The Babylon II mint was crucial in the post-Alexandrian monetary landscape, producing coinage that circulated widely across the Near East.

Good Very Fine Price 1417; ADM II Series XIII. Antigonus I Monophthalmus, born around 382 BC, emerged as a formidable Macedonian general and a key Diadoch, following Alexander the Great's death. Serving under Philip II, Antigonus displayed military prowess during Alexander's conquests, later asserting his claim to the entire empire's kingship. This marked the inception of the Antigonid dynasty, the last ruling house of Macedonia. Antigonus faced numerous challenges, instigating conflicts like the first Diadoch War. Despite successes in battles, such as Gaza, setbacks came against Ptolemy in Egypt and Seleucus in Babylon. His ambition to monopolize Alexander's empire led to a coalition formed by Ptolemy, Cassander, Lysimachus, and Seleucus against him. The Battle of Ipsus in 301 BC proved pivotal and fatal for Antigonus. Despite his strategic acumen, he suffered defeat due to tactical errors by his son Demetrius, ultimately leading to Antigonus' death in battle. The aftermath saw the division of his Asian territories among the coalition's victors. Antigonus' legacy embodies the ambition to reunify Alexander's empire, marking the end of the dream for a unified successor state. The Antigonid dynasty persisted, influencing the Hellenistic period, particularly in Macedonia. His son Demetrius continued the struggle, but the reunification of the Macedonian heartland remained elusive.

Antigonos II Gonatas, who ruled Macedonia from 277 to 239 BC, was a pivotal figure in the stabilization and revitalization of the Macedonian kingdom following the chaotic period after Alexander the Great's death. He was the son of Demetrios I Poliorcetes and the grandson of Antigonos I Monophthalmos, one of Alexander's most trusted generals. Antigonos II came to power during a time of great instability in the Hellenistic world, with numerous factions vying for control. His ascent to the throne was not straightforward, as Macedonia was embroiled in continuous warfare, internal disputes, and invasions, particularly by the Celtic tribes (the Galatians). In 277 BC, Antigonos achieved a decisive victory over the Galatians at the Battle of Lysimacheia, securing Macedonia and earning widespread respect. This victory marked the beginning of his long and relatively stable reign. One of Antigonos' most significant achievements was his ability to maintain the integrity of the Macedonian kingdom amidst constant threats from rival Hellenistic monarchs and external invaders. He managed to establish a strong defensive posture, particularly through control of key cities in Greece, such as Athens and Corinth. His control of Athens, however, was often resented, as he installed Macedonian garrisons there, limiting the city's autonomy. Antigonos II was a pragmatic and cautious ruler, focusing more on preserving Macedonia's power than on grand conquests. His foreign policy was marked by a mix of alliances and defensive wars, notably with the Ptolemies of Egypt and the Seleucids. He also had to deal with recurring conflicts in Greece, particularly with the Achaean and Aetolian Leagues, which sought to resist Macedonian influence. Despite his military successes, Antigonos is remembered as much for his cultural contributions as his political achievements. He was a patron of philosophy and the arts, maintaining close ties with the Stoic philosopher Zeno of Citium and fostering intellectual life in his court. His reign marked the beginning of the so-called **Antigonid dynasty** in Macedonia, which lasted until the Roman conquest. Antigonos II



