to occupy both collectively and independently for the following half century. Unmercifully criticized at the time for various typographical and factual errors, passions soon cooled and a landmark catalogue remained. The brothers had set a new standard: oversize format, thick paper, new type, gilt letters, photographically produced plates and detailed if sometimes controversial descriptions. All were welcome innovations and the furor raised at the time has secured the Bushnell sale catalogue a greater fame. Even today it remains a landmark in American numismatics, remarkable for its rare and unique colonial coins, Washingtonia, and historical American medals and tokens. These "reprints" used original copies of the sales that had been part of the hoard of Chapman catalogues found in the Henry Chapman estate and the photographic negatives (which were in John Ford's possession). Perhaps as few as 20 copies of each were reproduced. The Bement sale (rated A- overall, A for all European categories) featured an outstanding collection of European coins, the choicest and rarest of which are depicted on the plates. John Story Jenks began collecting coins around 1850 and was 82 years of age when his collection was sold. Chapman claimed that "He is probably the oldest collector in the United States, and nearly every important sale has contributed to his collection." Twenty years his junior, Henry Chapman was still at the height of his considerable powers: "Suffice it to say I have not spared my faculties, energy or money to give in this catalogue full descriptions of the coins contained in this grand collection." For years the Jenks catalogue served as the best American single reference guide to the entire range of numismatics. Of great importance for the fine array of ancient Greek and Roman coins alone, also featured was an incredible selection of medieval and modern European rarities, and an especially important and extensive series of British coins. The American coins, from colonials to pioneer gold, were also of prime importance. Previously Unrecorded Plated Gable Catalogue Printed on Fine Paper

An exciting recent discovery. At first glance, it is obvious that this copy is special, being exceptionally well-preserved in the original paper covers and with essentially perfect contents—fresh plates, no internal chipping, virtually untouched. Closer examination quickly draws attention to the paper on which the catalogue is printed. It is subtly tinted, noticeably heavier, and is smoother to the touch than the paper used in other Chapman catalogues. It bears no watermark, but the Chapman Brothers used a variety of papers in their catalogues: a quick survey of half a dozen large-format Chapmans revealed Chester Laid, Oxford Laid, and Double Antique watermarks, and two of those checked-Mills and Parsons-used paper with no watermark at all. Direct comparison to another plated copy of the Gable sale confirmed our suspicions, however. The papers used look different and feel different, with the paper used in this example being obviously superior. This copy is printed on what is known as "paper vellum"—specially prepared and treated paper that resembles the calfskin-based vellum of earlier periods. George Kolbe recalls handling a similar copy of the Gable sale perhaps forty years ago, but never described it in print and never encountered another Chapman catalogue on similar paper. Exactly why it was printed remains a matter of speculation. According to a note in the hand of Donald Miller (laid in to this volume), Miller acquired this copy from Gerald Patton in 1981; Patton had acquired of from a Betty Gable Ansley, suggesting strongly that this had been in the library of the consignor. William Francis Gable (1856-1921) was a serious bibliophile, with his excellent library totaling over 35,000 volumes at the time of his death; the American Art Association sold the library in a series of seven auctions, with some additional material sold separately a decade later. Anthony Kroll and Elva Marshall's Collecting Books and Autographs: William F. Gable (Pasadena: Castle Press for the Roxburghe and Zamorano Clubs, 1992) makes it clear that however advanced Gable's coin collection may have been, his library ranked first in his affections, and he had a particular fondness for works printed on vellum. This would seem to explain why Chapman took the unusual step of having a copy or two printed on this special paper.

The sale itself is Adams 13, rated A- overall: "NE shilling. 1792 disme. 1843 proof set. MS 1798/7 \$10. Proof 1875 \$3. Excellent silver, copper, patterns." Gable was the proprietor of an "immense department store" and, according to Chapman, his coin collection was formed "between the years 1890 and 1901, since which time he has been so engrossed in affairs that he has added practically nothing to it." Nonetheless, it was an exceptional collection of American coins in all metals, particularly rich in United States gold coins. The first plate depicts ancient Greek and Jewish coins, along with European crowns; the second plate illustrates colonials; five plates depict choice United States gold coins; three plates illustrate silver dollars, and one depicts other United States silver coins; two plates are devoted to cents and a few half cents; the final plate depicts rare patterns. The attractive halftone portraits of Gable and Chapman were both taken in the photographic department of Gable's establishment. The coin photography was, as usual, superbly executed by Samuel Hudson Chapman, producing "plates printed by direct contact from the original negatives." In the sale announcement flyer (not present in this copy), he continues: "The object of plates in the catalog of an auction sale is to represent the state of preservation of the coins and it is, therefore, essential to use the process that will give us the most exact reproduction of the original. After trying all other processes, I went back years ago to the original method. The half-tone process cannot equal it because a screen is interposed to break up the image so that it can be printed in ink; and this image, of course, will not bear magnification for examination as to die varieties or preservation because it then separates into its component dots." 

A highly important copy of the revised second edition of this work, from the library of the author, accompanied by the calling card (with black border denoting mourning) of Mrs. S. Hudson Chapman, and—most importantly the original photographic plates taken for (both editions of) the book. These are clearly the photographs from which the collotype plates in the published volumes were prepared. They are similar to other Chapman photographs, bear his stamp, and are annotated by him in pencil. The images are clear and, aside from some minor wear relegated mostly to the blank margins, they are well preserved. It is generally believed that only 200 copies were printed of the 1926 edition, split between two issues: the first has lettering on the spine and is apparently always encountered numbered; the second does not have spine lettering and is unnumbered. As far as we can tell, the 1923 first edition is always numbered under 100; the first printing of the second edition is always numbered between 100 and 200. Copy No. 100 exists, though nothing about it indicates that it was treated differently than any other copy. This is copy No. 101, and it obviously is special and was retained by the author. Of this work, Dr. Sheldon wrote: "The Chapman monograph is illustrated by excellent plates, and it is perhaps the most generally adequate presentation of the subject. However, the older Hays numbers seem to have taken deep root in the affections of cent collectors, and it now appears likely that the name Hays will long be associated with this the most extensive one-date series of American coins." Denis Loring was the first to draw attention to the two printings of this edition, in the Fall 1994 issue of *The Asylum*. In addition to the differences in the bindings (by which they are most readily distinguished), he enumerated a number of textual differences observed as well—the plates are identical in the 1923 edition and both printings of the 1926 edition. The First Work on Civil War Tokens

Chase, Pliny E. CATALOGUE OF TOKENS, CIRCULATING DURING THE REBELLION OF 1861. (Philadelphia, 1863). 8vo, self-covered. 19, (1) pages. Annotated in pencil. Very good.

A rare 1863 offprint from the Proceedings of the American Philosophical Society, appearing as an article the same year in Volume IX, pages 242-258. While obviously eclipsed by subsequent works, Chase's landmark study remains of use in that it establishes with certainty that all tokens listed were produced no later than September 1863. Based on the collection in the cabinet of the American Philosophical Society, varieties described from other collections are identified by an asterisk. The author notes that "Collectors and others who may wish to assist in completing the collection of Token currency in the Cabinet of the American Philosophical Society, may send specimens, duplicates, or descriptions of such varieties as are not mentioned in this catalogue..." Chase carefully describes 303 pieces, arranging them in seven different categories: 1) Business Cards; 2) Portraits; 3) Equestrian Statues, Fancy Heads, and Human Figures; 4) Animals; 5) Flags; 6) Miscellaneous Devices; and 7) Mottoes. A remarkable contemporaneous effort to record these still underappreciated metallic memorials of the Civil War. We are able to trace only a few other copies in private hands: 1) the Fuld copy, later in the library of Eric P. Newman and sold for \$2200 hammer in 2018; 2) the S. Alofsen copy, sold in the 1995 Joint Kolbe/Spink New York Book Auction (lot 321) for \$550; 3) the Isaac F. Wood copy, sold as part of the John J. Ford, Jr. Library in 2004 (Kolbe Sale 92, lot 356) for \$1300; and 4) the copy sold in Kolbe Sale 110 (lot 1) in 2009 for \$1650. Neither Champa nor Bass owned a copy. Pliny Earle Chase (1820-1886), was a teacher and scientist of some renown. Many of the results of his various scientific researches were published in the Proceedings of the American Philosophical Society and in European scientific journals. He served as vice president of the American Philosophical Society and his published works include several on arithmetic and Elements of Meteorology (Philadelphia, 1884). A virtually unimprovable copy. Acquired as mementos of a trip to America at the end of the 18th century, the great importance and superb condition of the run of 1794 large cents and the 1794 and 1795 silver coins (including two mint state 1794 dollars) in this noteworthy sale were not fully appreciated by Christie's at the time. Consequently, the print run was not large and copies of this remarkable catalogue are infrequently available and in great demand. Ex Wayne Homren Library.




