This gold stater, minted in Babylon after Alexander the Great's death by his successor Seleucus I, stands as a symbol of monetary unity across a fragmented empire. Though Alexander died unexpectedly in BC 323 without naming a successor, his legacy endured — not least through his revolutionary coinage system. Upon conquering the Persian Empire, Alexander gained access to its vast treasures, estimated at 180,000 talents (around 4,700 tons of silver and gold). He used this wealth to issue an unprecedented number of coins in newly established mints across his realm, stretching from Egypt to Central Asia. These coins followed the Attic weight standard and adopted consistent iconography, ensuring their wide recognition and acceptance.

The gold coins, including this stater, featured the same design across all mints: the helmeted head of Athena on the obverse, and the winged goddess Nike on the reverse. Athena, the goddess of wisdom and war, wears a Corinthian helmet adorned with a griffin — a mythical creature with a lion's body and an eagle's head. Nike, holding a palm branch and a ship's standard, symbolizes victory, possibly alluding to the Greek triumph at Salamis. Although minted by Seleucus, the coin bears the inscription "ΒΑΣΙΛΕΩΣ ΑΛΕΞΑΝΔΡΟΥ" ("of King Alexander"), maintaining the fiction of imperial unity long after Alexander's death. This deliberate omission of Seleucus' name reflects the prestige of Alexander's image as a unifying force.

Crucial to identifying mint and issue are small control symbols, used to monitor production and ensure quality standards. More than a medium of exchange, this stater was a political and cultural statement — a "world currency" of the ancient era that embodied the enduring reach of Alexander's vision.

The Caracalla medallion struck at Anchialos in Thrace is a rare and fascinating piece of Roman provincial coinage, combining imperial propaganda with local symbolism. Anchialos (modern-day Pomorie, Bulgaria) was an important port city on the Black Sea coast, and this medallion highlights both the authority of Emperor Caracalla and the maritime character of the city.

The obverse features a laureate, draped, and cuirassed bust of Caracalla facing left, bearing the inscription ΑΝΤ Κ Μ ΑΥΡ ΑΝΤΩΝΕΙΝΟΣ (Antoninus Augustus, the emperor's official name). Caracalla is depicted holding a spear and shield, symbolizing his role as a military commander and protector of the empire. The cuirass and laureate crown emphasize his authority and divine favor, reinforcing his image as a strong and legitimate ruler.

The reverse depicts a five-oared galley manned by five rowers and a helmsman, a direct reference to Anchialos' status as a naval and trading hub. The inscription ΟΥΛΠΙΑΝΩΝ ΑΓΧΙΑΛΕΩΝ ("of the Ulpian of Anchialos") indicates the civic identity of the local community under Roman rule, highlighting their pride in the city's maritime prowess.

This medallion blends imperial iconography with local pride, illustrating the interconnectedness of Roman imperial power and provincial identities during Caracalla's reign (211–217 BC).

Under Augustus, the Roman administration continued minting cistophoric tetradrachms in Asia Minor, especially in cities like Pergamon, Ephesus, and Smyrna. Originally introduced by the Attalid dynasty in the 2nd century BCE, the cistophorus had become a well-established regional silver coin. Rather than impose the imperial denarius system, Augustus preserved this local currency, reflecting a policy of economic pragmatism and regional accommodation.

Augustan cistophori maintained the traditional weight standard but replaced the earlier Dionysiac imagery with Roman motifs, particularly imperial portraiture. The obverse typically featured a bust of Augustus, projecting Roman authority in a Greek numismatic format. These coins circulated exclusively within Asia Minor, serving as a closed provincial currency system, distinct from the empire-wide denarius.

Several major types were issued. Portrait types showed Augustus alone, or paired with figures like Agrippa or Julia, reinforcing dynastic continuity. Temple and altar types likely referenced the imperial cult or local religious practices aligned with Augustan ideology. Some coins featured the Capricorn, Augustus's astrological sign, symbolizing divine favor and cosmic order. Other types included personifications of Victory, Peace (Pax), and Mars Ultor, reflecting key themes of Augustan propaganda.

The continued use of the cistophorus under Augustus reflects a carefully calibrated balance between innovation and tradition. By adapting a familiar local coinage to convey imperial authority, Augustus ensured monetary stability while embedding his image and ideology in the daily transactions of Asia Minor. These coins offer a vivid example of how Roman power was localized and mediated through the language of regional identity.