Originally settled by colonists from Phlios and Kleonai, Klazomenai was a prominent member of the Ionian League. Its initial location lay on the narrow strip of land linking the mainland to the Erythrai peninsula. However, in response to the growing threat of Persian expansion, the population relocated to a nearby island within the bay, where they reestablished their city. Despite being explicitly listed under Persian control in the King's Peace of 386 BC, Klazomenai continued to issue coinage bearing its own name. The city maintained strong religious and cultural ties to the wider Greek world, evidenced by its treasury at Delphi and its consultation of the Delphic oracle in 383 BC concerning a territorial dispute with Kyme over the city of Leukai. Both cities sought control of Leukai and its sanctuary of Apollo. The oracle decreed that whichever city first completed a sacrifice at Leukai on a set day would win. To fulfill this requirement, Klazomenai cleverly established a colony near Leukai and thus arrived first, securing the right to the sanctuary. This strategic and religious victorv commemorated with the establishment of a local festival known as the Prophthaseia and by the striking of an elegant coinage series, to which this example belongs. The obverse features a striking portrait of Apollo, while the reverse shows a graceful swan—an animal sacred to the god and associated in myth with his annual journey from the Hyperborean lands. The swan also serves as a subtle visual pun on the city's name, as klazein ("to cry out") echoed the call of the swan, and Klazomenai itself was known for its abundance of these birds. Contemporary coinage issued from Leukai in similar style further underscores Klazomenai's dominance over the sanctuary at that time. This particular type is thought to reflect the artistry of Theodotus of Klazomenai, the master engraver credited with the famous signed tetradrachm housed in the British Museum. The stylistic parallels between this piece and the signed example strongly suggest his hand in its creation.

The tetradrachms of Mausolos, satrap of Caria from 377 to 353 BC, exemplify the fusion of Persian authority and Greek cultural influence during his rule. Mausolos belonged to the Hekatomnid dynasty, founded by his father Hekatomnos, who was appointed satrap by Artaxerxes II after the fall of Tissaphernes in 392/1 BC. Taking advantage of the weakened Achaemenid Empire due to internal revolts and Egypt's independence, Mausolos exercised considerable autonomy. He moved the Carian capital from Mylasa to the fortified city of Halikarnassos, expanded its population, and initiated grand construction projects, most notably the Mausoleum Halikarnassos, later one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. Mausolos also refounded several Greek cities, including Knidos, Erythrai, and Priene, strengthening his regional influence. Although he briefly joined the Great Satrap Revolt against Persia in the 360s BC, he maintained a level of independence despite eventually accepting a Persian garrison in Halikarnassos. His tetradrachms reflect this blend of power and culture. The obverse often features a laureate portrait, possibly depicting either Apollo or Mausolos in divine form, merging Persian rulership with Greek artistic traditions. The reverse shows Zeus Labraundos holding a labrys (double-headed axe) and a scepter, symbolizing local religious authority. The inscription "MAYΣΣΩΛΟΥ" (Mausolou) boldly asserts his personal rule, an unusual move for a Persian satrap. After Mausolos's death, his sister-wife Artemisia II succeeded him briefly, followed by their brother Hidrieus, and later their sister Ada. Internal conflict continued with their youngest brother Pixodaros seizing power. Eventually, after Alexander the Great's conquest in 332 BC, Ada was reinstated as satrap, reflecting the region's complex political shifts. Mausolos's coinage stands as a testament to his political ambition and the cultural hybridity of Caria under Persian rule.

Maussolos was a notable figure in ancient history and the most famous satrap (governor) of Caria, a region in southwestern Anatolia (modern-day Turkey). He ruled Caria from 377 to 353 BC and belonged to the Hecatomnid dynasty, which was a local ruling family under the Achaemenid Persian Empire. Mausolus is best known for his ambitious building projects and the construction of the Mausoleum at Halicarnassus, a magnificent tomb for himself. The Mausoleum was designed by skilled architects and adorned with impressive sculptures and intricate decorations. After his death in 353 BC, his wife and sister, Artemisia II, completed the construction, and the monument became one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World.

His reign was marked by efforts to assert Seleucid authority in the face of rising Parthian influence and growing independence among local rulers. Despite some military successes, Demetrios III ultimately fell to his brother Philip I Philadelphos and was handed over to the Parthians, spending his final years in exile. His rule reflects the final phase of Seleucid decline, characterized by short-lived reigns and regional disintegration.



