This striking Stater was minted in Herakleia during the city's peak period of prosperity. The imagery on the coin vividly reflects the diverse origins of Herakleia's population, particularly those from Thurii and Tarentum. The obverse features the head of Athena adorned with an Attic helmet, which includes a remarkable depiction of Skylla. This design is directly inspired by the contemporary coinage of Thurii and serves as a reminder of the Athenian origins of the Thurians. On the reverse, Herakles is shown grappling with the Nemean Lion, a motif that references both the Dorian heritage of the Tarentine settlers and the city's name. Herakles was widely regarded as the mythical ancestor of the Dorian Greeks, especially the Spartans, who originally founded Taras.


The Lucanians were an Italic people speaking Oscan who settled in the central Apennines around 400 BC, south of the Samnites. Their region roughly corresponds to modern-day Basilicata. During the 4th century BC, they frequently threatened the Greek colonies in southern Italy and, in 290 BC, allied with the Romans against the Samnites. However, they later supported Pyrrhus against Rome itself. During the Hannibalic period— the only time they minted coins— the Lucanians likely hoped to achieve definitive revenge against Rome. Yet, when Hannibal withdrew from Italy in 203 BC, the Lucanians were left to face their fate alone.

As with many of the cities of Magna Graecia, the gold issues of Metapontum are typically associated with periods of abnormal military expenditure. The similarity of the head of Hera here to that on the issues of Tarentum during the time of Alexander the Molossian, and the exceptional appearance of Hera on an issue of Metapontum, suggest that this issue was struck when the city was allied with the Epirote king.

The dating of this magnificent coin is debated, with estimates ranging from 290-280 BC to the more precise year of 302 BC. The latter date ties the coin to the Italian campaigns of Kleonymos, a Spartan general from the Agiad dynasty. Kleonymos, rejected as successor to his father Kleomenes II due to his unpopular rule, sought refuge in Italy around 303/2 BC. He supported the Spartan colony of Tarentum against the Lucanians and captured the Greek city of Metapontion in 302 BC. This stunning coin may have been struck to commemorate his brief victory. Kleonymos's turbulent career continued for three more decades, ending with his failed attempt to conquer Sparta in 272 BC, after which he vanished from historical records.





The Punic didrachm series was minted during a turbulent period in Sicilian history. After the Syracusans defeated the Athenians in 413 BC, Selinos resumed its conflict with Segesta in 410 BC. Facing renewed threats, the Elimian Segesta sought Carthaginian support, which led to Carthage subjugating Segesta and destroying both Selinos and Himera. This aggressive expansion alarmed the rest of Greek Sicily, but having just expelled the Athenians, they hesitated to intervene. The situation escalated when Hermocrates, a Syracusan exile, raided Punic territories in 407 BC, triggering a prolonged war that culminated in the destruction of cities like Akragas and Motya. In this context, the didrachm series, produced by the Siculo-Punic cities of Motya and Panormos, was likely used to fund Carthage's massive military efforts in Sicily. Segesta, newly under Carthaginian control and experienced in minting didrachms, probably played a key role in this production, as evidenced by die-sharing with Motya and Panormos. The presence of hybrid coins combining dies from these cities suggests a central mint, though its location is debated. While Jenkins and Hurter propose Panormos, Rutter argues convincingly for Segesta, which, considering the historical circumstances, seems the most plausible location.»

This short-lived coinage, likely issued to fund Athens' ill-fated expedition against Syracuse, represents a notable departure from earlier designs. The obverse portrays Dionysos with a cool, Olympian presence, his gaze and tousled hair reflecting contemporary Athenian monumental sculpture. The reverse shows Silenos in a more relaxed, humanized form, seated in a simplified landscape and anticipating his wine. This transition from rigid archaic forms to dynamic, lifelike depictions highlights the coin's artistic excellence and alignment with high classical aesthetics.


