Dear Bidder,

As we usher in the beginning of a new decade, it is apparent that the international numismatic market is more vibrant than ever, including an ever-growing diversity of both material and collector participation. This event, Heritage's first New York International Numismatic Convention auction of the 2020s, mirrors this expansion and interest, displaying a fascinating assortment of material spanning the full history of coinage and encompassing every inhabited corner of the globe. It is with pride and joy that we share just a few of these highlights with you below.

The New York International show always draws stellar ancient coins and this year exceeds our already high standards. We are delighted to offer not just one or two, but six total decadrachms, including two Fine Style Syracuse examples signed by Euainetos. An unpublished medallion of 9-Solidi from Constantine the Great, with its nearly 42 grams of gold spread across 47mm, will certainly elicit ferocious bidding. Croesus and the Lydian Kingdom comes through for us again this auction, with more than 10 specimens, led by a heavy standard stater graded Choice Mint State by NGC. A magnificent collection of very rare Cyzicene electrum is a veritable panoply of Greek storytelling, from Gaia and Erichthonius to Chiron of Jason and the Argonauts to Eros taming the bull. There are hundreds of excellent ancient coins across three sessions, and we are certain you will find something tempting no matter what your area of interest.

Among the most important world coins in the auction is a sublime gold Dinar of Abd al-Malik, widely recognized as the first "Islamic" coin of the Umayyad Caliphate. This early and historically significant type discarded the earlier imitative styles of Islamic coinage, which had relied on the long-established design principles of depicting the image of the current ruler on the obverse, instead employing solely the use of citations from the Qur'an on both faces. We are excited to present this item of momentous historical interest to our bidders as part of the Platinum Night sale.

From France, hailing from the same collector who assembled world-class collections of multiple talers, British crowns, and German 3 marks comes the next installment of the Cape Coral Collection. This group of coins is perhaps the finest quality selection of French ecus and 5 Francs to be brought to market in recent memory. Ranging from common to rare types, every piece is in an exceptional state of preservation, each one fit for the collector who wants the very best. The selection of European gold coinage is similarly magnificent and deserving of separate mention, including an assortment of sublime multiple ducats from Munster, Bavaria, Austria, Salzburg, and Transylvania. Collectively these issues represent some of the most inspiring selections in the sale, and are bound to impress as a result of their combined visual allure, rarity, and condition, which varies between the upper echelons of lightly circulated quality and full Mint State preservation.

From Britain we see such highlights as an extremely rare XF45 Elizabeth I "Ship" Ryal, as well as a number of other alluring milled rarities including a gem Mint State example of the "Three Graces" Crown of 1817. A gorgeous 1703 Anne "Vigo" Crown, ranking not only as the single-finest certified example of its type but also as a veritable jewel of the British series, represents an item of both great historical importance and of high collector interest. It is joined by a rare gold Half Guinea of the same coveted Vigo issue. We would be remiss if we did not give a brief, if insufficient, mention to the rest of the world, from which we find such dazzling offerings as a gem-certified Meiji 20 Yen of the Year 3 (1870), a Mexican Oaxaca Revolutionary gold 60 Pesos dated 1916 and certified MS64+ by PCGS, or a magnificent and prooflike Alexander I½ Rouble of 1825, awarded a star for its superior eye appeal.

We are confident that even a cursory review of this auction will yield something of interest for all, whether that interest lies in the coinage of the ancient Greek city-states, the issues of medieval Europe, or the rarities of the modern world. This event promises to be one which will not be forgotten, and it is you, our bidders, who fuel the fires of interest that keep our auctions varied, exciting, and worth coming back to. Whether you decide to bid online or attend the auction in person, we wish you the best of experiences and good luck.

Caulonia was founded in the 7th century BC by Achaean Greeks, either emigres from the homeland or from the nearby city of Croton. The location, on the underside of Italy's "toe" on a headland jutting out into the sea, has in the centuries since disappeared beneath the waves, but underwater archaeology has located more than 100 fluted columns and two spectacular mosaics, both depicting dragons, dating to the 5th-4th centuries BC. The columns were likely for a large shrine to Apollo, the deity depicted on the city's beautiful and intriguing coinage. On this magnificent piece, Apollo's entire nude body is shown in refined Archaic form, striding to right, with a small winged daemon on his left arm; to his right stands a stag, sacred to both Apollo and his sister Artemis. The unusual fabric of this piece follows a style peculiar to Greek southern Italy in the archaic period - broad, thin flan, obverse depicted in relief, reverse repeating the obverse motif but in negative relief, or incuse, and reversed. Creating such coins required a high degree of technical skill and quality control. The reasons for the popularity of this fabric are poorly understood; some scholars have postulated a connection to the mathematician-philosopher Pythagoras, who was active in Italy during this period and taught a creed which stressed the duality of mankind's nature and all existence. The location of the main Carthaginian mint in Sicily identified by Punic inscription as "The Camp" has long been a matter of conjecture and dispute. Recent research, adopted by Oliver Hoover in his Handbook of Coins of Sicily (CNG 2012), suggests the "Camp" mint to have been Entella, a fortress-like city located in central-west Sicily. Founded by the Trojans in the 500s BC, Entella was conquered by a group of Campanian mercenaries in about 410 BC who quickly sold their services to the Carthaginians (alternatively, the Campanians might have been employed by Carthage before they took the city). The city remained a Punic stronghold through most of the fourth century, although the Syracusan tyrant Timoleon briefly drove them out circa 342 BC (a peace treaty dividing Sicily into Greek and Carthaginian spheres of interest in 338 BC returned Entella to Punic control). The Siculo-Punic coinage of Entella seems to have been intended mainly to pay mercenary soldiers who were used to being paid in Greek coin, as the silver tetradrachms adhere closely to the Attic weight standard. Designs were usually based on the ubiquitous issues of Syracuse (obverse), but with reverses displaying their Carthaginian allegiance (the palm tree, phonix in Greek, is likely a canting pun on the term Phoenician). Horses also feature prominently, likely referring to the outstanding cavalry of the Carthaginians and their Campanian allies. Starting Bid: \$3,000

Phanes was evidently a Carian or Ephesian minister or aristocrat of the later 7th century BC. The name is known from a rare group of electrum staters and a lesser denominations that bear a stag and the Greek legend "I am the badge of Phanes" or "of Phanes." These are among the earliest coins to bear legends. It has also been speculated that the name refers to a divinity, perhaps Apollo-Phaneos (light-bringer) or Artemis (due to the stag). The Phanes coinage falls into seven denominations, from a full stater down to a 1/96 stater, all featuring the stag in various poses; only the full stater and third-stater or trite are inscribed, but the distinctive rendering of the stag links all denominations of the series to the same issuer. The fact that Phanes is otherwise unattested as a king or satrap indicates the first coins may have been struck by private individuals, rather than governments or royal courts.

The Hellenistic gold staters of Ephesus have been the subject of long-running debate over when they were struck. In the 1880s, the eminent Barklay V. Head assigned them to the period of the Mithradatic Wars, circa 88-86 BC, when Ephesus briefly came under the control of the Pontic King Mithradates VI Eupator. However, as more varieties were discovered over the next century, it became clear they were struck over a much longer period of time. G.K. Jenkins, in a 1987 article, placed them in two groups starting in the later second century BC, after the Roman takeover of Asia Province in 133 BC, and linked the reverse symbols present on several varieties to similar symbols found on the common cistophoric tetradrachm coinage of the Roman era. Debate has long swirled regarding the identity of the 'helmeted hero' appearing on the obverse of this type - is it Seleucus I, or Alexander the Great, or a composite demigod incorporating features of Seleucus, Alexander and Dionysus? In the Handbook of Syrian Coins (CNG, 2009), Oliver Hoover opts for identifying the portrait as an idealized image of Seleucus I himself. The trichryson, a gold piece of about 24mm and 17.8 grams (the approximate size and weight of an Attic silver tetradrachm), was first introduced by Ptolemy I shortly after he assumed the title of Basileus (king) in 305 BC. The weight was equivalent to five Ptolemaic silver drachms on the reduced Phoenician standard adopted by Ptolemy I (hence the modern term "pentadrachm" usually applied to this denomination) but under the Ptolemaic system the value would have been 12 times as great, or 60 silver drachms - a huge sum in the ancient world. It was the largest gold coin the world had yet seen, testament to the vast wealth of Egypt. The Alexandria mint employed the best engravers in the production of its gold coinage and the quality of portraiture is typically outstanding. The production of gold trichrysons continued under Ptolemy II Philadelphus, with the added feature of a regnal date added between the eagle's legs. The unusual elephant headdress worn by Demetrius on this tetradrachm recalls the similar headgear sported by Alexander the Great on early coins of Ptolemaic Egypt, referring to his conquests in northern India. Demetrius also campaigned in India while serving a long apprenticeship under his father, Euthydemus I, as recorded on a dedicatory stone recently discovered north of Ai Khanoum in Afghanistan. After succeeding to the throne, he launched an invasion of Northern India that extended Greek control into modern Pakistan. The coin at hand displays exceptionally fine style and a superior level of execution for the type, which often appears basic and blundered, making the 'date' on this particular piece somewhat clearer than on most of Peroz's gold. It appears to be an attempt at Year 16 (ca. AD 473/4), though Goebl notes on p. 23 that while the dating of Sasanian coins commenced under Peroz's reign with his first and second crown types, "the bulk of his remaining issues until his 25th year remain undated." He continues by adding, on p. 27, that "under the reign of Peroz the gold minting policy is quite hazy, for the weight of his dinars dropped to a mere 3.5g", leaving the question of dating on his later gold issues somewhat ambiguous. Regardless, whether or not the blundered word on the reverse indicates a date, it goes without saying that for the general rarity of Peroz's dinars, the present coin represents a truly elite example, particularly when compared to its counterparts that have come to auction. L. Munatius Plancus was one of the few Roman aristocrats who managed to navigate the transition from Republic to Empire with his life, career and fortune intact. An officer in Caesar's army during his conquest of Gaul and the civil war against Pompey, Plancus was rewarded with the important office of Urban Praefect in 45 BC, during which term he struck both gold aurei and quinarii. He was Proconsul of Gallia Comata when Caesar was assassinated in 44 BC, and spent the next several years adroitly shifting allegiances from the pro-Senatorial faction led by Cicero, to Marc Antony, and to the Triumvirate, and finally to Octavian, the ultimate victor. In 27 BC, he made the formal proposal that the Senate grant Octavian the unprecedented title of Augustus, by which he is known to history. As a reward, Augustus named him to the prestigious office of Censor in 22 BC. The huge circular tomb of Plancus still stands on a hill in Gaeta, about 20 miles from Rome. Starting Bid: \$2,000