After the death of Darius II, the Persian throne became a battleground. Xerxes II, his son, briefly assumed power, ruling for just 45 days. However, his reign was short-lived due to his half-brother Sogdianus, who murdered him in a bid for the throne. Sogdianus, too, faced swift rebellion, as another half-brother, Ochus, the satrap of Hyrcania, rose against him. Ochus, a cunning and ambitious leader, gathered support from key nobles and defeated Sogdianus. Upon taking the throne, he adopted the name Darius II. His reign saw relative stability, but his grip on power was marked by internal strife and the constant threat of rebellion. Following Darius II's death, his son Arsaces ascended to the throne as Artaxerxes II in 404 BC. Artaxerxes II faced a massive challenge from his brother Cyrus the Younger, who, with the aid of Greek mercenaries, attempted to overthrow him. The two clashed in the famous Battle of Cunaxa in 401 BC, where Cyrus was killed, securing Artaxerxes' rule. Though Artaxerxes II's reign was filled with challenges, including the rebellion of satraps and conflicts with Sparta, he ruled for over 40 years, maintaining Persia's vast empire.

Ptolemy III Euergetes, a significant figure in the Hellenistic era, ascended to the throne of Egypt in 246 BC, succeeding his father, Ptolemy II Philadelphus. The title "Euergetes" which translates to "the Benefactor" in Greek, aptly reflects his reputation as a generous and benevolent ruler who undertook numerous philanthropic endeavors during his reign. Notably, Ptolemy III is celebrated for his military achievements and successful conquests. His campaigns expanded the dominion of the Ptolemaic Kingdom, securing territories in Asia Minor, the Aegean Islands, and even regions within the Seleucid Empire. His motivations were partly driven by a desire to avenge the murder of his sister and regain territories that once belonged to the Ptolemies. Furthermore, Ptolemy III continued to nurture the legacy of the famed Library of Alexandria, a beacon of scholarship and learning in the ancient world. He expanded its collection of texts, further enhancing its status as a preeminent center for the study of various disciplines. In addition to his military and cultural endeavors, Ptolemy III was a patron of Greek culture and the arts. He provided support to poets, scholars, and philosophers, fostering the flourishing of Greek culture within the confines of Egypt. Ptolemy III Euergetes passed away in 222 BC, and he was succeeded by his son, Ptolemy IV Philopator. His legacy endures in the annals of history, marked by territorial expansion, intellectual development at the Library of Alexandria, and the promotion of Greek culture during his reign in the Ptolemaic Kingdom of Egypt.



Born in Emesa (modern-day Homs, Syria), Julia Domna came from a powerful priestly family and married Septimius Severus, rising to prominence when he became emperor in AD 193. Her title of Augusta signaled her official status as empress and her considerable political influence, which extended through the reigns of both her husband and her son, Caracalla. The coin was struck in Stobi, an important Roman city in the province of Macedonia. Once a Paeonian settlement, Stobi flourished under Roman rule, becoming a municipium in the early imperial period. Its strategic location at the confluence of the Erigon and Axios rivers made it a commercial and administrative hub in the Balkans. The appearance of Julia Domna on civic coinage like this Triassarion highlights her imperial authority and the close integration of local cities into the Roman imperial framework. It also reflects the role of coinage as a tool of propaganda, promoting dynastic legitimacy and celebrating Roman victories—often symbolized by the figure of Victory, as seen on the reverse. Issued during a time of military campaigns, internal strife, and dynastic maneuvering, coins like this one serve as small but telling witnesses to the far-reaching influence of Rome—and of Julia Domna herself—across the empire.

The obverse of the coin honors Rhoimetalkes I, depicted with a royal diadem, symbolizing his semi-independent rule under Rome's protection. The reverse features a portrait of Augustus, a reminder of Roman supremacy and the king's indebtedness to the emperor. Issued during a transitional era between Hellenistic traditions and Roman imperial dominance, this coin exemplifies the subtle balance of local monarchy and imperial authority on the fringes of the Roman world.

He became coemperor with his brother, Geta, in AD 198, but their relationship soured, leading Caracalla to have Geta assassinated in AD 211. As emperor, Caracalla was known for his brutality and lavish spending. In AD 212, he issued the Antonine Constitution, granting Roman citizenship to all free inhabitants of the empire, but his rule was marked by oppressive taxation. Caracalla was a military-focused emperor, leading campaigns in various frontier regions. Although he achieved some military successes, his reign was marred by ongoing conflicts. In AD 217, Caracalla was assassinated during a campaign in the eastern provinces. He left a legacy of tyranny and violence, earning him a notorious reputation in Roman history.

