Maguigana fled to the Transvaal, but was pursued, cornered and killed, apparently dying after discharging his revolver into his pursuers. The Portuguese occupied Gaza and peace resulted, which lasted for about 60 years.

The Portuguese were subsequently attacked by 2,000 Namarris warriors. For many hours, the Portuguese formed a square, repelling the enemy's attacks, but then, at the request of therince, they retreated, losing 2 killed and 37 wounded. Mozambican losses amounted to 500 killed and wounded.

In August 1907 a force of approximately 2,500 men under Captain Alves Roçadas sought to avenge the earlier disaster. This was achieved by October of the same year, after which the Cuamato threat was ended. Roçadas received the sole gold medal and 99 junior officers received the silver medal.

In 1895 the King of Manufahi refused to pay the *finta* (tribute to the crown) or to provide men for forced labour. While the governor was putting together a force to compel him to surrender, the king seized the offensive with several allies, managing to destroy a Portuguese column of several hundred soldiers and to capture their weapons. After 50 days of fighting, the two side were both weakened, and the campaign ended in a stalemate.

She was renamed in honour of the famous Portuguese naval officer Roberto Ivens.

On July 26th, 1917, the *Roberto Ivens* hit an underwater mine laid by the German Imperial Navy and she sank, 24 kilometres offshore, somewhere between Cabo Espichel and Cascais, taking the captain, first lieutenant Raul Alexandre Cascais, and 15 crew members with her. Seven of her crew survived. The minesweeper was the first ship Portugal lost during the Great War.

On several occasions when the aircraft has been damaged be anti-aircraft fire his skill in navigation has made it possible for the aircraft to return to base. His fearless bearing in the face of intense anti-aircraft fire has enabled many fine photographs of the target to be taken. His devotion to duty and zeal in operations against the enemy have made him a valuable member of the crew. Lieutenant Hall is an outstanding navigator and has a fine operational record."

Air Medal (date of order 9 May 1945): 'For meritorious achievement while serving as a Navigator of a Halifax bomber on Heavy Bombardment Missions over enemy territory during the period of 24 May 1944 to 14 June 1944. The courage, coolness, and skill displayed by First Lieutenant Hall on these occasions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States."

British Distinguished Flying Cross: Approved 9 March 1945

LIEUTENANT COLONEL SHELDON HALL was born on 2 August 1910 in New York, U.S.A. After a period of service with the New York National Guard, beginning on 10 April 1931, he later served during WW2 with the U.S.A.A.C. between 1 December 1943 and 26 September 1947, initially as a First Lieutenant but rising to the rank of Captain. For his services, principally as a Navigator in Halifax Bombers, he received several U.S. awards (see above) and the British D.F.C., which mentions some service on attachment to the 10th Squadron, R.A.F.

From 1947 to 1948 he served in the Philippines (F.E.A.F.), and returning to the U.S.A. the following year, he undertook numerous positions and postings across the U.S.A., many related to Radar Observation and Instruction. His service documents state that he undertook 35 combat missions in *B-29* bombers relating to the Korean War between January and July 1952, after which he returned to work with Intelligence and Electronic Warfare, and latterly in educational roles. He retired from active duty on 1 December 1963, and died on 25 September 1986, at Winter Park, Florida.

MASTER SERGEANT MORRIS WAYNE YOUNT was born in Liberal Missouri on 5 August 1921, and saw service during Word War II and Korea. He was wounded on several occasions and additionally received a Purple Heart, spending 31 months as a P.O.W. in Korea. During that time he was befriended by a cat who he credited for keeping him focused on better times. He retained a fondness for cats on returning home and became known locally as 'Cat Man Morris' who housed many of the cats in Sarcoxie. He retired from the army in 1967 with the rank of Master Sergeant. He died 30 April 2013.

A Rare WW2 Navigator and Cine-Camera Operator's D.F.C. awarded to Flight-Lieutenant Peter Norman Herbert, 627 Squadron R.A.F.V.R., late 617 and 99 Squadrons, who having flown over 100 operations, including 80 as a Navigator and 30 as a Cameraman & Navigator, was killed in action during a filming operation over Walcheren on 7 October 1944. Camera footage taken by Flight-Lieutenant Herbert was displayed in cinemas on 'the Home Front' to inform the public about the progress of the R.A.F.'s bombing raids, comprising: Distinguished Flying Cross GVIR, reverse engraved '1944', in original Royal Mint Case of issue, extremely fine

D.F.C.: London Gazette: 24 October 1944.- 'On his first tour of operational duty this officer participated in many sorties, involving attacks on well defended enemy targets. Throughout he displayed a high degree of navigational ability and proved himself to be a worthy member of aircraft crew. He has now completed very many sorties on his second tour in the role of cine-camera operator. He has shown a real enthusiasm for his duties and his skill is reflected in the excellent quality of the films he has taken. Those of the attacks on Le Havre, Caen and Juvisy are outstanding examples and have proved of great value. Many hundreds of feet of these films have been given wide publicity, thus placing before the general public a pictorial record of Bomber Command's war effort. He has displayed untiring devotion to duty.'

Peter Norman Herbert, of Knebworth, Hertfordshire, joined the Air Force in Spring 1941. His first operations took place in September 1941 with Flight 23 O.T.U. In November he transferred to O.C. 'B' Flight, 99 Squadron, largely flying in *Wellington* bombers, and in June 1942 his squadron was transferred to India. From November 1942- July 1943, he participated in several missions in the Burma campaign and at the end of the tour he was made a War Substantive Flight-Lieutenant having flown over 80 operations in the course of his first tour.

In May 1944 he resumed operational flying with 467 as a Cameraman and Navigator, on 18 May he was attached to Squadron Leader Les Munro of 617 Squadron's Lancaster as a cameraman, photographing the raid on Juvisy Marshalling Yards near Paris, and soon afterwards he had a spell with 463 Squadron. On 5 June, just before midnight he filmed St. Pierre du Mont coastal gun battery prior to the D-Day landing, and on D-Day he filmed the Argenton rail yards. The following month he transferred to 627 (Pathfinder) Squadron, his final posting. Footage taken by Herbert in July, 1944, concerning the 'Daylight Attack over the Eastern Sector of Caen', and 'The Flying Bomb Storage at Thiverny' and upon the 'Air Equipment at St. Cyr' can still be readily seen on the website of the Imperial War Museum, and provides an impressive and vivid reflection of the dangerous nature of these bombing raids.

The award of his D.F.C. was made public in September 1944, as shown in a contemporary newspaper clipping, however soon after on 7 October 1944 he was posted as missing over Walcheren in the Netherlands and was subsequently presumed dead. In his second tour he performed 30 operations as a Navigator-Cameraman. He is commemorated on the Runnymede Memorial. This lot is offered with the recipient's original Observer's and Air Gunner's Logbook with entries from 19 March 1941-6 October 1944, from which the following entries are taken:



October 20 1941 'Nickel Raid Paris. Crash landing at base. Aircraft burnt.'

November 15 1941 'Operations to Emden. Attacked by enemy fighters. Bombs Jettisoned, Crash landed Coltishall.'

June 5 1944 'Cameraman St Pierre du Mont Coastal gun battery 'D' Day.'
July 4 1944 'Navigator-Cameraman Ops. St Leu D'Esserent Criel. Rocket store.'

Logbook also contains two newspaper cuttings, one on his award of the D.F.C., the other his death, also included with the lot is a portrait photograph of the recipient in uniform, and a group shot in flying suits.

D.C.M.: London Gazette: 5 December 1918 – 'for conspicuous gallantry as brigade orderly [H.Q. 1st Guards Brigade]. Three times during the morning he made his way backwards and forwards between brigade headquarters and his battalion through enemy barrage, and delivered his messages in a most efficient manner. Later he volunteered after several orderlies had been killed or wounded, and went under very heavy machine gun and shell fire to his battalion, and brought back most valuable information to brigade headquarters. His courage and devotion to duty were admirable.'

PRIVATE RICHARD GEON was born in March 1886 at Mullingar, County Meath, Ireland, and served with the 1st Battalion Irish Guards during the Great War. He was awarded the D.C.M. in the *London Gazette* of 5 December 1918, which according to '*The Great War Medal Collector's Companion (Vol. I*)' by Williamson, suggests an award for the Battle of the Amiens (8-11 August) or the Second Battles of the Somme. He died in January 1926 in Islington, London.

One of a reported 78 D.C.M.s awarded to the Irish Guards during the Great War.



The Edward Medal (Mines) awarded to Mr. Harold West, of the Holmewood Colliery, near Chesterfield, for his 'distinguished' role in the rescue party which saved four men who had been trapped for four days underground after the collapse of a coal seam on 22 September, 1920, comprising:

Edward Medal (Mines), G.V.R., 1st 'coinage head' Type, bronze (**Harold West**), in original case of issue, and with original medal ribbon retained within case, *extremely fine*£800-1,200

E.M.: London Gazette: 24 March, 1922 - Harold West (in a joint citation with Samuel Peters, Joseph Harrison, and Thomas Calladine [all awarded the Edward Medal (Mines) in Bronze]) - 'On September 22nd, 1920, a heavy fall of earth occurred in a seam of the Holmewood Colliery, near Chesterfield, imprisoning two men who were working in the seam. It was ascertained that the men were uninjured, but, as it was obvious that the work of reaching them would occupy some days the first necessity was to supply them with food. Peters, the undermanager, with great ingenuity, passed food through a cycle tyre enclosed in iron piping. Further falls occurred during the forty-eight hours following the original fall, but it then became possible to pass some timber through, although gas appeared in the cavity and began to give trouble. A small hole was made through to the imprisoned men, and they were eventually freed after being four days in the seam. Peters, West, Harrison and Calladine all distinguished themselves greatly in the work of rescue, and were engaged for practically the whole time in a dangerous: position at the face of the fall. They were exposed to the risk of injury from falling stones and displayed a dogged courage and endurance.'

Mr. Harold West, E.M., was employed as a Stallman, at the Holmwood Colliery, Chesterfield.

Lance-Corporal P.J. Maher, of Moate, County Westmeath, Ireland, enlisted for Great War service with the Royal Dublin Fusiliers. Fighting in the Gallipoli campaign, he landed on 9 August 1915 and was wounded in action soon after while serving with the 7th Battalion in September 1915 (as reported by the '*Irish Independent*' of 14 September, 1915). He was later awarded the M.M. for '*bravery in the field*' with the 2nd Battalion on 17 June 1919.

An Exceptional Rhodesian Order of the Legion of Merit and Police Decoration for Gallantry Group of 5 awarded to Lieutenant-Colonel Peter Alexander 'Billy' Conn, Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion, the Rhodesia Regiment, late Mazoe Police Reserve, Rhodesian Light Infantry, and 'C' Squadron, 22 Special Air Service (S.A.S.). Having served as a radio operator and parachutist in Malaya during the very first years of 'C' Squadron S.A.S. alongside Major Peter Walls, he formed part of the South Rhodesian Contingent during the Coronation parades of 1953. Commissioned as an officer with the 1st Battalion of the Rhodesian African Rifles, he rose to the rank of Major and beca me second in command of his battalion by the time of 'first' retirement in 1969, after 20 years' service. Returning to civilian life, but continuing to serve as a Section Leader with the Mazoe Police Reserve's 'Police Anti-Terrorist Unit' (P.A.T.U.), he was the first police reservist to receive the Police Decoration for Gallantry, when as part of a 'stick' of 5 men on 2 February 1973 in north-east Mashonaland he led his men during a 2-hour firefight against a large and well-armed terrorist force, killing five of the enemy in the process – including the opposing Z.A.N.L.A. District Commander. In 1977 'Billy' Conn accepted the appointment as Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion, Rhodesia Regiment, and finally retired from an extraordinary military career in 1980, comprising:

P.D.G.: 2 August 1974 - full citation as quoted in the book 'Contact' by John Lovett: 'On 2nd February, 1973, as a result of information received, Field Reservist Peter Alexander Conn, who is section leader of the Mazoe Police Reserve P.A.T.U. led his section, together with other P.A.T.U. sections from Umvukwes and Centenary, against a group of terrorists who had made their hideout in the North-East Mashonaland area. Section Leader Conn took up an exposed position on top of a rock and proceeded to direct fire and operations against the terrorists who were located immediately below him. The engagement lasted about two hours, during which Section Leader Conn was subjected to grenade attacks in an attempt to dislodge him. These attacks did not deter him from carrying out his duties. Throughout the operation Section Leader Conn proved himself to be a capable leader. He displayed brave and gallant behaviour above the call of normal duty.'



Lieutenant-Colonel Peter Alexander 'Billy' Conn (1929-2015) was born on 6 July 1929 in Kampala, Uganda, the son of Alexander Aberdein Conn and Elsie Conn (nee Cutfield). Educated at Hilton College, Natal, he initially joined the 'Natal Mercury' newspaper as a reporter in 1947, but left to join the Rhodesian Army on 1 November 1949. Serving with the 2nd Battalion, Rhodesia Regiment, 'Billy' Conn made a promising start to his military career and soon after volunteered for service in Malaya as an original member of the newly formed Southern Rhodesian Volunteer Unit- the brainchild of the highly-decorated Colonel 'Mad Mike' Calvert of Chindit fame. For a squadron of just 100 men, some 998 men volunteered, with the young Lieutenant Peter Walls placed in command and Conn as one of his Sergeants. Undergoing various changes to their moniker, this unit was known for a time as 'C' Squadron (Malayan Scouts), but was later - and more famously - renamed as 'C' (Rhodesia) Squadron, 22 Special Air Service (S.A.S.) in 1951, with whom 'Billy' Conn served at the rank of Sergeant between 1950 and 1953. He appears in a contemporary photograph published in 'Selous Scouts – Rhodesian Counter-Insurgency Specialists' by Peter Baxter (pg. 25) as an S.A.S. radio operator, communicating from a paddy field to nearby aircraft after a parachute deployment. Incidentally, Conn was reportedly one of the first four volunteers to act as 'guinea pigs' for parachute jumps into the Malayan jungle, alongside his C.O. the recently promoted 'Major' Peter Walls, Trooper Frank Wentzel and Trooper J. Pretorious. For this service in Malaya he was awarded the G.S.M. – one of a reported 119 such medals issued to 'C' Squadron S.A.S. for this campaign.

On 2 June 1953, and then at the rank of Colour-Sergeant, Conn travelled to London to take part in the Coronation Parade of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II as part of the Staff Corps of the Southern Rhodesian Coronation Contingent, and appears in various group photographs from the parade itself. Receiving his first commission as a Second Lieutenant with the Rhodesian African Rifles on 8 December 1954, a few years later in October 1957 he transferred to the Northern Rhodesia Regiment, based in Lusaka. He was enrolled in the Memorable Order of Tin Hats (or 'M.O.T.H.') on 2 February 1961 for his earlier service with 22 S.A.S., and between 1962 and 1966 he served with the Rhodesian Light Infantry, which included the end of Federation and U.D.I., and for which he received an additional 'Loyal Service' certificate from the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland on 31 December 1963. During his time with 3 Commando, Rhodesian Light Infantry, during the early years of the Rhodesian Bush War, Conn is mentioned in the article 'Fire Force - Helicopter Warfare in Rhodesia: 1962-1980' by Prof. J.R.T. Wood, showing his leadership and combat experience during an incident in 1966, as follows:

'Another pair to join the fun was Major Billy Conn of the R.L.I. and his sergeant who had driven through Sinoia from Kariba and had come upon the helicopters and the armed police. Conn turned round and drove straight to the Police Station to volunteer his services to his friend John Cannon. Cannon readily agreed and Conn drove out along the main road and turned onto the strip road, arriving just as the advancing sweep line from the east shot and killed an insurgent. The sight of a dead Z.A.N.U. drew the inexperienced police forward to cluster around the body. Conn shouted at them to disperse and as he did two Z.A.N.U. rose out of the nearby grass and bush, one aiming his rifle. Conn opened fire killing both. The second had been in the act of throwing a grenade which then exploded. The chastened sweep line continued and eventually eliminated the remaining four insurgents.'