One of the main ringleaders in the plot to assassinate Julius Caesar, Gaius Cassius Longinus had been a survivor and hero of the Parthian War of Crassus (53-51 BC). Initially a backer of Pompey, he accepted a pardon from Caesar in 48 BC and loyally served him for the next four years. It soon became apparent the dictator had no intention of stepping down, and thus Cassius was one of the first to plunge his dagger into Caesar on the Ides of March, 44 BC. After fleeing Rome, Cassius returned to Syria and commandeered several crack legions and a fleet. He joined forces with Brutus in 42 BC and the two marched into Thrace to meet the pro-Caesarian legions led by Marc Antony and Octavian. At the first clash at Philippi in early October, Cassius suffered a reverse and rashly fell on his sword before he could be told that Brutus had counterattacked and saved the day. Younger brother of Marc Antony, Lucius Antonius "Pietas" naturally backed his brother's leadership of the Caesarian party and his attempt to seize control of the state, but both ambitions were complicated by the arrival of Caesar's adoptive son Octavian. Relations between the brothers and Octavian cooled markedly after the final defeat of Caesar's assassins in 42 BC. The cold war escalated when Lucius Antony became consul in 41 BC and took a notably hostile stance toward Octavian. He was joined in this propaganda war by Marc Antony's wife, the fiery Fulvia, and the two began rousing Italian cities against Octavian's plan to settle 100,000 of his veterans on land confiscated from Italian citizens. Octavian reacted quickly and recalled his friend Agrippa from Spain at the head of several veteran legions, which besieged Lucius Antony and Fulvia in the town of Perusia. When Lucius and Fulvia surrendered in February, 40 BC, Marc Antony washed his hands of the fiasco and hung his wife and brother out to dry. Both Lucius and Fulvia conveniently died later in 40 BC, supposedly of natural causes. The fair-haired youth of his generation, Germanicus Julius Caesar was the son of the great general Nero Claudius Drusus and Antonia, the niece of Augustus. He became a peerless soldier, like his father, and was widely admired as a paragon of Roman manly virtues. Like John F. Kennedy, Germanicus' untimely and rather mysterious death in AD 19 won him immortal fame. This copper as, bearing Germanicus' portrait, was struck by his son, Gaius 'Caligula,' after he became emperor in AD 37. A similar coin was also struck by Germanicus' brother Claudius, emperor AD 41-54.

The son of Augustus' wife Livia by her previous marriage to a member of the aristocratic Claudian family, Tiberius Claudius Nero was born in 42 BC in the waning days of the Roman Republic. His path to supreme power was too circuitous to relate here, but upon the death of Augustus in AD 14, Tiberius was a weary 54-year-old who didn't truly want the job of emperor anymore. Nevertheless, Tiberius' first years as emperor went fairly smoothly, marred only by the death of the popular Germanicus in AD 19. Still, Tiberius longed to leave the hubbub of Rome behind. He attempted to retire in stages, giving more and more power to his unscrupulous Praetorian Prefect, Sejanus, who plotted the arrests and murders of nearly the whole Julio-Claudian family. Heartsick and tired of intrigues, Tiberius retired permanently to the luxurious island retreat of Capri in AD 27, allowing Sejanus to run wild and destroy himself by overreaching. Tiberius died embittered and unloved in AD 37, leaving the succession to his deranged nephew Gaius 'Caligula,' perhaps as a cruel joke on the Roman people. It is unlikely he ever knew about the most momentous event of his reign, the ministry and crucifixion of Jesus Christ in Judaea. Like Tiberius himself, his coinage was intensely conservative, with only a single precious metal type in use for almost the entirety of his 23-year reign (the PONTIF MAXIM reverse type), making this early quadriga type even more desirable as it was only produced during his first two regnal years - Tribunicia Potestas XVI and XVII. This gold aureus bears a wonderful portrait of Claudius, fourth emperor of the Julio-Claudian dynasty. Son of the great general Drusus and Antonia, niece of the emperor Augustus, Tiberius Claudius Drusus seemed well-positioned when he was born in 10 BC. But, a serious childhood illness left him with a limp, a stammer, and other uncouth qualities that made him the black sheep of the family. While these problems barred him from a political career, such exclusion also granted him immunity from the family's murderous intrigues. Upon Caligula's assassination in January, AD 41, Claudius was the sole surviving Julio-Claudian male, and, when members of the Praetorian Guard found him cowering behind a curtain in the palace, they immediately acclaimed him as Emperor. Claudius astutely awarded the Praetorians a substantial bonus, and with 10,000 heavily armed soldiers backing him, he easily forced the Senate to accept him as the next princeps. Once installed, Claudius surprised everyone by ruling with intelligence and moderation. In AD 43, he ordered the invasion and annexation of Britain, the first major addition of territory to the Empire since the days of Augustus. He chose provincial governors carefully and managed foreign relations with considerable skill. He erred only in his obsession with detail, his reliance on freedmen and cronies, and his atrocious taste in women. Messalina, his promiscuous third wife, ran wild as Empress and nearly brought down his regime with a sex-crazed conspiracy in AD 48. His next wife, Agrippina the Younger, used her wiles to enhance her own power and advance Nero, her son by a previous marriage, in the succession arrangements. This done, she fed Claudius a dish of poisoned mushrooms in October, AD 54 and brought his 13-year reign to an end. Despite many missteps and his unsavory demise, Claudius had been a fairly successful ruler and his regime set a pattern for the Flavians and the reigns that followed. Starting Bid: \$750

The Judaea Capta sestertii are part of the propaganda campaign touting Vespasian's victory in the Jewish War. The figure of Judaea is shown in an attitude of mourning, while the emperor stands behind in a display of might. Such images, while supremely brutal to modern eyes, were to the Romans justified and indeed glorious - the rebellious Jews having broken faith with their overlords and killed tens of thousands of Roman soldiers and civilians. The 'Victory' celebrated on this aureus, over the Parthians in a long and difficult war AD 161-163, ended up being a Pyrrhic one for the Romans, as the returning Legions brought with them a virulent plague which quickly spread through most of the Roman Empire and devastated its population. The "Antonine Plague," also called the "Plague of Galen" after the famous physician who strove mightily against it, is now thought to have been smallpox or possibly measles. Europeans seemingly had no exposure to the illness before and died in enormous numbers. While not as devastating as the later Plague of Justinian or the Black Death of the 14th century, it seems to have severely depopulated vast regions and helped bring about the economic stagnation and external invasion that eventually brought down the Western Roman Empire.

The reverse legend translates "the indulgence of the Augusti towards Carthage" and the reverse type is a clear picture of the favor that Septimius inclined toward Carthage in his homeland of North Africa. Dea Caelestis, the Carthaginian moon goddess, is a reverse type unique to the Severan era and as the patron goddess of Carthage, astride her lion, she represents a distinctive feature for the coinage of Septimius and his family. This reverse type represented in gold aurei and silver denarii always depict water flowing beneath the personification and may represent the improvements that Septimius made to the Carthaginian aqueduct in the first years of the 3rd century.

Aelia Eudocia started life as a legendary beauty born in Antioch to a Pagan professor. Having absorbed Greek philosophy from childhood, she became an accomplished poet, prose writer and orator in her own right. She traveled to Constantinople in AD 420 and caught the eye of Emperor Theodosius II, who was in the market for a wife. His sister, Pulcheria, insisted that she convert to Christianity before any marriage, terms that she readily accepted. The new empress immediately became an advocate for universal education and tolerance, particularly toward Jews and other persecuted sects. She also sought to blend Classical Hellenism and Christianity. This placed her at odds with Pulcheria, who began to denigrate the sincerity of her conversion. To prove her devotion, Eudocia made a pilgrimage to the Holy Land in AD 438, but soon after returning she was accused of adultery and banished from the court. Theodosius still loved her, however, and she was able to retire to Jerusalem where she continued her writing and charitable work until her death in AD 460. Starting Bid: \$2,500



30719 Oliver Cromwell Shilling 1658 MS63 PCGS, KM-A207, S-3228, ESC-1005. A popular issue for its historical significance (featuring the only commoner to ever appear on the obverse of an English coin) and undeniable quality of engraving and production. Elusive in Mint State, let alone choice; this piece boasts sleek fields with almost no evidence of handling, light surface rub the sole element holding it back from an even higher certification, appealing steel-blue tone creeping across the slate-gray planchet. 30720 Oliver Cromwell 1/2 Crown 1658 UNC Details (Tooled) PCGS, KM-B207, S-3227A, ESC-252. Tooled in antiquity to smooth elements of the surfaces, leaving brush marks in the fields and some areas of deeper scratching; the reverse is more strongly affected with some additional charcoal staining. In all other regards, an attractive UNC example with an impressive portrait and appealing rainbow tone at the peripheries. Starting Bid: \$1,000





30721 Oliver Cromwell Crown 1658/7 AU58 PCGS, KM393.2, ESC-10, S-3226. Lightly rubbed to the highpoints in line with the grade - an otherwise intriguing and attractive specimen of this one-year Crown featuring Cromwell's laureate portrait. The peripheries are aglow with dazzling reflectivity, toned to an iridescent flame-orange and yellow; the centers a dove-gray with smoky magenta highlights. A pleasing XF piece, evenly worn yet still bearing scintillating mint luster in the legends, a light golden brown tone beginning to form. Reserve: \$4,000





30727 Charles II silver Specimen "Naval Victory Against Holland" Medal ND (1665) AU55 PCGS, Eimer-230, MI-I-503/139. 62mm. Edge plain. By J. Roettier. Struck to commemorate the Battle of Lowestoft on June 13, 1665 during the Second Anglo-Dutch War, this Battle saw more than 100 naval vessels under the command of Lieutenant-Admiral Jacob van Wassenaer Obdam attack the similarly sized English fleet commanded by James, Duke of York. The English, having the advantage in ship and gun size, as well as fleet training, quickly overwhelmed the Dutch whose commanders tactics went against orders. In the end, the English lost only one ship, Great Charity, while the Dutch lost seventeen and around 2000 men. Slightly worn to the highpoints (as is to be expected on such a high-relief piece), otherwise well-preserved and handsomely toned to a dark slate gray.





30728 James II gold "Elephant & Castle" Guinea 1685 UNC Details (Obverse Tooled, Cleaned) NGC, KM453.2, S-3401. Extremely rare and extremely desirable in any grade, the most coveted of James II's Guineas bearing the elephant and castle hallmark denoting its gold being sourced by the Royal African Company. Despite its certification, this piece is highly appealing to the eye and bears original luster at the peripheries; its tooling is limited to delicate smoothing on the obverse and barely detracts from the visual allure this rarity boasts. 30731 William & Mary Crown 1691 AU50 NGC, KM478, S-3433, ESC-82. TERTIO edge. Lightly handled, but an otherwise notably well-made piece for issue (besides a vertical metal flaw running through William's portrait). Jean-Pierre Droz, a Swiss engraver of dies for coins and of plates for paper currency, copied the concept of the originals by Augustin Dupré and engraved the set of dies used to strike this pattern for Boulton and Watt at the Soho Mint, Birmingham where this was made. 



As we usher in the beginning of a new decade, it is apparent that the international numismatic market is more vibrant than ever, including an ever-growing diversity of both material and collector participation. This event, Heritage's first New York International Numismatic Convention auction of the 2020s, mirrors this expansion and interest, displaying a fascinating assortment of material spanning the full history of coinage and encompassing every inhabited corner of the globe. It is with pride and joy that we share just a few of these highlights with you below.