A remarkable presentation copy, with an inscription reading: "To Caroline M. Opperman, whose careful writing and editing greatly helped the production of this book. (*signed*) Geo. H Clapp." No. 9 of only 126 copies bound in cloth, of an entire edition of 135. A classic work, the photographic plates of which are the finest of any large cent reference. This handsome production and Newcomb's 1925 work before it set a new standard. Carefully written, painstakingly researched and wonderfully illustrated, they eclipsed all previous efforts. One of the founders and president of Aluminum Company of America, Clapp wrote in an April 16, 1932 letter (lot 192 in our 1993 ANA sale) to Michael Powills, that "there is no doubt but that I was foolish in putting out the book in such an expensive form, but I took a pride in my work and wanted it to be a credit to the subject, so hunted up the best printer that I could find and told him to do his best." Clapp included the 1799 varieties only after realizing that his 1799 No. 1 was struck before 1798 Nos. 46 and 47. Davis 239. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

The two printed works are rarely offered: John Ford acquired his copies the year after publication and paid a princely \$150 for them. Carefully researched and issued in a very small edition, the work was not offered for sale but was presented to friends of the author interested in the topic. Cobb's foreword bears repeating: "A collector who shall remain nameless wrote in 1953 as follows: 'Economically, each of us acts like a Robinson Crusoe on his own little island of interest—we fail to arouse the interest of new people and thus encourage competition for ourselves. Each guards his own particular island of interest. Yet, unless such competition is encouraged, who will appreciate his collection? Who will know anything of the vast amount of information one has acquired about the subject he collects and each of the pieces in his collection? Usually the collector dies with his knowledge lost. This is perhaps the most serious loss of all—this loss of knowledge—because often the collector's sources of knowledge are also dead.' This is the basic reason for this compilation of facts, presented herein." Ex Donald M. Miller Library; ex Wayne Homren Library.





J.N.T. Levick's Copy of the Original Manuscript Record of Cogan's 1859 Foote Sale

"Mr. Foote employed a person to write a number of catalogues with prices, which he distributed among his friends. I happened to be one of those friends, and therefore am fortunate enough to hold now one of his rare catalogues."

A wonderful item, being an original manuscript account of Edward Cogan's March 1859 sale of the coin collection formed by Charles B. Foote, comprising Sale 2 in the Cogan series. The first four Cogan sales were not conducted as traditional auctions, though they have always been included in listings of his catalogues. They were conducted from a manuscript listing in Cogan's office, either as sealed-bid sales (1), what appear to be "buy or bid" sales (2 and 3), or as an auction without printed catalogue (4). Emmanuel J. Attinelli described the first Cogan sale thusly:

This sale, although perhaps not strictly an "auction sale," yet so closely approaches it, that it is given a place here. The coins were exhibited at Mr. Cogan's store, and bids for the various pieces were made in sealed letters, which letters, nineteen in number, were, in accordance with a previous understanding, opened on the 1st day of November; the highest bidder for any particular piece was to be regarded as the purchaser. (*Numisgraphics*, page 13)

The Foote sale was conducted in a somewhat different manner, with Attinelli writing (page 14) that "This was not an auction sale, upset prices were placed on the pieces, competition was invited, with the results described [in Attinelli's entry for the sale]." This cataloguer is inclined to interpret "upset prices" as meaning prices at which the coins could be purchased outright, especially given a comment made by Mark Collet that "This collection was not sold by Auction, but was retailed between 7th & 14th March 1859" (see below). The Gratz sale, Cogan's third, was conducted in the same manner. Cogan printed an edition of his first sale in 1863 to meet collector demand; Attinelli printed limited editions of Cogan's Sales 2–4 from borrowed manuscripts shortly thereafter. The Attinelli printing of the Foote catalogue was made from a manuscript provided by Foote himself—which is highly interesting, since it does not exactly match the manuscript here present.

This copy was presented in October 1859 to well-known collector "Mr. J.N.T. Levick, with Compliments of C.B. Foote. Octo. 1859." Following the inscription is a photographic portrait of Foote, neatly trimmed and mounted—a fascinating addition to this copy. Aside from the presentation inscription to Levick, the notebook is unsigned. Clarity regarding its production is provided in the October 1868 issue of the *American Journal of Numismatics*, where J.N.T. Levick provided "A Table Exhibiting the Prices Paid for the Five Types of the 1793 Cent of the United States, Selected from Twenty of the Most Prominent Coin-Sales in the Country from 1855 to 1868." In his introduction to the table, he writes:

The collections of Chas. B. Foote and Simon Gratz, of Philadelphia, were sold by Mr. Cogan in his store; and no printed catalogues were ever issued, but copies were preserved by many collectors in manuscript, for they were then considered very fine collections, and sold at high prices. Mr. Foote employed a person to write a number of catalogues with prices, which he distributed among his friends. I happened to be one of those friends, and therefore am fortunate enough to hold now one of his rare catalogues.

This is the exact copy Levick describes. As mentioned before, it differs somewhat from the edition printed by Attinelli. The Attinelli edition assigns each lot a number, listing a total of 273 lots, including a group of material sold directly to Cogan to close out the sale. The manuscript account does not assign numbers to the lots. It lists each piece individually, suggesting that this is how they were sold. For instance, the Attinelli edition lists eight lots of 1794 large cents, numbering twelve

pieces total: there are twelve separate listings in the manuscript. The total value of the lots is the same, but the method of listing them is different. This difference between the Foote/Levick manuscript account and the Attinelli printed edition continues, with coins usually listed separately in the manuscript regardless of whether they sold separately or as a group (and some did seem to sell as group lots). There are exceptions, such as the 1858 proof set, all eight pieces of which are recorded as being sold as a set in both versions; the larger bulk lots are also recorded simply as a lot in both versions. Attinelli lists the collection in 273 lots; the manuscript lists them in 325 (both including the lots bought in by Cogan). No coins appear to be present in only one version, and the proceeds are the same. The order of presentation is somewhat different.

While Foote may well have commissioned manuscript compilations of "a number of catalogues with prices," they certainly haven't survived in any number. The only other copy to be sold on the secondary market of which we are aware was the copy prepared for Major J. Ledyard Hodge sold by us in our 2016 New York Book Auction (lot 428) for \$11,000 hammer. A somewhat different manuscript of the Foote sale exists in a bound volume compiled by Mark Wilkes Collet, a promising Philadelphia numismatist who was killed at the Battle of Chancellorsville. This volume, sold by George Kolbe in his June 1990 sale of material from the John W. Adams library, had manuscript versions of Cogan Sales 1, 2 and 4. Written on 8 pages and arranged in 309 lots, it may have been the work of Collet himself, as the copies commissioned by Foote appear to be more or less identical. There has not been a copy of the Attinelli edition of the Foote sale sold in the modern era to the best of our knowledge; the ANS Library owns the only copy of which we are aware.


Very little is known about Foote's numismatic interests. He was apparently a very young man at the time of the sale, having been born in 1837. An energetic start seems to have been typical of him, however, as he moved from his native Bridgeport, Connecticut, to New York city at a young age and joined the firm of Fisk & Hatch—which by 1867 was the firm of Hatch & Foote. Set back by the Panic of 1884, he struggled on with business in a less prominent role. Later in life he made a name for himself as a book collector; it would seem that numismatics was a passing fancy for him. He died in September 1900.


J.N.T. Levick (1828–1908) was one of the most active and important numismatists in the early American scene. He was an early member of the American Numismatic and Archaeological Society in New York, and it was he who urged the Society to establish the *American Journal of Numismatics*. His research on early U.S. large cents led him to compile what has come to be known as the "Levick plate," a fine photographic plate illustrating the die varieties of the cents of 1793. This famous photograph, included in the April 1869 issue of the *AJN* accompanied by an article on the subject by Sylvester S. Crosby, is considered the first die study in all of numismatics. Levick was also a specialist in American tokens, and his outstanding collection was featured in W. Elliot Woodward's auction of May 26–29, 1884. He consigned material to a number of other auctions as well, including an Edward Cogan sale scheduled for April 27–29, 1865 that had to be postponed due to the assassination of Abraham Lincoln. The disposition of Levick's library is poorly recorded, and the ownership of this catalogue in the years between Levick and our consignor is completely unknown to us.

These antebellum U.S. coin sales are little remembered today, and aren't generally included in provenance chains. Levick's account of the Foote sale in the *AJN* provides a little information regarding participants, specifically mentioning a couple of purchases made by William J. Jenks:

It will be observed that the prices in the Kline, Cogan, Foote, Gratz and Levick collections, all sold previous to 1860, are low in comparison to more recent sales; but my recollection of these sales is, that were the same pieces resold at the present time, they would command much higher prices. The cents of Mr. W. Jenks, of Philadelphia, whose name appears opposite the prices of the pieces he bought in Foote's and Gratz's collections, were in such excellent condition, that, if sold now, they would rank among the fifty dollar pieces. Mr. Jenks' set of cents, especially his 93s, I presume were then about the best if Mr. Mickley's only were excepted. Geo. F. Seavey, Esq., of Cambridgeport, Mass., was fortunate enough to purchase Mr. Jenks' collection, which, of course, improved his own cabinet immensely, and undoubtedly it now ranks as the first in the country. Mr. Mortimer L. Mackenzie, who has been most enthusiastic as a purchaser of the Cent Series, may excel so far as relates to condition; but for varieties, with condition combined, Mr. Seavey undoubtedly outranks him. I recollect well the fine condition of those he secured from the Jenks cabinet.

Levick notes in his table that Jenks was the buyer of Foote's 1793 "Ring" cent for \$4.75 and his 1793 Wreath cent for \$8.50, these being the finest large cents in the sale. The chain cent is likely the Seavey specimen now in the ANS as part of the Clapp collection; the wreath cent (with vine and bars on edge, according to the table) is more difficult to trace as a few such pieces are provenanced to Seavey. The fact that these early sales often featured genuinely important coins—and that some of them can be traced to present-day collections—should generate real excitement among today's connoisseurs, just as it did among the cognoscenti in the years preceding the war between the states. This is a landmark rarity among early American numismatic works, and will be a highlight of any library of which it becomes a part.