Leading from the front, and by example, he eventually rose to the position of Second-in-Command of the 1st Battalion, The Rhodesian African Rifles, and after 20 years' service he retired from the Regular Army on 31 October, 1969, at the rank of Major. At the time of this, his 'first' retirement, he was, according to his own personal memoirs, offered the position of C.O. of 'C' Squadron S.A.S. by then Chief of Staff, Peter Walls, a position which he turned down for reasons unknown.

Returning once again to civilian life, he took up a position with the Anglo-American Company at Mazoe Citrus Estates, and in 1972 he volunteered for additional duties with the B.S.A.P. in the Mazoe Police Reserve's Anti-Terrorist Unit, with whom he was regularly

As section leader of the Spitzkop Section, he directed operations involving his own and other Police Reserve Anti-Terrorist Units (or 'P.A.T.U.' sticks) in action against a group of armed terrorists in the north-east Mashonaland area on 2 February 1973. The terrorists, who had taken up defensive positions in their hideout in a range of granite 'kopjes' (or small hills) in West Chiweshe, near the Forrester Estate, subjected Peter Conn to repeated grenade attacks on his exposed position above them on a prominent rock – including one instance in which Peter Conn only narrowly managed to kick away a grenade from beside him at the last possible moment. Despite having called for support from two larger sticks in the surrounding area, which were either delayed or were not reachable at the point of contact, Peter Conn led his group – just four men (alongside Lance Abel, Peter Hamilton, Len Dawson) and one A.P.R. tracker, into the action. In his own 2-page record of the incident, he mentions that he wounded the enemy leader, Z.A.N.L.A. District Commander Jack Chamunagwa (who was killed at a later stage of the engagement), and killed one terrorist in the closing stages. As a result of the action, in total four of the enemy terrorists were killed in action, and one died from wounds some time afterwards. For his role in this engagement, Peter Conn was granted the Police Decoration for Gallantry by President Dupont in the Government Gazette, which was then awarded to him by Lieutenant-Colonel H. B. Everard.

In 1977, Major Conn accepted the appointment as Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion, Rhodesia Regiment, despite having been out of the Army for eight years at this point, and set about making the unit a cohesive fighting force through his own 'example and ability' and with great success, and for which he was appointed a Member of the Order of the Legion of Merit on 7 December 1979 – just prior to his second and final 'retirement' in 1980. Spending a year in Mozambique in 1990-91, he spent his latter years in Natal, South Africa, and passed away at Howick on 15 July, 2015, at the age of 86. Offered for sale by direct descent.

The Impressive Naval General Service 'Trafalgar' and 'Ap. & May Boat Service 1813' awarded to Captain Henry Parker, who served as Signal Midshipman and A.D.C. to Captain William Hargood aboard the *Belleisle* at the Battle of Trafalgar and had the honour of nailing the colours to the stump of the *Belleisle*'s mizenmast while taking fire simultaneously from five enemy ships. He later served as Flag-Lieutenant to Admiral Sir John Warren on the North American Station, and took part in the Boat Service actions in April and May 1813 while serving aboard H.M.S. *Dragon*, including the attacks upon Frenchtown and Havre de Grace upriver from Chesapeake Bay, being twice wounded in action. Promoted to Commander at the peace of 1814, after a brief time with the Irish Coastguard he was appointed commander at Greenwich Hospital, and retired at the rank of Captain, comprising:

Naval General Service, 1793-1840, 2 clasps, Trafalgar, Ap. & May Boat Service 1813 **(Henry Parker Midshipman.)**, with original ribbon, *lightly toned, extremely fine, and a scarce clasp combination* £10,000-15,000

Captain Henry Parker was born on 17 June 1788 at Green Park, in Youghal, County Cork, Ireland, the son of John Robert Parker and Catherine Parker (nee Uniacke). He entered the Royal Navy as a Volunteer 1st Class in June 1801, and served as Midshipman aboard H.M.S. *Belleisle* (74) in the pursuit of the combined Franco-Spanish fleet to the West Indies, and then back, prior to the Battle of Trafalgar. Details gleaned from his obituary state that at Trafalgar, on 21 October 1805, Parker served as Signalling Midshipman (an appointment typically granted to the most senior of the Midshipman) and aide-de-camp to the *Bellelisle's* captain, William Hargood.

The *Belleisle* played a distinguished part in the great victory at Trafalgar, being ordered by Collingwood to take the second position in the Lee Column, just behind his own flagship. From this advanced position the *Belleisle* intersected the enemy line behind the *Fougueax* (74) and in front of the *Pluton*, and quickly found itself engaging numerous enemy ships at the same time – delivering a passing broadside to the *Santa Ana* before exchanging several shots with the *Indomptable*. Following these relatively early exchanges, Hargood began a longer engagement with the *San Juan Nepomuceno*, which shot off the *Belleisle's* topmast at 12.45pm, as the *Fougueax* reappeared soon after to rake her starboard quarter. In return, the Belleisle's furious fire was able to destroy the *Fougeaux's* mizenmast within just a few minutes, causing the huge mast and tangle rigging to hang over her port bow. At around 1.30pm The *Belleisle* found itself surrounded on all sides by the French ships *Achille* and *Aigle*, and the Spanish ships *San Leandro*, *San Justo*, and the powerful *Principle de Asturias* – taking a great deal of damage. As recorded in the book '*Trafalgar* – *Countdown to Battle'* by Schom, '...despite his extraordinary predicament *Hargood remained calm and his superb men held their own, refusing to strike their colours, regardless of the beating they were taking'*. Indeed, according to his published obituary, it was Parker himself who nailed the colours to the stump of the mizenmast in heroic defiance of the enemy all around them.

By 2.30pm the French ship *Neptune* had joined the melee and shot away the *Belleisle's* bowsprit and final remaining mast – the foremast – disabling the ship. Remarkably, the *Belleisle* was able to singlehandedly maintain its fire against the encircling enemy ships for a further 45 minutes – until the British ships *Polyphemus* and *Swiftsure* were able to draw their fire away. Battered, disabled and almost completely defenceless, it looked for a short time as though Hargood's *Belleisle* had seen its last involvements in the battle, when Hargood spotted the 80-gun *Argonauta* striking her colours, and immediately rallied a small boarding party to board it from his only remaining pinnace. Whether Midshipman Parker was part of this boarding party, we can only now speculate. The naval historian William James later remarked that *'(the Belleisle's) hull was knocked almost to pieces...ports, port timbers, channels, chain plates'* were ruined and even her anchors destroyed. Despite this damage, her relatively modest tally of 126 casualties was considered somewhat miraculous.

After the battle, Parker and witnessed the destruction, off Cape Henry, of the French ship *L'Impetueux* on 14 September 1806, and in November 1807 was ordered to leave the *Northumberland* (having continued to serve under Captain Hargood) in order to join the *Swiftsure* under Sir John Borlase Warren, on the North American Station. Receiving his commission as Lieutenant on 28 April, 1808, he continued as Warren's Flag-Lieutenant for some years before going aboard H.M.S. *Dragon* (74) in November 1811. He took part in various operations during the 'War of 1812', and in particular played an active role during the British attacks up the Chesapeake Bay in April and May 1813 at Frenchtown (29 April 1813) and Havre de Grace (3 May 1813) under the command of Rear Admiral Cockburn, during which he was twice wounded, and for which he received the Boat Service clasp as above.

He was promoted to Commander in 1814, and later served as Captain in the Coastguard between 1832-35, after which he appears to have retired to half-pay. He was appointed Commander of Greenwich Hospital between 1853 and 1864, and retired from this position at the rank of Captain in 1864. Recorded as having been 'the last of the original establishment of Greenwich Hospital', he died there on 7 April 1873 and was buried at the Naval Cemetery, East Greenwich. He married Lady Frances Theophilia Anne Hastings (eldest daughter of the Earl of Huntingdon), and had four sons, who served variously in the army, navy and marines.

While 57 awards were issued for 'Ap. & May Boat Service 1813', just three of these medals were also issued with the clasp 'Trafalgar' - the other two examples were awarded to: 2nd Lieut. George D. Hawkins, R.M. [Spartiate/Dragon]; and Vol. 1st Cl. Henry Walker, R.N. [Temeraire/Mohawk]. The painted portrait of Henry Parker as a young Midshipman, shown above, is to be offered in Sotheby's forthcoming auction of Old Master Paintings on 3 July, 2025.

Private James Gibson (1793-1846) was born in 1793 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire, Scotland, the son of Hugh and Jane Gibson. He enlisted for service with the 2nd Dragoons (Royal Scots Greys) in March 1806 and was present at the Battle of Waterloo on 18 June, 1815. Despite serving in Barnard's Troop, on the right of the Scot's Greys during their famous charge, and in which Captain Barnard himself was killed in action, Private Gibson somehow avoided receiving any injuries worthy of note (as stated in 'Greys' Ghosts – Men of the Scots Greys at Waterloo 1815' by Stuart Mellor). Serving for a total of 17 years with the regiment, he was discharged at Chelsea Pension office in 1821, owing to 'chronic affection (sic) of the spleen since 1818'. His general conduct was described as very good and remarkably clean, and his name is confirmed on the Waterloo Medal Roll.

Returning to civilian life, he took up work as a 'bonnet maker' in Kirkford, and married Mary Brown in 1820, just prior to his discharge. He died on 25 September, 1846, and was buried at St. Columba's Churchyard in Stewarton, Kilmarnock. Upon the death of his wife, the following obituary was placed in the '*Kilmarnock Weekly Post'* of 27 June, 1863:

"Gibson – At 8 Loudon Street, Stewarton, on the 23rd inst., Mary Brown, aged 70 years, relict of the late Mr James Gibson, bonnet manufacturer; and long an efficient and respected soldier in the Scots Greys, with which he was through many a well-fought field, ending with the fearful, and, to the French, fatal charge at Waterloo."

Major John Swinburne (1829-1867) was born on 25 April 1828 at Limerick, Ireland, the son of Major-General John Swinburne and his wife Jane Swinburne (née Burge). He enlisted for service as an Ensign (without purchase) on 5 April 1846, and served with 32nd Foot during the first and second siege operations at Mooltan, including the attack upon the enemy's position in front of the advanced trenches on 12 September 1848, during which he was wounded in the right hand. He also took part in the storm and capture of the city and the surrender of its fortress, continuing to take part in the surrender of the fort at Cheniote on 9 February 1849, and then at the Battle of Goojerat.

He exchanged into the 18th (Royal Irish) Regiment at the rank of Lieutenant on 22 September 1848, and served throughout the Burmese War of 1852-53. He was present at the capture of Martaban, saw action with H.M.S. *Rattler* during the destruction of the stockades before Rangoon, and then took part in the operations in front of Rangoon between April 11-14 that year, as well as at the subsequent capture of Prome.

In December 1854 he saw renewed action in the Crimean War, taking part in the siege of Sebastopol from December 1854. In May 1855 he took up the post of Assistant-Adjutant of the 4th Depot Battalion at Colchester, and was promoted to Major (by purchase) in 1863. He died suddenly on 14 February 1867, apparently of a heart attack, while conducting his duties in the orderly room. He was given a full military funeral and was buried in Lexden churchyard, according to an obituary published in the 'Essex Standard' of 22 February 1867. A watercolour portrait of the recipient, painted by T. F. Fisher in 1855, is held by the National Army Museum.

PRIVATE GEORGE LOCKTON, of St. George's, Bow, London, enlisted for service with the 1st Battalion Rifle Brigade on 13 September 1845, having previously worked as a labourer. Serving in the Kaffir Wars of 1846-47 and 1850-53, he is known to have served in the same company as Private John Pine, a relatively new recruit several years his junior, and whose letters from the Kaffir War of 1850-53 were published in *'The Crimea Society Journal'*, Volume 8, Number 1, of April 1990.

Upon the outbreak of the Crimean War, Lockton (and Pine) returned again to active service at the Battles of Alma, Inkermann and Sebastopol. He was sent to receive treatment at Scutari on 14 November 1854, after which he died on 27 November that year from unknown causes — mostly likely from a combination of disease and exposure.

Perhaps as a result of his death in hospital, some confusion appears to have come about regarding his precise entitlement concerning the Crimea Medal. The medal roll for his 3-clasp Crimea Medal appears to include the annotation 'W.O. 24/9/55', however, in addition to this, an earlier Crimea Medal had already been issued, but with only his earlier entitlement to two clasps for 'Alma' and 'Inkermann'. His South Africa Medal 1853 was sent out the following year, in the summer of 1856 ('medal sent W.O. 21/7/56').

Private James Holem was born in Coventry, c.1836 and enlisted for service with the 2nd Battalion Rifle Brigade at Bristol on 15 May 1854. He joined the battalion in Turkey on 19 July 1854, and spent a period of time sick at Varna during August and September that year. He is understood to have served as part of the wing that missed the Battle of Inkermann, and is not shown on the medal roll for Balaklava (previous detailed research, states), and thus should only be entitled to the clasp for 'Sebastopol'. He later served during the Indian Mutiny, again with the 2nd Battalion, and also saw service with the Camel Corps (October 1859 - May 1860), but did not qualify for the addition clasp 'Central India'. Transferring to the 4th Battalion in December 1868, he was discharged at Winchester on 7 December 1875, and is recorded as having attended the 50th Commemoration of the Indian Mutiny at the Royal Albert Hall in 1907.

REGIMENTAL SERGEANT-MAJOR MAXWELL GRANT DAVIDSON (1832-1878) was born in Ireland and enlisted with the 5th Dragoon Guards in 1845 in Dublin at a young age — possibly as young as 14. Serving in the Crimea at the rank of Sergeant, according to 'Forgotten Heroes: The Charge of the Heavy Brigade' by Dutton, Davidson is listed as: 'probably rode in the charge'. This high likelihood is rather reinforced by the presence of his French Médaille Militaire. The citation for this award states: '(He)...served throughout the whole of the Eastern Campaign; was present at Inkermann, Balaklava, and whole of the Siege of Sebastopol, and was always distinguished for his zeal and activity and irreproachable character in every respect.' The roll confirms the award of four Médailles Militaires to the 5th Dragoon Guards — to the R.S.M., two T.S.M.s and to Sergeant M. Davidson.

His discharge certificate, still apparently held by the American Numismatic Society Archive, states that he served for a total of 25 years and 202 days with the colours, finally receiving his discharge on 18 May 1875. A contemporary report from the '*Irish Times*' of 20 April 1875, states that in the lead up to his retirement, he was presented with a purse of gold by Lieutenant-Colonel Godman on behalf of the officers of the regiment as a 'special mark of their appreciation' after a career of 'nearly thirty years'. The 1871 Census shows him as living with his family at the Cavalry Barracks at Leeds, in which city he eventually died on 20 May 1878.

Major Thomas William Irons was promoted from Conductor to Assistant Commissary of Ordnance (with the Honorary Rank of Lieutenant) on 12 August 1914, and served in the Egyptian theatre from 30 August 1915. Receiving promotions to Captain (5 November 1917) and to Acting Major, he was appointed M.B.E. for 'valuable services' during the military operations in Egypt on 1 January 1919, and later retired on 4 August 1921, receiving a mention in despatches on 31 August that same year. He appears to have returned to Army service, however, as he is shown in the *London Gazette* as retiring at the rank of O.E.O. and Major on 26 April 1928, having attained the age limit for retirement. CHIEF ENGINEER WILLIAM RUTHERFORD SMITH was born on 10 April 1897 in Edinburgh, Scotland, the son of James and Theresa Smith, and served with the Mercantile Marine during the Great War. He was serving aboard the S.S. *Benwyvis* (Leith) when it was attacked and sunk on 12 March 1941 by the German submarine *U-105* near the Cape Verde Islands. Previous research with the group makes the claim that he died of thirst and starvation after the sinking, having made his escape from the sinking aboard a lifeboat, but this detail remains unconfirmed. It is known, however, that one man was rescued after 28 days at sea in an open boat by a French ship, which landed him at Madagascar.