The New York International show always draws stellar ancient coins and this year exceeds our already high standards. We are delighted to offer not just one or two, but six total decadrachms, including two Fine Style Syracuse examples signed by Euainetos. An unpublished medallion of 9-Solidi from Constantine the Great, with its nearly 42 grams of gold spread across 47mm, will certainly elicit ferocious bidding. Croesus and the Lydian Kingdom comes through for us again this auction, with more than 10 specimens, led by a heavy standard stater graded Choice Mint State by NGC. A magnificent collection of very rare Cyzicene electrum is a veritable panoply of Greek storytelling, from Gaia and Erichthonius to Chiron of Jason and the Argonauts to Eros taming the bull. There are hundreds of excellent ancient coins across three sessions, and we are certain you will find something tempting no matter what your area of interest.

Among the most important world coins in the auction is a sublime gold Dinar of Abd al-Malik, widely recognized as the first "Islamic" coin of the Umayyad Caliphate. This early and historically significant type discarded the earlier imitative styles of Islamic coinage, which had relied on the long-established design principles of depicting the image of the current ruler on the obverse, instead employing solely the use of citations from the Qur'an on both faces. We are excited to present this item of momentous historical interest to our bidders as part of the Platinum Night sale.

From France, hailing from the same collector who assembled world-class collections of multiple talers, British crowns, and German 3 marks comes the next installment of the Cape Coral Collection. This group of coins is perhaps the finest quality selection of French ecus and 5 Francs to be brought to market in recent memory. Ranging from common to rare types, every piece is in an exceptional state of preservation, each one fit for the collector who wants the very best. The selection of European gold coinage is similarly magnificent and deserving of separate mention, including an assortment of sublime multiple ducats from Munster, Bavaria, Austria, Salzburg, and Transylvania. Collectively these issues represent some of the most inspiring selections in the sale, and are bound to impress as a result of their combined visual allure, rarity, and condition, which varies between the upper echelons of lightly circulated quality and full Mint State preservation.

From Britain we see such highlights as an extremely rare XF45 Elizabeth I "Ship" Ryal, as well as a number of other alluring milled rarities including a gem Mint State example of the "Three Graces" Crown of 1817. A gorgeous 1703 Anne "Vigo" Crown, ranking not only as the single-finest certified example of its type but also as a veritable jewel of the British series, represents an item of both great historical importance and of high collector interest. It is joined by a rare gold Half Guinea of the same coveted Vigo issue. We would be remiss if we did not give a brief, if insufficient, mention to the rest of the world, from which we find such dazzling offerings as a gem-certified Meiji 20 Yen of the Year 3 (1870), a Mexican Oaxaca Revolutionary gold 60 Pesos dated 1916 and certified MS64+ by PCGS, or a magnificent and prooflike Alexander I½ Rouble of 1825, awarded a star for its superior eye appeal.

We are confident that even a cursory review of this auction will yield something of interest for all, whether that interest lies in the coinage of the ancient Greek city-states, the issues of medieval Europe, or the rarities of the modern world. This event promises to be one which will not be forgotten, and it is you, our bidders, who fuel the fires of interest that keep our auctions varied, exciting, and worth coming back to. 

The 'transitional' era of Greek numismatic art is perfectly exemplified by the dies of this Syracusan tetradrachm, which displays a blend of Archaic and Classical artistic conventions. The obverse image of a charioteer driving his quadriga to right retains some Archaic elements, notably the rather stiff pose of the charioteer and the slow, stately gate of the horses; the reverse head of Arethusa, on the other hand, exhibits the cool classicism of contemporary Athenian art as seen on the famous Parthenon frieze. The added touch of the meander pattern (or "Greek key") adorning the snood-like saccos containing Arethusa's hair shows the precise, mathematical precision of a true master engraver.

Realizing the high artistic quality of their work, the engravers of dies for Syracusan tetradrachms and decadrachms often signed their work. Their pride in their artistry is justifiable, as evidenced by the great desire of the coins they created among modern collectors. The obverse of this tetradrachm carries the abbreviated signature Euth...(likely for Euthydemos), while the full name of Phrygillos appears on the reverse. The iconic and highly influential types are skillfully rendered in high classical style. The quadriga carrying Nike on the obverse was widely copied and ultimately lies behind similar depictions on Classical and Hellenistic Greek coins of other cities and kings as well as related images on Roman coins. The sea monster Scylla, depicted in the exergue, was believed to live in the dangerous Strait of Messenia between Sicily and Italy. Arethusa-Persephone, the nymph-patron of Syracuse appears on the reverse, symbolizing the agricultural prosperity and maritime importance of Syracuse.

Widely considered to be the most beautiful coins ever struck, the immense silver decadrachms of Syracuse from the later fifth century BC represent the full flowering of classical Greek sculptural art. Syracuse, the foremost Greek city in Sicily, had produced coins of exceptional beauty for nearly a century when, ca. 415 BC, engravers began signing their coin dies. Chief among these were the master engravers Kimon and Euainetos, whose large silver decadrachms seemed to capture the spirit of the artistic and intellectual revolution then sweeping the Greek world. The obverse of these pieces depicts a four-horse racing chariot, or quadriga, in full career to left while Nike, goddess of Victory, flies above to crown the driver with a laurel wreath. Below this scene is a set of Greek armor offered as a prize to the victorious charioteer. The reverse depicts a beautiful head of Arethusa, nymph of a sacred spring, with dolphins frolicking around her. The decadrachm of Euainetos became a widely-copied archetype for Greek coinage, and the master engraver's head of Arethusa remains a paradigm of cool, classical beauty today.

Carthage, a Phoenician colony on the coast of North Africa, became a maritime powerhouse in the fifth century BC and challenged the Greek cities of Sicily and Southern Italy for control of the western Mediterranean. By the early third century BC, most of central North Africa, Spain and much of Sicily had fallen under Carthaginian control and mints were established at diverse places to produce coins used to pay the largely mercenary army. The stage was now set for the collision with Rome, newly dominant in Italy. Starting in 265 BC, Carthage and Rome fought three titanic wars that produced more death and destruction than any other conflict before the 20th century. The first gold staters struck by Carthage between 350 and 320 BC were of a nearly pure alloy and weighed more than the ubiquitous gold staters of Philip II and Alexander the Great. As time went on, this coinage was debased with silver and reduced in weight, hence the much more numerous Carthage staters produced after circa 320 BC are now termed 'electrum'. This early stater, in pure gold, shows a delicacy of style that indicates the dies were created by a Greek engraver of consummate skill.

While the types of this gold stater issue of Colophon conform to the norm for Philip II (359-336 BC), the magnificent obverse die of this late post-humous issue of Colophon bears a portrait of "Apollo" that is quite distinctive and clearly depicts a real person. Comparison with the coins of Lysimachus and surviving portrait sculpture leaves no doubt the portrait represents Alexander III the Great himself. The issue seems intended to legitimize the patchwork Macedonian regime put together by Alexander's generals after his death in Babylon under the figurehead rulers Philip III Arrhidaeus, Alexander's slow-witted half-brother, and the infant Alexander IV, his posthumously born son. As such the "Philip" named on the reverse should probably be seen as referring to Arrhidaeus rather than the traditional attribution to Philip II.

Alexander's conquests "liberated" tons of gold and silver that had been locked away for centuries in the Great King's treasuries in Sardes, Susa, Persepolis and Babylon. Mint masters soon set to work turning this huge haul into coins, which were paid out to Alexander's soldiers and high officials in staggering quantities. However, the silver decadrachm denomination, worth 10 Attic drachms and 2.5 tetradrachms, was struck in limited numbers, indicating they were presentation pieces intended for only the top tier of Macedonian officers. Only three decadrachm reverse varieties are known. Their extreme rarity — today perhaps 25-30 examples are known to have survived — makes it highly likely that these pieces were handed out by Alexander himself at a special ceremony, perhaps the one recorded at Susa in 324 BC, where the great conqueror assembled his army and distributed up to 20,000 talents to his Macedonian veterans. The bidder on this piece thus has an opportunity to acquire a coin that, with a high degree of likelihood, could have passed through the hands of Alexander the Great.

Olympia, located in the precinct of Elis in the western Peloponnesus, was less of a city than a religious sanctuary dedicated to Zeus, where the allimportant Olympic Games were held. The games commenced in 776 BC and continued uninterrupted at four-year intervals until AD 394, when they were abolished by the Emperor Theodosius as being too 'pagan' in spirit. Starting about 470 BC, Olympic coins were struck during the games to provide attendees with currency for the local markets, and to provide income for the shrine (a small fee was charged for changing other civic coinages into Olympic coin). Each coin type thus became a keepsake of the games in which they were issued, much as modern commemorative currency is tied to specific events. After 420 BC, two mints were active - a "Zeus" mint striking coins with images of Zeus and his avatar, the eagle, and a "Hera" mint striking coins with imagery of, and associated with, his wife. This is one of the later issues of Elis not known to Seltman, attributed to the 111th Olympiad in 336 BC, the year of Alexander the Great's accession.

Cyzicene coinage has great diversity in themes, displaying both local and foreign myths and legends. the sun god appears as radiate on this issue and was worshipped as Helios in Zeleia, a town neighboring Cyzicus, and likely in Cyzicus itself as well. M. Six (Numismatic Chronicle, N.S. xvii, p. 170) suggested that this design has "been copied from a metope of a temple." (Greenwell, p. 59). After the conquest of the Lydian Kingdom circa 546 BC, the Achaemenid Persian empire quickly adopted the Lydian concept of coinage and converted the recently invented gold stater into a new denomination, the daric, named after the Persian Great King Darius.

This extraordinary and large gold piece has been provisionally dated to the transition period between the conquest and consolidation of Alexander the Great's eastern empire. During this time, Alexander employed many of the same provincial rulers, or satraps, who had previously served the Persian King Darius II in the same capacity. Mazaeus, satrap of Cilicia, was among them. Though uninscribed, the design of this piece is virtually identical to coins struck under Mazaeus while he served under Darius. Other "local" Babylonian coins were struck at this time including double-darics featuring the Persian running archer/king motif.

Pnytagoras attained the throne of Cyprus after the deposition and expulsion his half-uncle Evagoras II, who grew unpopular after refusing to support a revolt against the Persians. Though the revolt failed, Pnytagoras subsequently submitted to the Persian king and ruled with their favor. After Alexander's invasion, Pnytagoras allied himself with the Macedonians and his fleet participated in the important siege of Tyre in 332 BC. Pnytagoras' gold staters feature busts of Cypriote Aphrodite in her various forms, as celebrated by her numerous cult centers on the island. Her turreted crown on the obverse of this coin shows her assimilation to Tyche as protecting civic goddess for the whole of Cyprus.