Ellis was active as a numismatist during the period of these sales (we once sold his copy of Hickcox, which is inscribed to him in 1861), so it would appear that he was the original owner of this volume, and presumably had it bound. An interesting bound volume of auction catalogues from the early years of the hobby in America. 



An important archive of materials from the early days of online numismatics. The Complete Electronic Numismatic Trading System (CENTS) was developed by Larry Brilliant and Joe Lepczyk, and was produced by MarketNet Technologies. It is regarded as the earliest computer-to-computer network for coin collectors, dealers and others connected to the hobby; it was intended to function as an online competitor to the hardwired teletype system used throughout the hobby at the time. It had four modules: CollectorPac, InvestorPac, DealerPac and AuctionPac. The main communications network was CoinTalk, intended as an easy way for CENTS users to talk to one another. The November 1983 issue of *PC Magazine* had a feature article on CENTS, and Ed Reiter wrote about it in the *New York Times* of July 31, 1983. These are rare survivals of the earliest era of online numismat-

ics, saved at the time by Wayne Homren, who would go on to found The E-Sylum in 1998. Wayne's notes dubbed these "The Dead Sea Scrolls of Online Numismatics," which I liked enough to steal for our heading. Of true historical interest, blending content that seems amusingly outdated (technical talk) with topical discussions that still seem timely (the section on online etiquette could have been written last week). The supplementary materials here present include technical information on the systems. Getting online in the pre-Internet era meant dialing an analog (non-digital) phone, connecting the handset to a modem, typing commands and getting text responses. The CoinTalk user manuals explain the process in detail. Appendixes list local phone numbers across the U.S., explain User IDs and passwords, how to navigate and enter text. CoinTalk was the "electronic bourse" of CENTS. CoinTalk was built on Confer, a conferencing system running on a mainframe computer in Michigan. Wayne Homren wrote to Joe Lepczyk in July 1983 offering his services as a consultant to Lepczyk's MarketNet Tech, Inc. and the CENTS system. He was hired, and the correspondence files included here generally relate to Homren's work on this project. The group of later files include printouts of emails and postings on the COINS mailing list, discussion of the rec.collecting. coins Usenet group, the ANA's CD-ROM project to digitize The Numismatist, the ANA Numismatic Information Network (NIN) and Multi-Media Committees, and the Numismatic Indexes Project (NIP). A fascinating group of material. Ex Wayne Homren Library (to whom go the thanks of the technically unsavvy cataloguer for his assistance in deciphering this lot).

A notable piece of 18th-century Connecticut fiscal paper. What at first appears to be simply an uncanceled example of a payment certificate to a Revolutionary War soldier, proves on closer examination to have a twist: the Revolutionary soldier in question was an enslaved African American who had been promised his freedom if he fought. Chatham Freeman served for three years (1777–1780) in Connecticut's Sixth Regiment, in Major Eli Leavenworth's company. Most of his time was spent in various locations in New York State (West Point, White Plains, Peekskill). Following the war, he renegotiated his agreement with his former slaveholder, agreeing to work for him for a period of time in order to marry Rhea, an enslaved woman—the two were fully emancipated two years later. Chatham and Rhea Freeman raised a family and eventually became landowners in Wallingford, Connecticut. A fascinating story, of which this is an artifact. Ex Wayne Homren Library.



The final and best edition of the first work covering the entire range of American numismatics, Dickeson's book is a landmark of American numismatic history. By nature a popularizer and showman, Dickeson toured the country for several years in the early 1850s lecturing on North American archeology and excavating Indian mounds. His *Numismatical Manual* (the *al* was dropped after the first edition) was also clearly intended to reach a mass market. Handsome in format and visual presentation, it was distributed by a major publisher of the day and written in an authoritative manner. Dickeson even envisaged, "if it should be approved, to prepare an edition for the use of schools." Until the appearance of Breen's magnum opus in 1988, it remained the only comprehensive work on American numismatics ever published. While this copy has been somewhat trimmed, it is free of the foxing and staining that seems endemic with this title. Ex Cardinal Collection Library.

This is the fourth copy of this Dickeson production that we have handled since 1967. Not in the Champa, Bass or Ford Libraries. It appears to have been issued by Scott, with leftover plates, to promote sales of the final edition of Dickeson's numismatic magnum opus: "A fine copy, in perfect order, can now be had. Price, \$15.00." The rear cover (not present with this copy) advertises the *Coin Collector's Journal*, listing volumes for sale up to 1880, and listing articles "already in type" for 1880, providing us with a pretty good guess as to when this was issued. Considering that Crosby's *The Early Coins of America* was published, bound, at \$15 in 1875, it's hard to imagine Dickeson's earlier effort selling for the same price in 1880. The Annual Register was founded in 1758 by James and Robert Dodsley, working with philosopher and statesman Edmund Burke. It is an important chronicle, with each volume focusing on the events of a single year, and contains much useful information, with the present volumes focusing on the period immediately following American independence (hence their presence in the U.S. section of this catalogue). It is still published today. The New Annual Register was a competing publication compiled along similar lines; it was published from 1780 to 1825. Ex Cardinal Collection Library.

A pioneering work, comprising the first listing of the contents of the Mint Cabinet. The introduction features the author's evocative statement: "The collection was commenced in June, 1838. Long before that date, however, Mr. Adam Eckfeldt, formerly Chief Coiner, led as well by his own taste as by the expectation that a conservatory would some day be established, took pains to preserve master-coins of the different annual issues of the Mint, and to retain some of the finest foreign specimens, as they appeared in deposit for recoinage." A printed notice on the title verso reads in part: "By a private contribution, an edition of one hundred forty copies, in the present form, has been struck off, for distribution to such societies and individuals as would be likely to appreciate the subject. It has also been adorned by a vignette, through the generosity of Mr. Saxton and Mr. Longacre, artists." A delightful little volume, *Pledges of History* is rarely encountered today, suggesting that the edition of 140 copies has not enjoyed an impressive rate of survival. Attinelli 107. A Complete Set of Sydney Eastwood's Numisma

Included are essays on the Confederate Cent, "James Condor: His Book and Tokens," coffee tokens of Ceylon, several titles on British and British colonial coins and tokens, etc. Only 75 copies of the first issue were printed, with publisher Eastwood declaring it unavailable in the second issue. The small number of copies printed, plus the fact that the seven issues were published over a decade's time—a decade encompassing the Second World War at that—has made complete sets quite difficult to find. An intriguing production, being only the plates printed for this landmark work on American numismatics without the accompanying text. We haven't offered a similar volume since Kolbe Sale 32, and this is the first we recall seeing with what appear to be differently printed prototype plates. For nearly two decades, Eckfeldt and Du Bois's *Manual* was the only practical guide available to American coin collectors. It was also the first work to illustrate the 1804 dollar and was one of the earliest works to combine photographic techniques, electrotyping and the medal rule machine for illustrative purposes. 



A handsome set, seldom offered complete. A chatty, most interesting publication, providing considerable insight into its irrepressible editor. In addition to Elder's many commentaries, the issues feature a number of interesting articles (many authored by Edgar Adams), notes on upcoming Elder sales, auction reports, proceedings of various numismatic societies in the United States and Canada, biographies of famous collectors including James Manning, William Dunham, George Earle, and others. Elder's cantankerous nature occasionally cannot be restrained. Writing of J.C. Lighthouse, a "Historical Coin Collector" who "for reasons known only to himself returned, in a great huff, 44 lots secured by him at his bids," Elder notes: "It will be the aim of this publication to assist in ridding the field of one or two cranks and freaks whose consummate delight seems to consist in annoying the numismatic fraternity." Referring to Pinkerton, Deitrick, Ehlers and McGrath, "Historical Coin Collectors" all, "The editor makes no distinction between the thief and the man who will not pay his honest debts, both should be serving time in state's prison." In the June–July 1907 issue, Elder reprints a letter from "A Reader," headed "Where is Geoffrey" and reading in part: "Have any of your readers seen or heard of Geoffrey 'Charlatan' [Charlton Adams], member

