Zeugitana. Carthage. Circa 300-264 BC. Bronze (18.41 mm, 4.35 g.). Head of Tanit left. Rev. Horse's head left, uncertain Punic letter to right. cf. MAA 57; cf. SNG Copenhagen 144. Very fine.



Lucania. Metapontum. Circa 300-250 BC. Bronze (13.53 mm, 2.25 g.). Facing bust of Helios. Rev. M – E. Three barley grains in the shape of a star; below, racing torch. Johnston, Essays Mørkholm-Kraay 53; SNG ANS 579; Historia Numorum Italy 1689. Very fine.



10 Moesia. Istros. Circa 256-240 BC. Silver Drachm (18.08 mm, 5.01 g.). Two young male heads facing, right head inverted. Rev. IΣΤΡΙΗ. Sea-eagle on dolphin to left; A below. Thrace. Kypsela. Kersebleptes. Circa 359-340 BC. Bronze (11.55 mm, 1.69 g.). Female head right, wearing sphendone. Rev. K-E-P. Two-handled cup; grain ear below. SNG Copenhagen 1070-1.



Thrace. Seuthes III. Circa 330-300 BC. Bronze (19.44 mm, 5.23 g.). Bearded head of Seuthes right. Rev. Horseman riding right; wreath below. SNG BMC Black Sea 317-319; Youroukova 68; SNG Copenhagen 1072.