COMMANDER PETER JOHN KNOWLING received instruction at the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, c. 1925, during which time he received several college prizes for Heavyweight Boxing. Appointed Sub-Lieutenant on 1 December 1928, he was commissioned as Lieutenant on 1 July 1930, and was promoted to Lieutenant Commander on 1 July 1938, just prior to the Second World War.

During WW2, Lieutenant Commander Knowling served as Captain of the escort Destroyer H.M.S. *Cotswold*, and it was while serving with this vessel that his ship was involved in a collision with H.M.S. *St. Donats*, off Spurn, Yorkshire, which was unfortunately sunk in the process, and left the *Cotswold* requiring repairs for a one-month period before returning to sea. Receiving and M.i.D. on 1 January 1942, online research suggests that he saw later service with the Combined Operations Material Department and C.O.H.Q. in 1944, and as Commander of the shore base H.M.S. *Nile* in 1945.

Seeing further post-war service during the Palestine 1945-48 operations, he was latterly sent to serve 'on loan' with the Royal New Zealand Navy, based at the shore establishment H.M.N.Z.S. *Tamaki* (near Auckland), for which services he was appointed O.B.E., prior to his retirement in January 1957.



The Barry Weaver Collection Of Medals from the Second Afghan War (Part 3)



DR. BARRY C. WEAVER

Born in Alabama in 1938 and growing up in Texas, Barry enlisted in the United States Navy as a young man, serving for four years before attending dental school. While a dentist by trade, Barry's fascination with military history led to him becoming a passionate collector of military medals for almost fifty years. He could often be found absorbed reading history books or doing research on medal groups. Of course, there was always time to go after a striped bass on the beaches of Ocracoke, North Carolina, his favorite fishing spot.

Barry built significant collections over the years in U.S. Medals, British Medals and Chinese Medals. Within each area he collected, he developed expertise through hours of research, often visiting military archives in Washington, D.C. and New York City. Well known within the collecting community, he was highly involved with the Orders and Medals Society of America (O.M.S.A.) for decades. He wrote many articles for O.M.S.A. publications and served in various volunteer positions within the organization. In 2000, he published *"The Boxer Uprising"* book with co-authors Edwin T. Wheatly and Charles P. McDowell. He attended nearly every annual O.M.S.A. convention for most of his adult life, deriving tremendous pleasure from organizing two conventions and frequently putting together exhibits on special medal groups of interest. Once Barry retired from dentistry, he translated his enthusiasm into a business, partnering with Jeffrey Floyd and Frederick Rockwood to create FJP Auctions, Inc. which they operated for several years.

Barry assembled his Afghan Wars (1878-1880) collection for over a decade, carefully acquiring the highest quality pieces he could find and meticulously researching the medals. It is with great pride that Barry's family is auctioning off this meaningful collection. As a lifelong collector of military medals and avid lover of military history, Barry held a deep recognition for the value of each soldier's life, their personal stories, and individual contributions to their countries. Dr. Barry Weaver passed away December 17, 2021 at his home in Hilton Head, South Carolina after courageously battling multiple cancers for many years.

Group of 3 awarded to Private Richard McAnary, 72nd Foot (Seaforth Highlanders), for his gallant part in the storming of the 'Heights of Kabul' on 6 October 1879, and helping to secure the key road towards Kabul – this one of just four men from the Seaforths to receive the D.C.M. for this battle. He later served during the Egypt & Sudan Campaign of 1882-89, and was present at the Battle of Tel-El-Kebir, comprising:

PRIVATE RICHARD McAnary was born c.1852, near Monmouth, Wales, and enlisted for service with the 1st Battalion, 72nd Foot (Seaforth Highlanders) in 1869. The regiment embarked for service in India in 1871, largely on the Northwest Frontier, and were later sent to serve during the Second Afghan War of 1878-80 as part of the 2nd Brigade, Kurram Valley Field Force.

Private McAnary was present with the Seaforth Highlanders at the Battle of Peiwar Kotal, on 2 December 1878, at the Western end of the Khyber Pass. After some careful scouting of the enemies positions, and having discovered that a steep path might be taken up over the Spingawai Kotal and around the enemy's flank fortifications, men of the 72nd Foot (and others troops from the regiments of the 'right wing' of their brigade) played a key role in taking this strategic position. Undertaking a night-time march up the very steep bed of a mountain stream, at daybreak on 2 December they engaged the Afghan breastworks on the top of the hill and surprised the enemy force, leaving 78 dead and capturing 21 guns. This flank attack shook the enemy, and was timed to coincide with the main frontal attack. Despite spirited resistance from the Afghans, this combined attack caused the enemy to give up their fortifications in retreat, leaving the British in control of this strategic position.

At the Battle of Charasia (sometimes referred to as 'The Heights of Kabul'), on 6 October 1879, a large Afghan force of approximately 12,000 men were found to be holding a range of hills commanding the pass leading towards the city of Kabul. As recorded in the 'Historical Records of the 72nd (now 1st Seaforth) Highlanders':

'…the 72nd, under command of Lieutenant-Colonel Clarke, leading the attack on the left of the British line, were at first - while crossing some open ground between two ranges of hills — exposed to very heavy fire from the Afghan army… They, however, soon drove back the enemy's right, and gaining the hills, got some cover, and eventually driving the enemy from hill to hill with considerable loss, about 3.00pm compelled them to retreat, and got possession of their position, thus ending the fight and leaving the road to Kabul open'.



The 72nd Highlanders suffered 3 men killed; Lieutenant Fergusson and 34 men wounded, and for their gallantry, Private McAnary and 3 other men of the regiment later received the D.C.M. - his name, along with those of Colour-Sergeant Robert Renwick Lauder (bar), Private John Waterstone and Private Michael McMahon, were submitted to the Queen for the award of the Distinguished Conduct Medal on 8 January 1880. While no citations for these awards are currently known, it is reported that 'half of the ammunition expended by the British force' at Charasia was spent by the 72nd Foot alone, so their 'fighting role' at the forefront of this attack is beyond doubt.

McAnary continued to serve during the Egypt and Sudan Campaigns of 1882-89, including at the key battle of Tel-El-Kebir. A photo from this period in Egypt (see above, second from right) shows McAnary, and other men of the 72nd, wearing their medals from the two campaigns. It would seem that McAnary returned to civilian life after his time in Egypt, and his name appears in the 1891 Census of Scotland, showing his employment as an Iron Works Labourer in Coatbridge, Lanarkshire, Scotland; married to an Emily McAnary, with one child also called Richard. No records can be found thus far concerning his death, so it is possible that he might have emigrated in later life.

COLONEL RICHARD CORBETT was born on 9 May 1844, entering Woolwich as a Gentleman Cadet on 1 July 1861. Receiving a commission as Lieutenant in the Royal Artillery on 1 September 1863, he was promoted to Captain in March 1876 and served in the Second Afghan War of 1878-80.

Serving in Afghanistan initially with 'E' Battery, 3rd Brigade, Royal Artillery, throughout the first and during part of the second campaign, he was present at the capture of Ali Musjid (as stated by Shadbolt's 'The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880') in the early stages of the war as part of the 1st Division, Peshawar Valley Field Force. He later served with 'A' Battery, 'B' Brigade of the Royal Horse Artillery, between March and May 1880, taking part in the Battle of Ahmed Khel, in which he was dangerously wounded in action – suffering a compound fracture to both bones in his right forearm from a gunshot. He was subsequently mentioned in despatches, and received the Brevet of Major.

Between 1898 and his retirement in 1901 he served as Colonel of the staff commanding the Royal Artillery at Woolwich, and died at Nottingham Place, Marylebone, London, in May 1907. This medal represents a unique combination of clasps to an officer.



DEPUTY SURGEON-GENERAL ALEXANDER GUTHRIE, M.D., was born in Forfarshire, Scotland, on 23 July 1832, gaining his qualification as a Medical Doctor at Edinburgh in 1853. He was appointed Assistant Surgeon (Staff) on 28 April 1854, with the Depot Battalion, Winchester, then serving on attachment to the Rifle Brigade from 4 May 1855. He was appointed to the Army Medical Department on 20 June 1865 and promoted to Surgeon (Staff) on 20 June 1865, serving on attachment to the Royal Artillery from 17 July 1866 (the 'Roll of Commissioned Officers in the Service of the British Army' by Johnston, refers).

At the time of the Second Afghan War he was appointed Brigade Surgeon on 27 November 1870 and served as Principal Medical Officer to the Reserve Division at Peshawar from January to February 1880, as recorded in Shadbolt's '*The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880*'. After this he was posted to the Medical charge of the Field Hospital at Landi Kotal and to act as P.M.O. of the 1st Section Kyber Line Force, in which capacity he continued to serve until the close of operations in September 1880, for which service he was mentioned in despatches. He was latterly promoted to Deputy Surgeon-General on 7 May 1882, and died at Chatham on 3 March 1886.

The Civil K.C.B. and Afghanistan C.B. group to Major-General Lord Ralph Drury Kerr, who commanded the 10th Hussars at the disastrous crossing of the Kabul River, and commanded the Cavalry Brigade during the action at Futtehabad, where the 10th Hussars contributed 'a well-delivered charge' to the right front, leading to 'the crushing defeat of the enemy', comprising:

MAJOR-GENERAL LORD RALPH DRURY KERR was born on 11 August 1837 at Newbattle Abbey, the third son of the 7th Marquess of Lothian and Cecil, daughter of the 2nd Earl Talbot. He was commissioned as a Cornet in the 10th Hussars on 24 November 1857, being promoted to Lieutenant in June 1858, and then to Adjutant in May 1859. He remained in that capacity until he obtained his Troop as a Captain in August 1861. He proceeded to India in 1873 as Major and second in command, taking command of the regiment in April 1875, and being promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel in May 1876. Arriving in Afghanistan, he joined the Headquarters and service troops at Jellalabad in March 1879 and commanded the 10th Hussars for the rest of the war. He was in command of the 10th Hussars at the time of the Kabul River disaster on 31st March (see 'The Barry Weaver Collection – Part I [lot 113] for the casualty medal to Sub-Lieutenant Francis Harford), and was present at the head of the regiment, leading the Cavalry Brigade during their charge at Futtehabad on 2 April 1879. For this he was mentioned in despatches (London Gazette 7 November 1879), and created a Companion of the Bath.

On the return from Afghanistan to India, he commanded the regiment during the terrible outbreak of cholera as it made its way through the Khyber Pass, and by his example and devotion assisted to alleviate the results (as stated in 'Memoirs of the Tenth Royal Hussars'), although 38 men died within a few days, in what became called the 'Death March'. In October 1880 he accompanied the 10th from Rawal Pindi to Mian Mir, and at a Durbar held by the Viceroy of India he commanded a Brigade consisting of the 10th and 15th Hussars, the Central India Horse and the 3rd Bengal Cavalry.



He was placed on half pay in May 1881, having held command of the regiment for the maximum period allowed of 5 years. As a Colonel he was appointed Inspector Officer for Auxiliary Cavalry at York, from 1883 to 1888, and after promotion to Major-General in January 1890, he commanded the Curragh District from 1891 to 1896, and retired in 1898. On 20 March 1901 he was appointed Colonel of the 10th Hussars, succeeding the Prince of Wales (later King Edward VII), who had been Colonel since 1863. He was made a Civil K.C.B. in the Coronation Honours list of 1911, and remained Colonel of the regiment until November 1912. Retiring from service to Woodburn House, Lord Kerr died at Dalkeith on 18 September 1916 – with one obituary stating: 'He was most kindly and courteous in disposition, and was highly respected by all classes. A gentleman by nature, as well as by birth, he was always ready to be of service to others.' He was interred at St. David's Roman Catholic Chapel in Dalkeith, near Edinburgh. Sold with a quantity of related research.



The Second Afghan War 'Maiwand Casualty' Medal awarded to Captain Ernest Stephen Garratt, 66th Foot, who was killed in action at the Battle of Maiwand on 27 July 1880, while commanding 'F' Company. As his regiment's position in the British line became overrun by the attacking Afghan tribesmen, Garratt ordered his rearmost rank to turn about, delivering volleys to the front and rear. Conducting an orderly retreat with his surviving men towards the village of Khig, Garratt was shot first in the leg, and then killed instantly by a bullet to the temple, in the vicinity of the Mundabad ravine. He was last seen 'giving orders with complete coolness as if on a parade ground... and with disregard to his own safety', comprising:



Captain Ernest Stephen Garratt was born on 28 September 1845, at Hampstead, Middlesex, the eldest son of the Reverend Samuel Garratt, Honorary Canon of Norwich, and Vicar of St. Margaret's, Ipswich, and Loetitia Sarah Bathsua, his wife, daughter of the Reverend Bowater James Vernon, who was Senior Chaplain to the Forces in St. Helena at the time of the death of the Emperor Napoleon, when the 66th Regiment happened to be stationed in the island (as stated in Shadbolt's 'The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880'). Educated at Marlborough College, as well as under private tutors at Geneva and elsewhere, he was commissioned as Ensign (by purchase) on 2 June 1865 into the 66th Regiment, then lately returned from India. After five years' home service, quartered at Aldershot, the Channel Islands, Plymouth, and the Curragh, he was promoted to Lieutenant (by purchase) in July 1867 and then to Captain in March 1870, embarking with his regiment to India soon after, and obtaining his company while on the voyage out.

Picked out early on for a promising career, and for his popularity with both officers and men, General Barclay, formerly Lieutenant-Colonel of the 66th, gave the following opinion of him during the period of his Indian service, as follows: 'I first made his acquaintance at Belgaum in 1875; he was then in command of a detachment at the fort, and I was much struck, on inspecting his company, with the thoughtful manner in which all arrangements for the comfort of his men were carried out. No care or even expense was spared. His company, from his Colour-Sergeant to the youngest soldier, would have done anything for him.' Other officers wrote of his 'kindness of heart', and indeed, he nursed his brother officer, Captain McMath, through a long and dangerous illness — having been severely mauled by a wounded panther— and was instrumental in saving his life.

After serving at various stations in Bombay, he returned on leave to England, was married on 19 Mach 1877 (to a Mary Jane Beeching) and rejoined the regiment at Ahmednagar. After one further voyage home, where he held for eighteen months an appointment at the Depot, at Reading, he was once more ordered to India in the autumn of 1879, three months before the departure of the 66th from Karachi to Kandahar. Whilst stationed at Kandahar he became involved in numerous experiments in the field of telegraphy and morse code, showing a remarkable ability and intelligence in its study and application. He also grew very close to his men, and wrote in one letter to his wife that 'We are all like brothers' such was his rapport with the officers and men of his regiment. Writing soon after the engagement at Girishk, he wrote that, after the pursuit and capture of the Wali's guns: 'Then, as the enemy still held the valley to which they had retreated, we were ordered to clear it; and in this three of our men were wounded badly. One or two shots came so close to me that my horse shied'. Acting as the senior Captain on active service, and doing Field Officer's duty, his horse 'nearly threw me, as I was acting galloper between the General and the Regiment.'



Two weeks later, on the 27th July, 1880, Garratt fought at the battle of Maiwand, in command of 'F' Company of the 66th Foot. As the day progressed, and the men of Jacob's Rifles began to turn and break from the British line, the men of the 66th did their best to maintain order amongst the chaos, maintaining a steady and effective fire towards the massing Afghan infantry, but soon found the enemy attacking from all sides. In turn, Garratt ordered 'F' Company's rear rank to turn about and face the enemy behind, delivering fire in two directions. Soon after, however, most of the 66th became engaged in hand-to-hand fighting, forming small groups and moving in the direction of the village of Khig. Crossing the 25ft deep Mundabad Ravine, Garratt continued to give orders to his men from the strip of land between the ravine and the garden walls of Khig, directing his men to provide covering fire to those still crossing. Reports from witnesses state that Garratt was at that time shot in the legs, and then soon after, received a bullet to the temple/jaw area which killed him instantly. One of the men of his company wrote:

'I saw Captain Garratt fall. I stopped to see if I could render him any assistance. I then noticed that he had a bullet wound between the temple and the jawbone, and that his eyes were closed. I raised his arm and found that he was dead.'