Debate has long swirled regarding the identity of the 'helmeted hero' appearing on the obverse of this type - is it Seleucus I himself, or Alexander the Great, or a composite demigod incorporating features of Seleucus, Alexander and Dionysus? In the Handbook of Syrian Coins (HGC 9, CNG 2009), Oliver Hoover opts for identifying the portrait as an idealized image of Seleucus himself. The reverse design of Nike crowning trophy was paralleled by a nearly simultaneous issue of the Syracusan tyrant Agathocles. The motif would prove highly influential in both Greek and Roman coins for centuries to come.

There is some ambiguity in the description of the queen on the obverse of this issue, with the holder listing Laodice IV and HGC describing Laodice V. Laodice IV was married three times, all to her brothers - Antiochus, Seleucus IV Philopater, and Antiochus IV Epiphanes. She bore six children, including Demetrius I Soter and Laodice V. Laodice V was married to Perseus of the Macedonian Kingdom and possibly married Demetrius I after Perseus was defeated, but it is uncertain. What is certain is that Demetrius I's wife was named Laodice and bore him three children - Demetrius II Nicator, Antiochus VII Sidetes, and Antigonus.



The ostentatious display of Egypt's wealth under the Ptolemies was not confined to gold coinage. Ptolemy I and his immediate successors also struck silver coins in larger denominations than any contemporary kingdom or city-state. Along with the vast outpouring of gold in the name of his sister-wife Arsinöe II, Ptolemy II also struck silver decadrachms displaying her veiled portrait backed with the cornucopia, symbolizing Egypt's agricultural abundance. Having died in about 270 BC, Arsinöe is shown as a goddess, with the tip of a ram's horn (symbolic of the god Ammon) poking out from beneath her veil, and the lotus-tipped scepter of the goddess Isis just visible above her head.

It has been speculated that the later K-type mnaieions issued during the reigns of Ptolemy VI through VIII feature a disguised portrait of Cleopatra II, who was the sister and later wife of both brothers. If such is the case, the K behind the head could refer to Kleopatra (on the original issues of Ptolemy II-III, from which the later issues were copied, the K was one of several letters used to designate obverse dies). Certainly the portrait on these later issues bears little resemblance to the face of Arsinoë II found on the gold pieces minted closer to her lifetime. Whether or not these pieces do bear portraits of concurrent figures, it is a historical fact that the strongest of the later Ptolemaic rulers invariably were women, including the last of the line, Cleopatra VII.

No other kingdom or empire in the ancient world could produce such large gold coins, and this display of economic clout drew thousands of mercenary soldiers into Egypt's service. This large and powerful army was put to maximum use by the third king of the Ptolemaic dynasty, Ptolemy III Euergetes. Shortly after inheriting the throne of the Pharaohs, he launched a massive invasion of the neighboring Seleucid Kingdom of Syria. Easily crushing all resistance, he even reached Babylon, where he proclaimed himself King of Kings. Ptolemy III's powerful portrait appears on gold mnaieions struck by his son, Ptolemy IV Philopator, who succeeded him in 221 BC.

A very special thanks to Catharine Lorber, who provided this research and commentary, to give some perspective of the enormous purchasing power of mnaieions:

It is tricky to estimate the purchasing power of the Ptolemaic mnaieion in terms of the modern economy. Although we possess price and wage data from Ptolemaic Egypt, our modern standard of living is so much higher that comparisons may not be entirely reliable.

The average price of an artaba of wheat during the reign of Ptolemy II was 2 drachms. The mnaieion, equivalent to 100 drachms, could purchase 50 artabas at this average price. The current price of wheat in the US, as of 30 August 2019, is \$4.60 per bushel. The bushel and the artaba are nearly identical measures of volume—a bushel is equivalent to 27.2155 kg, an artaba to 30 kg. The current price of 50 bushels of wheat, \$230, could be deemed more-or-less equivalent to the mnaieion. This figure should be increased by 10%, to \$250, to account for the 10% difference between the bushel and the artaba. However we should take into account that one of the blessings of modern life is an abundance of inexpensive food.

The typical pay of an ordinary soldier in third-century Ptolemaic Egypt was 1 drachm per day, thus 30 drachms per month. (The Egyptian month was exactly 30 days long.) The mnaieion was equivalent to a soldier's pay for $3\frac{1}{3}$ months. Current pay for an enlisted soldier in the US Army, at the lowest pay grade, is \$1680.90 per month (1). This amounts to \$5703 for $3\frac{1}{3}$ months. According to this measure, then, the mnaieion would be equivalent to \$5703.

During the reign of Ptolemy II the pay of a mounted patrolman was 100 drachms per month, exactly one mnaieion (2). This may be compared with the pay of a California Highway Patrolman (3): minimum \$4357.25 per month, average \$7443 per month, maximum \$12,714 per month. The average pay of a Texas Ranger is \$4167 per month (4). It would be tempting to adopt the low figures of \$4167 and \$4357.25 because of their congruence with one another, and their relative closeness to the figure derived from military pay. But documents from third-century Ptolemaic Egypt indicate that the pay of mounted patrolmen fell in a range from 20 to 100 drachms per month (5). There were probably different pay grades, just as in the modern military and in other modern organizations, and 100 drachms per month was apparently the top pay rate. According to this example, the mnaieion would be equivalent to \$12,714.

We can certainly conclude that the mnaieion had great purchasing power, but in terms of its modern equivalent the best we can do is suggest a range between \$4000 and \$13,000.

In AD 66, the people of Jerusalem rose up in revolt against the oppressive Roman occupation. The rebellion spread quickly throughout Judaea, and thousands of Romans were either massacred or forced to flee. The leaders of the revolt declared Israel an independent nation and, for the first time in Jewish history, began striking coins in silver. These coins were mainly shekels of about 13-14 grams weight, along with half-shekels weighing 6.8 grams, and a tiny handful of silver quarter-shekels. The mint was likely located within the Temple complex and the silver provided by the stockpiles of Tyrian shekels kept in the treasury. Mintage was carefully controlled for weight, fineness and and the political slogans each coin carried. For some unknown reason, half-shekels are considerably rarer than full shekels. According to the Israel Numismatic Society's Menorah Coin Project, which has made a census of known examples of Jewish War coins, more than 360 Year 2 shekels are known to have survived, but only 102 half-shekels are recorded. This is somewhat puzzling as the halfshekel is named in several ancient sources as the amount of the Temple Tax paid by every Jewish male over the age of 20, and one would think that such a denomination would be at least as common in circulation as its double. However, roughly the same survival rate applies to the Tyrian shekels and half-shekels previously used to pay the tax.



Aulus Hirtius was a key supporter of Caesar who might have ended up as his successor in power, had events taken a different turn. An experienced soldier, he served as one of Caesar's legates in Gaul from about 54 BC and was an envoy to Pompey in 50 BC. He served Caesar loyally during the Civil War against Pompey and his successors in 48-45 BC and was appointed as Caesar's mintmaster in Rome in 46 BC, when he struck the first truly large issue of gold aurei from the spoils of Caesar's campaigns. These aurei, which bear a rather enigmatic veiled female head on the obverse, were used to pay Caesar's soldiers after the great triumphal parade. After Caesar's assassination, Hirtius initially supported Mark Antony but, after taking over as Consul in 43 BC, he raised an army against Antony at the instigation of Cicero and Octavian. His army defeated Antony at Mutina in April of 43 BC, but Hirtius was killed in the fighting; his consular colleague Pansa died days later, leaving Octavian and Antony masters of Rome. Modern historians owe Hirtius a debt of gratitude for preserving and editing Caesar's Commentaries on the Gallic and Civil Wars.

While the Hirtius aurei in the name of Caesar are not rare, they are only rarely seen in high grade, with only two total examples attaining the lofty designation Choice Mint State with the star for exceptional eye appeal.

For two centuries, Rome had spurned the Hellenistic practice of placing the ruler's portrait on the coinage of the realm, much as they rejected the concept of kingship altogether. So early in 44 BC, many Romans must have been stunned to see the image of Julius Caesar, recently appointed dictator for an unprecedented fourth time, on circulating silver denarii. Like a profusion of other honors and titles, the right to place his image on coins had been bestowed on Caesar by the Roman Senate. Caesar's enemies may have had an ulterior motive in approving the honor, as it almost certainly would fuel the growing suspicion that Caesar intended to name himself king of Rome. If this was the intent, it succeeded, for within three months a conspiracy had been formed and Caesar was duly assassinated at a meeting of the Senate on March 15, 44 BC. This silver denarius carries a startlingly realistic, warts-and-all portrait of Caesar on the obverse and the image of the dictator's patron goddess, Venus, on the reverse. The obverse legend acclaims Caesar as "Imperator," or victorious general. Within a few years, Caesar's successors and even his assassins would show no compunction about putting their portraits on their coins.

This intriguing gold aureus belongs to the 12 months immediately following the assassination of Julius Caesar, which produced a chaotic situation in Rome when the Senate briefly regained its preeminence and a host of unlikely alliances were formed and broken up. Octavian, Caesar's young heir, allied himself with Cicero and the Senate against Marc Antony, who following the end of his Consulship on 1 January 43 BC, took an army north to attack Decimus Albinus Brutus, one of the assassins, who had been appointed by the Senate as governor of Cisalpine Gaul. The new Consuls Hirtius and Pansa, in turn, raised a Senatorial army and set off to attack Antony, ostensibly with Octavian's support. Lucius Cestius and Gaius Norbanus, both Caesarians and supporters of Octavian, were elected Praetors for 43 BC and ordered the striking of this issue of gold aurei to pay the Senatorial soldiers. Two of the new legions were raised in Africa, reflected by the personification on the obverse of this piece. The curule chair on the reverse reflects the authority of the Consuls and Praetors. The alliance between Octavian and Senate would proved short-lived and the latter's renewed authority was swept away when Octavian, Antony and Lepidus formed the Second Triumvirate.

The coinage of Octavian stands in stark contrast from that of the moneyers of the Republic. In a purely aesthetic sense, the coins minted under Octavian were elegantly simplistic when compared with the often busy designs of the late Republic. In a deeper sense, we also see a notable departure in themes and motifs used on earlier coins. The acclaimed Roman art historian Paul Zanker notes in The Power of Images in the Age of Augustus that "By following coin types from the late second century on, we can observe how the particular interests of the individual mint official became more and more important." Moneyers increasingly emphasized themselves and their lineage, using their position as a means of self-aggrandizement. It is both within and outside this schema that Octavian's coins fall. Zanker emphasizes that "every coin type issued under Augustus celebrated the new Republic and its leader." So in one sense Octavian did follow tradition by including himself and his ancestry on his coins, but more importantly, he broke from tradition by promoting the new Republic over himself.

On this coin we see all aspects of his coinage reform at work. For one, the design is quite modest, with nothing on the obverse aside from a simple portrait of Octavian, and with the most minimal of inscriptions on the reverse. It is this inscription, though, where we see Octavian playing with traditional Republican coinage motifs. With the legend CAESAR DIVI F ("Son of the Deified Caesar") he is acclaiming his ancestry, but not his distant kin as most moneyers did. Instead, it is his most recent relation, his adoptive father Caesar, to which he wants the people of Rome to connect his rule. Compounding this is the triumphal quadriga on the reverse. As this coin was likely struck just before or after the Battle of Actium, which solidified Octavian as the sole ruler of the Roman Empire, this is no generic victory that he is celebrating. The Triumph is the founding of the new Republic, with Octavian as its first citizen. What he seems to be saying on this coin is that he is finally realizing the legacy that began with Julius Caesar by re-founding the Roman Republic.