This intriguing coin was minted under one of the most obscure and mysterious kings of the early Mithradatic dynasty of Pontos. Little is known about Mithradates III beyond his striking series of tetradrachms, characterized by a highly realistic portrait. His reign likely occurred between 220 and 190 BC, a period lost to history as the Kingdom of Pontos faded into obscurity. Virtually nothing is known about his time on the throne, and some historians even question his very existence, adding to the enigma of this shadowy figure.







During the First Punic War (264-241 BC), silver coins minted by Carthage were not common. Carthaginian coinage primarily consisted of electrum (a gold-silver alloy) and bronze, as these metals were more accessible to them. Silver was less frequently used due to its scarcity in Carthaginian territories. However, during the war, some rare silver coins were minted to pay mercenary troops, particularly Greek soldiers accustomed to silver payments. This exceedingly rare coin appears to have been struck from a pair of dies never recorded before. Interestingly, the hairstyle of Tanit features tufts resembling a swan at the top of the head, similar to the Trihemistater of Jenkins & Lewis Group IX, dated just before the First Punic War, around 270-264 BC.

Alexandria of Egypt is myth, history and civilisation.

Alexandria was named after Alexander the Great, who founded it in 331 B.C. after conquering Egypt by crushing the Persians and proclaiming himself pharaonic ruler, son of Zeus Ammon, with his consecration by the oracle of the temple of the same name in the Oasis of Siwa: this is the story and the myth. Thereafter, Alexandrian civilisation developed during the period of the Hellenistic Egyptian reign under the 'Lagid' dynasty founded by Ptolemy I in 305 BC and ended in 30 BC with the death of Cleopatra VII. Immediately the capital of the kingdom, it became the metropolis and largest port in the Mediterranean; the seat of the famous 'Library', the largest and richest in the classical world; the builder of the 'Lighthouse', the monumental lighting structure recognised as one of the wonders of the ancient world; the home of extraordinary cultural and religious structures such as the "Museum", a famous place for meetings and teaching, and the 'Serapeum', the temple-sanctuary dedicated to the Greek Egyptian Zeus Serapis but also open to all the divinities of classical theology.

This is the Alexandrian civilisation that flourished during the Roman Empire after the conquest of Augustus and until the Arab invasion.

The successive populations 's overlapping during the centuries up to the present day, have disrupted and almost cancelled its ancient appearance, but the city and its civilisation live on through the precious images found on the Roman imperial coinage issued between 30 BC and 298 AD, referred to as 'Alexandrian', which is the subject of this anthological collection of mine that I offer to targeted collectors interested in discovering the originality and wonders of an extraordinary and unique cultural season of the classical world.

These are coins that, like those from my previous collection that I published in the book "Alexandria in Nummis", Muzzano 2017, I put together with others of ancient mints, in more than half a century of passionate research and that I have used as original work documents for the numismatic essays that I compile since 1966 and that I publish continuously since 1974 as you can notice in the appendix to this introduction.

I wish those who will take advantage of this opportunity, which brings together 285 specimens, all carefully and individually chosen for quality, rarity and artistic value as well as often prestigiously referenced, to perceive the same emotions and satisfactions that I have been able to benefit from for several decades.

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THE COINS OF THE NOMES OF EGYPT

Until Roman times ancient Egypt was divided into 42 administrative districts called Nomes: 20 belonged to Lower Egypt (Nile delta) and 22 to Upper Egypt (Nile course from Memphis to Elephantine-Aswan). Each nome had a chief town which was also a place of worship, with its own guardian deities and peculiar religious habits with specific local festivity.

The nomes are also known to have issued bronze coins by the mint of Alexandria in Egypt and for this reason they are forming part of the Alexandrian series. The coins are yet individually entitled to them and bears the images of their specific deities.

The period of these interesting coinage is relatively short and runs from the year 11 of Domitian (91-92 AD) to the year 8 of Antoninus Pius Augustus and Marcus Aurelius Caesar (144-145 AD), when it finally ceases. The collection presented here closes with ten specimens of this peculiar coinage, for the most part very rare, and the recent reference repertories concerning them, to which we refer, also mentioned in the coin cards, are the following:

In practice, once bronze was exhausted, it switched exclusively to misture coinage.