And General Primrose, making reference to him and his brother officer, Captain Cullen, in his letter to the Adjutant General, published in the 'Gazette' of the 31st December, 1880, tells how they 'were both killed on the field in front of the nullah, up to the last moment commanding their companies and giving their orders with as much coolness as if on ordinary regimental parade.' The surviving men of the 66th, and other units, then continued to make a series of stands in the walled gardens of Khig, until the final stand was made, with the last eleven men fighting until their ammunition was exhausted, and they were killed where they stood, fighting hand-to-hand.

After the battle, the Afghans buried those whom they found dead on the field and marked the place of this last stand with a large pile of stones, and it is understood that Garratt's body was buried there along with those of his fellow soldiers. His name was also marked on the memorial to the officers of the 66th Foot in the Church of St. John the Evangelist in Bombay, as well as in a chancel in the south wall of St. Margaret's Church, Ipswich, which bear's a dedication in his name, and the following verse from Psalm 27, Verse 3: 'Though an host of men were laid against me, yet shall not my heart be afraid: and though there rose up war against me, yet will I put my trust in Him.'

The Rare Second Afghan War 'Maiwand Survivor' Medal awarded to Private William Pike, 66th Foot, who served as batman to Major John Ready - the officer placed in command of the Baggage Guard during the battle. Pike was severely wounded by gunshot wound to the back during the battle, but was able to survive the fighting withdrawal to Kandahar, comprising:

Afghanistan, 1878-80, no clasp **(B/575, Pte. W. Pike, 66th Foot)**, occasional tiny marks and nicks, good very fine, and a rare example to a severely wounded survivor £1,500-2,000

PRIVATE WILLIAM PIKE was born in Ramsbury, Hungerford c. 1858 as stated in his original service documents (only later residing at Ladbroke Grove, London), and enlisted for service at the 41st Brigade Depot at Newbury on 28 February 1877. He served in the Second Afghan War with the 66th Foot, with confirmed entitlement as above, and is reported by name in the book 'Maiwand – The Last Stand of the 66th (Berkshire) Regiment in Afghanistan, 1880' by Richard J. Stacpool-Ryding as having served as batman to Major John T. Ready, who commanded the Baggage Guard& Train at the Battle of Maiwand on 27 July 1880. It is likely, therefore, that Private Pike served alongside Major Ready, either in an immediate capacity, or at least as part of his Baggage Guard.

As the main British line faltered and broke under the combined assault of the Afghan infantry, cavalry and artillery, the Baggage Guard – set slightly back in the relative safety of a sheltered ravine towards the rear of the British position – were better able to maintain order, despite repeated attacks along the floor of the ravine, and fought an ongoing 'fighting retreat' past the village of Mundabad and then along the arduous road to Kandahar. As shown in his service papers, apparently recently re-discovered (which state 'original sheet lost at Maiwand'), he received a musketball to the 'upper dorsal region... and was 43 days in hospital, leaving on 9 September 1880, which precluded him from active service at Kandahar (and explains his 'no clasp' award).

He married Jessie Allen, of Notting Hill, Middlesex, on 13 January 1884, and joined the Army Reserve on 5 January 1889 after completion of 12 years' service (with the service number '570'), enlisting for 4 further years. At the time of the Boer War he attested once again on 29 March 1900 with the R.H.C.R.R. at Reading, but was discharged on the 28th of March 1901. Offered with copied service documents.

His name also appears in the 'The Second Afghan War 1878-1880 Casualty Roll' by Farrington, which states that he was severely wounded in action at Charasiah on 25 April 1880, receiving bullet wounds to the left breast and right forearm.

Private Samuel Cardwell served in the Second Afghan War with the 100th Foot with confirmed entitlement as above, and was discharged from further service on 9 June 1882. It would appear that the second medal here is a late issue / replacement of some kind, since reunited with the original issue. These medals rare to the regiment, with only one medal awarded to an officer, and eleven medals to other ranks of the Royal Canadians for service with the Transport Department in Afghanistan.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL JOHN FRASER DINGWALL FORDYCE (1850-1924) was born on 6 November 1850 at Peshawar, India, the son of Lieutenant-General Sir John Fordyce, K.C.B., and Dame Phoebe Fordyce (née Graham). Educated as a Gentleman at the Royal Military College before being appointed as Cornet with the 21st Hussars on 4 February 1869, he was promoted to Lieutenant, and then as a Probationer for the Indian Staff Corps on 10 January 1872. He was admitted into the I.S.C. on 17 May 1873 at the same rank.

During the Second Afghan War he served as Captain and Adjutant with the 8th Bengal Cavalry (Shadbolt's *'The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880', refers*), taking part in the advance on and occupation of Kandahar and Kelat-i-Ghilzi, and the return to India by the Thal-Chotiali route. Confirmed in his rank of Captain on 4 February 1881, he was promoted to Major on 4 February 1889, and then to Lieutenant-Colonel on 4 February 1895. He retired on 10 August 1902, and died in Witney, Oxfordshire, on 25 June 1924.

MAJOR MARTIN JAMES MOORE (1842-1924) was born in London in 1842, the son of Major John Arthur Moore and Sophia Moore (nee Stewart). Educated at Mr Brackenbury's School, Wimbledon, he was commissioned as a Cornet in the 12th Bengal Cavalry on 20 October 1859, being promoted to Lieutenant in 1861. He was appointed 2nd Squadron Subaltern in 1866, and Squadron Officer and Adjutant in 1869, before receiving a promotion to Major in 1879.

During the Second Afghan War he served with his regiment from the commencement of the war until invalided home on 2 April, 1879, having been present at the capture of Peiwar Kotal (Shadbolt's 'The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880', refers). During the 'storming and capture' of Peiwar Kotal on 2 December 1878, Shadbolt states that: 'one squadron, sent forward under Capt. Green and Capt. Moore ... behaving with great steadiness under a very galling fire.' A contemporary diary, written by Lieutenant W. B. Wilson, adds further detail that they withstood a 'galling infantry fire from the crags overhead under "1 gun hill" (one horse killed) and on the flight of the enemy at 3 P.M. ascended the Kotul and was taken by Colonel Gough a mile or so down the ravine the other side of the crest on the road to Zabardast Kila.'

Moore was advanced to Major in 1879, and retired the following year after a period of sickness.

COLONEL RULLION HARE RATTRAY (1859-1934) was born on 1 June 1859, the third son of Colonel Thomas Rattray, C.B. C.S.I. (who had himself raised 'Rattray's Sikhs' in 1856), and Harriet Penelope Rattray (née Hare). He received his first commission into the 61st Foot in January 1878 and was transferred as a Lieutenant to the Bengal Staff Corps in April 1880. He served with the 22nd Bengal Native Infantry during the Second Afghan War in 1880, and later on took part in operations on the North West Frontier. He was present during the first Miranzai expedition of 1891, and in the Punjab Frontier campaign of 1897-98, with the Malakand Field Force, including operations in Swat and Bajaur, and the night attack on Nawagai on 19-21 September. He was also present at the capture of the Badmanai Pass and operations in the Mittai and Surab Valleys (mentioned in despatches), and also saw service with the Tirah Expeditionary Force on the Lines of Communication, including the action at Dargai as acting D.A.A.G. to Brigadier-General Kempster, commanding the 3rd Brigade (entitled to an I.G.S. 95 with 3 clasps). Rattray was made Brevet Colonel in January 1907, retired in January 1910, and died in England on 16 April 1934.

A soldier by the name of Sepoy Bhag Sing appears in the 'The Second Afghan War 1878-1880 Casualty Roll' by Farrington, having been slightly wounded in action by a sword on 26 March 1880 at Fort Battye.



The Remarkable Second Afghan War Medal awarded to Major-General Arthur Battye, 2nd (P.W.O.) Gurkha Rifles, one of the 'Fighting Ten' Battye brothers. His 31-year army career began with a narrow escape from death at the hands of mutineers at Barrackpore in 1857, but surviving this, he continued to serve in India during the Hazara and Looshai campaigns, and then into the Second Afghan War, during which he was wounded in action at Kandahar and thrice mentioned in despatches – being later awarded a C.B. for his services in Afghanistan, comprising:

Afghanistan, 1878-80, 2 clasps, Kabul, Kandahar **(Lt. Col; A. Battye, CB, 2nd Goorkha.)**, tiny edge grazes, extremely fine and lustrous £3,000-4,000

MAJOR-GENERAL ARTHUR BATTYE (1839-1909) was born at Behar, India, on 30 October 1839, the seventh son of collector and H.E.I.C. Judge George Wynyard Battye and his wife Marion Battye (nee Money). One of the ten 'Fighting Brothers', all of whom served in the Indian Army, Arthur was educated in England at Mr Bedingfield's School in Maidenhead, and may also have briefly studied at the Addiscombe Military Seminary – the East India Company's Military School near Croydon. He was gazetted as an Ensign with the Bengal Establishment on 6 January 1857 and was sent soon after to the 19th Native Infantry – just prior to its mutiny on 25 February 1857 (in which, one article relates, Arthur Battye managed to 'escape from death at the hands of mutineers'), and was also present at the affair at Barrackpore on 29-31 March which sparked the wider Indian Mutiny.

After a brief period of service with the 1st Bengal Europeans (in which his elder brother George was serving), he was promoted to Lieutenant on 22 January 1858 and then supposedly served with Hodson's Horse during the capture of Lucknow in March that year, as well as during the actions at Uttereah, Bhumore Ghat and Kintoor, receiving a mention in despatches for his good work in these engagements.

Gazetted to the Bengal Staff Corps, Arthur Battye was appointed the 2nd Gurkhas (Sirmoor Rifles) in May 1859, and was made Adjutant in January 1861. He served with them in the 1864 Northwest Frontier expedition against Sultan Muhammed Khan, having his horse killed under his at the action at Shabkadah on 2 January that year, and the following year he was appointed Wing Officer. In 1868 he took part in the Hazara campaign, distinguishing himself during the rearguard action at Manna-ka-Duma on 12 October, and was mentioned in despatches, with a promotion to Captain on 6 January 1869. More action followed in 1871-72, where he took part in the punitive expedition against the Looshais. The expedition was split into two separate columns, with the 2nd Gurkhas marching in early December 1871 in the Chittagong Column under Brigadier-General C. H. Brownlow. After some initial skirmishes, the force came up against the village of Chief Lal Gnura, which the 2nd Gurkhas subdued by force, losing one man killed, Captain Battye and nine men wounded in the process (with Major Donal Macintyre being recommended for the V.C.). Battye was promoted to Major on 6 January 1877, and on 4 January 1878 Battye was confirmed as Officiating Commandant.


After a year spent on garrison duty on Malta, the 2nd (P.W.O.) Gurkhas were recalled for service in Afghanistan, arriving at Dehra Dun in October 1878. Serving throughout both campaigns, he commanded the regiment from May 1879 in the first, and for the entirety of the second. As stated in Shadbolt's 'The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880', Battye took part in the operations under Brigadier-General Doran in the first Bazar Valley expedition, returning to that area again as part of Brigadier-General Appleyard's column early the next year. On 26 January Battye 'ably repelled' a rearguard attack, in which two of his men were wounded and the enemy repulsed, and in March the regiment moved through the Khyber to Basawal - where it would remain until withdrawing to India at the signing of the Treaty of Gandamak. Upon the renewal of hostilities, Battye's Gurkhas advanced with Brigadier-General Charles Gough's brigade to Gandamak in October, and was employed on outpost duty at Pezwan and Jagdalak Fort. Battye took part in the fighting soon afterwards at Jagdalak, and on 21 December marched with Gough's brigade to the relief of Sherpur, arriving there on the 24th. The regiment remained at Kabul until the evacuation of the northern Afghanistan in August 1880, when it formed part of Macpherson's brigade in Roberts' march from Kabul to Kandahar.



At the Battle of Kandahar on 1 September 1880, Battye's regiment formed part of the 1st Brigade, and played a conspicuous role in the capture of the villages of Gandi Mullah Sahibdad and Pir Paimal. Lord Roberts wrote, 'Grieg's 9-pounder and Robinson's 7-pounder (screw gun) batteries covered the attack on Gundi Mulla Sahibdad, which was made by the 2nd Gurkhas, under Lieutenant-Colonel Arthur Battye, and the 92nd Highlanders ... The village was carried with the utmost gallantry, Highlanders and Gurkhas, always friendly rivals in the race for glory, by turns outstripping each other in their efforts to be first within its walls.' In this action eight men of the regiment were killed, with Battye and twenty-one men wounded. For his services in Afghanistan alone Battye was three times mentioned in despatches, was given the Brevet of Lieutenant-Colonel, and was created a Companion of the Bath. He retired with the rank of Major-General in May 1894, and lived for a time at the 'In & Out' Club in London, before moving latterly to Torquay, where he died on 13 June 1909.

A contemporary obituary later wrote that 'The late distinguished General's demise acquires an additional interest for the singular fact that it has become an unusual event for a soldier Battye to die in his bed, though he gave fate every opportunity, was wounded, and in the thick of the Indian warfare, for many years.' His remaining entitlement is known to be in the possession of the National Army Museum, London, with the exception of this single medal offered here.

The 3rd Bombay Light Cavalry formed part of the Cavalry Brigade with General Burrow's force, and took part in the action at Halmand, the pursuit of the Wali's mutineers, and the subsequent capture of six smooth-bore guns, charging them down and taking possession of them (as noted in Shadbolt's 'The Afghan Campaign of 1878-1880'). They were also present at the Battle of Maiwand on 27 July 1880 where they 'kept standing under a murderous fire for four hours, without a vestige of cover... (remaining) perfectly in line... When the Ghazi rush took place... they formed up and charged to the best of their power, sweeping along the rear of the retreating infantry and cutting up the Ghazis... The 1st Bombay Grenadiers subsequently acknowledged publicly the great assistance rendered them by the 3rd Cavalry at this critical juncture. The regiment (also) covered the retirement of the four Horse Artillery guns from the field.'

BRIGADIER-GENERAL FRANK ABBOTT received his first commission on 22 July 1868, being promoted to Lieutenant in October 1871. Serving as a Squadron Officer in the 2nd Sind Horse from 1876, he served in the Second Afghan War of 1878-80 as Orderly Officer to Brigadier-General Nuttall during the advance towards Kandahar and afterwards as Brigade Major to the Vitakri Field Force. He was promoted to Captain in July 1880 and was Squadron Commander of the 2nd Sind Horse until late 1885, when he transferred to the 6th Bombay Cavalry. Promoted to Major in July 1888, he transferred in 1892 to become Second-in-Command of the 7th Bombay Lancers, and commanded the regiment from 1894 until his retirement in 1906 at the rank of Brigadier-General.

COLONEL CHARLES HENRY BEATSON was born on 27 March 1851, at Table Bay, Cape of Good Hope, the son of Surgeon-General G. S. Beatson, C.B. After Medical training at Edinburgh and Glasgow Universities, Beatson joined the Indian Medical Service as a Surgeon in September 1876. In March 1878 he was attached as Medical Officer to the 10th (the Duke of Cambridge's Own) Lancers, better known as Hodson's Horse, and was to remain with this famous regiment until June 1905. He served with the regiment during the Second Afghan War with the 1st Division Peshawar Valley Field Force in the first campaign.

Some years later, Beatson took part in the Manipur Expedition of 1891, for which he was mentioned in despatches in the *London Gazette* of 14 August 1891: *'Surgeon-Major Beatson took over charge from Surgeon Benerji on the 19th April and is now doing good service as Principal Medical Officer on the Kohima Line.'* Beatson ought to have been entitled to an India General Service Medal with clasp 'N.E. Frontier 1891' for this expedition but his mounted miniatures (previously sold with this lot, but no longer present) suggest that he never received such an award. Similarly, his entry in *'Services of Military Officers 1920*, which credits his medal for the Afghan War and additional mention for the Manipur Expedition 1891, does not state entitlement to the latter medal. Beatson was promoted to Colonel in June 1905, and was created a Companion of the Bath on 26 June 1907. He retired in March 1911, was recalled for service during the Great War between 14 October 1914 and 1916, but did not see any overseas service. He died on 20 June 1938.