Although Augustus regularized the Roman coinage system and established the large orichalcum (or brass) sestertius as its foundation, coins of this denomination with his portrait were never struck in Rome during his lifetime. Late in his long reign, the important Gallic mint city of Lugdunum began striking sestertii with an idealized head of Augustus, similar to the portrait seen on the widely circulating silver denarii of the same city, backed with the façade of the Great Altar of Lugdunum constructed by the general Nero Claudius Drusus in 12 BC. These portrait sestertii were evidently struck in relatively large numbers, but saw heavy circulation and are rarely seen today in anything other than heavily worn condition. The present example certainly ranks among the best specimens of the type we have ever seen offered, with negligible wear and largely natural surfaces. Starting Bid: \$5,000

Vipsania Agrippina was born in 14 BC to Julia the Elder, daughter of Caesar Augustus, and to his right-hand-man Marcus Agrippa. Though her Julio-Claudian family was the most powerful in the Empire, it was also shot through with intrigue, tension, and untimely death. Her father died when she was only two. A few years later Augustus exiled her mother for serial adultery, effectively orphaning her and her three brothers, who were taken into the imperial household and raised by the emperor and his wife, the arch-manipulator Livia Drusilla. In the drama-filled last decade of Augustus' reign, all three of her brothers died young, or were murdered, clearing the path for the succession of Livia's son Tiberius. Agrippina was also married during this span, between 1 BC and AD 5, to Germanicus, the charismatic nephew of Tiberius and her own second maternal cousin. Though supremely political, the union was also very happy and the couple eventually had nine children, including the future emperor Gaius 'Caligula' and empress Agrippina the Younger. All ancient historians agree Agrippina was a model of rectitude and matronly virtue; she also went beyond the traditional role of a Roman wife and mother in accompanying Germanicus on risky military campaigns and foreign postings. The Roman people admired her courage; however she also had an imperious nature and longed for the day when her husband would inherit supreme power. The mysterious death of Germanicus while on a diplomatic mission in the East in AD 19 dashed these hopes. Agrippina believed Tiberius and/ or Livia had a hand in his demise and made no secret of her suspicions. This put her squarely in the crosshairs of Sejanus, Tiberius' unscrupulous Praetorian prefect, who waged a patient campaign to undermine her in the eyes of Tiberius and the public. In AD 29 she was charged with treason and banished to a remote island; repeatedly abused and starved, she died four years later. Upon the death of Tiberius, her son Gaius 'Caligula' became emperor and rehabilitated his mother's reputation, striking this handsome sestertius to mark the occasion when her ashes were formally returned to Rome and interred in the mausoleum of Augustus.

Despite ranking among the worst of all Roman emperors, Caligula's coinage is interesting and attractive. As he had few, if any, real accomplishments to tout, his reverse types place great stress on his blue-blooded lineage. This remarkable denarius pairs his laureate obverse portrait with a bare headed bust of his father, the revered general Germanicus, whose mysterious death in AD 19 plunged the Roman world into mourning. There is scholarly disagreement over the mint location for Caligula's precious metal coinage. C. H. V. Sutherland and R. A. Carson, writing in Vol. I of RIC, state their belief that the early, bare headed coinage of Caligula, like that of Tiberius, was struck in Gaul at the mint of Lugdunum, but that late in AD 37, minting operations were transferred to Rome and continued there for all subsequent issues, identified by a laureate head of the emperor. J. B. Giard, author of the Bibliotech Nationale catalog in Paris, believes all of Caligula's gold and silver issues were minted in Lugdunum, and this view is supported by David R. Sear in "Roman Coins and Their Values."

The son of the great general Drusus and Antonia, niece of Augustus, Tiberius Claudius Drusus seemed well-positioned for greatness when he was born at Lugdunum, Gaul in 10 BC. But a serious childhood illness left him with a limp, a stammer, and other uncouth qualities that made him the black sheep of the Julio-Claudian dynasty. While these problems barred him from a political career, such exclusion also granted him immunity from the family's murderous intrigues and he managed to survive the bloody reigns of his uncle Tiberius and nephew Caligula while most of his relations perished. Upon Caligula's assassination in January, AD 41, Claudius was the sole surviving Julio-Claudian male and, when members of the Praetorian Guard found him cowering behind a curtain in the palace, they acclaimed him as emperor. Claudius astutely awarded the Praetorians a substantial bonus, and with 10,000 heavily armed soldiers backing him, he easily forced the Senate to accept him. Once installed in power, Claudius surprised everyone by ruling with intelligence and moderation. In AD 43, he ordered the invasion and annexation of Britain, the first major addition of territory to the Empire since the days of Augustus. He chose provincial governors carefully and managed foreign relations with considerable skill. The unusual personification of Constantia (steadiness, courage, steadfastness) on the reverse of this beautiful gold aureus was first used on Claudius' first gold coinage in AD 41 and revived in several subsequent years. It no doubt contrasts his even-handed rule with the capriciousness of his predecessor Caligula.

The late C. H. V. Sutherland, author of Volume I of Roman Imperial Coinage, does not list this issue among denarius types for Otho, even though surviving examples number in the dozens and most museum collections include the type, but includes a footnote on p.261 the type exists and is in need of confirmation.

Born in AD 32 to a nouveau riche family, Marcus Salvius Otho grew up as a pampered playboy with a taste for the finer things in life. He had a peculiar abhorrence for bodily hair and depilated every part of his body, including his head; to cover his baldness, he then wore a carefully made wig, clearly visible in this outstanding coin portrait. When Nero's regime collapsed in mid AD 68, Otho was governor of Lusitania and one of Galba's earliest supporters. He fully expected to be named the old man's heir apparent. Instead, Galba chose a young aristocrat of better breeding, and the furious Otho began plotting his removal. Playing on Galba's stingy reputation, he bribed the Praetorian Guards to murder Galba on January 15, AD 69, after which the Senate reluctantly confirmed Otho as emperor. But he immediately faced another rebellion, this time by Vitellius, the governor of lower Germany, whose sizeable army marched on Italy. Otho and the Praetorian Guard hurried north to hold the line at the River Po. The sharp clash at Cremona in northern Italy went decisively against him. Again, his generals urged him to keep fighting, but he decided to spare Rome further bloodshed. Retiring to his room with a dagger, he stabbed himself in the heart the morning of April 16 or 17, AD 69. His noble end gained him a respect that had eluded him in life.

The elder son of Vespasian, Flavius Titus Vespasianus was born in AD 41 and seemed marked out for the life of an upper middle-class civil servant in the mold of his father. Vespasian won glory as a general during Claudius' invasion of Britain, and Titus grew into an intelligent, handsome, and charming young man who became his father's second in command for the Judaean campaign of AD 66-69. When Nero's regime collapsed in Rome, Vespasian seized the throne and Titus took over direction of the Judaean war, which culminated in the storming of Jerusalem in AD 70. Returning to Rome at the head of several legions, Titus was suspected of planning a coup, but he warmly greeted his father and was granted a stupendous triumph. Titus next served as Praetorian Prefect and was utterly ruthless in protecting his family's stranglehold on power. When Vespasian died in AD 79 and Titus was proclaimed emperor, many feared he would be another Nero or Caligula. But he soon emerged as an uncommonly benevolent ruler.

Domitian has gone down in history as a depraved tyrant, but he was certainly not a madman like Caligula, nor was he an incompetent dilettante like Nero. As a young man, Domitian was largely overshadowed by his older brother Titus, a situation that probably shaped his dour, resentful character. In AD 79, Vespasian was succeeded by Titus as Augustus, with Domitian taking the junior position of Caesar. But Titus ruled only two years before he fell ill and died in September of AD 81. Domitian wasted no time in seizing power as the third emperor of the Flavian dynasty. He soon proved a conscientious, detail-oriented administrator who kept a firm hand on all facets of government. Despite his uneven military record, the legions loved Domitian for raising their pay by nearly 50 percent. But Domitian's suspicion of the aristocracy soon deepened into paranoia. Unsuccessful conspiracies against him in AD 87 and 89 caused him to abandon all restraint, and by AD 93 Rome was in the grip of a reign of terror. Even Domitian's wife came to fear for her life, and she encouraged the emperor's personal attendants to plot against him, leading to his murder in AD 96.

This stunning gold aureus, struck while he was Caesar under Vespasian, sports a robust portrait in high Flavian style (during his sole reign, he revised coin portraits to show himself in a slimmed-down, more flattering light). The reverse type is copied from the coinage of Augustus (RIC I 288). It reflects the dynasty's policy of promoting the cult of the first emperor and also subtly alludes to Vespasian's victories in the East.

The reverse figure of Pax (Peace) holding an olive branch perfectly characterizes the reign of this wise, just and clement emperor, whose era witnessed the peak of the Pax Romana.

ROMAN IMPERIAL

DIVVS ANTON-INVS, bare head of Divus Antoninus Pius right / CONSE-CRATIO, four tiered ustrinum (or pyre) - the lowest most of which represents a plain draped podium with three small festoons. The next tier forms the sepulchral chamber for the reception of the dead body. In the center is a pair of paneled folding doors, flanked by two niches on each side with statues and surmounted by a cornice. The tier above has three arched niches with statues and a cornice represented by beads; and the upper forms a lofty plain attic with hanging drapery in front. A lit torch flanks each end of the upper tier, which forms a pedestal surmounted by the quadriga of the deceased. All the tiers diminish in width from the base upwards so as to assume a pyramidal form. RIC III (Marcus Aurelius) 435. Calicó 1491.

The death of Antoninus Pius in March, AD 161, after a tranquil reign of nearly 24 years, prompted this immediate deification and the largest commemorative coinage yet seen for any Roman ruler. This superb aureus falls within this series, depicting the magnificent funeral pyre upon which a wax effigy of Antoninus driving a triumphal quadriga was placed. At the conclusion of services, the pyre was set alight and an eagle released from the interior, symbolizing the emperor's soul ascending to the heavens. Later generations viewed Antoninus as the perfect emperor, and the tranquility of his reign took on the sheen of a lost golden age.

Only two years into Antoninus' reign, his wife Faustina died of an unknown illness. The grief-stricken Antoninus secured her deification and issued an immense coinage in her name, the largest for any Roman woman to that point. While the staid Roman historians of later eras criticized her lack of "gravitas," Antoninus was devoted to her and the cult he established in her name became exceedingly popular, particularly with women. Her temple was later also consecrated to Divus Antoninus upon his death and deification, and is one of the few Roman structures that survives more or less intact in the Forum today. This elegant aureus is a rare variant that depicts a beautifully modeled figure of Fortuna, goddess of good fortune, holding both a patera and tiller.





