In colloquial language, "Regenbogenschüsselchen" refers to a unique type of Celtic gold and silver coin that was in circulation in a region stretching from what is now Hungary through Austria to southern Germany between roughly 200 BC and the turn of the era. These coins are known for their characteristic bowl-like shape and typically lack any inscriptions. Instead, they feature abstract, symbolic patterns or tangible motifs from Celtic iconography. The name "Regenbogenschüsselchen," which translates to "rainbow bowls," derives from a superstition that these gold pieces fell from the sky as if from a rainbow and landed on the earth. The unique curvature of these coins made them stand out when discovered, especially when the sun was at the observer's back, as their shape allowed them to reflect sunlight back in the direction it came from. This sometimes led people to believe that the coin had fallen from the heavens and was gleaming under a rainbow. These mysterious coins were often uncovered during plowing and were believed to bring luck, possessing even healing properties. This finding context likely inspired the Grimm fairy tale "The Star Money." The Bohemian numismatist Nikolaus Adaukt Voigt used the Podmokl coin hoard discovery in 1771 to characterize these coins as early indigenous pieces, dispelling theories about their foreign origin.

What makes him intriguing is the juxtaposition of his seemingly comical appearance with the wisdom he was believed to possess. In the realm of Greek mythology, Silenos played a pivotal role as a tutor and advisor to Dionysus, imparting his accumulated wisdom to the god and his followers. Despite the often chaotic and drunken nature attributed to him, Silenos carried an aura of ancient knowledge, symbolizing the harmony of revelry and wisdom. Art and literature of ancient Greece frequently featured Silenos, showcasing his jovial escapades and close association with Dionysus. Scenes of him riding a donkey or surrounded by satyrs underscored his connection to the untamed and joyous aspects of life. One notable myth involving Silenos centers around King Midas of Phrygia, who, after capturing Silenos, received a wish from Dionysus. The consequence of Midas' wish for the golden touch, a tale that has transcended myth into the realms of cautionary folklore, adds another layer to Silenos' narrative.

The Aesillas Tetradrachm: A Symbol of Roman Authority in Macedon. Following the Roman conquest of Macedon in 168 BC, the oncepowerful kingdom was divided into four client republics before being formally annexed as a Roman province in 148 BC. By the late 2nd century BC, Rome introduced its own provincial coinage, including the silver tetradrachms issued under the authority of Aesillas, a Roman quaestor (financial officer) governing Macedon around 90-75 BC. The obverse of this coin features the deified Alexander the Great, depicted with the horn of Ammon, reinforcing Macedonian heritage despite Roman rule. The reverse, however, is distinctly Roman in nature, displaying a money chest and quaestor's chair flanking a club, with the name "AESILLAS" inscribed above—a direct assertion of Roman administrative control. One of the remarkable aspects of this issue is the rarity of fully legible legends on the flan. Due to inconsistent die alignment and flan preparation, the inscription often appears off-centered or partially struck, making wellcentered specimens with a complete and clear legend highly desirable among collectors. This coin represents a fascinating fusion of Greek and Roman influences during a pivotal transitional period in Macedonian history.

The drachms of Eucratides I are significantly rarer than his tetradrachms due to differences in production and circulation. Eucratides I, one of the most powerful kings of the Greco-Bactrian Kingdom (c. 171-145 BC), issued large quantities of tetradrachms to finance his military campaigns and assert his dominance over the region. These larger denominations were more practical for high-value transactions and were widely used in trade, leading to their more frequent survival. In contrast, drachms were minted in much smaller numbers, likely intended for local use rather than large-scale commerce. Additionally, tetradrachms were often hoarded due to their intrinsic value, while drachms, being lower denominations, saw more daily circulation and wear, leading to higher attrition over time. As a result, far fewer drachms of Eucratides I have survived, making them a rarity in comparison to his more abundant tetradrachms.

His military commander, Timesitheus, played a crucial role in managing these campaigns and preserving the stability of the empire. However, in AD 244, Gordian III's reign came to an abrupt end when he died under suspicious circumstances while on a campaign in the East. His death marked the rise of Philip the Arab as the next Roman emperor.