The coin featuring the laureate head of Divus Julius Caesar to the right and the bare head of Octavian to the left is a remarkable piece of propaganda from the late Roman Republic, highlighting the close political and familial ties between Octavian and his adoptive father, Julius Caesar. The obverse inscription, "DIVOS IVLIVS" (Divine Julius) and "DIVI F" (son of the divine), emphasizes Julius Caesar's posthumous deification and Octavian's claim as his divine heir, reinforcing his legitimacy and right to rule. On the reverse, the inscription "M. AGRIPPA COS DESIG" refers to Marcus Agrippa, Octavian's loyal friend and key military commander, who was consul-designate at the time. Agrippa's inclusion on the coin reflects his crucial role in Octavian's rise to power, notably through military victories such as the Battle of Actium. This coin was struck around 37–31 BC, during the period when Octavian was consolidating power after Julius Caesar's assassination and the subsequent civil wars. The dual portrait symbolizes the dynastic continuity from the deified Julius Caesar to Octavian and the military strength represented by Agrippa. Through this imagery and inscriptions, the coin communicates Octavian's divine right to lead Rome, the endorsement of the gods, and the unity of his political and military team, setting the stage for the foundation of the Roman Empire.

One of the most historically significant aurei issued during the reign of Emperor Vespasian commemorates the Flavian victory in the Jewish War, culminating in the capture of Jerusalem by his son, Titus, in A.D. 70. While Vespasian had successfully subdued much of Judaea during his earlier command, Jerusalem remained resistant until its eventual fall under Titus. This victory was crucial in consolidating Flavian authority following the instability of the Year of the Four Emperors.

To celebrate this achievement, a joint triumph was held in Rome in A.D. 71 for both Vespasian and Titus. This event featured a grand procession displaying the spoils taken from the Temple in Jerusalem—an episode famously immortalized in the relief sculpture on the Arch of Titus.

The aureus struck in connection with these events reflects both the military success and the imperial propaganda of the Flavian regime. On the reverse, the god Neptune is depicted holding a trident and an acrostolium, a decorative prow-ornament, symbolizing naval power and safe return. The accompanying legend identifies Neptune as the “Returner,” celebrating the safe and victorious return of Titus from the East.

This coin exemplifies the Flavian use of numismatic imagery to reinforce imperial legitimacy and divine favor. It links the emperor’s house to Rome’s military triumphs and to the beneficence of the gods—an enduring message struck in gold. ons.

The reverse of Florianus' medallion displays one of the most iconic and enduring motifs in Roman medallion art: the Tres Monetae, or "Three Monetae." This type was first seen on a brass medallion of Commodus in the late 2nd century and remained popular throughout the 3rd century. Although primarily used for medallions, this design occasionally appeared on regular circulating coins, such as sestertii early in the reign of Septimius Severus. In Florianus' medallion, the reverse shows three female figures, each personifying the Roman mint system. These figures represent the three main metals of Roman coinage: gold, silver, and copper. All three stand beside heaps of coins and hold two key symbols: a cornucopia, indicating abundance and prosperity, and a pair of scales, symbolizing accurate and fair weighing of currency. A distinguishing feature of this design is how each figure holds her scales. The two outer figures suspend their scales from short, equal-length rods or cords, while the central figure holds hers from a noticeably longer cord or rod. Scholars interpret this difference as symbolic: the central figure likely represents gold, which required more precise and meticulous weighing standards than silver or copper.

By the mid-3rd century, under emperors like Trajan Decius, the reverse inscription had settled into the familiar MONETA AVGG (Moneta Augustorum), referencing the imperial authority over coinage. Earlier versions bore inscriptions like AEQVITAS PVBLICA or AEQVITAS AVGVSTI, emphasizing the fairness and legitimacy of imperial monetary policy.

In case of doubts or a value of over 2500€ the vendor has to prove upon delivery to Savoca that the coin stems from a legal source, hence, was not im- or exported illegally. Savoca is hereby implementing the provisions of the `Kulturschutzgesetz` as far as reasonably possible. A detailed check of the provenance of a coin therefore only takes place at a value of more than € 2500.

3. Purchase/Order

The purchasing process through the auction platform biddr.ch involves three to four steps in total. Every new customer has to register in order to purchase coins on biddr.ch. In order to register one needs to make his or her customer data known, including billing address, and in case it differs from the billing address, also the shipping address. Furthermore, you will select a password which in addition to your email you will use to login on the portal. 4. Conclusion of Contract

The presentation of coins on biddr.ch does not constitute an offer by Savoca. An offer for conclusion of a contract is made through the receipt of the order of the customer by Savoca Numismatik GmbH & Co. KG. The contract is concluded with the acceptance of the offer or order. This can happen through written acceptance or by sending the ordered product to the customer. The receipt of an online order is immediately confirmed to the e-mail address provided by the customer, but the confirmation of receipt does not represent an acceptance of the offer yet. However, the acceptance of the offer can be combined with the confirmation of receipt. No guarantee is given that the texts and pictures portrayed on the internet are correct, complete and up-to date. Printing errors and mistakes can occur and we reserve the right to correct them.

The acceptance of pre-bids that are not submitted via the biddr system is only possible during business hours.