Lovely Fine Style Faustina Junior Aureus

The younger Faustina is here presented as a princess (a term derived from the Latin princeps, "first man"), having just been named Augusta (empress) by the Senate as an homage to her father, Antoninus Pius. In this role, she replaced her mother, Faustina Senior, who had died in AD 141. She was about 20 at the time of her elevation and had been married to Marcus Aurelius Caesar, the heir apparent, for four years. The die engraver, an artist of exceptional talent, has captured her in the full bloom of her youth and beauty, with an elegant hairstyle that would be closely copied 15 centuries later by the ladies of the Napoleonic court. The reverse figure of Venus is also beautifully modeled, with her voluptuous curves quite evident beneath her voluminous stola; the dainty manner in which she holds the apple also shows the engraver's eye for telling detail.

When Antoninus Pius died in March, AD 161, Marcus Aurelius insisted that the Senate also grant his adoptive brother Lucius Verus the title of Augustus, for the first time giving the Empire two theoretically coequal rulers. Marcus also betrothed his daughter Lucilla to Lucius, further cementing their family ties. The arrangement was immediately put to the test in AD 162, when the Parthians attacked Rome's eastern provinces. Lucius traveled eastward at the head of a large legionary task force to repulse the invasion and restore order. His generals served him well and the Parthians were quickly expelled from Armenia, winning Lucius the title Armeniacus. The following year, Roman forces counter-invaded and captured the Parthian capital of Ctesiphon, winning Lucius the title Parthicus Maximus. He received a hero's welcome in Rome in AD 166 and basked in the glow of a triumph.



The consummate military man, Aurelian is shown here in the fashionable scale-mail armor of the era. Quite appropriate to this militant age, the war god Mars strides forward on the reverse, with a pitiful bound barbarian captive at his feet.







Iantinum (Meaux) Mint

MAXIMIA-NVS P AVG, laureate head of Maximian right / IOVI FVLG-E-RATORI, Jupiter advancing right, nude but for chlamys over shoulder and billowing to left, brandishing thunderbolt in right hand; anguipedal giant (probably Typhoeus) at right, facing left, right hand raised; IAN in exergue. RIC V -. RIC VI -. Calicó 4708 var. (obverse legend) and questioned the existence of the listed coin. ANSMN 25, plate 9, 1 (this coin). Extremely rare - no examples in sales archives in the past 20 years.

The appearance of this new aureus type in 1980 led Pierre Bastien to reopen the discussion of the existence of the Iantinum (Meaux) mint with an article in ANSMN 25, pp. 77-85 and plates 9-10. According to Bastien, only four other examples from Iantinum were known at the time - Museo Archeologico Florence (different obverse die, same reverse die); Cabinet des Medailles Paris (stolen in 1831 - different obverse legend, same reverse die); Cabinet des Medailles Paris, no. 1586 (Diocletian obverse die, VIRTVS AVGG reverse with Hercules lifting Antaeus); and Cabinet des Medailles Paris (Rothschild collection, no. 504, same obverse die as previous, HERCVLI VICTORI reverse with Hercules seated facing). As such, the present example is the only known specimen outside of museum collections and thus the only currently collectible representative from this mint, which is not listed in RIC at all.

Bastien explains the necessity of a transitional mint to pay for the military operations the Gallic region since the suspension of gold issues from the mint at Lugdunum in spring AD 286 and before the opening of the mint in Trier in the beginning of AD 294. The analogies between the portraits and the coin types of lantinum and Trier clearly show the engravers worked at the temporary mint and were transferred from Lugdunum to Iantinum to Trier months later upon its opening.

The reverse type on the present coin is postulated by Bastien to represent the diarchy of Diocletian and Maximian and their destruction of Carausius with Jupiter (the patron of Diocletian) on a Maximian aureus to show their unity against the giant Typhoeus (Carausius), against whom Jupiter had a difficult time defeating.

Gold medallions were gifts produced for the emperor to bestow upon high ranking civilian and military individuals, as well as "foreign ambassadors and chieftains whom it was intended to impress." They were "the imperial counterpart of private gifts presented to friends on important occasions." Described by Toynbee as money medallions because they were "true multiples of gold and silver coins" and could therefore legally used as money, they ranged in size from "the 1 ½-solidi pieces first issued by Constantine I to the 72-solidi piece of Valens."

The present lot appears to be related by subject to small group of gold medallions and coins that was discovered in the village of Helleville, near Cherbourg in Normandy, France in 1780. "These coins were acquired for the French Collection [Cabinet des Médailles, Bibliothèque Nationale], but at the time of the great robbery in 1831 were melted down by the plunderers, and shared the shocking fate of 2,000 other gold specimens of ancient currency ..." (The Classical Revue, vol. 20, no. 8, Nov. 1906, p.426). Fortunately casts of the related medallions and coins had been taken prior to the theft and Babelon published much of the hoard in 1906. It also appears that a few pieces from the original find may have found their way into trade and were ultimately acquired by the Royal Cabinet in the Hague (Kerkuyt, RN 1906, pp. 490-492).

This large medallion may have been issued by Constantine I in connection with the move of the capital of the Roman Empire from Rome and the consecration of Constantinople in AD 330, but as Bruun notes, "The dating of the beautiful 9-solidi pieces FELICITAS PERPETVA AVG ET CAESS NN presents great difficulties." (RIC VII, p. 594).

Referring to the examples struck at Nicomedia, Babelon (RN 1906) dates the issue to AD 326, placing it at the later part of the year, after the murder of Crispus (which would make the medallion one of the earliest productions of the Constantinople mint and well out of place from all of the other gold issues from the mint).

Toynbee "regards the type as belonging to a series of dynastic types comprising also the SALVS ET SPES REPVBLICAE [reverse] of Constantinople and Heraclea, all of the period of the two Caesars only (326-33)." Based on the portrait style, Toynbee dates those with the short hair at the nape of the neck to AD 326, and those with the longer hair at the back (as here) to the "solemn consecration of Constantinople" in AD 330. The medallions struck at Constantinople from these two series utilized multiple reverse dies; those from the Helleville find have the emperor seated on a more elaborately engraved throne than the present lot, which is more linear and compact.

M. Alföldi initially dated the medallions to AD 326-327 (RIC VII, p. 43, footnote 11), but subsequently agreed with Toynbee, dating the group to AD 330 (cf. Die constantinische Goldprägung, p. 165, 112).

Bruun disagrees with Toynbee's earlier dating (RIC VII, pp. 563-4), "The type CONSTANTINIANA DAFNE with unusual mintmark B/CONS* may be ascribed to 328 and in point of portraiture the exquisite heavy multiple SALVS ET SPES REIPVBLICAE is closely related to it. We can scarcely avoid dating this remarkable medallion to the dedication of the new capital in May 330." Bruun himself dates the Nicomedia issue with this reverse to AD 335, and the related SALVS ET SPES REIPVBLICAE reverse type struck at Constantinople to the winter of AD 335-336, remarking on Toynbee's dating of AD 326 "the portrait...is, however, smaller and cruder...Thus the portraits with the short hair have to be assigned to 330 and the others to even later dates." (RIC VII, p. 564, footnote 1).

Pierre Bastien, ("Monnaie et Donativa au Bas-Empire," p.80, Revue belge de Philologie et d'Histoire, 1991) placed the series after the dedication ceremony of Constantinople on 11 May 330, and this date seems to be supported by the consensus of opinion.

Extremely Rare Full Weight Decentius Solidus

Decentius, a relative of Magnentius, was charged with defending the frontier against Germanic tribes. However he soon lost Cologne to Silvanus, who initially defected to Constantius II, then opted for independence. In 353 Trier revolted against him and joined Constantius II. After hearing of Magnentius' suicide, Decentius also killed himself in 353 AD.

ARGENTINA

A gorgeous rendition of this sensational "Sun Face" type combining shimmering golden fields with pinpoint detailing. Owing both to its admirable design motifs and general rarity, the type continually finds itself highly contested when encountered on auction, virtually regardless of preservation. This example, though, boasts all the hallmarks of aesthetic quality, including a balanced, sharp strike, bright aurous luster, and hints of tangerine tone which engender the greatest sense of age and quality. As noted in previous descriptions for this type, Jansen theorizes that there was only one reverse die for this issue, and it features a small protrusion above and around the "2", meaning the die from 1831 was re-worked for the 1832 date. Therefore, though not listed as such on the insert, we feel that this lot is most accurately described as an 1832/1 overdate.



An extremely rare pattern, one of the most distinctive of the 20th century Australian series. The Kookaburra Patterns of 1919-21 were produced in an effort to replace what was considered a bulky minor coinage in bronze. Although the weight was cut in half, the added cost of importing nickel and, strangely enough, of retooling vending machine mechanisms, resulted in the cancelation of the proposed changes to the coinage. This example boasts sublime surfaces, copious satiny luster delicately toned to hints of white gold, every aspect of the design boldly struck up and sharp.

Impossible to upgrade upon, and a fantastic Sovereign for the discerning collector.

Sure to become the centerpoint for a premium Australian collection, a magnificent offering.

Karl's portrait is rendered superbly, the lightest wear to the highpoints as one would expect from the grade but with such depth of engraving detail that it still appears razor sharp; the reverse features a similarly crisp and extravagant coat of arms. The flan is slightly irregular resulting in a ridge in front of the portrait, serving to accentuate the delicate luster flowing across the butter-gold surfaces, turning more reflective at the peripheries. Of uncontested beauty, and lovingly looked after by every proud collector to have previously owned it; its next owner will surely have to place a strong bid to secure it.

Representing the first example of this rounded and impressively-sized denomination that we have been able to offer, this admirable 10 ducat features the Salzburg Cathedral dividing the date, with saints at sides on the obverse, the reverse depicting eight bishops carrying a reliquary, two angels below. Smaller multiple ducats of this same design are certainly rare and enticing when located in good condition, but the appeal is decidedly heightened in this large format, the intricacies of the cathedral and bishops expressed to noteworthy clarity, enhanced by fields awash with shimmering golden luster. Only the slightest and barely visible wear to the highest points limits the established grade to the uppermost region of the AU range, though otherwise the coin appears virtually Mint State in hand, with hints of reddish tones in the legends adding a welcome element of color contrast to this thoroughly enchanting offering.

Struck in the year of Guidobald's election as Archbishop of Salzburg, this type is extremely rare and almost completely absent from auction record. Collectors of the Austrian numismatic series will certainly have to place a strong bid to add this beautiful Almost Uncirculated specimen to their collection.

So many large gold types from this era were unfortunately cleaned by well-meaning past collectors - the present offering, however, boasts beautiful and reflective surfaces toned to a vibrant peach-red in the recesses, clearly perfectly original and untouched. Minor weakness is present to the very highest points, but the majority of the intricate designs remain intact. The sole certified example by NGC or PCGS, and surely amongst the finest to exist.

Painstakingly struck to render all of the devices in the sharpest relief possible, not a millimeter off-center, with only the most inconsequential of doubling in a few contained portions of the legends. Further drenched in sun-gold tone with a few spots of red-gold near the edges, a small planchet flaw at 6 o'clock on the reverse standing as the sole "stray mark." A true connoisseur's coin.