The depiction of the triumphal arch on the reverse of Alexandrian drachmas, which began with Domitian, ended with Hadrian and it is still to be considered rare and of exclusively Roman stylistic character, with no connection to Greco-Alexandrian or Egyptian architecture. It should therefore be seen as an expression of the assertion of the primacy of the empire capital in the intentions of the respective ruler or possibly confirmation of his occasional victorious war enterprise.

I note for the benefit of scholars that RPC also does justice to the mistakes in the determination of this drachm expressed in previous repertories.

First of all I refer to the study above mentioned, published by me in NAC 2014 referring to this coin, now updated following further examinations. comparisons and what suggested by RPC III 4317.1, plate 193 and RPC III 4317.2.1/4. This coin is absolutely rare: RPC knows only one item with such an obverse, shown at plate 193, while it records four coins with similar reverse, see RPC III 4217.2.1/4. Secondly, this specimen presents an absolutely anomalous and unusual technical characteristic compared to the normal system of Alexandrian coinage: in fact on the planchet the usual positions of the obverse and reverse are reversed, i.e. we note here on the obverse the portrait of Trajan struck with the respective minting in the position of an anvil (therefore more subject to deterioration) instead of the correct one of a hammer, a fact which takes on a further exceptional character, such as the demonstrated uniqueness of the obverse. But the greatest value of the coin is given by the reproduction on its reverse of a real Alexandrian monument, a fountain or nymphaeum otherwise unknown and no longer available today despite it being depicted here as real and complete as well as temporally circumstantiated at the issue of the drachm (108/109 AD) and confirmed by the contemporary documentary testimony of the historian Dione "Chrysostom" of Prusa in his "Oration to the Alexandrians" recited in the theater of the Egyptian

Coin of fundamental iconographic interest and of absolute rarity attends its improper position described in RPC III 4530.3 as well as, despite the correct description, the incorrect attribution in RPC III 4330.1 of the items Dattari 1160-1161-1162. The importance of the drachm lies in the reverse where the Egyptian temple represented is impressively similar to that of specimen 1161 illustrated in my essay on NAC 2018 cited above and clearly identified in the Hellenistic temple of Horus in Edfu where the relative recognition, in comparing the coins with the existing original monument, it was facilitated not only by the series of four windows being on each tower of the pylon of the facade and the pair of Horus-falcons facing each other on the roofs of the towers (all elements also present here), but also by the anthropomorphic figure of the canonical Horus depicted above the portal between the two towers, flanked at his feet by the image of the falcon, his alter ego. In our case the figure is intentionally replaced by that of his mythical mother according to Egyptian theogony, i.e. Isis, flanked at the feet et pour cause, by Harpokrates, the child Horus. How can we not therefore deduce from these explicit and convincing clues that this too is a representation of the temple of Horus in Edfu. on whose walls Isis is repeatedly depicted? Finally, from the precise comparison of the reverses of the specimens with similar images known from the main published repertoires (Dattari-Savio and RPC III) but which do not show identity with ours, it is possible to hypothesize that this is the only one known that reproduces all the characteristics above described below.

The Greek Eleusinian myth of Triptolemus is connected to that of Demeter, who in Egypt transforms into Isis-Demeter who protects and promotes the fertility of the Nile together with Triptolemus-Osiris. He is the legendary sower who here, stimulated by Demeter, flows to spread the seeds flying over the fields from Upper to Lower Egypt on the chariot pulled by the Egyptian Agathodaemones who here replace the dragons of the analogous Greek theology.

Beyond this unique variety the coin is well centered with an excellent brown patina, little circulated.

Splendid and very rare drachm from the renowned Dattari collection. The divine Nemesis-Demeter winged and clothed in the act of taking flight, holds with the left the wheel of destiny. It is perhaps an image of sowing, the second of the three seasons of the cycle of fertility of lands washed by the Nile, together with the hope of a particularly fruitful year. Excellent preservation and distribution of the original glossy brown patina.