5. Pricing, Shipping Costs

All mentioned prices are denominated in Euro and include the value added tax. Additionally, every buyer/customer is obliged to pay a premium of 20% and an insurance fee of 1% of the final auction bid to the auctioneer. This premium is not included in the final auction bid. The German-wide delivery of the product will be carried out by DHL if the product value is not above € 5000,00. The fee is € 7. International delivery in the European Union is carried out by Federal Express and costs € 15. Outside of the European Union deliveries are also carried out by Federal Express and the delivery fees are € 18 if the product value is € 1000,00 or less and € 55 if the product value is above € 1000. The recipient covers the customs duties.

The consignment is insured against loss and damage during transport.

The invoice amount is due within 10 days. The delivery includes an invoice. Additionally, an invoice will be sent to you via email upon conclusion of the purchase agreement. It is possible to pay via PayPal, bank transfer or credit card. The delivery is carried out as soon as the amount to be paid is finally credited to the account of Savoca Numismatik GmbH & Co. KG.

6. Retention of title

The goods remain our property until full payment has been made. If the buyer does not pay within 14 days from receipt of the invoice by Savoca Numismatik GmbH & Co. KG via biddr.com, the buyer forfeits all rights to fulfilment of the contract. Upon expiry of this period, Savoca Numismatik GmbH & Co. KG withdraws from the purchase contract.

7. Revocation policy for consumers

Right of revocation

In the case of an effective revocation, the services received at both ends shall be returned and, if applicable, drawn-out use (eg interest) shall be issued. If you are unable to return or return the received performance as well as usages (for example, advantages of use), or only in a deteriorated condition, you must reimburse us. For the deterioration of the goods and for related uses, you have to reimburse us only as far as the deterioration is due to a handling of the product, which goes beyond testing the properties and the functionality. „Testing the properties and the functionality“ means testing and trying out the respective goods, as is possible and customary in a retail store. Parcel-deliverable goods are only to be returned to us insured at our risk and only after consultation with us. You have to bear the regular costs of the return if the delivered goods correspond to the ordered goods and the price of the returned items does not exceed an amount of € 40,00 or in case of a higher price of the product if you have not yet received the consideration at the time of the revocation or if you made a contractually agreed partial payment. Otherwise, the return is free for you. Items that cannot be delivered by parcel will be collected from you. Obligations to reimburse payments must be met within 14 days. The period begins for you with the sending of your declaration of revocation or the product, for us upon receiving either.

8. Warranty, damages, statue of limitations

The condition of our coins is based on the facts and pictures that are made public until the auction as well as generally accessible knowledge. Additional specifications of the condition are not agreed upon. This is specifically the case for written or oral disclosures. The condition of the coin is not guaranteed in any way.

In case of defects of title according to § 435 BGB the buyer is able to withdraw from the contract within a time frame of two years due to the respective defect of title or demand a reduction of the sale price. Additional rights of the buyer according to Para 7 or BGB, especially the right to supplementary performance, damages or reimbursement for frustrated expenses are excluded, except when the defect of title was concealed maliciously.

In case of a material defects according to § 434 BGBthe buyer is allowed to withdraw from the contract after showing prove of the material defect, if Savoca infringed her due care of cataloging the coin keeping in mind the rarity and value of the coin. Insignificant defects of coins of the value of € 1000,00 or below do not constitute a right to withdraw from the contract. In case of a justified withdrawal the buyer receives back the purchase price step by step for the return of the coin in unchanged condition at the registered office of Savoca. Should the returning coin be manipulated or altered in any way, or should it no longer be in its original condition, it cannot be returned. All further claims of reduction of purchase price, damages or reimbursement of frustrated expenditure are excluded, except if Savoca concealed the defect maliciously.

Otherwise all other warranty rights of the buyer are excluded.

An enterprise or tradesman is not entitled to withdrawal, if he has not complied with his or her legal obligation of inspection, notification and rejection.

Savoca can transfer her claims against the vendor in case of justified defects of title or material to the buyer.

Claims of the buyer because of material defects become time-barred after one year after handover/delivery of the purchased item to the customer. Excluded from this are claims for defects of consumers as well as claims for damages due to injury of body, life or health as well as claims for damages due to grossly negligently or deliberately caused damage by Savoca. We assure that we do not pass on your personal data to third parties, unless we are legally obliged to do so or you have expressly given us prior consent. If we use third-party services for the execution and processing of processing processes, the provisions of the Federal Data Protection Act are complied with.

Personal data that has been communicated to us through our website will only be stored until the purpose for which they have been entrusted to us is fulfilled. Where trade and tax retention periods are to be observed, the duration of the storage of certain data may be up to ten years. If you no longer agree to the storage of your personal data, or if this has become incorrect, we will, upon appropriate instructions, make the deletion, correction or blocking of your data within the framework of the legal provisions. Upon request, you will receive free of charge information about all personal data that we have stored about you. If single clauses of the contract with the purchaser, including these terms and conditions, prove invalid, in full or in part, or become so in the future, this shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions. The fully or partially invalid provision shall be replaced by a provision of which the commercial effect most closely approaches that of the invalid stipulation. In case of existing loopholes, the Parties will add a provision that ensures that the Parties' will is reflected correctly according to the overall contract terms.