Septimius Severus, born as Lucius Septimius Severus in AD 145, was a Roman Emperor whose remarkable rise to power and eventful reign left a lasting impact on the Roman Empire. Hailing from Leptis Magna, a prosperous city in modern-day Libya, Severus belonged to a distinguished family. In AD 193, the Roman Empire was engulfed in chaos after the assassination of Emperor Pertinax. Amid the power vacuum, Severus, then governor of Upper Pannonia, seized the opportunity and declared himself emperor. With a formidable army at his disposal, he marched on Rome, defeating his rivals and ascending to the imperial throne. Severus proved to be a capable military leader. His reign was characterized by ambitious military campaigns to strengthen and expand the Roman Empire's frontiers. He notably ventured into Britain, strengthening Hadrian's Wall and reoccupying the Antonine Wall. In the East, he secured victories against the Parthian Empire, adding to his growing reputation as a skillful commander. As emperor, Severus implemented a series of significant reforms. He increased the pay of Roman soldiers, ensuring their loyalty and support. Granting Roman citizenship to the soldiers further solidified their allegiance to the empire. His reign marked a period of centralized power, as he expanded the emperor's authority over the provinces, contributing to greater imperial control. Family played a crucial role in Severus' reign. His wife, Julia Domna, a highly educated and politically astute woman, exerted considerable influence on his decisions. Together, they had two sons, Caracalla and Geta. However, the once-close siblings became embroiled in a bitter rivalry for power. After Severus' death in AD 211, Caracalla orchestrated Geta's assassination, leaving him as the sole ruler.

Mark Antony and the Denarius of 38 BC Mark Antony, one of the most powerful figures of the late Roman Republic, was a key ally of Julius Caesar and later a member of the Second Triumvirate alongside Octavian and Lepidus. This silver denarius, struck in Athens in the summer of 38 BC, reflects both his political and religious status. On the obverse, we see the radiate head of Sol, the sun god, symbolizing divine favor and possibly alluding to Antony's association with the East and his relationship with Cleopatra. The reverse features Antony in his role as augur, holding a lituus (a curved staff used for divination), emphasizing his religious authority and ties to Rome's sacred traditions. This period was marked by Antony's growing conflict with Octavian, as the alliance between the triumvirs weakened. By 31 BC, tensions culminated in the Battle of Actium, leading to Antony's ultimate defeat and his tragic end in 30 BC. This denarius serves as a powerful testament to Antony's attempt to legitimize his rule through divine and religious imagery, reinforcing his position in the turbulent final years of the Republic.

He was the grandnephew and adopted heir of Julius Caesar, who posthumously named him his successor in his will. After Caesar's assassination in 44 BC, Octavian, as he was then known, quickly positioned himself as a central figure in Roman politics. Following Caesar's death, Augustus formed the Second Triumvirate in 43 BC with Mark Antony and Marcus Aemilius Lepidus, a powerful alliance that sought to defeat Caesar's assassins and take control of Rome. This period was marked by proscriptions and political purges, as the triumvirs eliminated their rivals. The triumvirate eventually dissolved due to internal conflicts, leading to a power struggle between Octavian and Mark Antony. This struggle culminated in the Battle of Actium in 31 BC, where Octavian's forces decisively defeated Antony and Cleopatra, the gueen of Egypt. Following their defeat, both Antony and Cleopatra committed suicide, leaving Octavian as the unchallenged ruler of Rome. In 27 BC, Octavian was granted the title "Augustus" by the Senate, marking the beginning of the Roman Empire and the end of the Roman Republic. As the first emperor, Augustus established a new political order that maintained the outward appearance of the Republic while concentrating power in his hands. He implemented extensive reforms, reorganizing the military, the administration, and the tax system, and initiated an era of relative peace and stability known as the Pax Romana, which lasted for over two centuries. Augustus also undertook significant building projects in Rome, famously claiming to have found the city made of brick and left it made of marble. His reign saw the flourishing of Roman literature and culture, with figures like Virgil, Horace, and Livy producing some of their greatest works under his patronage. Augustus ruled for over four decades until his death in AD 14 at the age of 75. His legacy as Rome's first emperor and the architect of the Roman Empire remained profound, setting a standard for his successors and establishing a dynastic line that included emperors like Tiberius, Caligula, and

