A lovely coin of Kardia. Very Fine. Kardia anciently the chief town of the Thracian Chersonese, was situated at the head of the Gulf of Melas. It was originally a colony of the Milesians and Clazomenians; but subsequently, in the time of Miltiades; the place also received Athenian colonists, as proved by Miltiades tyranny. The town was destroyed by Lysimachus about 309 BC, and although it was afterwards rebuilt, it never again rose to any degree of prosperity, as Lysimachia, which was built in its vicinity and peopled with the inhabitants of Cardia, became the chief town in that neighbourhood. Cardia was the birthplace of Alexander's secretary Eumenes and of the historian Hieronymus. 

Married Laodice, daughter of Mithridates II of Pontus. Appointed commander of all Asia west of Mount Taurus in 223 BC and then recovered Seleucid territories from Attalus I of Pergamum. The fourth Syrian war and the preoccupation of Antiochus and his army with Ptolemy IV and Molon provided Achaeus the opportunity to declare himself king in Phrygia in the autumn of 220, thus finally severing the ties with Antiochus III. In 218 BC Attalus regained control over the Greek cities of northern Ionia, Aeolis and Troas and the Mysian lands as far east as the Megistos river, which occupied Achaeus during the fourth Syrian war. He held power only until Antiochus had reached a peace with Ptolemy, and issued bronze coinage in his name; Antiochus then allied with Attalus to retake the territory Achaeus had claimed. Achaeus withstood a seige in the citadel of Sardis for two years. After sustaining a siege of two years, the citadel at last fell into the hands of Antiochus in 213 BC, through the treachery of Bolis (who had been employed by Sosibius, minister to Ptolemy). Bolis pledged to deliver Achaeus to safety, but turned him over to Antiochus, who immediately put him to death.

Parion, also called Parium, was a Greek city located on the border of historical lands of Troad and Mysia. In ancient times, Parion functioned as an important harbor for the surrounding settlements. There are also rumors about where the name of the Parion came from. It is said that its name may have come from Paros because it was founded by Parosians, or it may have come from Paris, the son of King Priam, one of the most important actors of the Trojan War. Antique coins from Parion testify to its great importance and advanced minting facilities. The most interesting picture, visible on the coins from the Hellenistic period, is the coat of arms. It depicts the so-called gorgoneion, i.e. the head of the Gorgon - a terrible mythological beast with sharp fangs, and hair in the form of poisonous snakes. In ancient times, gorgoneion served as an apotropaic amulet, reversing evil charms. The relation between the city of Parion and the Gorgon is not fully understood, most likely the monster was chosen as the emblem of the city to reverse bad intentions and repel attacks against its inhabitants. Perhaps it had to do with military power represented by Parion.

Located over the Tiber River, northwest of Rome, it stands in the Ponte Milvio district, which is now a neighborhood of the Italian capital. The Milvian Bridge is famous, especially for an event in the early 4th century that greatly influenced the future of the Roman Empire. In the year 312 AD, a pivotal moment in the fate of the Roman Empire occurred at the Battle of the Milvian Bridge, fought at this very crossing. The battle was between Constantine (Constantine the Great) and his rival Maxentius. Constantine's successful crossing of the bridge led to his victory in the battle, ultimately strengthening his hold on the empire and eventually leading to his sole rule as the Roman Emperor. The outcome of the Battle of the Milvian Bridge is also significant for Constantine's support of Christianity and its subsequent spread throughout the Roman Empire. Traditionally, it is believed that Constantine had a vision before the battle, seeing the Christian symbol "Labarum" (the Chi-Rho), and after this vision, he carried the Labarum into battle, achieving victory under its banner. The Milvian Bridge and the battle fought upon it remain pivotal moments in Roman history. Although the bridge has undergone many repairs and alterations over time, it still holds symbolic and historical importance for Rome.

The position of young Flavius Claudius Hannibalianus in the succession arrangements of Constantine I the Great (AD 306-337) remains obscure and mysterious. Rather oddly named in honor of Hannibal, one of Rome's greatest enemies, Hannibalianus was the son of Constantine's half-brother and thus the great Emperor's nephew. In AD 335 he was included in an elaborate five-way succession scheme along with his brother Delmatius and the three surviving sons of Constantine, who were all named Caesar. Hannibalianus, however, received a very different title-- Rex Regum et Pontiacarum Gentium, or "King of Kings and of the Pontic Peoples." Constantine apparently foresaw Hannibalianus as the eventual ruler of territories beyond the formal boundaries of the Empire, including the vast Sasanian Persian kingdom then ruled by Shapur II (AD 309-379). Indeed, Constantine spent his last years preparing a massive campaign against the Persians, but fell ill and died in May of AD 337, before it could be launched. The five-way succession scheme abruptly collapsed as Constantine's three sons seized control of the army and ordered the executions of their cousins. Coins of Hannibalianus were struck only at Constantinople and remain the only pieces struck to give the title "king" (REGI) to a Roman ruler. The reverse type, a reclining personification of the River Euphrates, supports the view that Constantine's eventual aim was to invade the Sasanian Persian Kingdom and install Hannibalianus at its head, thus ending the centuries-old conflict between East and West. In the first colonization process during the reign of Augustus, it was aimed to provide land for two veterans of legion army in Parion, and in the second colonization process during the reign of Hadrian, it was aimed to honour the town by gaining it the status of a colony.

Nevertheless, with personal effort and willingness he studied the Scriptures and the teachings of Jesus Christ. In the following years, he preached Christianity and was blessed with the gift of miracles with which he helped many people in need. In 250 AD he was arrested for his faith and brought before the local rulers to deny Christ. He was then subjected to horrific torture. They pierced him with swords all over his body, then tied him by the feet to horses and dragged him, in hours of terrible cold, to difficult and stony places. Moments after his gruesome death, the pagans beheaded him. The Christians received the honest relic of the Martyr and after anointing it with precious myrrh and wrapping it in a shroud, deposited it in an altar and sent it to the city of Lampsakos according to his wish. Fabulous stories are interwoven with his hagiography.