PRIVATE SUKU MAITUR served with the 1st Bombay Grenadiers during the Second Afghan War and is confirmed as having been killed in action at the Battle of Maiwand on 27 July 1880 – as listed in the *'The Second Afghan War 1878-1880 Casualty Roll'* by Farrington [name listed as 578 Sakoo Maiter]. Upon the disorderly retreat of Jacob's Rifles, the nearby men of the 1st Bombay Grenadiers, hitherto a seasoned and reliable regiment, were also thrown into confusion in the face of the massed attack of the Afghan tribesmen, and thus suffered heavy casualties.

Subadar Rumzan Khan joined the Bombay Army in 1859, and later served at Quetta and at Khelat in 1878-79. He was promoted to Jemadar on 22 January 1880, before proceeding to Kandahar with the 30th Regiment Bombay N.I. in May of that year. He was present at the skirmish on 14 July, which led to capture of the Wali's guns from the mutineers, and was afterwards at the Battle of Maiwand on 27 July 1880, where he was slightly wounded in action – as listed in the *"The Second Afghan War 1878-1880 Casualty Roll"* by Farrington.

Moved into position at the front & centre of the British line, the men of 'Jacob's Rifles' bore the brunt of the combined Afghan artillery, rifle fire, cavalry attacks, and latterly, the massed charge of Afghan tribesmen. After several hours of withering fire, sending volley after volley back at the enemy in return (as later shown by the quantities of spent cartridges left behind at their original position) the men of the 30th Bombay N.I. finally broke from their position and fell back in confusion towards the remainder of the British line, leading ultimately to a chaotic and hard-fought retreat. Jemadar Rumzan Khan would have been in the thick of the fighting, attempting to rally his troops and maintain discipline, and on that basis it is no surprise that he was wounded in the fighting.

Somehow surviving the battle itself, he subsequently took part in the general retreat to and in the defence of Kandahar. He was promoted Subadar on 4 February 1881 and was still serving with Jacob's Rifles in April 1885.



DENNIS TROTTER

Dennis Trotter (1930-2010) was born on Valentine's Day, 1930 in Bethlehem, Orange Free State, South Africa. He attended Kingswood college in Grahamstown. Dennis married Stella Maris Grove, and they had two children, Ian and Helen. Dennis followed his father's footsteps into banking; indeed, the family still retain a chair given to his father by the Standard Bank, with an engraved silver plate. Dennis lived and worked in the then Nyasaland (now Malawi), Northern Rhodesia (Zambia) and Southern Rhodesia (Zimbabwe). Dennis became a bank manager; and lived in many places, as the bank had a policy to move its managers around, so they did not become friendly with and sympathetic to the tribulations of their customers.

Although Dennis was a banker, his main interest was in history. He was a collector, starting first with stamps, and then medals, and was also a scholar. He specialised in the Boer Wars, and was remarkably knowledgeable. As he would drive with his family through Natal he would gesture across a valley and point out the remains of an old railway line, used to transport troops to the various conflict areas in the interior of South Africa. He then remarked on the number of troops who lost their lives through illness and accidents. His family recall him describing how a trainload of horses was taken to the highveld, and how a great number died, due to the sudden drop in temperature. He would describe how horsemen of a particular regiment had ridden over the hillock, and who had engaged with the enemy, and who had been decorated. He could recall the names of the soldiers, down to their second initial. Dennis was often invited to talk at various clubs and historical societies. In the case of one birthday gift, presented to a family member, he handed over a treasured copy of 'Goodbye Dolly Gray' by Rayne Kruger, which is sometimes considered the classic text written about 'the Boer War' (and which, more strictly, we would now term the 'Second Anglo-Boer War'). One of the reviews of the book noted that: 'the real strength of the book lies in the patient, lucid, unhurried descriptions he supplies of military operations. His organization of vast material is masterly'. The same comment could be made of the careful, scholarly skill Dennis displayed in the organisation and cataloguing of this medal collection.

Dennis noted that a large portion of the military badge collection was originally put together by his grandfather, at the time of 'the Boer War'. Many years later his father handed it down to him. When Rhodesia was engaged with the Bush War, there came a time that people wishing to leave the country could only take RD\$1,500, a vehicle, and suitcases with their clothing. When he left the country, circa 1980, this was a modest amount with which to start a new life. Dennis remarked that he left 'six figures' of wealth behind him, but was able to take his medal and stamp collections out of the country.

The Boer Republics became a threat to British Imperialism, and the resulting wars were fought with great bravery, tenacity, and occasional ineptitude, on both sides. People have different views of history, and what one party will describe as frontier wars, are called wars of dispossession by others. South Africa's past is rich yet turbulent. In a lifetime one sees but a small spoonful. We wish all the peoples well, and that after such prolonged upheaval, hope everyone will travel to a good future. Dennis passed away in 2010, in Cambridge, England.

The Second Boer War D.C.M. and Great War M.i.D., L.S.G.C. and Belgian Croix De Guerre Group of 9 awarded to Quarter Master & Major Frederick William Mitchell, Border Regiment. His D.C.M. was most likely awarded in connection with the assault on Pieter's Hill, on 27 January, 1900. Continuing to serve in the Great War, he was mentioned in despatches 3 times for services in France and in Italy, rising to the rank of Major, comprising:

Distinguished Conduct Medal, E.VII.R. (Clr: - Serjt: F. W. Mitchell. 1st Border Regt);

Queen's South Africa, 1899-1902, 2nd type reverse, 5 clasps, Cape Colony, Tugela Heights, Orange Free State, Relief of Ladysmith, Transvaal (2773 C. Sgt F. W. Mitchell, 1st Border Regt);

King's South Africa, 1901-02, 2 clasps, South Africa 1901, South Africa 1902 (2773 Cr: - Serjt: F. W. Mitchell. 1st Border Regt);

1914 Star, with clasp '5th Aug. – 22nd Nov. 1914' upon ribbon (Hon. Lieut: & Q.M. F. W. Mitchell. D.C.M. Bord: R.);

British War and Victory Medals, 1914-1919, the latter with bronze 'M.i.D.' spray of oak leaves upon ribbon (Q.M. & Capt. F. W. Mitchell.):

QUARTER MASTER & MAJOR FREDERICK WILLIAM MITCHELL, of Poplar, Middlesex, was born on 15 January 1871, and served with the 1st Battalion, Border Regiment, during the Second Anglo-Boer War, at the rank of Colour Sergeant. The Regiment sailed from Malta on the 27 September 1899 and landed at Cape Town on the 21 October, and was sent to De Aar. After 2 days there they were taken to East London and thence by steamer to Durban. Mitchell earned the maximum number of clasps awarded to his regiment, being present at the Relief of Ladysmith. including the operations in the Tugela Heights, during the operations in the Cape Colony, Orange Free State and Transvaal. He was also mentioned in despatches in the *London Gazette* of 10 September, 1900.

While no specific details or citations are available for the award of this Distinguished Conduct Medal, it is possible - even likely - that the D.C.M. was awarded in connection with the assault on Pieter's Hill - one of the battles fought in the Tugela Heights, on 27 January, 1900. After this engagement, 3 non-commissioned officers and 2 men from this regiment were awarded the D.C.M. in the *London Gazette* of 27 September 1901.

Continuing to serve in the Great War, he was mentioned in despatches no less than three times: on 1 January, 1916, 10 May 1918, and 6 January, 1919, rising to the rank of Quarter Master & Major. He died on 17 March 1939 in Margate, Kent.

The Impressive Second Boer War, Great War M.M., L.S.G.C. and WW2 M.S.M. Group to Sergeant Lawrence J. O'Byrne, British South Africa Reserve Police, Late 1st and 2nd Royal Dublin Fusiliers. After serving in the Second Anglo-Boer War, he was awarded the Military Medal for bravery on the Somme in 1916. After the war he served for a time as Head Warder of the Southern Rhodesia Prison Service, between 1926 and 1938, and after a brief stint with the Royal Irish Rifles, served during WW2 with the British South Africa Police Reserve between 1940 and 1946, comprising:

1914-15 Star (6189 Pte L. O'Byrne. R. Dub. Fus.);

British War and Victory Medals, 1914-1919, the latter with bronze 'M.i.D.' spray of oak leaves upon ribbon (6189 Sjt. L. O'Byrne. R. D. Fus.);

War Medal, 1939-45 (412. Sgt. J. O'Byrne. B.S.A. Police.), engraved in smart upright capitals; Army Long Service and Good Conduct, G.V.R. (6189 Sjt: L. O'Byrne. R. Dub: Fus:);

Army Meritorious Service, G.VI.R. (7110881 Sjt. L. O'Byrne. R. Irish. R.);

Southern Rhodesia Service, 1939-45, unnamed as issued;

Group swing-mounted for display, the latter medal loose, *some polishing and contact marks*, *toned, generally about very fine to good very fine* (10) £1,000-1,500

M.M.: London Gazette: 11 November 1916 – 'for bravery in the field'

SERJEANT LAWRENCE J. O'BYRNE, of Drumcondra, Dublin, Ireland, served in the Second Anglo-Boer War with the 1st Battalion, Royal Dublin Fusiliers, with confirmed clasp entitlement as above. Continuing to serve in the Great War with the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, he rose to rank of Sergeant, and was awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the Battle of the Somme with the 1st Battalion in 1916 (according to the collector's notes), although he does not appear to be entitled to the M.i.D. emblem shown as mounted on the group. While his M.M. is confirmed in the regimental history, by Wylly, no additional details are provided regarding the particulars of the award. Nevertheless, after a period of additional service with the Royal Irish Rifles at the rank of Sergeant, he was discharged on 31 March 1922, having received the Army L.S.G.C. and M.S.M.

After the Great War he appears to have emigrated to Southern Rhodesia, and thereafter undertook a lengthy period of service as the Head Warder of the Southern Rhodesia Prison Service between 1926 and 1938. Upon the outbreak of hostilities in WW2 he re-enlisted for military service with the British South Africa Police Reserve, with whom he remained between 1940 and 1946. Worthy of further research, particularly in connection with his M.S.M.

This medal group was acquired in Salisbury, Rhodesia, in January 1975.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL ARTHUR GEORGE BURN, latterly of Masel Lacy, Hereford, was part of an illustrious line of Indian Army officers. Commissioned as Lieutenant on 10 March 1875, he was promoted to Captain on 10 March 1885, and served at that rank with the 14th Madras Infantry during the Third Burma War of 1887-89. As part of the Indian Staff Corps, he was appointed Major on 10 March 1895, and Lieutenant-Colonel on 10 March 1901. He appears to have served with the 66th Division in the Great War, despite being by then of considerable age, and saw active service with the Russian Expeditionary Force (June 1918-January 1919. His various papers and archives are held by the Imperial War Museum., and his son, Captain A. G. M. Burn, of the 2nd East Surrey Regiment, was killed on 29 October, 1914, while serving on attachment to the 1st Gloucestershire Regiment at Ypres.

SERJEANT A. RITCHIE served with the Jamestown Mounted Volunteer Rifles, and is confirmed on the medal roll. This, a scarce regiment, with just 43 officers and men awarded the above medal (as listed in 'Forgotten Heroes: Zulu & Basuto Wars', by Dutton).

SERJEANT H. BISS served with the 1st Battalion / 13th Foot (Somerset Light Infantry), and is confirmed on the medal roll.

Adams served with the Northern Border Police Force and two men of this rank, initial and surname are confirmed on the medal roll – Trooper Jan Adams, and Trooper John Adams, each with the same clasp entitlement. This, also, a scarce regiment, with just 56 officers and men awarded the above medal (as listed in 'Forgotten Heroes: Zulu & Basuto Wars', by Dutton), of which a reported 26 were returned unclaimed.

QUARTER MASTER SERGEANT CECIL ROGER VAUGHAN appears in 'The Cape of Good Hope Civil Service List (1889)', which states that he served initially with the 'Native Police, Australia' between 1872 and 1877, afterwards joining Commandant Nettleton's 5th Battalion, Natal Native Infantry for service in the Zulu War (previously knowns as the Natal Native Contingent prior to their heavy defeat and poor performance at the Battle of Isandhlwana). He is confirmed on the medal roll, as shown in 'Forgotten Heroes: Zulu & Basuto Wars', by Dutton, although his surname appears incorrectly as 'Vanghan'.

After his military service, he was appointed to the customs department on 21 February 1880, and was later transferred to serve as a Magistrate's Clerk. He rose to the acting position of Civil Commissioner and Resident Magistrate, Namaqualand, and remained in the Civil Service until 14 January 1888. Research suggests that he continued to work as a Magistrate during the Second Anglo-Boer War, and was placed under house arrest during the occupation of Maraisberg by Boer Forces, on 9 March, 1901, his name appearing in various newspaper reports. Worthy of further research, in particular regarding his early service in Australia.

Group swing-mounted on bar as worn, with original ribbons, *dark original tone*, *some contact marks, generally very fine*, and scarce (3) £800-1,200

TROOPER W. Hall served with the Natal Mounted Police during the Zulu War, and is confirmed on the medal roll (although it is not known, at present, whether he was part of the detachment of 80 men to serve at the Battle of Isandhlwana –of whom 26 were killed in the battle). He also served during the Basutoland Rebellion, and the Second Anglo-Boer War, and is confirmed on the relevant medal rolls – although the Q.S.A. roll suggests that he may be entitled to the additional clasps 'Transvaal' 'South Africa 1901' and 'South Africa 1902'. Incidentally, a man named 'Billy' Hall is mentioned in the regimental history: 'The Mounted Police of Natal' by Holt, as having had the responsibility of being regimental tailor, helping Major Dartnell to create and fit-out the regiment's early uniforms.

A Rare 'Jameson Raider' British South Africa Company's Medal to Captain and Quartermaster James Hutchison Kennedy, Salisbury Field Force, late Salisbury Horse, who was captured by Boer forces during the ill-fated Jameson Raid of 1896 – the fifth highest-ranking officer in the raid, comprising:

British South Africa Company, 1890-97, reverse for Matabeleland 1893, single clasp, Rhodesia 1896 (Captn. Qurtr.-Mstr. J. H. Kennedy. Salisbury Horse.), officially re-engraved in upright capitals, suspension a touch loose, some clear abrasions at edge, otherwise toned, good very fine

Captain and Quarter Master James Hutchison Kennedy was born in Ballineety, Dungarvin, County Waterford, Ireland on 11 December, 1853. Arriving in South Africa in 1872 he saw 12 years of service with the Griqualand West and Cape Colonial Governments, and was described as a 'jovial, rubicund Irishman'. He arrived in Mashonaland in 1891, a year after the Pioneer Column, and his first post in Salisbury was as Chief Accountant to the British South Africa Company. He served as Quarter Master in the Mashonaland Force sent to deal with the Matabeleland unrest in 1893 and, after the campaign, he remained there and was appointed Master Registrar and Sheriff of the High Court of Matabeleland on its formation in 1894. Later he became Judge of the High Court. In 1896 he returned to Salisbury when the Mashonaland Rebellion broke out and rendered great service to the then Administrator, Lord Grey. Kennedy was the 5th Senior Officer in the ill-fated Jameson Raid, in 1896 (see page 290 of 'The Jameson Raid' by Hugh Marshall Hole, where he is referred to as James Hutchinson Kennedy) - listed under 'Staff Officers'. Along with the rest of the Column he was captured and after a period in prison in Pretoria was deported to England.

Subsequently he returned to Salisbury and resumed his office as Master of the High Court of Southern Rhodesia. In 1899 Kennedy married Miss Lily O'Keefe in Cork, Ireland and, on 14 February, 1916, he died in Muizenberg, Cape Province, after a long illness. On pages 280-281 of 'The Rhodesian Roll Call', Capt. J. H. Kennedy appears in photo form, accompanied by a comprehensive write-up, in the publication 'The Downfall Of Lobengula', by W.A. Wills and L.T. Collingridge.