The sole example of this extremely rare double ducat date that we have been able to locate coming to auction in recent decades, one that entirely awes the viewer from all angles. Close inspection under magnification reveals only the slightest cabinet friction, while micro-fine die polish is protected close to the devices. Pulling back, the surfaces present a stunning glassy shimmer that borders on semi-reflective in places. A covetable opportunity for the seasoned collector of Austrian and early modern European gold, and a piece that is not to be passed up.

Truly stunning for its type, especially considering the relative softness of gold and the susceptibility of larger issues to marks and handling, this gem example demonstrates a level of preservation that might be considered appreciable for the much later 1915-dated gold restrikes of Franz Joseph I, but which is nearly unheard of for an original issue of the early 1800s. However, the utter quality implied by the gem grade is exactly what one sees in this admirable selection, revealing a bloom of golden mint frost over Franz's portrait, as well as the reverse double-headed eagle design, coupled with a lack of anything but the most minor instances of handling across the broad expanses of the mirrored fields. Bolívar standing on Potosí holding Liberty Cap, radiant sun in background, pillar decorated with cannons and flags below. Rev. "La Republica Bolivar Agradecida Al Heroe Cuyo Nombre Lleva" (The Bolivar (Bolivian) Republic [Is] Grateful to the Hero Whose Name it Bears). A significant historical medal created in honor of the revolutionary leader Simón Bolívar, struck in an identical design to that which serves as the centerpiece for the Presidential Medal of Bolivia. The Presidential Medal was awarded as a gift to Simón Bolívar upon his arrival in Bolivia in 1825. Before his death in 1830, Bolívar stated in his will his desire for the medal to be returned to the Bolivian government upon his passing. Since then it has served as an important part of the official regalia of the Bolivian executive office. While the exact circumstances of additional gold and silver strikings of the same design are not well documented, the few pieces known seem to have been produced contemporarily with the original medal, and therefore serve as important relics to Bolivian national history and Bolívar's memory. Ross and Stahl state that the medal was created for the Bolivian victory at the Battle of Ayacucho, though they note that few Bolivian troops were believed to have fought in the battle. Gold examples, while recorded, are exceptionally scarce, and this is the first of its kind that we have ever seen or been able to locate.

32100 Pedro II gold 4000 Reis 1703-R MS64 NGC Rio de Janeiro mint, KM101, LMB-34. The most admirable and perhaps even defining feature of this gorgeous specimen is the absolute superior quality of its strike, executed so fully as to leave every detail rendered to pinpoint clarity. When taken together with its bright shimmering fields, lacking any sort of meaningful problems or distractions, the result is an expression of history and preservation very rarely encountered with mint products of the period. This observation is borne out by population data from the grading services in the case of this year and type, with only one other example tied with this coin at the MS64 level across both PCGS and NGC, and only a single example certified finer.

32101 João V gold 6400 Reis 1727-M VF Details (Surface Hairlines) NGC, Minas Gerais mint, KM135, LMB-278, Bentes-112.01 (R3). An unbelievable rarity of the Brazilian numismatic series, the first year of issue for this denomination, and perhaps the very first time an example from this mint has been offered at auction. Despite production of the 6400 Reis beginning in 1727 and continuing until 1734, examples are seldom seen from any other years than 1733 and 1734, and even these are extremely rare. We have had the privilege to previously offer two examples of the 1727 6400 Reis, one struck at the Bahia mint and the other at Rio de Janeiro at our January 2012 auction (both graded AU Details, realizing \$110,000 and \$125,000 hammer respectively), but this is the first time we have offered such a specimen from Minas Gerais. Bright and sunny in color, moderately circulated in line with the grade yet retaining strong detail; somewhat altered surfaces (likely from time spent in jewelry), but to no great visual detriment. From its extreme rarity, it will come as no surprise that this is the sole certified example by NGC or PCGS. For the advanced Brazilian collector, this may be your only chance to obtain a Minas Gerais-struck 6400 Reis from the first year of its production.

5 Cents Specimen Rarity - "The Prince of Canadian Coinage"

George V Specimen 5 Cents 1921 SP63 PCGS, Ottawa mint, KM22a. A legendary rarity within Canadian numismatics and the most acclaimed example of its denomination, easily besting other rare Victorian issues because of the intriguing story behind its survival. In May of 1921, the government passed legislation to change the composition of the 5 cent piece from silver to nickel, halting the production of this long-produced type. With over 2,500,000 examples already struck however, a decision had to be made about the disposition of these coins, and ultimately the remainder of this previously coined silver was melted. Today, the total surviving population from this date is almost certainly not much greater than 400. While it's not known exactly how the survivors left from the Ottawa mint, a popular theory is simply that they were made available to mint visitors. Others were likely the souvenirs of mint employees. Census data tells us that whatever the case was, most that weren't melted did end up circulating. Few remain fully detailed today, with maybe 30 Uncirculated examples in total with 8-10 of those being from the Specimen sets. The present example is one of the aforementioned 8-10 Specimen strikings from the sets of the year. The surfaces, attractively presented, display the fine, matte-like texture of the era that produces delicate glowing luster in the fields. Tone mostly centers around the edges where light golden hues cling, with dapples of violet that make an appearance on the reverse. A couple leaves on the reverse are a trifle soft, but they are of little visual relevance. Evidence of handling remains slight. An altogether pleasing piece, obviously very rare both conditionally and in the absolute sense - a magnificent chance to obtain the elite of the elite.

Dubbed the "Prince" of Canadian numismatics due to its continued existence in only small numbers, the 1921 5 Cent issue saw most of its original mintage remelted subsequent to its production, leaving only few survivors. Of these, a large number circulated extensively, with the result that only very small numbers remain in better states of preservation such as this example, which retains appreciable detail complemented by icy white luster in the fields. The result is a respectable representative of Canadian numismatics, one which most collectors of the series could only hope to attain.

Gem Mint State Key Date 1884 10 Cents

32104 Victoria 10 Cents 1884 MS65 PCGS, London mint, KM3. Mintage: 150,000. The undisputed key date of the series and a truly magnificent representative at that, only a single piece ranking a grade point finer out of 104 examples certified between PCGS and NGC combined. Beginning after a hiatus of 13 years, in 1871 the Royal Mint in London again began striking 10 Cents pieces for circulation in Canada. While most of the subsequent dates in Victoria's reign saw between half a million to one million coins struck per year, the 1884 stands at fewer than a quarter of the pieces produced as those other dates, with half as many minted as the next scarcest date, the 1883-H. By far most known examples exist only in circulated grades, the Norweb, Pittman, and Burhop coins all in the VF to XF range, the George Cook specimen only an UNC Details, and the Belzberg Collection containing an MS62. We have offered just one other MS65 of this date, as part of our sale of the Canadiana Collection, which brought an impressive \$34,500 in 2010, though even that piece appears to have contained notably more wisps than the present offering.

32105 Elizabeth II "Large Date - Large Ship" 10 Cents 1969 XF Details (Scratch) PCGS, Royal Canadian mint (?), KM73. Large date, large ship variety. One of 10-20 known examples of this extremely rare type. There are various versions of how the 1969 large date variety came to exist; some think the coin was struck in Philadelphia as a sample to show Canadian mint officials, and some think the coin was inadvertently struck from the retooled 1968 dies that were abandoned after the retooling process. Whatever the case, this type has become a famous modern rarity of the Canadian numismatic series. The present offering has scratches to both the obverse and reverse, but is otherwise a pleasing XF with residual luster.

A low mintage of only 100,000 virtually guaranteed that 1887-dated examples would be accorded a special status when compared to their peers in the series, numerous dates of which run above one or even two million. At MS62 this offering achieves the peak of certification seen to-date at PCGS, tied with only one other example there for finest certified. Its surfaces display a uniform steel tone, the relief of the devices impressive at every angle, including both the central devices and peripheries, where well-defined rims create a sound visual frame for this great conditional rarity.

32107 George V Specimen 25 Cents 1934 SP66 PCGS, Royal Canadian mint, KM24a. This is certainly borne out by the PCGS Population Report, which shows the present example as one of only two Specimens certified, both at the SP66 tier (the other "plus" certified). Prooflike reflectivity gleams at the peripheries, the centers a more matte texture, the entire planchet a uniform goldenrod in color with largely unmarred surfaces. A shallow metal crack runs between the A and N of GRANADINA but provides no visual detraction. This is the single highest graded example of this majestic Colombian rarity by PCGS or NGC; according to Restrepo, just eight examples of this first-year type are known, and it does not defy logic to assume that this present piece must be the finest available.

COSTA RICA



32124 Central American Republic gold 8 Escudos 1828 CR-F AU58 PCGS, San Jose mint, KM17. As the single largest denomination struck for the now-extinct Central American Republic, the 8 Escudos combines the inspiring "sun and mountains" obverse design motif with the scale and presentation of a large gold issue, lending a sublime appearance that is difficult to exceed for its beauty. Though this can be said for the type as a whole, it becomes especially true when encountered so near to Mint condition, the Ceiba tree, mountains, and sun all displaying appreciable detail to even the highest points of their designs, the surfaces still bright with yellow-gold luster that concentrates in a deep shimmer at the legends. An altogether enchanting example of the issue, and a must-see for collectors of the Latin American series in general.

Gold issues of the now extinct Central American Republic remain widely recognized and sought-after by collectors for their combined rarity and visual allure, and so the largest of these denominations, found uncirculated, marks a find of particular importance. The strike borders on full, with only minor instances of discernible weakness in the denomination and ground below, rich gold color demonstrated throughout the planchet and confirming the special quality in which this selection has been maintained for the better part of two centuries.

Its imagery puts one in mind of the legendary, though ultimately short-lived gold 'Penny' of 20 Pence issued by Henry III of England, the contemporary to this type. Unlike Henry's failed experiment, however, this French 'Florin' served as the first French gold coin to reach widespread circulation due to its high quality and parity with the Florentine Florin—an ironic feat for the monarch known throughout history as the "faux-monnayeur" for frequently debasing the kingdom's coinage. Extremely rare and almost never seen at auction, one of the hardest pieces of French medieval gold to find, produced before the Franco-Flemish War necessitated debasement of the coinage.

A scarce issue with few found in superior Mint State condition such as this, and with Prooflike features at that. Close inspection under magnification reveals an alluring texturing over the devices, finer on the obverse over Karl Theodor's bust and more crackled on the reverse, lending a delightful contrast that accentuates the imagery against the fields surrounding.

32168 Halberstadt. Bishropic Taler 1617-HS AU58 NGC, KM-Unl., Dav-Unl. A remarkably rare issue, one which is unlisted in both the *Standard Catalog of World Coins* and Davenport. It is thought that most of the original issuance was melted down during and following the tumult of the Thirty Years' War, a period known throughout German history as the Kipper- und Wipperzeit. The exceedingly few examples we could locate have survived in a state of considerable wear, unlike the present selection, which is certainly one of the absolute finest in existence, having experienced only minimal time in circulation and offering resultingly sharp detailing with freshly lustrous fields across both the obverse and reverse. A tremendous rarity of German numismatics, and a likely once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the majority of our bidders.