The object in the shrine on the coins of Trajan does not look like a mummy of Osiris (as on the coins of Aurelius), and is perhaps a representation of its external decoration (see e.g. the barge depicted by Staffieri and Tosi on their p. 235). A specimen was also described by D for year 19 (D1159: '[L I] Θ '), but the date is not clear on the rubbing in DS (and the obv. illegible), and it is probably safer to regard it as probably another coin of year 15. The reverse refers to the Egyptian mythology of the facing pair of snakes: on the left the peaceful male Agazhodaermon sacred to Zeus-Sarapis and on the right the combative Pharaonic female Uraeus sacred to Isis which, together, indicate well-being and political stability, as well as fertility. In this rare example reported only by Dattari-Savio, the tails of the two snakes extend beyond the exergual line, accentuating the perspective and three-dimensionality of the scene.

A clarification regarding the statue that dominates from the top of the lantern of the lighthouse: it is Helios-Sarapis greek-egyptian deity of light and not Poseidon god of the sea or Zeus or anything else.



It is undoubtedly one of the absolute masterpieces of the master engravers of the Alexandrian mint and worthily celebrates the tragic figure of the young bithinian man who was Hadrian's favourite from 123 A.D. and accompanied him on all his travels in the provinces of the empire, until he perished by drowning in the Nile in an accident that has never been clarified, during the emperor's visit to Egypt with his court. His death took a heavy toll on Hadrian's spirits and body, but he reacted by publicly honouring him with heroic and then divine honours, linking his death to the sacrifice of Osiris, founding the city of Antinopolis-Antinous at the site of his death, instituting the cult of Antinous with respective temples and priestly colleges, having countless statues of him sculpted, scattered and found especially in the eastern part of the empire, and finally having coins minted with his portrait by almost thirty provincial mints, first among all, Alexandria of Egypt. The reference texts of Alexandrian issues are those of Gustave Blum (Numismatique d'Antinoos, in "Journal International d'Archéologie Numismatique", tome seizième, pp. 33-70 + tavv. I-V. Except on the obolus, all reverse of the Alexandrian series, so also on this rare Hemidrachm is repeated in the legend the attribution to Aelius of tribunician power and his second consulship, thus dating the coin according to the Roman calendar: the only exception in Alexandrian coinage.



This coin evidences as, the cult of Apollo Didymeus at Miletos, achieved a high level of fame throughout the ancient world, including Egypt.

The reverse of this interesting tetradracm, ex Dattari Collection, shows us a divinity extraneous to the Egyptian and Greco-Egyptian cult: it is the statuary figure of Apollo in the Didymeion of Miletus, famous ionic Sanctuaray-temple which competed with the seven wonders of the ancient world. Scholars agree on the hypothesis that the one depicted on this coin, as well as on the others in mixture or bronze of the years 7 to 11 of Antoninus Pius, is a faithful reproduction of the original statue of the temple (cfr. Vogt, J. I, p. 121. One could also think, with regard to the motif of this image on Alexandrian coins, of a semi-explicit, but nevertheless indicative form of alliance (OMONOIA) between the cities of Didyma and Alexandria.

This drachm belong to the lucky and famous series of the legendary "The labours of Hercules" or Dodekation, all depicted on the reverses of Alexandria drachms by Antoninus Pius, issued between the fourth (140-141 AD) and the tenth (146-147 AD) year of his reign, during one of the artistically happiest periods of the mint of Alexandria. Our drachm is absolutedly rare (grade 5 according to Emmett) and also the best specimen of the five known (see RPC IV. 4) and depicts on the reverse the third labour of Hercules, let us say, the capture of the Cerinea doe, which had bronze legs, gold horns; it was sacred to Artemis (Diana) and roamed unreachable over the crags and woods of Mount Cerinea, but the hero managed to trap her. Heracles stands out magnificently and sculpturally in his plastic, dynamic nudity as he immobilises the graceful doe who reluctantly bends to his will.