The Rolls, at the National Archives, Salisbury, accessed by the late Dennis Trotter, confirm the medal and clasp as follows: '1893 Medal - page 21 of the Roll; medal awarded for campaign and for Captain Kennedy's presence at Shangani and Bembezi. Rhodesia 1896 clasp-page 33 of the Supplementary Roll relating to the 1896 medal issue.'

A comparable medal to the same recipient, but with different naming details, and apparently with the incorrect reverse type for Rhodesia 1896 (the medal roll, by Forsyth, states '*Medal 1893 / Clasp 1896*'), was offered by D.N.W. on 5 July 2011. The medal offered here, despite being apparently officially re-engraved / corrected in the usual style, is correct in terms of its reverse type, regiment details, and clasp.

CORPORAL J. CLINTON served with Grey's Scouts, and was later commissioned as a Lieutenant with the Salisbury Field Force. He is confirmed on the medal roll.

TROOPER F. R. COLEMAN served with the British South Africa Police, and is confirmed on the medal roll.

An Interesting British South Africa Company, Second Boer War and Great War M.I.D. Group of 4 awarded to Major Thomas Nathaniel Micklem, Reconnaissance Officer, 10th Battalion, Royal Tank Corps, late 4th Battalion, South African Infantry (South Africa Scottish), Rhodesia Regiment, Southern Rhodesian Volunteers and British South Africa Police, who was wounded in action near Haplincourt Wood on 21 March, 1018 comprising:

British South Africa Company, 1890-97, reverse for Rhodesia 1896, no clasp (**Troopr T. H. Micklem. B.S.A. Police.**), engraved in upright capitals;

Queen's South Africa, 1899-1902, 3rd type reverse, 3 clasps, Rhodesia, Relief of Mafeking, Transvaal **(82 Tpr: T. N. Micklem. S. Rhod: Vols:)**, this officially re-impressed;

British War and Victory Medals, 1914-1919, the latter with bronze 'M.i.D.' spray of oak leaves upon ribbon (Major. T. N. Micklem.);

Group swing mounted for display, with old, possibly original ribbons, and three pieces of related regimental insignia, medals toned, a few light marks and minor bruises to first, otherwise almost extremely fine, and a scarce combination (4) £800-1,200

MAJOR THOMAS NATHANIEL MICKLEM (1875-1925) was born c.1875 in Waltham St. Lawrence, Berkshire, the son of Leonard and Dora Micklem, and worked as a Civil Servant in Rhodesia prior to military service. He is confirmed as having served with the British South Africa Police during the operations in Rhodesia of 1896 (roll confirms), and during the Second Anglo-Boer War, although the Q.S.A. medal roll only appears to confirm his first two clasps (the latter clasp is thus unconfirmed). The roll states that Trooper Micklem served with 'B' Troop, Western Division, Southern Rhodesian Volunteers, later transferring as No. 614 'A' Squadron, Rhodesia Regiment. Recruiting for both the Southern Rhodesian Volunteers and The Rhodesia Regiment commenced on 10 August 1899, the regiment saw action and suffered casualties in the Relief of Mafeking. The Rhodesians were also present at the famous Battle of Elands River in the Western Transvaal (4th-15th August, 1900).

Serving later during the Great War, he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant with the 4th South African Infantry (S.A. Scottish) on 11 September 1915. Promoted to Lieutenant (temp.) on 12 May 1916, and to Captain (temp.) on 17 November 1917, when he joined the newly formed Tank Corps, rising to the rank of Major, and receiving a mention in despatches. The brother of Lieutenant-Colonel John Micklem, D.S.O. M.C., he served alongside his brother on attachment with the 10th Battalion, Tank Corps, and was wounded in action during heavy shelling on 21 March 1918, as recorded in the battalion's war diaries:

'21 March, 1918: The whole Battalion was in reserve in Haplincourt Wood. The camp was heavily shelled, about 7am the mess hut was hit and entirely gutted; this wounded the Battalion's O.I.C., Lt. Col. J. Micklem, 2.I.C., Major G.J.G.G. Cummie, Reconnaissance Officer Captain T.N. Micklem, and Acting Adjutant, 2 Lt. S. H. Newton. Major Cummie remained on duty, the others were evacuated.'

Surviving the rest of the war, Thomas Micklem relinquished his rank of Acting Major on 30 January 1919, and returned to Sikalozia Farm, Marabuka, Northern Rhodesia. He assisted the Rhodesia Museum in the study of the mole rat (or 'Fukomys Micklemi') by donating his collection of scientific specimens – gathered on the Upper Zambezi River- to that museum. He died in Mazabuka, Northern Rhodesia, in 1925. Worthy of further research.

LIEUTENANT RAINY ANDERSON (1873-1901), was born in September 1873, the son of Staff Surgeon James Rainy Anderson. Educated at Neuenheim College and Dr. Northcott's, Ealing, he entered the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, and received a commission as Second Lieutenant with the Royal Engineers on 12 February 1892. Promoted to Lieutenant on 20 November 1895, he embarked for South Africa on 27 October 1899, and served with the 26th (Field) Company, R.E. He took part in the main Army advance from the Cape Colony to Bloemfontein and Pretoria under Lieutenant Generals Sir J. D. P. French and Sir C. Tucker, and was for some time charge of the electric lighting in Pretoria. Appointed to General Beaton's Mobile Column as Staff Captain and Intelligence Officer, he was present at the capture of Jack Hindon's camp, ten miles north of Middelburg, and had his horse shot under him on 9 July 1901. He is stated to have behaved with great gallantry and owing to his dash a large quantity of arms and ammunition were captured.

He was mortally wounded at Zeekogat on 10 July 1901, dying from his wounds at Doornkop the following morning. He received a mention in despatches in the *London Gazette* of 29 July, 1902, and was buried in the British Army Cemetery at Old Middelburg Municipal Cemetery, Eastern Transvaal. There exists a wall monument to him in the crypt of St Paul's Cathedral, and a memorial. Sold with copy photographs of the recipient and his grave. Rolls confirm.

MAJOR GEORGE FREDERIC BARTTELOT (1865-1930) was born on 13 June 1865, in Findon, Sussex, the son of Brian Barttelot, and Mary Dorothy La Trobe Barttelot (née Bateman). He was initially appointed Lieutenant with the 1st Battalion, Royal Welch Fusiliers on 7 February 1885, and embarked for service in Burma aboard H.M.S. *Malabar* and arriving at Lucknow on 23 January 1886. Arriving as part of a draft of 4 officers and 236 other ranks, they arrived at the Bhamo Garrison, Burma, on 6 November 1886. Barttelot was present with the Katha Detachment of 3 companies sent to confront the 'recalitrant' Tswaba of Woontho, and took part in the storming of the stockades of Thiba on 5 December 1886. He commanded half a company in support at Manteik, but was invalided to India owing to disease.

Promoted to Captain on 6 May 1894, he served during the Second Anglo-Boer War, arriving at Durban on 17 November 1899. He saw plenty of action during the war, and was present during the operations to relieve Ladysmith, including the action at Colenso, and in the operations around Tugela Heights, including Pieters Hill (and was present during the advance towards 'Hussars Hill' on 7 February). He continued to take part in the operations in the Transvaal, and in the action at Venterskoon on 7 August, in which he was slightly wounded, and at Frederikstad between 17-25 October 1900. He later received a mention in despatches on 10 September 1901, was promoted to Major on 25 October 1902 (and appears to have retired to the Reserve of Officers c.1904 – seeing no overseas service in the Great War), and died on 19 August 1930, in London. His relation, Sir Walter George Barttelot, second Baronet, was killed in action at Retiefs Nek, on 23 July, 1900.

COLONEL HARRY DACRES MILWARD (1871-1940) was born on 1 July 1871, at Woolwich, England, the son of Colonel Thomas Walter Milward and Olivia Maria Milward (née Beatty). Passing out as Queen's Cadet from the Royal Military College, Dacres received a commission as Second Lieutenant in Worcestershire Regiment on 21 January 1893, and having been promoted to Captain, served in the Second Anglo-Boer War in South Africa. Appointed Staff Captain and Brigade Signalling Officer on 23 January 1900, he received an M.i.D. in Field Marshal Roberts' dispatch of 10 September 1901.

Seconded for a time to the Volunteer Battalion, Royal Fusiliers (the K.S.A. roll, refers), upon the outbreak of hostilities in the Great War, he was sent to France with the B.E.F. as a Major with the 3rd Battalion, Worcestershire Regiment, embarking for France on 14 August, 1914. Commanding 'A' Company of the 3rd Battalion, he saw immediate action in the Battles of Mons and Le Cateau, being stationed near the town of Caudry. Having vacated the town in the face of heavy shelling and German attacks, Major Milward led an advance back into the town, towards the station, which 'was occupied and held without difficulty' according the regimental history. Just a few months later, near Ploegsteert Wood, the 3rd Worcesters bore the brunt of a very heavy German pre-dawn attack, on 7 November 1914, which despite a firm resistance by the battalion, and other supporting units, and in this attack Major Milward was wounded in action.

After a period of subsequent recovery, he appears to have been spared further frontline command and was granted a position as D.A.A.G. on the Staff, as of 31 July 1917, being promoted to Lieutenant Colonel on 1 November 1917, and appointed A.A.G. on 1 September 1918. Relinquishing this appointment on 10 May 1919, he was made O.B.E. on 3 June 1919 and given a second mention in despatches on 5 July that year. He was placed on half-pay on 29 February 1920, and promoted for a final time to Colonel on 14 February 1920, prior to his retirement on 21 October 1920. He died on 18 December, 1940.

SERGEANT JOHN BODDY (born c.1875) enlisted c.1894 and served in the Second Boer War with the 2nd Battalion, King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry (K.O.Y.L.I.) and is confirmed on the roll, with additional entitlement to a 2-clasp K.S.A. Having served for almost 9 years with the K.O.Y.L.I.s he left the army by purchase on 7 November, 1903 and settled in South Africa. Working at the Tranvaal and Delagoa Bay Collieries, he re-enlisted for Great War service on 23 June 1917, at the age of 42, and served with the South African Native Labour Corps, being promoted to Sergeant and serving with the B.E.F. on the Western Front from 6 May 1917, serving initially with 24 Company and then later with 39 Company from 21 February 1918. He was subsequently discharged from further service on 30 September, 1918, apparently on health grounds.

This pair was acquired from a Mr. D. Weakley, of Amanzimtoti, South Africa, on 10 July, 1984.

During the Great War he served in the German East Africa campaign, where he was invalided from Tanganyika, and in the Second World War he served on home duty with the South African Artillery. Offered with three original photographs, one in uniform wearing his Q.S.A., another in uniform taken during the Second Word War and another probably post-war in civilian wear.

A man of 'marked administrative powers; his rule was firm, just and kind and he seemed possessed of unlimited resources'. After the war he became a resident magistrate in the Orange Free State 'spending his life amongst the Boers he had served in the camps', comprising:



CAPTAIN ST. JOHN COLE BOWEN (1872-1952) was born at Bowen's Court, County Cork, Ireland, on 20 September 1872, the son of Robert St. John Cole Bowen, and Elizabeth Jane Clarke. According to 'Men of the Times' (1906), he obtained a thorough classical training at St. Columba College and the Dublin University, where he graduated in the year 1895. Receiving a commission with the King's Royal Rifle Corps, he had intended to embark on a full career in the army, but in the year 1897 he decided to travel out to South Africa, where, on landing he joined the Zululand Police (afterwards called the Natal Police), serving as a trooper at the time of the outbreak of the Boer War. He later rejoined the K.R.R.C. and served with them during the late campaign, eventually resigning his commission with the rank of Captain.

In the year 1900 he received the appointment of Magistrate at Senekal, Orange River Colony, and on the evacuation of the town he was appointed Superintendent in charge of Norvalspont on 25 February 1901 - taking over the command from Captain Du Plat Taylor of the Grenadier Guards. At this point, the Concentration Camps were no longer under the management of the British Army, but were under civil administration. The Norvalspont concentration camp had been established in November 1900 to relieve the Bloemfontein concentration camp after it experienced an acute water shortage. The camp, initially housing Afrikaner women and children, was situated in the Cape Colony but formed part of the concentration camp complex of the Orange River Colony, later accepting significant numbers of Boer soldiers. On that account, it is reported in various articles that Bowen, being of 'of Irish extraction... may have given him some sympathy for the Boers. His ability ensured that he did not remain at Norvals Pont and Cole Bowen was later appointed as a travelling inspector. Almost everyone who encountered him commented on his calm efficiency'. Equally, not being 'English' almost certainly helped him to develop a rapport with the internees.

Emily Hobhouse, the daughter of the Vicar of Bodmin, Cornwall in England (and noted Boer sympathizer), who visited Norvalspont in 1901, described the conditions at the camp as 'one of the best in the network' of Concentration Camps in the Orange River Colony, and that Cole Bowen possessed 'marked administrative powers; his rule was firm, just and kind and he seemed possessed of unlimited resources'. However, given the harsh conditions and the unnatural circumstances in which the internees were forced to live, the death of many soon became unavoidable. Lieutenant Bowen worked tirelessly to make every family as comfortable as possible, but the overcrowding of the camp made it impossible to provide for every person's needs.

Emily Hobhouse wrote in her report on the camp that, even though she slept in a marquee tent with a double layer of canvas for shelter, her bedding was always soaking wet in the morning from the dew. During the day the temperature rose to 40° Celsius, and she mentioned that in the tents the temperature rose as high as 43° Celsius. Despite these challenges, and a fractious relationship with his camp medical officer, Bowen maintained a friendly and respectful disposition towards the internees, and saw that all were treated fairly, while ensuring that the camp ran efficiently – so much so that it was regarded as a 'model camp'. The camp was eventually closed on 2 October 1902, and



after more than a century the position of the tents used to accommodate the internees is still visible, according to certain online articles, given the incorporation of empty milk and food tins in the original paving.

Leaving Norvalspont in late 1901, in 1902 he was appointed Magistrate at Winburg, and in July 1904 Resident Magistrate for the Fauresmith District. In the year 1903 he married Winifred, eldest daughter of Mr. Rosslieu, of Winburg, and died in 1952 at Sea Point, Cape Province.

Private E. Pemberton served with the 1st Battalion, K.R.R.C. during the Relief of Chitral campaign of 1895, and leaving India for Mauritius in late 1896, the officers and men of 1st Battalion (including Headquarters, A, C, G, and H Companies, half a Battalion of the 2nd York and Lancaster Regiment, under Major W. J. Kirkpatrick, and 25 men of the Middlesex Regiment) were aboard the R.I.M.T. *Warren Hastings* when in the darkness it struck upon the rocks off Reunion Island in the early hours of 14 January 1897 and was wrecked. An immediate evacuation of the passengers and crew began thereafter, and it is possible, even likely, that Private Pemberton was aboard the vessel and survived the incident (although it has not been possible to entirely confirm this). Nonetheless, Pemberton continued to serve with the 1st Battalion K.R.R.C. during the Second Anglo-Boer War in South Africa (rolls confirm, as above).

The action that followed there was a disaster, the Fusiliers losing 10 men killed and 3 officers and 54 men wounded. Of the combined force 43 officers and 925 men were afterwards listed as missing. I have not been able to establish that Private Farley was, officially, amongst those taken prisoner by the Boers, but his bar combination would seem to indicate this without much doubt.' He is not, however, listed in 'The Boer War Casualty Roll, 1899-1902' by Palmer.

James Lionel Joyce Conry (1873-1914) of Mount Jessop, Longford, Ireland, was born on 16 November 1873, the son of Staff Surgeon Thomas Conry R.N., and joined the Connaught Rangers on 21 October 1893. Promoted to Lieutenant on 1 March 1897, he served in the Second Boer War and saw plenty of action (receiving numerous mentions in the regimental history 'The Connaught Rangers is the Boer War 1899-1902'), taking part in the Relief of Ladysmith, including the actions at Colenso and Spion Kop; was slightly wounded at 'Hart's Hill' on the Tugela Heights, and was also slightly wounded a second time on 14 July 1901 during the Battle of Zuurvlakte. Promoted to Captain on 21 May 1901, he was invested with his D.S.O. by the King 21 October 1902 (and is also entitled to the K.S.A.).