R.N.S., etc., etc., etc., etc.? he who formerly held a 'suite' in the famous 'Scrapiron." Elder could also be eloquent in praise of those he considered beneficial to the hobby. Of J.N.T. Levick, he wrote in the May, 1906 issue: "If the question ever arises as to who is the youngest coin collector in this country, we would beg to be consulted, as we think a thorough canvass of the field will result in a unanimous vote for our friend J.N.T. Levick, of this city. As with the smiling maiden, the question of age is to Mr. Levick a sensitive subject, but it was some time in 1852 that he began to get the interesting little discs together. Known from the early days of his collecting as a numismatist of prominence, he afterwards came into possession of a collection of cards and tokens numbering fully 20,000 specimens—the largest assemblage extant. By hard squeezing Mr. Woodward managed to squeeze the collection into about 3,000 lots and sold them over twenty years ago. An important point which we wish to make is that numismatics can hold a man in his later years—yes, can enthuse him with the fire of the raw recruit. Mr. Levick may be found at every sale, minutely examining the pieces, making careful pencil notations in his catalogue, buying whenever anything suiting his taste is offered, and pricing his catalogue with the precision of clockwork. We doff our hats to J.N.T. Levick, the 'youngest' coin collector in America." Elder managed to bungle the numbering of the issues, skipping Volume I, No. 5, but making up for it with two No. 7s, though these errors are relegated to the masthead and are different on the original covers (not here present). Adams 18. The hardcover version of the photographically illustrated edition of Elder's first blockbuster catalogue. In Elder's February 12-14, 1920 sale, he wrote that only ten of these hardcovers were produced, and about that many are known today (elsewhere, he stated that as few as four copies were bound, and that none of them were priced). This example is well-preserved, fully priced, and includes the scarce addenda leaves. The collection itself was of the highest importance. The sale begins with exceptional colonials, many of which are plated: an NE shilling; Higley coppers; a Rosa Sine Spina; two Liber Natus pieces; Maryland silver; and so on. (The NE sixpence appears to be the fake from the Clay sale; this and the threepence were pulled from the auction.) The large cents and half cents include important specimens in remarkable condition. Pattern coins of the 1860s are very well represented. William Hartman Woodin had purchased the collection intact from Gschwend and, after removing a small number of coins needed for his collection, consigned it to Elder. Elder called it "the finest and most important that has been held in this city since the Parmelee sale in 1890." Originally from Pennsylvania, Gschwend later moved to New York City, engaging in the dry goods business on Fifth Avenue. At the time of the sale, he was one of the few remaining numismatists who had been involved since the heady days following the Civil War. Adams rated A+ overall ("Superb colonials: Rosa Sine Spina, Higleys (2), Virginia shilling, Castorland in gold. Disme, silver center 1¢. Choice Washington patterns & silver. 1865 proof set, 5¢ to \$20, in copper. Palmetto medal. First rate copper." Davis 349. Fanning, Ancient Coins in Early American Auctions, 26. A scarce work, often overlooked in numismatic circles, this copy was never bound (or even sewn). Chapter VI is titled, "Currency of New Jersey," and it comprises a substantive work on the subject. In his preface Elmer states: "The chapter giving a history of the money of account and of circulation, in this and the adjoining colonies, from

their beginnings to a recent date, it is believed embraces facts not to be found in any of our histories, which were fast passing into oblivion, but which are too curious and instructive to be entirely lost." Its fascinating comments on the circulating money of the late 18th and early 19th centuries would surely have interested Schilke and Solomon but the work is not cited in their *America's Foreign Coins*. A leatherbound copy of this classic work, almost certainly intended for presentation. Evans's *History* is one of the most successful numismatic titles ever printed. By the turn of the century, over 100,000 copies of this famous work had been issued in at least a dozen different editions and upwards of two hundred different varieties. Although of considerable interest to American numismatists, this work was not written from that perspective. Like his predecessor A.M. Smith, Evans mainly sold copies to people visiting Philadelphia, more specifically, the Mint. Although the technical numismatic information is not always entirely accurate, reading Evans is enjoyable and instructive. Particularly entertaining is his kow-towing to Mint officials in office at the time the various editions were published. Lavish biographies, usually enhanced by a portrait plate, apparently were an essential component in enabling him to retain his position as the primary supplier of Mint histories for two decades. 



Frossard's Numisma, Complete with All Supplements

A remarkable publication. Fewer than a dozen complete sets are currently known to be extant, and it is doubtful whether most of those include all of the issued supplements. The first nine volumes were published bimonthly but the final volume was issued over a five-year period, which, combined with being printed in a modest, self-covered format, helps to explain its rarity. Supplements were issued for the following numbers: Volume IV, No. 6 (4 pages, and missing from the 1983 reprint); Volume V, No. 1 (2 pages); Volume V, No. 4 (2 pages); Volume VI, No. 2 (2 pages); Volume VI, No. 6 (4 pages); Volume VIII, No. 1 (4 pages); Volume VIII, No. 2 (4 pages); and Volume IX, No. 6 (4 pages). While Volume X, Nos. 3 and 6 were of above-average length, they seem to have been issued in one piece, which may also be true of some of the earlier Supplements. This copy also has a second copy of the Volume IV, No. 6 supplement incorrectly bound with Volume V, No. 6 and two copies of the Volume VIII, No. 2 supplement. In United States Numismatic Literature, Volume I, John W. Adams wrote: "Frossard opened his own business in 1877 and initiated his own periodical, Numisma. The editor deals out praise to his friends but doesn't hesitate to flog offending competitors, a list which includes Scott, Proskey (he of the India Rubber conscience), Mason, Steigerwalt, Woodward and the Chapmans, among others." One of America's most colorful and outspoken early coin dealers, Édouard Frossard was one of the premier American coin dealers in the last quarter of the nineteenth century. Perhaps best known for *Numisma*, his highly entertaining 1877–1891 house organ, Frossard's auction sales are a better testament to his distinguished numismatic career. John Adams writes: "In terms of content, the Frossard catalogues represent great variety and, cumulatively, great knowledge. Bespeaking quality, no less than twenty-one of the sales draw a rating of *A*- or better." A number of key catalogues are present here. Sale 7 is the Stenz silver cabinet. Sale 34 featured the outstanding Isaac F. Wood collection, important for medals and colonials. Sale 37 is the sale of Frossard's own collection, a highly impressive offering for which a scarce plated edition was also issued. Sale 48 features W.W. Thurston's fractional currency collection as well as William Lee's highly important Confederate collection and numismatic library. Sale 89 is the Hart collection, one of the great all-time American sales of Canadian coins, tokens and medals. Sale 111 includes material from the Hiram Deats collection and featured an 1822 half eagle that was passed. Sale 125 is the catalogue of the W.M. Most of the few copies of the plate that we have examined have at least some light staining; this is usually relegated to the plate and suggests the possibility that many, perhaps most, were damaged in production and never issued. A pleasing copy of a book that is rarely encountered signed by either Frossard or Hays. Written by Frossard and based on Hays's collection. Fifty-six varieties were described, given a new numbering system and, most importantly, for the first time the coins were depicted. In the preface, Frossard notes that "It is but just to my collaborator, Mr. Hays, the man through whose patience and perseverance a complete set of the 1794 Cents was collected, that the varieties in this new classification should bear his name. For this reason, it is desired that when referring to this work the varieties should be announced and known as Hays. No. 1, 2, 3, etc." The book itself is a handsome production, decorative yet finely illustrated. Depicting every variety, it set a high standard for subsequent specialized cent monographs. First binding variant (crimson cloth, one inch decorative bands at top and bottom, without inner filigree to cover device). Until Sheldon's Early American Cents, the primary work on the subject. Only 250 copies printed, all of them poorly bound, with cracked hinges and other problems being the rule rather than the exception. I discussed this publication in my column in the January-March 2013 issue of The Asylum. Ex Wayne Homren Library.



Very rare. Not in the Newman, Bass, Ford or Fuld Library sales; the Champa Library had a copy that had been acquired in plain paper covers in a 1984 Kolbe sale and was subsequently rebound; the copy in the Heather Hardon-Hudson Library, sold by Stack's Bowers (but catalogued by us) in August 2020, was comparable overall, but in a more heavily worn binding. A couple of copies of the 1866 fourth edition also have been offered in recent years. Gear's treatise was a predecessor of Laban Heath's ubiquitous publications on the topic, from which, as Eric Newman notes, Heath "adopted many of his concepts and expressions." The illustrations are not finely produced for the reason stated in the introduction: "These engravings are executed in a coarse manner, that the difference between the counterfeit and genuine may be more easily distinguished." A June 23, 1866 testimonial letter from C.E. Twombley, Paying Teller, U.S. Treasury, is reproduced on page 79, recommending it "to the public as an invaluable book for every business man." Gear downplays the main difference between the two works: "We might fill the book with specimens of genuine work, which would increase the cost of the same only, without being of any aid to the learner. Genuine bank notes are always at hand, and can be examined by all at any time." Ex Wayne Homren Library.

Daniel Groux, self-styled Professor of Numismatics, was often impecunious. In the sale catalogue of his collection, issued after his death, Strobridge kindly termed him "The fond old dreamer." This interesting little pamphlet embodies a novel attempt to raise money whereby he divided his collection into twenty lots and proposed to sell them as prizes in a lottery. Dr. Winslow Lewis acted as trustee and held the coins and books. A total of four hundred fifty \$10 tickets were to be sold. Groux and Lewis claimed that "The collections are estimated to be worth \$7,549, so that even by disposing of all the tickets it will be at a loss of \$3,049." Prizes ranged in value from \$1,971 to \$69. The two additional items tipped in at the beginning both relate to Groux's "Grand Enterprise." Over the years, we recall having handled only one example of the *Circular* and but two of *Additional Arrangements*. The first, signed in type by Groux, states that "The undersigned takes the liberty to send you the abstract of a Catalogue of some

collections of rare coins and medals... The undersigned will leave with you the Catalogue for your inspection, and will call in a day or two, when he hopes you will add your name to the subscription list..." Apparently the second item, like the first, was sent out with the pamphlet and it assured potential participants that all of the proceeds were to be held by two trustees, N.D. Hubbard and Joseph M. Wightman, and that their money would be returned if all of the tickets were not sold. Its third page gives the names of fifteen participants, one of whom, Mrs. Abbot Lawrence, purchased 25 tickets, and three others who, including Lewis, each bought six tickets. Given that he became the leading authority of his day on the topic, it is regrettable that such a work never came to fruition. Rare and historically important. In truth, the descriptions are so detailed and meticulous that a separate work on the topic, apart from the addition of plates, would have been largely redundant. Newman in a substantial article appearing in the 1991 American Numismatic Association *Centennial Anthology*, titled "Heath's Counterfeit Detectors: An Extraordinarily Successful Comedy of Errors." In it, Newman writes, "A highlight in American numismatic literature is the myriad of editions of Laban Heath's counterfeit detectors. These books gained great popularity by the simple technique of complimenting the intelligence and ability of members of the public to recognize counterfeit paper money and by the appeal of spectacular illustrations. The series of editions from 1864 through 1889 carried a transition of text and a development of pictorial content by a masterful huckster and a skilled political maneuverer. He was the first person to promote a numismatic book into a best seller." Heath claimed a total issue of 25,000 copies of the first

The present example has the usual "PRICE \$1.50" on the cover. The Newman copy brought \$840 with the premium—this copy is a little better. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

Newman 1-P-20. An unusual issue. Eric P. Newman wrote of it that "This printing may be from handset type instead of stereotype." It could have been issued at any time after Newman 1-P-3, as it includes the two unnumbered folding plates, but before Type 2-P. It is also the only variety of the first edition not printed throughout within double borders. The lack of a price on the front cover would suggest that it fell later in the lifetime of the first edition. Quite rare. Ex Heather Hardin-Hudson Library.