This extraordinary drachm is one of the rarest and most sought-after coins of the Alexandrian series, minted in the Antoninian golden age of the great master engravers of the mints of Alexandria in Egypt. Of the mythological "judgment of Paris" of typical classical Greek origin, there are two main versions of the transposition on the reverses of the Alexandrian drachms, with variations in the position of the characters: a very scarce one with the images of Hera standing together with Aphrodite and Athena (Cf. Staffieri G.M., Alexandria in Nummis, nr. 139, pp. 277-278, Muzzano , 2017) and the other, which is practically impossible to find, with Hera seated on a throne with a long scepter, between Aphrodite and Athena, is represented by this specimen. In fact, only the following documented six specimens of this version are known to date:


«The story of the judgement of Paris begins at the wedding of Peleus and Thetis (the parents of Achilles) to which every god or goddess was invited except Eris, the goddess of discord. In her anger she threw an apple into the gathering upon which it was written 'To The Fairest'. Three goddesses laid claim to the apple, Athena, Hera and Aphrodite, and it was decided that Zeus would choose the winner. Rather than facing the anger of the two not chosen, Zeus instructed Hermes to lead the goddesses to Paris, a prince of Troy who was known for his fairness. Each goddess offered Paris a bribe: Aphrodite promised the most beautiful woman in the world. Helen, as a wife (despite her being married already to the Greek Menelaus); Athena offered strength in battle and wisdom; and Hera offered to make him king of Europe and Asia. Paris chose Aphrodite's gift and thus made himself and Troy enemies of the Greeks and several gods (especially Hera). This animosity culminated in the Trojan War, a tenyear besiegement of Troy by the Greeks which is the central topic of Homer's Iliad.»

Another relevant example of the zodiac series issued in the eighth year of Antoninus Pius with Helios bust combined with the sign of the right rampant lion, as well as the imperial portrait on obverse, immersed in an original homogeneous chocolate brown color patina. It should be noted that the juxtaposition of the twelve signs of the zodiac was carried out astrologically and theologically with each of the divinities that accompanied the five planets known at the time in antiquity: Mercury, Mars, Jupiter, plus Helios and Selene.







On the reverse of this drachm appears the sign of Cancer on which Selene's bust rests. Some authors maintain with conviction that the zodiac series of the year 8 of the reign of Antoninus Pius (144-145 AD) was issued as an auspicious celebration of the wedding in that year, of Caesar Marcus Aurelius, with Faustina II, daughter of the emperor.

The cult of Apis was introduced in the pharaonic era from Memphis and bears the crescent moon imprinted on the body, while in front of it there is a sacrificial altar in Egyptian form.

The reverse of the drachm leads us to Heracles' second labor, that of fighting the Lernaean hydra and killing it. The hydra presented itself as a monstrous being with nine heads, one of which was immortal, while the others sprouted as soon as they were cut off; her body was half that of a beautiful nymph and half that of a snake. Heracles confronted it by burning off the eight heads to prevent them from reproducing, then crushed the immortal head with a boulder and dipped the tip of his arrows in the blood that gushed from them by causing the monster mortal wounds.



In pharaonic theology, Anubis was the jackal-headed anthropomorphic deity who presided over the embalming of bodies. In the Egyptian-Alexandrian world, the figure of Hermanubis was created by combining the Greek Hermes with the Egyptian Anubis in a divine synthesis, with human features, without a jackal's head and with psychopompa activity, i.e. accompanying the dead to the afterlife.

Isis in Greek-Egyptian theological syncretism is assimilated to the star Sothis, i.e. the Roman Sirius, the brightest star in the constellation of the Greater Dog: hence the visual meaning of the drachm's reverse.

On the reverse of this drachm we admire a fitting numismatic interpretation of another famous myth of Greco-Roman theology: that of the freeing of Andromeda by the hero Perseus, son of Zeus and Danae, in an eminent specimen already in the Dattari collection. According to legend, the young Andromeda was chained to a cliff above the sea at the mercy of a sea monster that was supposed to devour her. Perseus decided to free her. He killed the monster and helped her to leave the place of her agony, which is the scene engraved on the coin, at last making her his bride. Cf. also Staffieri G. 





