he ubiquitous and persistent theme of the lion-bull combat can be traced back to the figurate art of the third millennium, where the geometrical motifs are replaced by narrative symbolic representations, and the scene is characteristic of Near Eastern art in its infancy. The earliest known depiction occurs on a ewer found at Uruk dated to the latter part of the Protoliterate period, circa 3300 BC. That ewer has a relief depiction of a lion attacking a bull from behind (see Henri Frankfort, Art and Architecture of the Ancient Orient, 1963). The scene became widely distributed by 500 BC, featuring prominently in the Achaemenid Empire, and in particular at the palace of Darios in Persepolis, where it occurs no fewer than twenty seven times, including on the main staircase leading to the imperial complex. Its frequent appearance in key locations strongly suggests an important symbolic significance, which unfortunately has not survived antiquity in any explicitly clear form.

Explanations for the symbolism and its power over the ancient peoples who reproduced it with prodigious enthusiasm have ranged from it being an expression of royal power, to an astronomical allusion, as well as it being an embodiment of the constant struggle between civilisation (represented by the domesticated bull) and nature (represented by the untameable lion). This latter argument may well hold true for the Mesopotamians of Uruk, who it is known took a rather grim view of the world, seeing it as a battleground of opposing powers.

One interpretation that has gained traction in recent years is that the motif is apotropaic in nature, serving to ward off evil in a similar function to the gorgoneion, which like the lion attack motif is very prevalent in ancient Greek coinage, though there is little evidence to support such a notion.

G. E. Markoe (The Lion Attack in Archaic Greek Art', Classical Antiquity Vol. 8, 1, 1989) convincingly suggests that a more likely explanation may be found in the examination of archaic Greek epic poetry, particularly in Homeric literature, wherein a lion attacking cattle or sheep is repeatedly employed as a simile for the aggression and valour of combatant heroes. In notable passages, Agamemnon's victorious advance against the Trojans in the Iliad (11.113ff and 129) and Hektor's successful pursuit of the Achaeans (15.630ff) are both likened to a lion triumphing over its hapless prey. In both of these cases the allusion is completed by the defeated being compared to fleeing prey animals. In all, there are twenty five examples present in the Iliad of heroic warriors being compared to leonine aggressors, with the victims variously compared to boars, sheep, goats, bulls or deer. The repetition of this literary device is clearly demonstrative of how deeply rooted the imagery was in the Greek (and perhaps more generally human) consciousness. Of further and great significance is the involvement of the gods as the primary instigators of heroic leonine aggression in almost every case, and as it is made clear that the lion itself is an animal that is divinely directed to its prey (11.480, by a daimon), so then is the lion attack a metaphor for divinely inspired heroic triumph.

In Greek mythology, Apollo's kithara wasn't merely an instrument; it was a source of inspiration, a means of calming divine tensions, and a symbol of cultural excellence. It was through the kithara that Apollo led the Muses, guiding humanity toward the arts and creativity.

n 323 BC, following the death of Alexander the Great, his half-brother, Philip III Arrhidaeus, was elevated to the throne of Macedonia. Though he lacked the leadership qualities of Alexander due to a mental disability, his reign became a symbol of the struggle for power between Alexander's generals. One artifact that captures this turbulent time is a gold stater struck in Susa, an ancient Persian city now under Macedonian control. The stater, minted around 323-317 BC, bore an image of Athena on one side and Nike, the goddess of victory, on the other, both traditional symbols of power and divine favor in Macedonian coinage. Though Philip III was a figurehead, the stater was likely issued by one of the regents who truly held power, using his name to legitimize their rule.

The gold coin circulated throughout the fragmented empire, representing a fragile peace. It became a silent witness to the ongoing Wars of the Diadochi, as generals fought to carve out their own realms. Philip III's reign, though marked by his lack of influence, was immortalized in the coins that bore his name, symbolizing the fleeting unity of Alexander's once-mighty empire.

spendos is particularly renowned for its numismatic heritage, especially the series of silver staters minted between 380 and 325 BC, during the city's time under Persian control. These staters are famous for their depictions of wrestling, a sport highly revered in Greek culture. Wrestling was not only one of the earliest and most prestigious Olympic events, but it also symbolized a blend of raw strength and skill, making it a fitting representation for the athletic traditions of Aspendos. What makes Aspendos coins especially unique is the portrayal of wrestling in 16 different positions across various coins, capturing distinct moments of the wrestlers engaging, grappling, and countering each other. This attention to detail and dynamic representation of the sport has made these coins particularly popular among collectors. On the reverse side of the coins, Aspendos featured the image of a slinger, likely as a punning reference to the city's name. The Greek word for sling, "σφενδόνη" (sphendone), closely resembles "Aspendos," much like the way the people of Rhodes adopted the rose as a symbol of their city due to the linguistic similarity between "Rhodes" and "rose" in Greek. This playfulness with language and symbolism was a common feature of ancient city coinage, allowing cities to celebrate their local identity while engaging in clever wordplay.