His rise to power came after the assassination of the previous emperor, Domitian, whose oppressive rule had made him deeply unpopular. The Senate selected Nerva as a compromise candidate, recognizing his reputation for moderation and diplomatic skills. During his relatively short reign, Nerva implemented several important reforms aimed at improving the well-being of the Roman Empire. He showed clemency by pardoning political exiles and taking measures to improve the treatment of slaves. Nerva also sought to address the needs of the urban poor, offering some relief to the marginalized members of society. One of the most significant acts during Nerva's rule was his adoption of Trajan as his successor in AD 97. Since Nerva lacked a biological heir, adopting Trajan was a strategic move to secure a smooth and stable transfer of power after his own death. Trajan, a highly capable and respected general, proved to be an exceptional ruler, and his reign would become one of the most prosperous and successful in Roman history. Nerva passed away from natural causes in AD 98, at the age of 68. While his reign was relatively brief, it marked a crucial turning point in Roman history. The "Five Good Emperors" era, which began with Nerva, brought stability and benevolent governance to the empire. These rulers prioritized the welfare of subjects and focused on efficient administration, contributing to a period of prosperity and relative peace within the Roman Empire.

Her father and brother held high political ranks, while her maternal uncle was Emperor Hadrian. Around AD 115, she married Titus Fulvius Antoninus, whose rise to power was aided by her connections. When Hadrian's chosen heir, Aelius Caesar, died in AD 138, the emperor named Antoninus as his successor. Later that year, Antoninus became emperor, and Faustina was honored as Augusta. Beloved for her elegance, compassion, and distinctive hairstyle—widely imitated across the empire—Faustina was a popular figure. Though later historians criticized her for lacking "gravitas," Antoninus was deeply devoted to her. The couple had four children, including Faustina the Younger, who married Marcus Aurelius. Faustina died just two years into Antoninus' reign, and in his grief, he secured her deification and issued an extensive posthumous coinage in her honor, the largest ever for a Roman woman. This magnificent aureus belongs to that series.

She died in AD 175, either from illness or an accident. Deeply devoted, Marcus Aurelius secured her deification. Her extensive coinage, spanning over 30 years, reflects her evolving image from princess to matron and showcases Roman feminine hairstyles of the era.

Hailing from Leptis Magna, a prosperous city in modern-day Libya, Severus belonged to a distinguished family. In AD 193, the Roman Empire was engulfed in chaos after the assassination of Emperor Pertinax. Amid the power vacuum, Severus, then governor of Upper Pannonia, seized the opportunity and declared himself emperor. With a formidable army at his disposal, he marched on Rome, defeating his rivals and ascending to the imperial throne. Severus proved to be a capable military leader. His reign was characterized by ambitious military campaigns to strengthen and expand the Roman Empire's frontiers. He notably ventured into Britain, strengthening Hadrian's Wall and reoccupying the Antonine Wall. In the East, he secured victories against the Parthian Empire, adding to his growing reputation as a skillful commander. As emperor, Severus implemented a series of significant reforms. He increased the pay of Roman soldiers, ensuring their loyalty and support. Granting Roman citizenship to the soldiers further solidified their allegiance to the empire. His reign marked a period of centralized power, as he expanded the emperor's authority over the provinces, contributing to greater imperial control. Family played a crucial role in Severus' reign. His wife, Julia Domna, a highly educated and politically astute woman, exerted considerable influence on his decisions. Together, they had two sons, Caracalla and Geta. However, the once-close siblings became embroiled in a bitter rivalry for power. After Severus' death in AD 211, Caracalla orchestrated Geta's assassination, leaving him as the sole ruler.