A specimen of excellent quality and of large form, mentioned by RPC IV.4 2395 at number 5, dating back to the famous swiss collection of Dr. Hans Steger and put on auction sale on 18th March 1936 by Münzhandlung Basel belonging to brothers Herbert and Erich Cahn, successively founders and executives of the historical Münzen und Medaillen AG, in Basel, now extinguished. The catalogue of that auction was the first to be personally and masterfully edited by Herbert Cahn.

A coin considered very rare by RPC, which notices only four specimens including ours at no. 4.

A practically unobtainable drachm and the only specimen in a private collection as RPC IV.4 1493 refers of only one item belonging to a public collection. It is here a glorious demonstration of Roman sovereignty in the East (Vogt p. 138). One of the very few known specimens that RPC IV.4 2756 cites and illustrates in no. 7.

After Antoninus Pius's death in 161 AD, the Alexandrian coins minted for Faustina II show the reign years of her consort Marcus Aurelius and in this specimen is the fourth (163-164 AD). On the reverse we find one of the few coin representations of Cybele, an ancient Anatolian deity worshipped as the 'great mother' of Mount Ida near Troy: goddess of nature, animals and wild places. in Greek mythology she was identified with Rhea, the mother of the gods.

We are at the beginning of the peaceful and cooperative alliance of Marcus Aurelius and Lucius Verus at the head of the Roman Empire as solemnly affirmed on the reverse with the presence of the divine OMONOIA, corresponding to the Roman CONCORDIA AUGUSTORUM which was a constant of that period that ended in 169 AD with the premature death of Lucius Verus whom we recognize in the magnificent laureate bust on the obverse of this dracm of great charm.

It could also be the reproduction of a statuary group found in an Alexandrian monument. It should be noted the exceptional dark green original patina and the splendid preservation of the coin, already belonging to the Giovanni Dattari collection 3779, who showed its reverse on plate XXIV of his catalogue of 1901 and the same made RPC IV.4.2789.5 reproducing it in full.

On this magnificent drachm of Lucius Verus, formerly in the Dattari Collection, is repeated, on the reverse, the image of the two canopic jars of Osiris (left) and Isis (right) facing each other, which we have already encountered on drachm No. 166 in the collection, of co-ruler Marcus Aurelius, issued in year 6 of their joint reign (165-166 AD). It is therefore a parallel and contemporary mintage as evidence of allegiance to a cult of pharaonic origin still deeply rooted in Egypt, in the Roman imperial period. The physiognomic portrait of Lucius Verus is majestic. The original dark brown patina is limpid. This very rare drachm is known to RPC IV.4.2921 in only 3 examples (this one No. 3).

We are in his first year of reign (180 -181 AD) and Commodus presents himself in victorious and triumphant form.



This coin regards exclusively the year 12 of Gallienus' reign (264-265 AD). On the reverse is the deification of Alexandria with her attributes, destined to protect the "princeps juventutis", yet doomed to die in the Illyrian, quite at the beginning of 258 AD.








Beginning with this tetradrachm, of great rarity, of the presumed year 5 of the Zenobia's very young son Vaballathus, an Alexandrian numismatic representation of the period of Aurelian's 'connivance' with the exponents of the kingdom of Palmyra, later self-proclaimed as sole Augustus, as attested by this coin and by no. 250 in the collection, both in conflict with Aurelian who ended up exorcising them in 272 by expelling them from Alexandria and conquering Palmyra. The invoked Omonoia (= concord) depicted on the reverse was therefore a pathetic and ephemeral illusion.