Herod Antipas, a key figure in ancient Judea, ruled as tetrarch in Galilee during a tumultuous period in the 1st century BC and AD. He was the son of Herod the Great and Malthake, his fourth wife, and was raised in Rome alongside his siblings. Upon his father's death in 4 BC, he inherited rule over Galilee and Perea. Antipas is best known for his tumultuous love affair with Herodias, his sister-in-law and niece, which led to scandal and conflict. He divorced his first wife, the daughter of King Aretas IV of Nabatea, to marry Herodias, causing outrage among the Jewish populace. The marriage ultimately led to political fallout, including a military defeat by Aretas. His association with John the Baptist is also notable, with biblical accounts depicting John's public condemnation of Herod's marriage to Herodias. This led to John's imprisonment and execution, orchestrated by Herodias. Later, facing political intrigue and pressure, Herod Antipas sought the title of king from Caligula in Rome but was instead banished to Lugdunum Convenarum in Southern Gaul, where he died around 39 BC. His territory was subsequently absorbed into that of his nephew Herod Agrippa I, marking the end of his reign and legacy.

Nerva, born Marcus Cocceius Nerva in AD 30, was a Roman Emperor who held the throne from AD 96 to 98. His rise to power came after the assassination of the previous emperor, Domitian, whose oppressive rule had made him deeply unpopular. The Senate selected Nerva as a compromise candidate, recognizing his reputation for moderation and diplomatic skills. During his relatively short reign, Nerva implemented several important reforms aimed at improving the well-being of the Roman Empire. He showed clemency by pardoning political exiles and taking measures to improve the treatment of slaves. Nerva also sought to address the needs of the urban poor, offering some relief to the marginalized members of society. One of the most significant acts during Nerva's rule was his adoption of Trajan as his successor in AD 97. Since Nerva lacked a biological heir, adopting Trajan was a strategic move to secure a smooth and stable transfer of power after his own death. Trajan, a highly capable and respected general, proved to be an exceptional ruler, and his reign would become one of the most prosperous and successful in Roman history. Nerva passed away from natural causes in AD 98, at the age of 68. While his reign was relatively brief, it marked a crucial turning point in Roman history. The "Five Good Emperors" era, which began with Nerva, brought stability and benevolent governance to the empire. These rulers prioritized the welfare of their subjects and focused on efficient administration, contributing to a period of prosperity and relative peace within the Roman Empire.

His descendants included Lucilla, who married Lucius, and Commodus, whose controversial succession sparked debates. The Column and Equestrian Statue of Marcus Aurelius, both located in Rome, commemorate his military triumphs. Beyond his imperial role, Marcus's legacy as a philosopher-king endures. His insights into Stoicism continue to inspire modern thinkers, admired by writers, philosophers, and leaders over the centuries. In navigating the complexities of governance, philosophy, and legacy, Marcus Aurelius left an indelible mark on Roman history and the broader understanding of leadership and ethical principles.

After the death of Antoninus Pius in AD 161, Marcus Aurelius and Lucius Verus, who succeeded him as co-emperors, issued a series of coins in Rome to commemorate his deification. These coins were part of a consecration issue, a traditional practice to honor a respected emperor after his passing by elevating him to divine status. The obverse of these coins typically featured a portrait of Antoninus Pius, now referred to as "Divus Antoninus," indicating his status as a god. The reverse of the coins often depicted symbolic imagery associated with his deification. One common design shows Antoninus Pius being carried to the heavens by an eagle, a symbol of his apotheosis, or seated on a ceremonial chair. Other designs might include representations of a funeral pyre, or the personification of Eternity holding a globe, symbolizing the emperor's eternal presence. These coins served to reinforce the divine status of Antoninus Pius and to legitimize the rule of Marcus Aurelius and Lucius Verus by emphasizing their connection to a deified predecessor. The consecration coins circulated throughout the empire, reminding the Roman people of the continuity and stability provided by the imperial family.

Adding to the mystery, the series features Severus Alexander, an emperor who was never officially deified. The coin reverses display either an altar, as seen in this example, or an eagle, which appears in various artistic representations.