You have to bear the regular costs of the return if the delivered goods correspond to the ordered goods and the price of the returned items does not exceed an amount of € 40,00 or in case of a higher price of the product if you have not yet received the consideration at the time of the revocation or if you made a contractually agreed partial payment. Otherwise, the return is free for you. Items that cannot be delivered by parcel will be collected from you. Obligations to reimburse payments must be met within 14 days. The period begins for you with the sending of your declaration of revocation or the product, for us upon receiving either.

8. Warranty, damages, statue of limitations

The condition of our coins is based on the facts and pictures that are made public until the auction as well as generally accessible knowledge. Additional specifications of the condition are not agreed upon. This is specifically the case for written or oral disclosures. The condition of the coin is not guaranteed in any way.

In case of defects of title according to § 435 BGB the buyer is able to withdraw from the contract within a time frame of two years due to the respective defect of title or demand a reduction of the sale price. Additional rights of the buyer according to Para 7 or BGB, especially the right to supplementary performance, damages or reimbursement for frustrated expenses are excluded, except when the defect of title was concealed maliciously.

In case of a material defects according to § 434 BGBthe buyer is allowed to withdraw from the contract after showing prove of the material defect, if Savoca infringed her due care of cataloging the coin keeping in mind the rarity and value of the coin. Insignificant defects of coins of the value of \in 1000,00 or below do not constitute a right to withdraw from the contract. In case of a justified withdrawal the buyer receives back the purchase price step by step for the return of the coin in unchanged condition at the registered office of Savoca. Should the returning coin be manipulated or altered in any way, or should it no longer be in its original condition, it cannot be returned. All further claims of reduction of purchase price, damages or reimbursement of frustrated expenditure are excluded, except if Savoca concealed the defect maliciously.

Otherwise all other warranty rights of the buyer are excluded.

An enterprise or tradesman is not entitled to withdrawal, if he has not complied with his or her legal obligation of inspection, notification and rejection.

Savoca can transfer her claims against the vendor in case of justified defects of title or material to the buyer.

Claims of the buyer because of material defects become time-barred after one year after handover/delivery of the purchased item to the customer. Excluded from this are claims for defects of consumers as well as claims for damages due to injury of body, life or health as well as claims for damages due to grossly negligiently or deliberately caused damage by Savoca. Insofar the statutory statues of limitations are applicable.

9. Data protection clauses / Data protection and security

We collect, store and process data within the scope of the statutory provisions for the initiation, conclusion, processing and repackaging of a sales contract. When visiting our website, the IP address, date and time, the type of browser and the operating system of your PC, as well as the pages you are looking at, are logged. Conclusion on personal data is not possible and not intended. The personal data you provide to us e.g. via order or email (for example your name and contact details) will only be processed for correspondence with you and only for the purpose for which you provided us with the data. We only pass on your data to the shipping company commissioned with the delivery as far as this is necessary for the delivery of the goods. In order to process payments, we will pass on your payment data to the credit institution which is responsible for the payment. We assure that we do not pass on your personal data to third parties, unless we are legally obliged to do so or you have expressly given us prior consent. If we use third-party services for the execution and processing of processing processes, the provisions of the Federal Data Protection Act are complied with.

Personal data that has been communicated to us through our website will only be stored until the purpose for which they have been entrusted to us is fulfilled. Where trade and tax retention periods are to be observed, the duration of the storage of certain data may be up to ten years. If you no longer agree to the storage of your personal data, or if this has become incorrect, we will, upon appropriate instructions, make the deletion, correction or blocking of your data within the framework of the legal provisions. Upon request, you will receive free of charge information about all personal data that we have stored about you. 10. Final provisions

The laws of the Federal Republic of Germany shall apply with the exclusion of UN law pertaining to international sales of goods (CISG).

Insofar as the customer is a merchant, solely the district court Munich I (Germany) is responsible for all claims resulting from and in connection with the agreement entered into with the customer.

If single clauses of the contract with the purchaser, including these terms and conditions, prove invalid, in full or in part, or become so in the future, this shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions. The fully or partially invalid provision shall be replaced by a provision of which the commercial effect most closely approaches that of the invalid stipulation. In case of existing loopholes, the Parties will add a provision that ensures that the Parties' will is reflected correctly according to the overall contract terms.