This rare issuing of Aurelian and Vaballathus combined, by hasty strikes and always irregular size, is the final bronze Alexandrian coinage, of which exist two different numerals that we will fix as reduced drachm (of the weight of circa 8,5 g.) and reduced emidrachm (just over 4 g.). Our specimen should be considered a reduced drachm and belongs to the short-lived period of imposed Omonoia of 271-beginning of 272 A.D., of Aurelianus together with the son of the notorious Zenobia. Septimia Zenobia (circa 240 – 275 A.D.), queen of Palmira in Syria from 268 to 272 A.D. and lastly self-proclaimed Augusta, was one of the "femmes fatales" of classical antiquity. Zenobia, second wife of Odaenathus, lord of Palmira (circa 260-268 A.D.) and defender of the eastern borders of the roman empire against Sassanids, got rid of her consort and her stepson Herodian, turning the state into a reign independent from the roman empire. She self-proclaimed Augusta and descendant of the great Cleopatra, conquered wide regions in the East pushing as far as Antioch of Syria and Alexandria of Egypt, controlling the mint in these areas but only for a short time. Aurelian, the legitimate reigning ruler, temporarily adapted to a tolerated co-regency with her between 270 and the beginning of 272 A.D. This was until, in her delirium of omnipotence, Zenobia openly challenged Aurelian by dissociating himself from Omonoia and pursued his own independent path together with his young son Vaballathus, usurping the imperial dignity. To this very short period of 272 A.D. belong the few tetradrachms named to her or her son Vaballathus: her army was soon defeated by Aurelian indeed who regained possession of all Syrian and Egyptian regions occupied by Palmira troops and brought with him in triumph Zenobia with Vaballathus to Rome. This is one of the rarest and most sought-after coin of the Alexandrian autonomous series, also for its high historical importance. Our specimen is particularly well-centred and preserved; on the reverse the godlike Selene is indicated as the guardian of the Augusta Zenobia, but she was certainly not prophetic.

The reverse of the tetradrachm praises the victorious Nike, which did not bring Tacitus luck.

This tetradrachm refers to his first and sole year of reign (282-283 A.D.) and shows on the reverse the imperial eagle advancing right on the exergue holding a palm branch and a wreath in its beak.

With the advent of Diocletian, a great general and brilliant politician, the institutional and administrative composition of the Roman Empire was structurally modified through the creation of the Tetrarchy, with the territory divided into East and West, respectively governed by an Augustus and a Caesar, an organization inaugurated in March 293 AD and coinciding with the minting year of our superb and rare tetradrachm, already belonging to the famous Giovanni Dattari Collection, A coin of large size, excellent original chocolate-brown patina, in practice uncirculated.

After the defeat and death of Carinus during the battle of Margus in August 285 A.D. Diocletian's second "decennalia" were celebrated.

The emperor's disputed centralist monetary reform came into full force only 2 years later, in 298 AD, following the repression of Domitian's revolt. Magnificent physiognomic portrait of Diocletian on the obverse of this rare tetradrachm and a pretty image of Isis on the reverse.

On the reverse of this rare tetradrachm, the peaceful Elpis is offering her support to the new Caesar in his installation's year. At the exergue, the mark with the letter A, suggests us the first mint's workshop.

In the first tetrarchy (293-305 AD) Galerius, a brave general, was the Caesar of Diocletian, whose daughter Galeria Valeria he had married in second marriage. This exceptional tetradrachm of the third year (294-295 AD) is still to be considered the only known specimen and in excellent conditions of conservation, minting and well-centred with original patina. Lively the portrait of the leader Caesar on the obverse, and austere the laureate bust of Roman Zeus turned right on the reverse.

The first coin of the series of nomes is a very rare drachm of the year 12 of Trajan (108-109 AD) issued by nomo Prosopite from Lower Egypt. The obverse presents a laureate bust of the sovereign of excellent style and conservation, very realistic, while on the reverse is the Hellenistic-Egyptian personification of Hermanubis to left, dressed in chiton and himation, Nemes and Hem-hem crown on head, while putting a finger of the right hand in his mouth. In fact, it is the Greek rendering of the local Pharaonic deity Harsomtus, corresponding to the combination of Horus, son of Osiris, with Somtus, the "Unifier of the Upper and Lower Egypt". This drachm is so important and so well preserved as to be cited and illustrated in RPC III 6797, referring of only four specimens extant, and also to have been described, chosen and illustrated by Geissen – Weber pp. 233-234, Plate XIII, n. 125 b.

The Greek Athena is related to Egyptian Isis and Neith; the latter had at Sais her own temple where the cult of Isis was also active with its own priestly college.