Leo I, Byzantine Emperor from 457 to 474, rose from humble origins, commanding military forces before ascending to the throne at the prompting of the influential Aspar. His rule departed from the Theodosian-Valentinian dynasty, emphasizing a proactive approach to the challenges facing both the Eastern and Western Roman Empires. To stabilize the West, Leo dispatched Anthemius in 467, providing substantial military and financial support, but the planned reconquest of Africa in 468 ended in failure, straining finances. Leo strategically countered Aspar's dominance by establishing the excubitores, a guard loyal to him, and fostering the rise of Zeno through marriage to his daughter. The power struggle culminated in 471, as Leo, supported by the excubitores, eliminated Aspar and Ardaburius, earning him the epithet "the Butcher." Leo adeptly navigated foreign relations, rejecting Hunnic overtures, resolving Gothic conflicts, and appointing Western emperors Olybrius and Julius Nepos, though stability remained elusive. His policies contributed to peace with the Sassanids, alleviating Eastern military pressures. Leo's death in 474 led to his grandson Leo II briefly succeeding him, followed by Zeno. His legacy included a vanished forum in Constantinople, built in 471, and indications of Eastern Roman efforts to forge closer ties with China during his reign.

Born in 630, he became co-emperor with his father in 654 and later assumed sole rule in September 668 after his father's assassination. Constans faced challenges, including suppressing a military revolt in Sicily and navigating conflicts with the Muslim Caliphate. His religious policy attempted to find a middle ground between Orthodoxy and Monothelitism, culminating in the Type of Constans decree in 648. During his reign, the Muslim Caliphate, under Umar, Uthman, and Mu'awiya I, launched invasions, leading to Arab raids and territorial losses for the Byzantines. Constans was the first emperor to visit Rome since the Western Roman Empire's fall in 476. In 663, he embarked on campaigns in Italy, attacking the Lombard Duchy of Benevento and visiting Rome for twelve days. Despite friendly relations with Pope Vitalian, Constans stripped buildings of their ornaments and bronze. His rule saw developments such as the creation of themes, military-administrative districts. However, Constans faced internal challenges, including opposition to Monothelitism and suspicions regarding his younger brother Theodosius, whom he later had killed in 660. Constans II was assassinated in 668, leading to the succession of his son Constantine IV. His legacy includes diplomatic contacts with China, recorded in the Chinese dynastic histories of the Old and New Book of Tang, showcasing the Byzantine Empire's interactions with distant cultures.

She was the youngest daughter of Emperor Constantine VIII and the sister of Empress Zoë, placing her within the prestigious Macedonian dynasty, which had ruled Byzantium since the late 9th century. Theodora first held power briefly in AD 1042 when she co-ruled with her sister Zoë after the overthrow of Michael V. However, Zoë soon married Constantine IX Monomachos, sidelining Theodora from politics. After Constantine IX's death in AD 1055, Theodora, despite being elderly and without heirs, was recalled to the throne due to the lack of a clear successor and the influence of the court factions that wanted to preserve the legitimacy of the Macedonian dynasty. As empress, Theodora was known for her firm and independent rule. She resisted pressure to marry or appoint a co-emperor, determined to maintain full control over the empire. Her administration focused on consolidating imperial authority and curbing the power of the aristocracy and the military elite. She promoted capable officials from the civil bureaucracy rather than relying on the traditional noble families, continuing the policies of centralization that had characterized the Macedonian dynasty. Despite her brief reign, Theodora managed to maintain internal stability and uphold the empire's administrative functions. However, her refusal to name an heir created political uncertainty. In AD 1056, Theodora fell seriously ill and, under pressure from her advisors, reluctantly named Michael VI Bringas, a senior court official, as her successor. She died shortly after, in late AD 1056, ending the Macedonian dynasty's direct rule. Theodora's coinage reflected traditional imperial iconography, often depicting her crowned and wearing imperial robes, holding the cross scepter and globus cruciger, symbols of divine authority and sovereignty. These coins reinforced her legitimacy as the rightful ruler in a maledominated political environment. Her reign, though short, is remembered for preserving the authority of the Byzantine state

during a critical transition period. After her death, the empire