Newman 2-P-h-2 (variant). A rare transitional printing that falls between Newman 2-P-h-1 and 2-P-h-2 in his enumeration of varieties. This printing includes the plate depicting half the face and back of the \$5 National Currency issue, correctly numbered as Plate 17 (and the accompanying text on page 17), but does not include the fractional currency plates (and the accompanying text on page 27 is not present). Heath writes in his introduction that "I am ... through the kindness of the Secretary of the Treasury, enabled in this new edition to give fac-simile cuts and dies from nearly all the Government issues, thus placing in the hands of all the means of detecting the most skilfully prepared counterfeits that can be executed. In issuing this work, I have retained all of the plates and cuts that were in my first edition save two, which have become obsolete, and have added about fifty [actually thirty-three, according to Eric P. Newman] of the most beautiful Government devices, including 'vignettes,' 'dies,' etc. These devices are now considered the most important safeguards, as the whole ingenuity of the most experienced rogues seems to be directed against the Government issues since the State bank-bills have mostly been withdrawn from circulation." A handsome copy of a rare printing.

Newman 2-P-s-9 (tentative). This variant was not listed in Eric P. Newman's article, nor was it identified by him afterwards. Similar to his 2-P-s-7 (not in the article but identified by Newman afterwards and included in his library sale), except that it includes the \$100 First National Bank of Boston counterfeit and both folding Plates 15 and 16. It does not include the 1869-dated Casilear patent anti-alteration sample card present in Newman's 2-P-s-6, and hence may predate that variant. Given that the main difference between this and Newman's 2-P-s-7 is the presence of the three folding plates, it is possible that the copy of Heath that Newman identified as 2-P-s-7 was incomplete and this is the complete version. While I attempted, in cataloguing Newman's Library in the 2018 Heritage sale, to update his 1991 article, it's clear that there remains a fair amount of work to be done on the Heath Detectors. Newman continued to examine every copy that he encountered, occasionally discovering new variations. He noted that the Heath bank note facsimile plates used in this printing were encountered both with and without a printed plate number (which, when it is encountered, is hole-punched). Thus was born Newman 2-BH-2(a), with the hole-punched plate number, and Newman 2-BH-2(b), without it. Their relative scarcity to each other has yet to be established. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

Newman 3-P-2 (variation). There would appear to be multiple variants of Newman 3-P-2, which needs to be reexamined. According to Newman's description of 3-P-2, "The impression of the counterfeit \$10 Philadelphia note has sometimes been replaced by an impression of the face and unfinished back of the newly captured counterfeit plates for the \$10 Merchants National Bank of Chicago and a printed page is inserted describing its dangerous quality." We actually have no record of a 3-P-2 existing with the \$10 First National Bank of Philadelphia note included in 3-P-1, but feel inclined to accept Newman's statement that it is only *sometimes* replaced by the \$10 Merchants National Bank of Chicago note (which is actually the only way we've encountered it). This emission marks the only appearance of the Merchants National Bank note and the added final leaf, which either precedes the \$10 note (as here) or is added at the very end; this also has a similar added page describing the \$20 note, which is not mentioned by Newman. 

Hickcox's Historical Account is the first substantial work ever written on American coins. Only 200 copies were issued. The author writes in the preface: "The design of this work is to give an account of the legally authorized coinage of the United States of America during the periods of their colonial history and their existence as a united republic. Nothing as comprehensive has heretofore been attempted, nor is there any separate publication on either our colonial or early federal coinage. The materials have been collected by consulting early periodicals, congressional and legislative documents and other works, and through an extensive correspondence with gentlemen in other states. In the concluding chapter is given a catalogue of pieces which have been neither legally issued, nor can they, with one or two exceptions, be considered as tradesmen's tokens, but were the inventions of individuals, sometimes proposed as specimens or patterns of coinage for the newly formed republic... The modern coinage of the United States having been quite fully exhibited in the valuable treatise by Messrs. Eckfeldt and Du Bois, it has been deemed expedient not to repeat the engravings contained in that work." Unfortunately for Hickcox, his pioneering work was almost immediately overshadowed by Montroville Wilson Dickeson's American Numismatical Manual. Though smaller in size and scope, Hickcox's work is richer in historical detail and more elegant in style. It will always remain a landmark in American numismatic literature. Clain-Stefanelli 11884. He provides a history of New York currency, establishing the proper context with a discussion of the greater economy and early struggles to establish a circulating medium of exchange. He then presents a catalogue of the various issues, discussing each one separately and going into the background of each note, giving information on number printed, signers, designs and so forth. The original inventory of the Lilly collection, prepared in the late 1960s for Abe Kosoff, is rarely encountered. As is well known, the idea for the United States government to purchase the collection for inclusion in the National Coin Collection was controversial, and Kosoff testified before Congress on its behalf, stating that "the acquisition of the Lilly Collection by the Smithsonian Institution will put the United States Collection in the forefront as the finest numismatic collection in the world." It was not until September 1969 that the bill to approve the purchase was passed. Of considerable importance, listing over 6000 gold coins.

The scarce original edition. Leach served as Superintendent of the San Francisco Mint from 1897 to 1907 and as Director of the Mint from 1907 until 1909. These years are covered in considerable detail in this fascinating volume recording "A life experience of sixty-five years in California" dating from the "pioneer days of the state." His account of "The Battle to Save the Mint Building" in the aftermath of the 1906 earthquake is riveting: "When I reached the mint building I found that I had also reached the edge of the fire zone... Inside the mint building I was greatly pleased to find fifty of our employees, whose sense of loyalty to duty had not been mollified by fear of earthquake or the horror of being penned up in a big building surrounded by fire... It did not seem probable that the structure could withstand that terrific mass of flames that was sweeping down upon us from Market Street...

The battle would soon be on... Fortunately for us, we had a good supply of water... Without this protection the building would, without question, have been gutted by the flames... a mass of black smoke... swept in upon us just ahead of the advancing flames; then, following, came a tremendous shower of red cinders... The glass in our windows, exposed to this great heat, did not crack and break, but melted down like butter... It did not seem possible for the structure to withstand this terrific onslaught... The explosions of the stones in our walls grew fainter, and finally we heard no more of them... we began to feel that the fight was nearly won and that, after all, we were going to save the building... We were a happy band... but we did not think so much of our victory until a day or two later when we saw the benefits to follow to the stricken community in a financial way. We opened the only available vaults in the city holding any considerable amount of coin." The segments of this book most directly pertaining to Leach's experiences as Mint Director were reprinted in 1987 by Bowers & Merena under the title *Recollections of a Mint Director*. 
A legendary rarity. The Levick sale was important on its own merits—Adams gives it an overall rating of A-: "Season medal. Gem cents. Extraordinary store cards, 43 in silver. Copper 1794 \$1. 1842-1847 proof sets. Political medals." Its second source of fame is that it was postponed following the assassination of Abraham Lincoln on April 15, 1865. Edward Cogan, who is credited on the title page with "having supervision of the collection," sent out notice that the sale was being held off for a month "in consequence of the unsettled state of the public mind, caused by the assassination of our late President." Finally, it is well-known because of the rarity of its special edition. Twelve copies were prepared on larger paper, with printed pages on the left-hand side of the open catalogue facing blank ruled pages on the right, awaiting the annotations of the purchaser. Copies are known with the original April dates on the title and half-title (as here) and with the postponed dates in May (which copies also come with printed correspondence about the postponement). Levick would seem to have catalogued his own collection—whatever Cogan's participation in the conduct of the sale may have been, he does not appear to have catalogued it. Versions of the catalogue exist without the final three pages listing Levick's collection of numismatic auction catalogues, though they are included in this copy. These three pages are highly important, as Levick's library included American numismatic auction catalogues dating back to 1840, with eight before 1856. The final catalogue lot, under an "1865" heading, is described as follows: "April 27. Levick (Bangs) 12 printed... The foregoing copy is desirable to a collector, being interleaved and ruled for prices and names on fine letter sheets, and more appropriate in size than some of the large paper copies heretofore issued. The purchaser has the privilege of taking this bound copy or one in loose sheets, to have bound according to his own taste." Remarkably, there were two special editions present in the Harry W. Bass, Jr. Library (one of which we recently sold in our Sale 164 for \$3250 hammer). We know of four other extant copies: one in the ANS Library; Levick's own copy (sold in Kolbe Sale 111, ex Stack Family Library); Robert Hewitt's copy (sold in Kolbe Sale 107); and J. Doyle DeWitt's copy (ANS deaccession sold in Sklow's Sale 25). That accounts for seven of the twelve said to have been originally issued of this wonderful special edition of this notable 19th-century coin sale, rendered famous by a great American tragedy but memorable in itself for the care and discernment exercised in its production by one of this country's earliest and most devoted numismatic bibliophiles. 