During his reign, Philip faced numerous challenges, including external invasions and internal rebellions. One of the major threats came from the Sassanian Empire, a powerful Persian state, which invaded Roman territories in the east. Philip managed to negotiate a peace settlement with the Sassanians, but the conflict strained the Roman economy. Philip also had to deal with internal dissent, particularly from the Senate, which was suspicious of his background and authority. He attempted to strengthen his position by bestowing titles and honors upon his family members, but this move further alienated the Senate. In AD 249, a rebellion broke out in Rome led by Gaius Messius Quintus Decius, a Roman general who challenged Philip's rule. Philip's own troops turned against him, and he was defeated and killed in battle. Decius proclaimed himself emperor and succeeded Philip as the Roman emperor. Philip's reign as emperor was relatively short and marked by a mixture of successes and challenges. He is remembered as the first Roman emperor of Arab origin and as one of the transitional figures in the turbulent period of Roman history known as the Crisis of the Third Century.

Interestingly, the selection does not encompass all deified rulers of the time, notably omitting figures such as Julius Caesar, Claudius, Pertinax, and Caracalla, with no clear explanation for these absences. Adding to the mystery, the series features Severus Alexander, an emperor who was never officially deified. The coin reverses display either an altar, as seen in this example, or an eagle, which appears in various artistic representations.

Theophilus, the final and most extreme iconoclast ruler of the Byzantine Empire, is remembered for his strong opposition to religious imagery. He infamously forced his iconoclastic views upon monks, branding them with his poetry if they resisted his ban on icons in worship. However, his wife, Theodora, secretly supported the veneration of icons. For her own safety, she kept this hidden throughout their marriage, and even sent their children to stay with their iconophile grandmothers, where they were secretly taught to honor sacred images. Theophilus remained unaware of his wife's true beliefs. After his death, Theodora became regent for their young son, Michael III. In the following year, she convened a council that reversed the iconoclastic policies, restoring the veneration of icons throughout the empire. Iconoclasm would never again be officially supported, and it largely faded from Eastern Christianity. This restoration is commemorated on the first Sunday of Lent as the Feast of Orthodoxy. Theodora effectively governed for 14 years until Michael came of age, and many historians believe that her steady leadership helped turn the tide in the conflict with the Arabs in favor of Byzantium. The Orthodox Church later canonized her for her efforts to reinstate the veneration of icons. Theophilus' iconoclastic policies were deeply unpopular in the West, where the rejection of religious imagery had never been supported. As a result, he was disliked by the people in Byzantine territories in Italy, including Syracuse, where this coin was minted.

The youngest daughter of Emperor Constantine VIII and sister of Empress Zoë, she belonged to the prestigious Macedonian dynasty, which had governed Byzantium since the late 9th century. Theodora first held power briefly in AD 1042, co-ruling with Zoë following the overthrow of Michael V. However, her influence waned when Zoë married Constantine IX Monomachos, who assumed primary authority. After Constantine IX's death in AD Theodora—despite her advanced age and lack of heirs—was recalled to the throne due to the absence of a clear successor and the efforts of court factions seeking to uphold the Macedonian dynasty's legitimacy. As empress, Theodora was known for her firm and independent rule. She resisted pressure to marry or appoint a co-emperor, determined to retain full control over the empire. Her administration focused on consolidating imperial authority and curbing the influence of the aristocracy and military elite. She promoted competent officials from the civil bureaucracy rather than relying on traditional noble families, continuing the centralization policies of her dynasty. Despite her brief reign, Theodora maintained internal stability and ensured the continuity of imperial administration. However, her refusal to designate an heir created political uncertainty. In AD 1056, she fell seriously ill and, under pressure from her advisors, reluctantly named Michael VI Bringas, a senior court official, as her successor. She died shortly thereafter, in late AD 1056, bringing an end to the direct rule of the Macedonian dynasty. Theodora's coinage adhered to traditional imperial iconography, often depicting her crowned and clad in imperial robes, holding the cross scepter and globus cruciger—symbols of divine authority and sovereignty. These coins reinforced her legitimacy as the rightful ruler in a male-dominated political landscape. Though her reign was brief, Theodora played a crucial role in preserving the Byzantine state's authority during a period of transition. Following

her death the empire gradually entered a phase of decline