This Pharaonic subject, a real exception in the Alexandrian coinage, refers to the draining works of the vast Fajum oasis, belonging to the land of nome Arsinoite, carried out in the time of the 12th dynasty and in particular during the reign of Pharaoh Amenemhet III, whose memory is still honoured on the coin after almost two millennia.

More than sixty years after the stunning and diverse issues of Augustus, the Romans once again minted cistophori under Claudius, with two short-lived series likely intended for commemorative purposes rather than general circulation. This particular coin, from the first series, is thought to depict the temple of Roma and Augustus in Pergamum, although there is evidence linking this type and the temple of Diana at Ephesus. Such connections suggest that despite the differing reverse designs, all coins were likely struck at a single mint, probably Ephesus, where the second Claudian issue also seems to have been produced.





The reverse type has been compared to the heifer of Myron, the famous Athenian sculptor of the 5th century BC. C. Mattingly in the British Museum catalog states that "The heifer is indisputably the famous statue of Myron which was placed by Augustus in the 'Porticus Apollinis' and which was transferred by Vespasian to the temple of Peace" (BMC p. xxxviii). Carradice and Buttrey in the revised edition of the Roman Imperial Coinage are more cautious, suggesting that the connection with Myron is hypothetical (RIC p. 30). However, the reverse draws inspiration from the previous series of aurei depicting bulls or heifers issued by Augustus.

None of the authors who have examined the Gazoldo mint in general or this interesting imitation in particular (to name a few: Promis, Kunz, Papadopoli, Perini, compilers of the CNI, Magnaguti, Gamberini, Pesce, Navarrini, Guidetti) seem to have noted that, in addition to the modification of the legends compared to the original, this imitation presents a small but important variation in the design of the obverse, which introduces a complete monogram of the name HIPPOLITI into the so-called stylized castle (which is more likely a gate, symbol of IANUA).







The medal celebrates the feats of the Italian army during the Italian-Turkish War and is dedicated to the valiant captain Giuseppe Locurcio. In 1913, an expedition was organised under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Antonio Giuseppe Miani to conquer the remote Fezzan region. The 5th Eritrean battalion commanded by Captain Domenico De Dominicis managed to rout the enemy near the oasis of Esc Scebb and was victorious in the bloody battle of Maharuga, where the Neapolitan captain lost his life, earning him the gold medal for military valour. Another brave member of the Italian contingent was Giuseppe Locurcio, an experienced artillery captain who had distinguished himself several times in Benadir, Somalia. He was chosen to be in charge of the artillery contingent in support of the infantry and on 13 December 1913, after defeating the enemy, his unit entered the town of Brak victorious. The Italian flag flew in one of the most important oases in that region and within a few days, with concerted war actions with Captain De Dominicis' infantry, the entire Fezzan region was conquered. From an artistic point of view, the medal shows an interesting usage of perspective.

Pierre Jeannin was born in Autun around 1540 and died in Paris in 1622 or 1623. He was a lawyer and in 1579 he became President of the Burgundian Parliament and soon after an influential advisor to King Henry IV leading many diplomatic missions. Being a member of the Council of State, he had an important role in the politics of that time and from 1607 to 1609 he was ambassador to the United Provinces. After the murder of the King Henry IV in 1610, Jeanin was responsible of the finances for Maria de' Medici and her son, King Louis XIII, until his dismissal in 1616.

The Furietti Centaurs are a pair of Roman marble centaurs based on Hellenistic models. They were originally dug up by Giuseppe Alessandro Furietti in Hadrian's Villa in Tivoli in 1736, who refused to hand them over to the Vatican and kept them in his private collection instead. When Furietti - now cardinal - passed away in 1765, his heirs sold his Centaurs and the so-called Furietti Mosaic to the Capitoline Museum for a whopping 14,000 scudi, where they are still on display today.














The medal commemorates the elevation of St. Ephrem to Doctor of the Universal Church.

This imposing palace was built before the establishment of the Vatican City State and was to be the new seat of the Roman Minor Seminary, but the Concordat between The Holy See and the Italian State led to a change in the destination of the building which therefore became the Governor's Palace of the Vatican City.