A wonderful volume from Lyman Low's personal library, most notable for including his heavily annotated bidbook for his 1885 sale of the Alexander Balmanno collection (which also happens to be plated). Low's eighth sale, rare with plates, was both large and important. A founder and honorary member of the American Numismatic and Archaeological Society, Balmanno's collection of Greek and Roman coins was especially notable and was apparently purchased by the British Museum. Low records prices and names, as well as many additional bids and other information. One of only two Low sales issued with photographically printed plates (six others were issued with halftones). Three of the plates depict British coins and medals; the remaining plate depicts North American colonial coins and U.S. and private & territorial gold pieces. Adams 8, rated A– overall: "1857 proof set. Strong Latin American. RR Scottish gold. Portcullis crown, ½ crown." Davis 637. Also included in this volume are Low's annotated (priced and named) copies of George Cogan's May 1885 sale and Smith's Stewart Douglas sale. These three sales were held within about three weeks of each other, hence their assembly in this volume. Given the spine numbering, one wonders how many similar volumes were annotated and bound by Low and how many could possibly survive. A rare opportunity. Ex Wayne Homren Library.



Rarely offered. Mason's *Magazine*, along with Frossard's *Numisma*, provides a rare glimpse of coin collecting in 19th-century America. In the early issues, Mason's essay on "The Coin Trade" and his "Reminiscences of a Coin Collector" series are an important source of information on American coin collecting and collectors in the 1850s and 1860s. The famous photograph entitled *Mason's Photographic Gallery of the Coin Collectors of the United States No. 1*, issued to accompany the March 1869 issue, is highly important. Mason also provides much interesting background on Joseph Mickley and the sale of his collection in 1867. Beginning with the second volume, Dr. Montroville Wilson initiated an illustrated series on "the aboriginal coins of this country," under the general title "Antiquarian Researches in North America," and Mason's series on the "History of the Pattern and Experimental Coins of the United States," also began about this time. The final volume features a colorful recounting of the French numismatist Jean Foy-Vaillant's 1674 adventure with pirates, causing him to swallow twenty gold coins, weighing four or five ounces, later recovering them "at the rate nature herself permitted." Reports of important coin auctions are also regularly included, and many other long-running series of articles are featured as well. The single-page insert included in the August issue would appear to be missing from many copies now extant. On page 115 of the July number, Mason wrote that "in our next month's issue we shall give photographic illustrations of



the Greenville, Alabama, stamp and the Washington, D.C., 'One Cent Dispatch,' with cavalier on horseback. These two stamps are now in the possession of R.C. Davis, Esq., of this city, and both are genuine issues, as represented.' The insert has two mounted photographic illustrations, though both are rather faint. They probably were faint at the time of production, as Mason states "the impressions given in this number are the best we could obtain by photography." Very important historical publications by the Massachusetts Historical Society, absolutely essential for any research involving the early history of New England. Perhaps most intriguing are the little-known numismatic nuggets awaiting discovery. The first volume includes Daniel Gookin's "Historical Collections of the Indians in New-England," which features a 17th-century description of wampum, as well as a letter from Nathaniel Weare (Ware) discussing money and commerce in America. The British counterfeiting of American paper money during the Revolutionary War is discussed in Volume II, as part of the *Historical Journal of the American War* (which includes a number of other references to Continental paper money). Roger Williams's *A Key into the Language of America: or, an Help to the Language of the Natives, in that Part of America, Called New England* has a chapter on Indian money ("Of Their Coin") as well as one on buying and selling with them. Buried within the tremendous amount of information to be found within these volumes, many of which print letters, diaries and other papers of early Massachusetts settlers, must be other numismatic references, most of which are unknown to readers today. 

A well-preserved set, handsomely bound. An underrated source of information, *Mehl's Numismatic Monthly* is especially rich with word sketches of turn of the century American numismatists, often accompanied by individual





or group photographs. Also featured are short monographs on many unusual numismatic topics, including a wealth of data on Canadian numismatics. Of Mehl and his *Monthly*, John Adams has written, "Launched in January of 1908, the early volumes of the *Monthly* are easily the equal of *The Numismatist*, boasting original articles by such gifted writers as R.W. McLachlan, Edgar Adams, Howland Wood, George Blake, Dr. Eugene Courteau, J.W. Haseltine and Frank Stewart." Ex Joseph Foster Library; ex Richard Cooper Library.

Without exaggeration, it was the most important factor in the popularization of coin collecting in America until the appearance in 1946 of Richard Yeoman's even more ubiquitous *Guide Book of United States Coins*. 

The Deluxe Leatherbound Edition. Quite rare, with perhaps half a dozen copies or so having been sold publicly in the last thirty years. While Mehl raised the importance of the fixed price catalogue to a new level with this well-produced work, it was not without considerable controversy. George H. Clapp, among others, was critical, writing that he had "never seen a catalog with more false and/or misleading statements." It should be noted that Clapp and Mehl were hardly friends. Legend has it that Clapp once told Mehl that he was mendacious, and, apparently unaware of the word's meaning, Mehl thanked him. Nonetheless, the French catalogue, though overloaded with the usual Mehl hyperbole and malapropisms, is still important to large cent collectors. At the time, sales from the catalogue were less than a commercial triumph, though it featured wonderful large cents. Many of the coins appeared years later in various Mehl sales and others changed hands for considerably less than the original asking prices. Doubtless, the beginning of the Depression was not a good time to sell coins. The letter provides additional context and is an interesting addition. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

A significant gathering. Mooney gave a talk on the Washington before Boston medal to the Western Pennsylvania Numismatic Society in February of 1976, a duplicated typescript of which was circulated on a limited basis afterwards. Though not the final word, Mooney brought together much useful information in this work, providing a historical overview of the medal and detailed analysis of the dies used in the various strikings and restrikings. Present here is correspondence entered into later that year with John J. Ford, Jr., and Dr. Joseph B. Vacca, both of whom assisted Mooney in further developing his work. His other work included here includes his substantial article on play money (with correspondence and original photos). Ex Wayne Homren Library.

A privately distributed (i.e., never really published) collection of brief essays, frequently topical and largely of a humorous nature, generally focusing on numismatic activities and personalities in the Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania area. Many of them were written under the aegis of "News Notes from Carnegie Museum Coin Section." Ferdinand Wise, James Sloss, and Ray Byrne are frequently mentioned, and most especially William Woodside (1905–1978),

curator of numismatics at the Carnegie Museum. Glenn Mooney (1918–2001) was an active numismatist for many years in the Pittsburgh area, where he was affiliated with the Western Reserve Numismatic Society and "that ailing patient, the Western Pennsylvania Numismatic Society" (as he puts it here). He was associated with the Carnegie Museum as a volunteer assistant to Woodside. This is the first printed copy we have encountered. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

In the 2018 Heritage auction of Newman's library, a lot of twenty-nine of these boxes was offered as lot 15353. An important archive of early date large cent provenance information. Through the 1980s, Jeff Peck was deeply involved in researching the pedigree chains of United States large cents, particularly the early dates, and was a major collaborator of Del Bland's. These materials mimic in many ways the vast compilation of information assembled by Bland, albeit on a smaller scale. They were Peck's master set of notes and photos during his years spent on this project. The fruit of over twenty years of labor in this field, these materials bring together a massive amount of information, probably surpassed only by the extraordinary Bland archives in the library of the American Numismatic Society.

In the introduction, the author states: "In presenting this small volume to the public, I feel confident that, if it contained nothing but the plates, it would be exceedingly serviceable to those who might peruse it." The plates are most attractive and were doubtless very useful; the text is also quite well executed for the time. Though legitimately scarce, this is probably the earliest counterfeit detector to appear on the market with any frequency. Little appears to be known about the author beyond his occupation as an exchange broker with "fifteen years' active experience." Ex Wayne Homren Library.

