  - 3 Island of Caria. Rhodos. Rhodes. Circa 305-275 BC. AR Didrachm (6.54g/ 18mm). Head of Helios facing, turned slightly to the right/  $PO\Delta ION$  Rose with bud to right; to left, hydria above EY. Ashton 160. SNG Copenhagen 730. SNG Keckman 462. Vey fine.

Kings of Macedon. Alexander III the Great (336-323 BC). AR 4 Drachm (4.05g/ 18mm). Head of Herakles to right, wearing lion skin headdress/ Zeus Aëtophoros seated to left, holding sceptre. Very fine.

5 Kings of Macedon. Alexander III the Great (336-323 BC). AR Drachm (4.11g/ 17mm). Early posthumous issue, Lampsacus, ca. 323-317 BC. Head of Heracles right, wearing lion skin headdress, paws tied before neck / AAEEANAPOY, Zeus seated left on backless throne, right leg drawn back, feet on stool, eagle in outstretched right hand, grounded scepter in left; buckle left

above  $\Delta$  in left field, AI below throne. Very fine. Price 1380.











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6 Achaemenid Empire. Time of Xerxes II to Artaxerxes III (c. 420-350 BC). AR Siglos. (5.42g/ 15mm). Carradice-Type IVa. Persian king or hero right, in kneeling-running stance, holding bow and dagger, guiver at shoulder, Countermarks / Incuse punch. Carradice Type IV. Bankers' marks on obverse and reverse. Choice very fine. Beautiful toning.



7 Achaemenid Empire. Time of Xerxes II to Artaxerxes III (c. 420-350 BC). AR Siglos. (5.50g/ 14mm). Carradice-Type IVa. Persian king or hero right, in kneeling-running stance, holding bow and dagger, quiver at shoulder, Countermarks / Incuse punch. Carradice Type IV. Bankers' marks on obverse and reverse. Choice very fine. Beautiful toning.



Radiate and diademed head right; monogram (mark of value) to left / ΒΑΣΙΛΕΩΣ ΑΝΤΙΟ[XOY], goddess, wearing polos and holding Nike in extended right hand, seated left on throne; at feet to left, bird standing left. SC 1508; ESM p. 272; HGC 9, 635; CSE 982-3. Near Extremely fine, even dark brown surfaces. Exceptional for issue. Extremely rare, one sample sold at CNG Triton XXII for \$1500.

Bopearachchi 2B; Mitchiner 169b; SNG ANS 437-8; HGC 12, 135. Extremely fine.









Parthian Empire. Mithradates II (121-91 BC). AR Drachm 14 (3.86g/ 19mm). Ekbatana mint. Phase IV, circa 99/8-91 BC. Bust left, wearing tiara with ear flap, torque ending in seahorse / Archer (Arsakes I) seated right, holding bow. SNP 2 Vb. $\alpha(1)/4d.\alpha(1)$ ; Sellwood 28.7; Sunrise 300; Shore 99. Very fine, nice toning.

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**15** Parthian Empire. Mithradates II. 121-91 BC. AR Drachm (3.96g/ 18mm). Ekbatana mint. Phase III, circa 111/110-100/99 BC. Diademed bust left; torque ends in sea-horse / Archer (Arsakes I) seated right on throne, holding bow. SNP 2 IVb. $\alpha$ (1)/4d. $\alpha$ (1); Sellwood 27.1-2 (Rhagai); Sunrise 293; Shore 85. Extremely fine, lovely toning.



**16** Parthian Empire.Mithradates II. 121-91 BC. AR Drachm (4.19g/ 18mm). Ekbatana mint. Phase III, circa 111/110-100/99 BC. Diademed bust left; torque ends in sea-horse / Archer (Arsakes I) seated right on throne, holding bow. SNP 2 IVb. $\alpha$ (1)/4d. $\alpha$ (1); Sellwood 27.1-2 (Rhagai); Sunrise 293; Shore 85. Extremely fine, lovely toning.

Very fine, original dark patina.

Diademed and draped bust left, wearing long beard and torque; to right, star above anchor symbol / Diademed and draped bust left, wearing beard;  $A\Xi[\Sigma]$  (date) in exergue. van't Haaff Type 9.1.1; Alram 463. Very fine, some original deposit on obverse and reverse.