He served as Adjutant to the 1st Battalion between February 1903 and February 1906, after which he joined the Egyptian Army, serving in the Sudan in 1908 - for which he received the Khedive's Sudan medal and clasp 'Nyima' (roll states). He was promoted Major and placed in command of the Gedaref Arab Battalion, and during this time took part in 'big game hunting' in the region, but was killed in action at Wad Hadi, in Kassala Province, near the Atbara River on 3 March 1914, while leading the pursuit of an outlaw and his 'band of brigands'. A memorial was erected in his honour at Mannamead School, Devon.

A short obituary in 'The Illustrated London News' of 14 March, 1914, states clearly, concerning the citation for his D.S.O., that: 'Major Conry served with great distinction in the South African War, and received the D.S.O. for his gallant action at Colenso, when he volunteered to carry a message under heavy fire. On another occasion he rescued an ambulance and several men, who had been captured, from a Boer camp at night.' These details are also confirmed in the regimental history.





The Ian Stedman Collection Of Medals to The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment (Part 1)



IAN STEDMAN

IAN STEDMAN (1939 - 2024) was born and raised in the village of Cranleigh, Surrey (known as 'England's largest village') where he lived for most of the years of his life. As a child growing up during the Second World War, and with a father away fighting overseas (in this case, in Burma), the war made a deep and lasting impression upon him. He spent a handful of years during WW2 staying with family in nearby Guildford, and whilst attending school in Stoughton, he passed the barracks of The Queen's Regiment on an almost daily basis, and thereafter became fascinated with the regiment.

A keen student of military history, he began to acquire medals of The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment as a teenager – forming a collection which focused upon the Great War. He purchased many of his 'best' groups after his period of national service, and during his working career as a bookbinder in Guildford between the 1960s and 1990s in particular, buying from London dealers (especially A.H. Baldwin & Sons), auction houses, local shops, and even directly from local families and ex-soldiers on occasion. He knew some of these soldiers and veterans personally, speaking with them on Smithwood Common, and hearing first-hand their stories and experiences from the trenches of the Great War.

Collecting was his lifelong passion, and becoming an active member of the Orders and Medals Research Society (and local branches) in 1975, he was a regular exhibitor at their conventions, mounting his entire collection into displays around his home, to be enjoyed - and remembered - every single day. He also formed a secondary collection of medals to the Army Ordnance Corps in his latter years, while still, and always patiently waiting to find new rarities and unusual groups to add to his main collection. This process continued for the rest of his life. Ian Stedman passed away peacefully at home on 2 December 2024, surrounded by his family, and his much-prized collections.



The Remarkable Great War D.S.O. and M.C. Group of 5 awarded to Captain Charles John Murray Paige, 11th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment. Having worked his way up through the ranks from Private to C.S.M. in the 8th Battalion, he was subsequently commissioned as an officer with the 11th Battalion, being awarded M.C. in late 1917, and the D.S.O. to follow for his 'conspicuous leadership and gallantry' on 19 October 1918 during the attacks on Coutrai and Heestraet - being recommended by his C.O. for being 'the very life of the leading troops', during which the success of the whole operation was considered to be the direct result of his 'magnificent leadership', comprising:

Distinguished Service Order, G.V.R., in silver-gilt and enamels, each of the lower three arms of the cross engraved (T/2nd Lt. (A/Capt) C.J.M. Paige / Courtrai 19 October 1918 / Heestraet 25th Oct. 1918), once expertly repaired at suspension;

Military Cross, G.V.R., reverse privately engraved (2nd Lt. C. J. M. Paige. Passchendaele 20th-22nd September 1917):

1914-15 Star (G-2897 Cpl. C. J. M. Paige. The Queen's R.), mounted with reverse facing;


British War and Victory Medals, 1914-1919, the latter with bronze 'M.i.D.' spray of oakleaves upon ribbon (Capt. C. J. M. Paige.);

D.S.O.: London Gazette: 8 March, 1919, and citation 4 October 1919 - original citation reads as follows: for conspicuous leadership and gallantry on 19 October, 1918, at Courtrai. He took his company across the River Lys in an improvised ferry boat under heavy shell fire. In a surprisingly short time he had either captured, killed or driven away then enemy and had advanced on an 800 yard frontage along the Coutrai-Harlbeke Railway, being an advance to a depth of 1,500 yards. It was largely due to his personal supervision, leadership and dash that the objective was gained, organised and held. His gallant and able leadership contributed materially to the success of the whole operation.'The original handwritten citation adds the following, addition details: 'You were the very life of the leading troops, and your example was magnificently followed by your company. Again, on Oct: 25th 1918 at Heestraet you led your company in the most gallant manner possible.'

M.C.: London Gazette: 19 November 1917 – 'for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an action. As battalion signalling officer he moved about both by day and night arranging communication and establishing runner posts, often under heavy shell fire. His energy and determination throughout were most marked' (date for award incidents noted as 20-22 September 1917 in original handwritten citation)

M.i.D.: London Gazette: 16 March, 1919



CAPTAIN CHARLES JOHN MURRAY PAIGE (1892-1923) was born at sea on 23 November 1892 while aboard the ship 'Spirit of the Morning', the son of Charles H. Paige, Master Mariner, and Constance Howard Reed, both originally from South Shields. Raised in Deal, Kent, where his father worked as a Trinity House pilot, he was educated at Deal College, and at Sandwich School. Initially working as a Mercantile Clerk, as noted in the 1911 Census, he enlisted for Great War service on 3 September 1914, initially with the Buffs (Royal East Kent Regiment), but transferred very soon after to the Royal West Surreys. Serving with the 8th Battalion, Queen's Regiment in France and Flanders on the Western Front, and rising from the rank of Private to C.S.M., he was recommended for a commission and trained as an officer cadet at Newmarket, before being commissioned as an officer on 2nd Lieutenant on 27 June 1917. He returned to the front on 21 August to serve with the 11th Battalion thereafter.

Just a month or so later, 2nd Lieutenant Paige was recommended for the Military Cross for his excellent work as battalion signalling officer between 20 and 22 September, maintaining crucial communications under heavy fire. While not specifically named here in the regimental history, the offensive between 'Hedge Street' and 'Java Trench' is recorded in some detail ('The History of the Queen's Royal Regiment (Vol VII)', by Wylly, on page 271). For this good work, Paige received his M.C. ribbon at a 'church parade' on 21 October (according to a detailed article in the Deal, Walmer & Sandwich Mercury of 27 October 1917).

After a period of time in Italy in late 1917 and early 1918, the 11th Battalion returned to the Western Front in March, just as the German Spring Offensive was about to begin. Seeing considerable front-line fighting during the year, on 19 October 1918 Paige led an important assault over the River Lys in an improvised ferry boat, after which his company 'killed or drove away the enemy' on the opposite bank and allowed for an advance of 1,500 yards across a frontage of 800 yards. These events are also covered in the regimental history, which records the following:

Having been ordered to try to cross the Lys north of Courtrai, the 11th The Queen's went forward at 11 o'clock on the morning of the 19th, and at the first attempt to cross the river met with active machine-gun fire; this was soon, however, overcome, and "B" Company [note: this presumably, Paige's company] effected a crossing...pushing boldly forward and making good the line of the railway and taking 7 prisoners.'

This attack was followed up, soon after, by a second offensive on 25 October at Heestraet (or Hustret), during which Paige once again led from the front, as 'the very life of the leading troops' in carrying his objectives and capturing the village. For these instances of gallantry, Paige, who was only 4 years previously a Private, was recommended for the D.S.O. by the officer commanding the 41st Division, Major-General Sydney Lawford.

After the War, Paige is understood to have returned to civilian life as a brewer, living at Westaria House, London Road, Deal, but died on 22 February 1923. This lot offered with some excellent and scarce original documents, including two extremely rare handwritten citation cards for his M.C. and D.S.O., by Major-General Sydney Lawford, C.O. of the 41st Division, and original D.S.O. & M.i.D. certificates, a photograph of the recipient, and other copied research.



The Scarce 'Mesopotamia' D.C.M. Group of 4 awarded to Sergeant Joe A. Drowley, Machine Gun Corps, late 'D' Company, 1st/5th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, who received 'the first war distinction earned by the Battalion' of the 1st/5th The Queen's for conspicuous gallantry in assisting to withdraw wounded men under heavy fire near Butaniyeh on 14 January 1916, comprising:

Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (2382Pte. J. A. Drowley 1/5 The Queen's R. - T.F.);

D.C.M.: London Gazette: 15 April 1916 – 'for conspicuous gallantry in assisting to withdraw wounded men from the firing line under heavy fire'

PRIVATE JOE A. DROWLEY (1893-1935) the son of Mr. G. F. Drowley of 127 Maybury Road, Woking, was born on 13 June 1893 and prior to WWI worked as a house decorator. He enlisted for Great War service with 'D' (Guildford) Company of the 1st/5th Battalion, The Queen's Royal (West Surrey) Regiment, and proceeded via Southampton to India – departing on 29 October 1914. Arriving in Lucknow in early December, 1914, they remained there for much of the following year, in training and in anticipating mobilization, which came in late November 1915. Receiving orders to travel by train to Bombay, they embarked aboard the H.M.T. *Elephanta* to Basrah, arriving there on the 7th of December, 1915, travelling thereafter up the Euphrates in barges.

With Major-General Townsend and his force now under siege in the city of Kut in Mesopotamia, and short of supplies, forces were gathered to divert enemy forces away from the siege, and to allow for its relief by British and Indian forces in the vicinity. On 11 January, 1916, the 1st/5th The Queen's were transferred to become part of the 12 Brigade of the 12th Indian Division under Major-General Gorringe, and on the following day they set out towards Butaniyeh, leaving a small garrison at Nasariyeh, hoping to create a diversion for the Kut Relief Force. On the 14th January, the Battalion engaged in its very first action, taking up a defensive position near Suwaij Village. 'D' Company, under the command of Captain Bray, lined an irrigation channel as their force began to take fire from enemy positions to the north. After some heavy exchanges, in which the enemy threatened to take their flank positions, but were repelled, the order was given by General Gorringe to retire at 11.45am, but as recorded in the regimental history, 'there was some delay, as 'D' Company had several casualties and could not get these away till stretchers...could be brought up'. According to Private Drowley's citation, it would appear that it was at this specific point that he assisted to withdraw wounded men from the firing line. This is also corroborated by the oral account given, some years later, by Sgt. Chris Brand who recounted:

'The Battalion were very green and they were jumped on by Arabs who hid behind some rocks and did some pretty effective shooting, pinning the battalion down and causing some casualties. Drowley, who was always a popular fellow with the officers, jumped and manhandled wounded men to safety.'

For these gallant actions he was awarded the D.C.M., which is recorded in the regimental history by Wylly, as being 'the first distinction earned by the Battalion' in the war. Drowley later transferred to the Machine Gun Corps, and was promoted to Sergeant, suffering a wound in October 1917 (and receiving a metal plate in his head). He returned to civilian life after the war in Romford, Essex, and died on 4 June 1935.

A total of 155 D.C.M.s (and 3 second award bars) were issued to The Queen's Regiment in the Great War, of which only 10 were issued to the 1st/5th Battalion for Mesopotamia. This the first awarded.



A Great War D.C.M. Pair awarded to Sergeant Lionel Brazier, 2nd/4th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, who having served in Gallipoli and Egypt, was later awarded the D.C.M. for 'important reconnaissance work under heavy shell fire' while serving as battalion bombing sergeant in 1918 - with particular credit given for his 'very valuable service' in France near Tigny in July & August 1918, comprising:

Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (201289 Sjt L. Brazier. 2/4 The Queen's R.); 1914-15 Star (T-3142 Pte L. Brazier. The Queen's R.), mounted with reverse details facing; Pair court-mounted on board for display, *good very fine* (2)

D.C.M.: London Gazette: 1 January 1919 - 'both as platoon serjeant and as battalion bombing serjeant he has displayed great ability, coolness in action, and tact in handling men. He has been constantly with the battalion from February to the present time. During this period he has rendered very valuable service, especially in action near Parcy Tigny, July and August, 1918.' (Lindfield, Sussex)

SERGEANT LIONEL BRAZIER, of Linfield, Sussex, enlisted for Great War service with the 2nd/4th The Queen's Regiment and commenced active service in Gallipoli on the 17th of July 1915. A letter home written by Brazier just one month later, and published by the 'Sussex Express' of 10 September 1915 recorded the following:

I am glad to tell you that I am well and happy. We landed here on - - , and went into action on - - . My mate was killed, and also Tom Pranklin. Joe Whall was with me in the trenches on Tuesday. I thank God that I came through safely. I went into action very well, without feeling a bit nervous... It is hot out here in the day, but chilly at night. We amuse ourselves by making stew and tea... we get some lovely water from the wells. The warships bombard the hills terrifically all day... (and) we do plenty of trench digging, and that keeps us fit.'

The 2nd/4th The Queen's continued to serve through the Gallipoli Campaign, Egypt and Palestine, then being ordered to return to the Western Front in France in early April 1918. As part of the 101st Brigade of the 34th Division, and under the command of Brigadier-General W. J. Woodcock, D.S.O., Brazier saw significant action and served as battalion bombing sergeant during this period, for which he was later awarded the D.C.M. – especially for valuable service in action in July and August near Tigny. Incidentally, the award of his D.C.M. as published in the 'Sussex Times' of 29 February 1919 adds further specifics to the citation which are not included in the London Gazette, stating that the award was made 'for important reconnaissance work under heavy shell fire and for getting the Boys' rations up to them under a fire of machine guns.' It also adds the following details, written by Brazier:

'When it was known by the Company I had a warm time... the Colonel pinned the Medal on and shook my hand and told me I was one of the most hard working and conscientious Sergeants in his Battalion – praise of which I am very proud. The Boys gave me three cheers, and needless to say we had a lively evening in our Mess... What with my D.C.M. and 1914 [sic] Star I am looking like an old soldier.'

It is particularly interesting that he mentions wearing his D.C.M. and 1914-15 Star (not 1914) in the above extract – the pair as offered here – and not his remaining entitlement. After a period of time after the war in Germany, he was disembodied on 8 May 1919.

A total of 155 D.C.M.s (and 3 second award bars) were issued to The Queen's Regiment in the Great War, of which only 6 were issued to the 2nd/4th Battalion.



An Interesting Great War 'Posthumous M.M.' Group of 4 awarded to Sergeant Marcel Renaud, of 'B' Company, 1st Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment. The son of a French soldier from the Franco-Prussian War of 1870, he was recorded as having been killed in action on 15 July 1916 at 'Swiss Trench', High Wood, with no known grave – however his body was rediscovered almost 20 years later by the Imperial War Graves Commission and 'reverently reburied' at London Cemetery, High Wood, in 1937, comprising:

France, Franco-Prussian War Medal, 1870-71, unnamed as issued, possibly as issued to the recipient's father;

Main group court-mounted on board for display, surname to first legible but somewhat obscured, possibly from corrosion or past soldering, otherwise good extremely fine (5)

M.M.: London Gazette: 28 July 1917 – 'for bravery in the field to the undermentioned Non-Commissioned Officers and Men, since deceased, who has been killed in action or died of wounds or disease subsequent to the date of award of the Military Medal to them by the Commander-in-Chief in the Field'

SERGEANT BOMBER MARCEL RENAUD (sometimes spelled incorrectly as Renand), the son of Louis Renaud, who had fought for France against Germany during the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-71, and his wife Margaret Renaud, enlisted for service in the Great War with the 1st Battalion, The Queen's Regiment. One of several serving brothers from the same family, Marcel Renaud serving on the Western Front from 17 December 1914 and was killed in action on the Somme on 15 July 1916, shortly after he had been awarded the Military Medal. Several contemporary reports from the British Red Cross & O.S.J., copies of which are offered with this lot, detail the various reports of his death, the first of which reads as follows:

'On the 15th July on the Somme at Swiss Trench, Bomber Renaud was sent to recover the papers from the body of a Major [Parnell] who had been killed. He got the papers but was killed while bringing them back to our trench. Another Sgt...from No. 8 Platoon... got the papers from Renaud's body.'