Scarce 1862 Work on Pennsylvania Paper

Various "discussions" are devoted to U.S. Coinage and Currency Laws, The World's Currencies, Our Paper Currency, States as Bankers, New England Bank Currency, Canadian Bank-Note Currency, The Currency Famine of 1893, "Free Coinage" Dissected, U.S. Currency Statistics, etc. In "The Currency Famine of 1893" by John DeWitt Warner is found a discussion of Clearing House Certificates and 47 illustrations of them. In the issue on "U. S. Coinage and Currency Laws" are found sections devoted to laws relating to coinage, to government currency and to bank currency. One issue is devoted to "Coin's Financial School" and reproduces cartoons promoting the gold standard. Several numbers devoted to state banking and paper money include state by state information and are of particular interest. A useful index provides a key to specific information. The Reform Club strongly supported the gold standard and the various issues of *Sound Currency* unfailingly promoted their agenda. Scarce. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

Very rare, one of only a few examples we have handled in over half a century. Raphael Prosper Thian (1830-1911) is best remembered today for compiling a series of groundbreaking publications on the paper money and finances of the Confederate States of America, all of which were published in very small numbers. This is his first such publication. The work's raison d'être is stated on the leaf following the title: "A desire to afford Collectors of Confederate Currency a tasteful repository for their Notes, and at the same time furnish them an accurate and exhaustive description of the varieties comprising a full set, has resulted in this Album, which is respectively dedicated to them." The text describes in great detail the 88 notes comprising a set, and provides space for them to be mounted within. This is the only album we recall having handled that still includes a small number of the notes that at one point were held within. Present are: Thian Nos. 7 (the September 2, 1861 \$100), 31 (September 2, 1861 \$20 by B. Duncan), 33 (September 2, 1861 \$20 by Hoyer & Ludwig in black), 72 (April 6, 1863 \$5), 78 (June 2, 1862 \$2 in black and green), and 82 (June 2, 1862 \$1 in black). While most of these are rather worn, their presence is distinctly unusual. Remarkably, given the rarity of the present version, deluxe printings are known, with the note borders printed in green (or in black but on blue stock), and bound in either full or half morocco. This testifies to Thian's tendency to print his publications in very small batches, with numerous modifications and variations. This 1876 album can rightfully be regarded as a predecessor of the famous Master Albums produced by Thian to include comprehensive collections of CSA currency. Unrecorded in Davis. 



A wonderful volume, bringing together several important antebellum auction catalogues, from the library of Mark W. Collet, who would be tragically killed in the war. Most notable for including the 1851 sale of the Dr. Lewis Roper collection, which is considered the first important American coin auction. Roper (c. 1806-1850) was a Philadelphia dentist and early American numismatist. He was well-known to the Mint establishment, testifying to the avidity of his collecting. Roper headed west during the Gold Rush, and died at sea while returning home in 1850. His collection reflected the varied tastes of the time. In the American series, the sale featured Comitia Americana and War of 1812 medals, a few Franklin medals, four Gobrecht dollars, a 1792 Washington Head half dollar, colonial coins, presidential medals, etc. A Stony Point medal in gold sold for \$38 to Fales (the catalogue doesn't mention the actual recipient of the medal, though Charles Bushnell recorded in his copy that it was de Fleury—which is puzzling because de Fleury was not presented with a gold medal—see Adams & Bentley on the Anthony Wayne gold medal and the predecessor created by Duvivier). Also featured were collections of French medals and coins, English coins, German and other European series, long runs of ancient Greek and Roman coins, etc. Buyers included Joseph J. Mickley, Richard Wistar Davids, Charles I. Bushnell, Henry Muhlenberg, Ammi Brown, Jeremiah Colburn, James H. Taylor, Henry Cook, and Jacob Giles Morris. Attinelli wrote in Numisgraphics (page 8) that, "This is, it is believed, the first coin sale in this country, in which sufficient interest was manifested by numismatists to take note of the prices paid for coins, and who were the purchasers." The Roper sale is one of the great landmarks in American numismatic literature, and is rare, with perhaps a dozen or so copies known. This copy is from the first state, without the Thomas firm's full "Philada." address printed at the base of the last page (see P. Scott Rubin's "Variants of the 1851 Roper Auction Sale Catalogue," in the Fall 1998 issue of *The Asylum*). The existence of a second state of the catalogue that goes out of its way to specify the city in which the sale was being held testifies that the news of the upcoming auction had spread to other locales, indicating the growing interest in the hobby. The other catalogues in this volume are also significant. The second catalogue, primarily a book sale, includes 135 lots of coins and medals (uncharacteristically, Attinelli records only 92 lots), and featuring 61 lots of important works on ancient and foreign coins and medals. Attinelli 12. The Bogert sale is Adams 2 in his listing of Bangs catalogues. It is Sage's most significant catalogue, and one of the most important U.S. sales of the 1850s. The sale contained important pieces and brought \$2,198.47, a record at the time. This copy is priced and named. The addenda is scarce. Q. David Bowers has written a wonderful book about Sage and the birth of the coin hobby in the United States, which is well worth reading. Attinelli 13-14. Davis 894. The Bramhall catalogue is very scarce. Bramhall, a collector from New York who had served as the second curator of the ANS, also fought in the Civil War and was badly wounded in the head at the Battle of Wilderness on May 6, 1864. Apparently, he never fully recovered. Not listed by Adams. Attinelli 14. The gentleman of the June 1859 Sage sale was James D. Foskett. Attinelli 14. The June 21-23, 1859 catalogue is Adams 3 for the Bangs series: "1799 1¢, late date proofs. 1792 Washington 1¢. Higley 1¢. VF 1794 \$1. NE 12¢. Baltimore groat. 1857, 1858 proof sets." Mainly the property of John K. Curtis. In this sale, Joseph Mickley purchased for \$11.00 his fabled 1799 large cent, lot 140, a "superb" specimen. The Whitmore sale is Adams 4 in his listing of Bangs catalogues, and was Sage's final auction—this copy is priced and named. Attinelli 15. The 1859 Levick sale was the first Cogan auction printed as a traditional catalogue. It is strong in early copper and proofs, as well as Washingtonia and tokens. Scarce, especially priced with names recorded. Adams 5. Attinelli 15-16. Philadelphia numismatist Mark Wilkes Collet was a medical doctor and token collector who had been one of the founders of the Philadelphia Numismatic Society. With J. Ledyard Hodge and Alfred B. Taylor, he had published in 1858 a Catalogue of American Store Cards, Etc., which was one of the first publications on the subject. Collet had enlisted as a Major in the 3rd New Jersey Volunteers (Infantry) on May 22, 1861. He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and then to Colonel, as which he served the 1st New Jersey Infantry. His death on May 3, 1863 at the Battle of Chancellorsville took from the hobby a numismatist of considerable promise. This is a historically important volume. Ex Wayne Homren Library.



Numismatic historian Joel J. Orosz has written that "there can be no disputing the statement that the Kline sale was the most significant numismatic auction in America before the Civil War." The Kline sale was very strong in Roman and English coins as well as U.S. federal issues. The sale brought \$2,062.80, setting a record for a coin collection sold at auction in the U.S. Kline was a man involved in many businesses, including the coin and stamp trades. He consigned coins to a number of auctions, using both his own and his wife's name, but the 1855 sale is the one for which he is remembered. Buyers recorded here include Winslow, Brown, Davids, Stone, Mickley, and so on. Attinelli 11. Ex Cardinal Collection Library.

Sale 22 includes a strong group of U.S. patterns, mainly from the 1850s to 1870s; it is also notable for inclusion of a Confederate cent and a collection of colonial and Revolutionary-era currency of Connecticut. Sale 24 includes Dr. French's Hard Times Tokens. Adams B: "1794 1¢ varieties: VF S-52 and S-53. XF 1823/22 1¢. French's hard times tokens: 141 varieties." Rated A for tokens. In Sale 26, which is priced and named, a collection of Hard Times Tokens gets top billing over 142 lots of proof U.S. gold coins; while the gold is remarkable for its sheer inclusivity, Raymond's cataloguing there is meager. The Hard Times Tokens, on the other hand, are well-catalogued and very impressive, containing many rarities and specimens in outstanding condition. The collection is followed by a group of tokens not included in the Low reference but that Raymond felt belonged there. This is a rarity among the U.S. Coin Company sales: as late as 2007, the only copy we had handled was the one in Raymond's own (incomplete) bound set; it was lacking from the Fuld and Champa sales, as well. 

The entire U.S. House proceedings, including Acts and votes, of the First Session of the Second Congress, October 1791 through May 1792. Features the historic discussions leading up to the passage of the Act Establishing a Mint, and Regulating the Coins of the United States, including the contentious deliberations concerning whether U.S. coins should bear the likeness of the President. Along with the Senate Journal of the same Congressional session, of unparalleled importance and quite rare.

The history of the Mint Act goes back to Alexander Hamilton's January 28, 1791 report to the House of Representatives on establishing a Mint and a uniform currency. This report drew upon earlier efforts, but Hamilton's work was the seed from which the final Act really grew. Hamilton's report had to contend with the chaotic currency systems in place in the U.S. markets, which varied considerably across time and place. The crux of the matter was that the U.S. economy was tied to the coinages of foreign nations, and that U.S. sovereignty was not fully realized under such a system of dependence. Thomas Jefferson had much to say about Hamilton's report, as did Robert Morris, the senator to whom the final proposals were given. On March 3, 1791, Congress passed a Mint Act, albeit one that did little but authorize the President to hire the necessary personnel and purchase the required equipment. It did nothing to establish a U.S. currency or coinage in any practical way.