**26** Kings of Armenia. Tigranes II 'the Great" (95-56 BC). Æ Chalkous (1.18g/ 13mm), Tigranokerta, circa 80-68. Draped bust of Tigranes II to right, wearing five-pointed tiara decorated with a star between two eagles and tied with a diadem/  $BA\Sigma I \Lambda E \Omega \Sigma$  /  $BA\Sigma I \Lambda E \Omega N$  - TIFPANOY Cornucopiae tied with a fillet; below, A; in exergue,  $\Delta H$ . Kovacs 87. Well centered and unusually complete. Very fine.



**27** Baktria. Indo-Greek Kingdom. Menander I Soter (Circa 155-130 BC). AR Drachm (2.46g/ 16mm). Diademed, draped, and cuirassed bust right, wearing crested helmet covered with pelt of scales and adorned with wing / Athena Alkidemos advancing left; monogram to right. Bopearachchi 16I; SNG ANS 879-92; HGC 12, 19. Extremely fine, nice toning.



**28** Baktria. Indo-Greek Kingdom. Hermaios Soter. Circa 105-90 BC. AR Drachm (1.90g/ 17mm). Diademed and draped bust right / Zeus enthroned facing slightly left, holding scepter; monogram to right.. Senior, Hermaios 10D.1; Bopearachchi 3A; HGC 12, 293. Very fine. Ex Emporium Hamburg Auction 73 & e-Auction 501, 2012 & 2015; Sold for 70 EUR.

30 Indo-Greek. Apollodotus I Soter (ca. 180-160 BC). AR Square 14mm). Bilingual Drachm (1.63q/ series, obv. Bacillios Apollodpotou Sotherus legend around an Indian elephant, standing right, monogram in exergue/ Maharajasa MT Apaladatasa Tradarasa legend in Karosthi around zebu bull. Very fine. Rare.



**31** Indo-Scythian Kingdom. Azes II (ca. 35 BC - 5 AD). AR drachm (2.12 g/ 15mm). Scythian king advancing on horseback to r., Kharosthi letter (Ga) to r., Greek legend around / Pallas Athena standing I., holding spear and shield with 'rajadirajasa'-legend in Kharosthi around. Senior Type 349. Very fine, nice rainbow patina on obverse, uncleaned reverse.

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**38** Sasanian Empire. Shapur I (240-272). AR Drachm (4.11g/ 25mm), mint I ('Ctesiphon'). 'mzdysn bgy šhpwhry MRKAn MRKA 'yr'n MNW ctry MN yzd'n' = 'mazdēsn bay Šābuhr šāhān šāh Ērān kē čihr az yaz(a)dān' ('The Mazda-worshipping Lord Shapur, King of Kings of the Iranians, whose essence is from the gods' in deteriorated Pahlavi) Diademed and draped bust of Shapur I to right, wearing mural crown with a great korymbos on top and long earflaps; long beard with two rings and thick tufts of curly hair at the back; two ribbons rising from behind head. Rev. Zoroastrian fire altar flanked by two regal attendants wearing mural crowns and holding scepters; to right and left, 'NWRA ZY šhpwhry', i.e. 'ādur ī Šābuhr' ('Fire of Shapur' in Pahlavi). Göbl type I/1. SNS I, type IIc/1b, style P. Nicely toned. Areas of weakness and with some light deposits, otherwise, very fine.



**39** Sasanian Empire. Shapur I (240-272). AR fourree Obol (0.95g/ 14mm). A fascinating ancient coin featuring a copper core with a thin silver plating, likely an ancient counterfeit. Extremely fine and rare.



**40** Sasanian Empire. Shapur II (AD 309-379). Gold Dinar (7g/ 18mm). Mint IV (Merv), ca. AD 320. Bust of Shapur II right, wearing mural crown with korymbos; pellet to right. Reverse: Fire altar with ribbons; legend to right of altar shaft. SNS type la/1b, A18; Göbl type 1a/7. Full Merv mintmark. Lustrous. Extremely Fine. Ex Collection of a UK collector formed in early 2000s.

**42** Sasanian Empire. Kavād (Kavādh) I. First reign (AD 488-497). AR Drachm (4.04g/ 26mm). ŠY (Shirajān) mint. Crowned bust right; star to left / Fire altar with ribbons and attendants; star and crescent flanking flames; kw't (Kavād) in Pahlavi on left, mint signature on right. SNS type I/1. Very fine.



**43** Sasanian Empire. Khusrau II (590-628). AR Drachm (4.11g/ 32mm). BBA (the Court), year 33. Crowned bust right / Fire altar flanked by attendants. Göbl II/3.