Although his remains were not recovered at the time, almost 20 years later, on 12 April 1937, a letter was sent to his father, Louis Renaud, by the Imperial War Graves Commission, stating that a body had been discovered bearing the identity disc of his son, and was 'reverently reburied' in London Cemetery, High Wood, Longueval. Offered with associated research and copied documents and images, one believed to be an image of the four serving Renaud brothers.

A total of 836 M.Ms (and 57 second award bars) were issued to The Queen's Regiment in the Great War, of which 169 (and 17 bars) were awarded to the 1st Battalion.



A Great War M.M. Group of 4 awarded to Corporal Albert Butcher, 6th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, who having been awarded the Military Medal for a bombing attack in July 1916 at Ovilliers, was later killed in action on 12 May 1917, comprising;

Military Medal, G.V.R. (GS-145 Cpl A. Butcher. 6/The Queen's R.);

1914-15 Star (G-145 Pte a. Butcher, The Queen's R.), mounted with reverse facing;

CORPORAL ALBERT BUTCHER was born c.1884 at Alford Heath, Guildford, Surrey, the son of Mrs W. Knight of Oriston Cottage, High Path Road, Merrow. Serving in the Great War with the 6th Battalion, The Queen's, on the Western Front, he was reportedly awarded the M.M. for taking a prominent role during a bombing attack in July 1916 near Ovilliers. He was later killed in action on 15 May 1917, and his name is recorded on the Arras Memorial.

A total of 836 M.Ms (and 57 second award bars) were issued to The Queen's Regiment in the Great War.

[signed 'Sydney Lawford']

Divisional 'Appreciation' Card (2): 'I wish to place on record my appreciation of... your courage& initiative from 20 to 22 Sep 1917 when you re-organised your men under heavy shell & machine gun fire leading them forward to their objective which you held until relieved.' [signed 'Sydney Lawford']

CORPORAL JONATHON FREEMAN, of Golborne, Lancashire, was born c.1899 and served with the 10th (Service) Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, during the Great War. Receiving two separate commendations for bravery on the Western Front during the summer of 1917 (as above), he later received the Military Medal.

A total of 836 M.Ms (and 57 second award bars) were issued to The Queen's Regiment in the Great War.



The Great War M.M. & Memorial Plaque Group of 5 awarded to Corporal Ernest Bonsey, 1st Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, who had been wounded in action three times before receiving his M.M., and who 'died fighting' on 25 September 1917, during the attack on the Menin Road, comprising: Military Medal, G.V.R. (G-4421 Cpl. E. Bonsey. 1/The Queen's R.);

1914-15 Star (G-4421 L.Cpl. E. Bonsey. The Queen's R.), mounted with reverse details facing;

British War and Victory Medals, 1914-1919 (G-4421 Cpl. E. Bonsey. The Queen's R.);

Memorial Plaque, 1914-1918 (Ernest Bonsey);

Corporal Ernest Bonsey was born c. 1897, the son of George Bonsey (a former soldier with the Queen's) and Caroline Bonsey, of 10 Bright Hill, Sydenham Road, Guildford. Educated at St. Nicholas School, Guildford, he enlisted for Great War service on 5 September 1914, at the age of 17, and after just six weeks' training went out to service on the Western Front in France& Flanders with the 1st Battalion, The Queen's Regiment from 20 December 1914. Reaching the rank of Corporal, he saw a 'great deal of hard fighting' and was three times wounded in action (head, leg twice) and was later awarded the Military Medal for 'conspicuous services'. He was killed in action on 25 September 1917, apparently during the attack upon the Menin Road, as reported in the 'West Surrey Times' of 12 October 1917, including details of the condolence letter written to his mother by Captain A. M. Allan:

It is with the greatest regret that I have to write to inform you that your son, Corpl. Bonsey, was killed in action on Sept. 25th. I shall miss him very much in the company, as he was one of the best N.C.O.s in my company, and we cannot afford to lose such men nowadays. I hope it will be some satisfaction to you to know that he did splendidly, and that he died fighting, which, I am sure, he would have wished. Please accept my Deepest sympathy, and also that of the whole company.'

The newspaper report also states that 'Corporal Bonsey, who was last home in December, was recommended for the Military Medal a year ago [i.e. October 1916], but for some reason did not receive the distinction.' Corporal Bonsey is commemorated at the Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium.

A Great War Military Medal Group of 3 awarded to Sergeant F. J. Linsey, 3rd/4th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, who was recommended for the M.M. on 6 October 1917 in bringing essential rations up to the front line near Polygon Wood 'through the heaviest shell fire', comprising: Military Medal, G.V.R. (201126 Cpl F. J. Linsey 3/4th The Queen's R. – T.F.); British War and Victory Medals, 1914-1919 (201126 Sjt. F. J. Linsey. The Queen's. R.); Group court-mounted for display, toned, good very fine (3)

M.M.: London Gazette: 28 January 1918 – the original citation from the Battalion War Diary reads as follows: This N.C.O. was continually with the pack animals taking rations to the line east of Polygon Wood and always displayed the greatest courage and devotion to duty in getting the convoy through the heaviest of shell fire. It was solely due to his efforts that rations arrived every night at the assigned dump. On Oct. 6th especially he showed the greatest coolness and perseverance under abnormal conditions in getting the pack animals to the mound north of Polygon Wood by daylight when he displayed great disregard of personal safety in helping to extricate several animals who had become deeply embedded in the mud amidst heavy shelling. I consider this N.C.O.s fine example, devotion to duty and carelessness to danger well worthy of official recognition. [6.10.17]. His home address was given as 72 Southbridge Road, Croydon.

A total of 836 M.Ms (and 57 second award bars) were issued to The Queen's Regiment in the Great War, of which 20 (and 1 bar) were awarded to the 3rd/4th Battalion.

PRIVATE HERBERT CAPON served in the Great War with the 2nd / 4th The Queen's Regiment, and was awarded the Military Medal (L.G. 18 July, 1918). Entitled to an additional Great War pair, and an I.G.S.M. with clasp 'Waziristan 21-24'.

PRIVATE GEORGE HERBERT GROVER, of Shere, Guildford, served in the Great War with the 2nd / 4th The Queen's Regiment, and was awarded the Military Medal (L.G. 19 March, 1918). He was killed in action on 27 December 1917, and is entitled to an additional Great War pair& memorial plaque. His name is commemorated at the Jerusalem War Cemetery, Israel, and at the Shere WWI Memorial.



The Extremely Rare Great War Serbian Gold Medal for Bravery Group of 5 awarded to Private James Alfred Earle, 1st/5th Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment – this Serbian award in gold believed to be unique to the regiment, comprising:

PRIVATE JAMES ALBERT EARLE, was born in 1894 in Shalford Common, Guildford, and served in the Great War with the 1st/5th Battalion, The Queen's Regiment in India, and in Mesopotamia. He was awarded the Serbian Gold Medal for Bravery by the King of Serbia (reputedly on 27 August 1916), as published in the London Gazette of 15 February 1917, this understood to be the only award of this class made to any soldier in The Queen's Regiment. Typically, awards were made to officers (in gold) and senior N.C.O.s (in silver), but a few examples in gold are known to have been issued to Private soldiers as special awards for gallantry. He later served with the War Reserve of the Surrey Constabulary during the early years of WW2, being stationed in Bramley, but died at Warren Road Hospital, Guildford on 23 June 1942 (as stated in the Surrey Advertiser of Saturday 27 June 1942).

Lance-Corporal Francis William Combes was born c.1880 in Guildford, Surrey, and served during the Great War with the 1st/5th Battalion, The Queen's, in Mesopotamia. He was awarded the Serbian Silver Medal for Bravery as published in the London Gazette of 15 February 1917, this understood to be one of just four awards of this class made to The Queen's Regiment. He was also awarded the M.S.M. later that year on 16 August 1917 for 'devotion to duty' in Mesopotamia, and received an M.i.D. on 27 August 1918. A number of his letters home were published in the Surrey Advertiser' during the war, detailing first-hand some of the hardships experienced during frontline service near Baghdad, Basra and elsewhere. He returned to civilian life working for a firm of solicitors in Guildford, and died in 1978. The location of his Great War entitlement is currently unknown.

He enlisted for regular service later that same year, and served in India on the Punjab Frontier (with entitlement as above), being discharged on 5 November 1904.

They were both pitched onto the platform, and while his companion... escaped with a cut on the knee... Callingham rolled down between the train and the platform and was cut to pieces.'

SERGEANT FREDERICK W. MIDDLETON was one of the 24 men of the 2nd Volunteer Battalion, The Queen's Regiment, to serve in the City of London Imperial Volunteers during the Boer War, as part of 'F' (Godalming) Company. Surviving his service in South Africa, he returned to his home in Farncombe to much fanfare, as reported in the 'Surrey Advertiser' of 1 November, 1900:

'...Private Middleton returned, alive and well, to his home at Farncombe... He was not, however, allowed to escape a demonstration of the popular feeling of joy at his safe return, for at about seven o'clock... he was intercepted...(and) proceeded to the railway platform at Farncombe Station, where a crowd had assembled... The Godalming Brass Band was stationed outside, and Private Middleton was 'shouldered' by his comrades. The young soldier was carried on... to the Public Hall, where Captain the Hon. A. G. Brodrick [see lot 90710-045] and the officers and men of 'F' Company, 2nd Volunteer Battalion, were holding a dinner, at which Middleton was an honoured guest.'

He was awarded the Territorial Force Efficiency Medal on 1 April 1910, and later re-enlisted for Great War service in 1914 – this time as a Sergeant with the 7th (Service) Battalion, The Queen's (West Surrey) Regiment. He arrived in France for active service on 27 July 1915, and surviving the war, was placed on Class 'Z' Reserve on 20 February 1919.

He was killed in action during a trench raid in the Beaumont Hamel sector of the Western Front on 5 January 1917, at the age of 19, and his name is recorded on the Thiepval Memorial and Cranleigh War Memorial.

MAJOR ERIC PAUL KINGZETT was born in Edmonton, Enfield, on 9 June 1883. He was granted a commission with the 4th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment on 25 September 1913, and was promoted to Lieutenant on 11 September 1914, after the outbreak of hostilities in WW1. Serving in Gallipoli, he contracted dysentery and temporarily relinquished his commission owing to ill health on 5 November 1916. His early experiences in Gallipoli with the 1st/4th The Queens are detailed in a his own privately printed account titled 'One of the Lambs' (written under the pseudonym 'The Mad Mullah', published in 1920). One excerpt published online, records the following, and somewhat controversial, observations:

We hurried down the gully, and on the way had the pleasure of seeing two Turkish snipers (naked girls, covered in pigment) dead underneath the trees from whence they had been "popping" at us all night. In fact they had been killed by the Turkish rifle fire at us during the battle of the previous night.'

Regaining his health, he rejoined The Queen's Regiment in 1922, and was promoted to Captain, and was then given the Brevet of Major on 1 January 1927, still with the 4th Battalion. He retired from military service, reaching the age limit on 24 June 1933. He afterwards took up a position with the Special Constabulary, serving as Sub-Inspector over a period of twelve years, and was commandant of the 'Comrades of the Great War' (forerunner of the British Legion) at Wellington. He died on 8 June 1947 at Taunton, Somerset. Worthy of further research.

SERGEANT ERNEST GEORGE PRANGNELL was born c.1870 in Clerkenwell, Middlesex, and was living in Croydon, Surrey, when he enlisted for service c.1913. Serving in India during the Great War with the 1st/4th Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment, appears to have been demobilised on 27 September 1922. He returned to civilian life as an L.C.C. Teacher in West Norwood, South London. An amusing tale is recounted, believed to be from the regimental journal, regarding the above recipient at a Battalion reunion:

'At a reunion dinner of the ¼ Battalion there were present a certain General and Colonel B. L. Evans, of the ¼th Battalion; near them... sat a trim ex-sergeant of the Indian battalion. Colonel Evans served in that country, and greeted the giant-killer. To the General word was passed that the sergeant was with the battalion in India. A brief word from the great man was followed by the quick retort "Yes, Sir, I have also the distinction of being the only sergeant in the battalion to be awarded a D.C.M." – "Indeed," remarked the General with a pleasant smile, "Allow me to congratulate you!" Immediately, to stay the hand of felicitation, the rash one parried, "No, no, Sir, really, I don't deserve it. It was a District Court Martial." It might be unfair to disclose the name of his valiant, but there are clues. A small bright-eyed sparkling booted body, lacking in sadness...sometime known as 'Praggie'.

Lance-Corporal Thomas Bone was born c.1886 in Croydon, Surrey, and appears to have joined the 1st Volunteer Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey) Regiment in 1901-02. He received his T.F.E.M. in 1913 and served in the Great War with the 1st/4th Battalion, and after the war rejoined the Territorials on 31 January 1921, becoming one of the few of his regiment to receive the Jubilee Medal 1935. The regimental journal of the Queen's for 1939 stated that 'he will be remembered by all the officers who have served in this period as one of the most regular in attendance and as one whose service to the mess was at all times most efficient and courteous.'

He is mentioned in the regimental journals regarding a full-blooded football match between the sergeants and private soldiers of the battalion: 'FOOTBALL CASUALTIES: Sport was rife in the battalion but no contest reached the equal of the football match between the sergeants and the rest at Ferozepore. Sergeant Hill broke his leg, C.Q.M.S Baker his nose, while Sergeant G. Kemp damage an eye...' He received his T.F.W.M. in 1922, and the clasp to his T.F.E.M. in 1939.

COLONEL THE HONOURABLE ARTHUR GRENVILLE BRODRICK was born on 2 June 1868, the third son of the 8th Viscount Midleton. Educated at Eton College, he received a commission as Second Lieutenant with the 2nd Volunteer Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey Regiment) on 22 February 1890, and was promoted to Lieutenant the following year. Reaching the rank of Captain and Honorary Major on 17 December 1904, he was appointed to the 5th Battalion, The Queen's on 1 April 1908, and was awarded the Territorial Decoration on 3 May 1910. He was appointed to command the 5th Battalion in 1912, which he would continue to command throughout the Great War.

Upon the mobilization of the Territorials for Great War service, Lieutenant-Colonel Brodrick travelled with his battalion out to India in December 1914, and then onwards to Mesopotamia in December 1915. As the Commanding Officer of his battalion through the hardships and hard-fighting of the Mesopotamia Campaign, Brodrick's 1st/5th Battalion, The Surrey Regiment initially formed part of the 12th Indian Division in early 1916, gaining their first taste of frontline action at Butaniyeh, and later being transferred to the 15th Indian Division on 7 May 1916. Brodrick led his men throughout, showing his quality and that of his men especially during the Battle of Ramadie (or Ramadi), which was captured on 28-29 September 1917. For his good work in command, Brodrick was twice mentioned in despatches, and is recorded as having been a popular commanding officer. After a short period in command of the 12th Infantry Brigade of the Mesopotamia Expeditionary Force (M.E.F.) between February and May 1918, he reverted to command of the 1st/5th from May 1918 to the end of the war. He was promoted to full Colonel on 5 August 1918 and was latterly disembodied on 10 April 1919.

In May 1920 Colonel Brodrick was appointed Deputy Lieutenant for the County of Surrey, and in the same year was appointed as an Extra A.D.C. to the King, and role in which he continued to serve until 1931. He undertook a great deal of political and philanthropic work as chairman of the Guildford Division Conservative and Unionist Association, while also taking on the position of chairman for the council's Mental Hospitals Committee. He died unexpectedly while on a visit to Scotland in 1934, and was buried at Peper Harow Church.