The above leads up to the events chronicled in the present volume. On Tuesday, October 25, 1791, George Washington reminded the entire Congress that "The disorder in the existing currency, and especially the scarcity of small change, a scarcity so peculiarly distressing to the poorer classes, strongly recommend the carrying into immediate effect the resolution already entered into concerning the establishment of a Mint. Measures have been taken pursuant to that resolution for procuring some of the most necessary artists, together with the requisite apparatus." The Senate developed the initial draft of the Mint Act, and their discussions are presented in the Senate Journal for this session of Congress. The draft upon which the Senate agreed was entered into the record on January 12, 1792 and sent to the House the following day for its approval. This version of the Act retained the wording in Section X mandating the likeness of the president on U.S. coins. The House famously disagreed with this part of the proposed Act, and amended it as follows:

In the tenth section, strike out the words—"Or representation of the head of the President of the United States for the time being, with an inscription, which shall express the initial or first letter of his christian or first name, and his sirname at length, the succession of the presidency numerically," And, in lieu thereof, insert—"Emblematic of liberty, with an inscription of the word LIBERTY."

Votes were taken on both parts (the deleted and inserted text) of this amendment on March 24, and the vote of each member is here recorded. The amended Act was sent back to the Senate on March 26, with the Senate refusing the amendment that very day. The House then voted on whether to recede from the amendment, and voted against doing so. The Senate was informed that the House was insisting on the changes, and on Tuesday, March 27, the Senate informed the House that it was receding from their disagreement with the amendment, allowing the Act to move forward to the President. The bill was enrolled on March 28 and presented to President Washington. On April 2, 1792, Samuel A. Otis, the Senate Secretary, made the following announcement to the House: "Mr. Speaker—I am directed to inform this House, that the President of the United States did, this day, approve and sign an act which originated in the Senate, intituled, 'An act establishing a mint, and regulating the coins of the United States."

The Congressional deliberations leading up to the establishment of the United States Mint are recorded in this volume and in the Journal of the Senate for the same session of Congress. Copies are rare, with most impounded in institutional libraries. They provide extraordinarily important contextual information, allowing the reader to appreciate the Act's full significance. Unlike the vast majority of bound copies of early governmental works, this copy is untrimmed, preserving the wide margins as originally printed. An unsophisticated copy such as this is a highly unusual find. We last offered a copy of this House Journal at our 2013 New York Book Auction, where a bound copy sold for \$6500 hammer.

On page 269, we find the following: "In commemoration of the American war, and the independence of America that succeeded it, Dr. Franklin has caused a medal to be struck. It represents Hercules in his cradle, strangling two serpents; a leopard, amazed at his strength, is ready to fall upon him; he is repulsed by France, who, under the figure of Minerva, turns her shield, on which are three fleurs de lis, towards him. At bottom are the years 1777 and 1781, epochs of the capitulations of the armies of Burgoyne and Cornwallis, represented by the two serpents. On the other side is Liberty, emblematically pourtrayed by a fine woman; and in the exurgue, *Libertas Americana*." The wording of this announcement is nearly identical to that used in the *London Chronicle* for 13–15 March 1783, though establishing precedence would be difficult. This volume also includes a plate in the June issue that illustrated several coins and seals.



A fascinating copy, this was sent by Vattemare to Dutch numismatist Pieter Otto van der Chijs, author of De munten der Nederlanden, van de vroegste tijden tot aan de Pacificatie van Gend (Haarlem, 1851-1866), a still-indispensable nine-volume reference work on the coinages of the Low Countries. Van der Chijs clipped the original wrapping in which it was sent, preserving his name and address, but also Vattemare's signature, the ink stamp of the Système d'Échange International (with the initials "A.V." in the center), and the handwritten "10 cent" postage amount. Vattemare's System of International Exchanges was initially aimed at the exchange of duplicate books between libraries, and was later extended to include works of art, maps, natural history specimens, coins, medals and other similar objects. He came to America in 1839 and again in 1847, and was granted funds by Congress and by several state legislatures to further his scheme, which met with greater success here than in Europe. This elusive 1861 work describing American coins, medals and tokens from 1652 to 1858 was written to complement the collection given to the Bibliothèque Impériale (Nationale) in the name of the government and citizens of the United States. Following an interesting historical overview, from colonial issues to pioneer gold, some 381 pieces are described in detail. P.O. van der Chijs was the foremost Dutch numismatist of his day; some of the pencil annotations record additional American coins in the numismatic cabinet at Leiden. "Alexandre Vattemare is recognized among American numismatists as one of the fathers of the discipline in the New World, having assembled the first comprehensive collections of American coins, medals, and paper currency, and produced the first comprehensive catalog of American numismatics." — Alan Stahl, in The Extravagant Ambassador: The True Story of Alexandre Vattemare, the French Ventriloquist Who Changed the World. 

An extraordinary volume. The Mickley sale is Adams 17 (rated A+ overall and A in large cents, half cents, colonials, medals, literature, patterns, proofs, early silver, Washington, comments and British). Quite scarce, and of the utmost importance, particularly fully named and priced. Adams refers to this as "Perhaps the greatest U.S. collection," a superlative that seems entirely justified. Woodward's tenth and final Semi-Annual Sale, the Mickley auction was followed by an 11-year absence of Woodward from the numismatic scene (the two catalogues in his series during this period having been catalogued by Strobridge). Perhaps he felt that nothing could surpass the Mickley collection: an understandable feeling. The sale featured astounding rarities and brought very strong prices (Attinelli states that the \$750 brought by the 1804 dollar was "Probably the highest sum ever paid in this country for a single coin"). Attinelli 48-49. Davis 1158. The McCoy sale is a most important early collection, the first Woodward catalogue accorded an A+ by Adams. Attinelli wrote eloquently of the collector and his landmark collection: "This noted collection, always spoken of as the 'McCoy' collection, was sold by that gentleman to Mr. W.E. Woodward, whose property it was, when sold at auction. It consisted almost exclusively of American coins and medals. It contained, with but one exception, the finest collection of U.S. Cents ever offered at any sale. Exceedingly rich with 'Political pieces,' many of them exceedingly rare and fine, added to a fine collection of 'American Medals,' it was deservedly celebrated." The first addendum is infrequently met with, and includes some notable medals and patterns. The Betts addendum is noteworthy as it lists the owner's fabrications of American colonial coins. A note following the title states: "Very many of the pieces here offered, are struck from excessively rare dies, recently engraved, all of which are destroyed; and every piece being the best in existence, it is the sincere wish of the owner that they meet with satisfaction." 

Unfortunately for Woodward, any character lent to the sale by these pieces was not what he had anticipated. As the April 1885 *AJN* follow-up reported: "The two medallions mentioned in our last number as found in the collection, and claimed by the owner as from the Castellani Collection, both proved to be false; they were beautiful examples of the counterfeiter's art." We appreciate the time and energy that Wayne has put into compiling these, and trust that they will be appreciated in other hands as well.

Perhaps its most arresting feature is the striking color frontispiece plate, a bold and highly appealing chromolithograph that is impressive now and must have been exceptional in its day (and quite expensive to produce). Elder's screed against Zerbe is amusing, as is the edited version of Woodward's circular on numismatic periodicals, redacted to reflect poorly on Ed Frossard. The three different variants of the Endwell-Union Company catalogue are all rare. Arranged in three-column reduced typescript, they are comprised of buying prices preceded by a bit of historical text for each of the various series. According to Bowers, Endwell-Union was established for a brief time primarily as a vehicle to purchase 1955 double die cents. During the period, Bowers and/or Ruddy were the pre-eminent market-makers for this spectacular mint error. *Ruddy's Review* is very scarce, particularly (as here) complete. Some of the announcements of upcoming publications shed light on the publication of them, and should be preserved. Given the advance timing of

The M.N. Daycious Hoax

The greatest prank ever pulled on the American numismatic literature hobby. A simple mailer, cheaply and inexpertly produced, was sent from Texas in late March 1992 to a number of leading lights in the hobby, advertising an auction of numismatic books and catalogs ("a few going back to the 1820's"). Hints were dropped in the flyer to allow the knowledgeable recipient to deduce that what was being offered was the library of legendary Fort Worth coin dealer B. Max Mehl. "Many 100's of lots, recently discovered," promised the flyer. "From A long deceased dealer. Old coin books. Many old catalogs in beautiful leathers, though a number marked up with prices and various names. Nice photos in a number." The date on which the sale was to take place, in addition to the unusual appellation of the seller (M.N. Daycius = mendacious) led some to rightfully conclude that this was an April Fool's joke being played on the numismatic fraternity. Others were convinced that this was the find of a lifetime. The perpetrator has neither been revealed nor 'fessed up, though suspicions tend to focus on one individual whom discretion declines to name. The various clues and multiple levels of meaning in the flyer's text are revealing both of the composer's knowledge of his victims and his sense of humor. Ex Wayne Homren Library.

The story is the stuff of legends: over \$11,000 in face value of U.S. gold coins from \$1 to \$20, dated 1834-1856 and apparently buried at about the time of the Civil War, were unearthed by Jones and Grob in the cellar of a building in Baltimore on August 31, 1934. Poorly catalogued (condition, though apparently generally excellent, was described only as "fine" or "very fine" and no branch mint-marks are noted for the nearly 3000 1849-1856 gold dollars in the sale), the hoard brought slightly under \$20,000, most lots selling for little above bullion value. Leonard Augsburger's Treasure in the Cellar tells the story of this remarkable hoard and its discovery. The Paul Lange sale (also catalogued under The Hobby Shop) is the 1930 ANA sale. "Another Reason to Attend the A.N.A. Convention at Buffalo August 23rd to 28th, 1930," according to the front cover. A very scarce American Numismatic Association auction sale, one of only a small number we've handled in the last thirty years. In addition to being an active coin dealer at the time, Lange also served as ANA Librarian and Curator. Ex Wayne Homren Library.