Hephtalite. Anonymous (ca. 486-490). AR Drachm (4.03g/ 45 27mm). Derived from Göbl-176 of Peroz, with normal winged crown of Peroz, blundered obverse legend, blundered legend left and imitative DA mint signature (for Darabjird) to right on reverse, Pahlavi "M" to left. These drachms closely imitate issues of the Sasanian Peroz (457-484), both his second type (struck circa 460-474) and the abundant third type (474-484). Hephthalite invasions into Sasanian lands started about 474, again about 480, finally in 484, when Peroz was killed and most of Khorasan brought under Hephthalite control. Sasanian coinage at Marw and Herat ceased, not to be resumed after those cities were retaken by the Sasanians under Kavad I about 512. Peroz was ransomed during his defeat in the second battle about 482 for "30 mule packs of silver drachms", which must have become the standard circulation in Hephthalite territories, with large numbers found in Tokharistan countermarked with various local symbols. The common Hephthalite coinage of their own were imitations of Peroz type three, with four large pellets added to the obverse margin (Göbl-287/289, including several variants), most of which bear the mint name boxlo in the Baktrian script on the reverse in the standard position at the far right. We do not know when this series was introduced, but would guess at some time during the first right of Kavad I (488-497). A significant group of previously unrecognized type has recently been brought to market. The drachms are relatively close copies of Peroz drachms, both his second type (Göbl-171) and third type (Göbl 174 & 176). They lack the four large pellets in the obverse margin. The obverse may have no legend whatsoever, or a crude copy of the Peroz legend or completely meaningless script. The reverse may have the Pahlavi letter "M" as on G-171 and 176, often hopelessly engraved; some retain a very crude imitation of a Pahlavi mint signature. This type would have been introduced soon after the 484 conquest, perhaps after the ransom supply was dispersed and now coins had to be minted. An extremely rare example of this type bear a large star to the left of the king's crown, first introduced by Kavad I for his first type in 488. The rarity of the star type suggests that the production of this series ended not long afterwards, probably discontinued during the early 490s. Thus this series was only briefly struck only circa 486-490+.We should mention that a few examples of this newly reported type have in fact been known for a long time, published either as Sasanian Imitations or as poorly engraved examples of Peroz's normal type 2 and type 3 drachms



Hephtalite. Anonymous (ca. 486-490). AR Drachm (4.14g/ 46 25mm). Derived from Göbl-176 of Peroz, with normal winged crown of Peroz, blundered obverse legend, blundered legend left and imitative ART (Ardashir-Khurra) mint signature (for Darabjird) to right on reverse, Pahlavi "M" to left. These drachms closely imitate issues of the Sasanian Peroz (457-484), both his second type (struck circa 460-474) and the abundant third type (474-484). Hephthalite invasions into Sasanian lands started about 474, again about 480, finally in 484, when Peroz was killed and most of Khorasan brought under Hephthalite control. Sasanian coinage at Marw and Herat ceased, not to be resumed after those cities were retaken by the Sasanians under Kavad I about 512. Peroz was ransomed during his defeat in the second battle about 482 for "30 mule packs of silver drachms", which must have become the standard circulation in Hephthalite territories, with large numbers found in Tokharistan countermarked with various local symbols. **47** Hephthalites. AR Drachm (3.81g/ 30mm), imitating a drachm of Hormizd IV (579-590) from Balkh. Uncertain mint in Bactria, after 589. Draped bust of Hormizd IV to right, wearing elaborate mural crown with frontal crescent and korymbos set on crescent; behind head, AFZUT ('may increase' in Pahlawi); before head, WHLMZD ('Hormizd' in Pahlawi); in outer margin, countermark of a helmeted head of a Huna, wearing an earring/ Fire altar flanked by two attendants; in upper left field, six-pointed star; in upper right field, crescent; to left, date in Pahlawi (RY 11 = AD 589); to right, BHL (Balkh, name of the mint in Pahlawi); in outer marigin, countermark of obopo in Bactrian. Vondrovec, type O.IV. Nicely toned. Some marks, otherwise, about very fine. The Sasanian occupation of Bactria lasted only a few years, but their Balkh drachms from the regnal years 9-11 became the prototypes of the local numismatic iconography and were eagerly imitated by the Hephtalite authorities for several decades.

Draped bust of Bahram V to right, wearing elaborate mural crown with frontal crescent and korymbos set on crescent/ Fire altar flanked by two attendants. Very fine an rare.

Crawford 415/1 note; Sydenham 926a; Aemilia 10b; RBW –. Lightly toned, very fine.