32178 Regensburg. Free City gold 4 Ducat 1664-HF MS63 NGC, KM173, Fr-2479, Beckenbauer-302. 13.88gm. With the name and titles of Leopold I. Mintmaster Hieronymus Federer (signed on obverse). The highest grade level for this extremely rare type at NGC, with none certified finer; and truly, in-hand, it is hard to imagine what more one could want for eye appeal. Rendered in exceptional relief with striking detail almost to the very highest points of the design, bold enough to provide a shadow-contrast to the dimly mirrored fields behind, reflectivity transforming into a faint matte luster at the margins. An offering produced to a fantastic standard, and preserved to a level deserving of its beauty. A must-have for any collector concerned with only the finest of German States coins.





Unique Gold 10 Ducat

Regensburg. Free City gold 10 Ducat ND (1700-1705) AU58 NGC, cf. KM183 (with date of 1667), Fr-2568 (Unique; this coin), Beckenbauer-202. 34.70gm. With the name and titles of Leopold I. A striking gold 10 Ducat listed as unique in Friedberg, where it impressively serves as the plate coin, with an estimated date of production stated as 1790-1792, a range which would place its creation within the reign of Leopold II. However, the obverse carries the initials IM-F within the cartouche design, corresponding with Mint Master Johann Michael Federer (1700-1740). Further, in its own sale of this impressive issue, Künker noted, correctly, that the H-F initials on the reverse (corresponding to Mint Master Hieronymus Federer) point to the use of an even earlier reverse die. While it is entirely believable that dies produced under Federer (1653-1673) would have been employed a few decades later, it is much more unlikely that the same dies would have been used in the late 18th century coinage of Leopold II. If true, this observation renders Friedberg's date attribution (also listed on the NGC insert) incorrect. Further, the stated date of 1667 in the Standard Catalog of World Coins must also necessarily be incorrect, as the IM-F initials, mentioned explicitly in the reference, were not in use until a third of a century later. Rather, if one takes the facts at face value, the reign of Leopold I lasting until 1705, and the use of Johann Michael Federer's initials beginning with his role as Mint Master in 1700, then the likeliest explanation is that the coin was produced within the first six years of the 18th century, 1700-1705.

If the appeal of its uniqueness and use as a plate coin in one of the most widely used modern references were not enough, this exceptional gold issue boasts a commendable visual presentation to match. Displaying an absolute minimum of highpoint rub, the coin otherwise appears essentially uncirculated, with only minimal signs of even the lightest handling present in the fields, which uniformly remain alluringly lustrous, a subtle trace of red tone embracing the boldly crafted devices and further accentuating the artistic skill which brought them to their present state, one in which they have essentially remained for over three centuries.

Truly a unique opportunity for the prospective bidder, this majestic 10 ducat will undoubtedly serve as both a centerpiece and as a point of great pride for its future owner, carrying its rich history with it for the ages. This clarity of detail extends equally to the obverse, and is enhanced by an unmistakable reflectivity in the fields that offers an enchanting backdrop to both the obverse and reverse design elements. Exceptional Confederation Medal

Rhenish Confederation. Karl Theodor von Dahlberg gold Medal of 10 Ducats MDCCCX (1810) MS62 NGC, Julius-2241, Bram-940, Joseph/Fellner-1004. 40mm. 36.27gm. Commemorating the Constitution of the Grand Duchy of Frankfurt and Karl Theodor von Dahlberg's elevation to the position of Grand Duke of Frankfurt following the Treaty of Schönbrunn in 1810, with the obverse bearing his new title and the reverse displaying an angel flying above a city view of Frankfurt and bestowing it with flowers and a cornucopia of fruits. The design attests to the Grand Duke's early and enduring ties to the church and the study of canon law-having been elected to the Archbishopric of Mainz, the Bishopric of Worms, and Bishopric of Constance—carrying the Benedictine slogan ORA ET LABORA ("Prayer and Work") prominently above the reverse scene. Linking together the threads of early hopes of a unified Germany with the overriding influence of Napoleonic France, this exceptional and historically significant medal is certain to appeal to both students of early 19th century European history and connoisseurs of academically and visually inspiring exonumia.







Key Date Saxe-Meiningen 20 Mark

32183 Saxe-Meiningen. Georg I gold 20 Mark 1905-D MS65 Prooflike NGC, Munich mint, KM195, J-279. A key date in the series that saw a meager 1,000 examples struck. Interestingly, of the mere three examples seen by NGC to-date, every specimen has received a "Prooflike" designation by NGC, perhaps suggesting the use of highly polished dies for the date, or merely that the dies retained their "freshness" in the majority or even entirety of this limited run. Regardless, this selection remains the finest of these three, at two points by that, and owes its gem certification to its bright mirrored fields, clear and reflective, as well as its sharp detailing lacking in any noteworthy contact. 

Besides some minor weakness to the centers due to a wavy flan, this crisply-struck selection boasts full and unmarred designs, an excellent portrait of Henry and no significant evidence of handling whatsoever.

Rare and Ornately Detailed Ship Ryal

32190 Elizabeth I (1558-1603) gold "Ship" Ryal of 15 Shillings ND (1584-1586) XF45 NGC, Tower mint, Escallop mm, Sixth issue, S-2530, N-2004. 7.52gm. Potentially the most coveted issue from Elizabeth's reign - the outstanding 'Ship' Ryal, produced solely for international trade in extremely limited numbers, a type missing from many of the most famous British collections. The Ryal was always a slightly controversial denomination, representing an attempt during Edward IV's first reign to simplify the interlocking gold types by producing a 'Half Sovereign' equivalent worth 10 Shillings. However, as the Noble of 6 Shillings 8 Pence was the standard by then, the Ryal was found unsuccessful and replaced shortly afterwards by the famous Angel type. Despite its initial unpopularity, the 10 Shilling Ryal reared its head once again in Henry VII's reign, and again in Mary's reign then worth 15 Shillings to match the 30 Shilling Sovereign. By Elizabeth's reign it was not considered to be a necessary denomination, and the present type was only produced for trade in the Netherlands, designed with charming medieval style imagery and Lombardic lettering.

Due to the quick abandonment of this denomination, only a handful of examples are known today and they always generate extreme excitement from collectors of British hammered gold when offered. This specimen is exemplary for issue, Elizabeth's portrait razor sharp with only localized areas of weakness to sunken areas of the flan and within the fourth quarter of the reverse. Dulled by tone and time to a pleasant honey-gold with subdued gleam at the highpoints; attractive, extremely rare and perhaps one of the only opportunities collectors will ever have to obtain an XF example of this celebrated denomination.



32191 Elizabeth I (1558-1603) gold Sovereign ND (1587-1589) AU Details (Reverse Graffiti) NGC, Tower mint, Crescent mm, S-2529, N-2003. 15.10gm. The largest gold denomination to be produced during Elizabeth's reign; creased and with some minor flan cracks, an 'X' incised on the reverse, yet otherwise a firm AU with pleasing sharpness to the devices and rich original surfaces. Impressive Mint State Hammered Gold Pound

32192 Elizabeth I (1558-1603) gold Pound ND (1595-1598) MS62 NGC, Tower mint, Woolpack/Key mule mm, Sixth issue, S-2534, N-2008. 11.26gm. A Tudor medallic masterpiece with exceptional engraving detail, by far one of Elizabeth's most popular coins. No collection of hammered gold could be complete without an example, and the present offering ranks amongst the finest, certified as a firm Mint State. Definitively struck with a far crisper portrait than is usual for the type, an abundance of velvety luster coating the planchet; the obverse die is very clear and fresh, the reverse die somewhat worn with thick die-polish lines, but nonetheless pleasing to the eye. Butter-yellow, subtle hints of red tone forming in the peripheries and bolstering the aesthetic effect. A captivating representative and very seldom encountered so fine as this.





An Iconic Piece of Stuart Engraving

32193 James I (1603-1625) gold Rose Ryal ND (1612-1613) AU58 NGC, Tower mint, Tower mm, Second coinage, S-2613, N-2079. Everpopular as a type, a truly superlative piece and very rarely found as well-preserved as this. This denomination marks the final British coin produced following the Sovereign canon of Henry VII, with monarch enthroned between pillars, the reverse shield within a rose (hence 'Rose' Ryal). The present specimen has been fantastically struck so as to leave no weakness anywhere on the planchet, every detail boldly rendered (particularly James's portrait); there is a slight wave to the flan, but this is certainly asmade. With exceptional color and quality of production, collectors could scarcely hope for a better representative of the type.





Fantastic and Lustrous James I Rose Ryal

32194 James I (1603-1625) gold Rose Ryal ND (1623-1624) MS62 NGC, Tower mint, Lis mm, Third coinage, S-2632, N-2108. 12.47gm. The finest certified example of this late Ryal - specimens with the 'lis' mintmark appear at auction far less often than other mintmarks such as the spur rowel or rose. Collectors of large English hammered gold will be familiar with the usual hardships these pieces exhibit; nearly every example has been either circulated or otherwise cleaned, pierced or mounted. As such, the present offering is extraordinary for its rich mint luster, crisp designs, minimal handling and overall spectacular eye appeal. Slightly double struck, a trivial edge crack at 8 o'clock and a small scratch on the reverse. In all other respects a perfect example of the type and worthy of inclusion in a top-tier collection of hammered gold.



32195 Charles I gold Unite ND (1625) MS63 NGC, Tower mint, Lis mm, S-2685, N-2146. Incorrectly listed as S-2688 on the holder. Exceptionally well-preserved for the type, and the single highest graded example of this first-year Unite by either NGC or PCGS. Only minor areas of striking softness appear, the majority of the designs fully represented and needle-sharp, the planchet boasting an almost complete coverage of mint luster. Charles's portrait is particularly notable for the type, being notoriously shallowly-engraved and yet featured here almost as crisp as can be. For the collector of high-grade British hammered gold, you can look no further for quality.





Inspiring Cromwellian Broad

32196 Oliver Cromwell gold Broad 1656 MS62 NGC, KM-Pn25, S-3225, W&R-39. After the English Civil War terminated in 1649 with the execution of King Charles I, Oliver Cromwell, the leader of the anti-monarchist Parliamentarians, became Lord Protector of the Commonwealth of England. Seven years later, through combining the masterful engraving of Thomas Simon and the engineering know-how of Pierre Blondeau, the Cromwell portrait series was created. A step towards hypocritically representing Cromwell as King, this milled coinage featured the Lord Protector wearing a laureate wreath and the reverse shield featuring a crown, its overall quality a significant improvement over previous issues.

The present example does the type that it represents beyond full justice, every portion and smallest detail struck to precise definition. The fields in the background remain drenched in golden luster, revealing a profound display of amber and cupric tones, which themselves result in a "red gold" appearance that would be difficult to exceed for its beauty. A lightly stippled texture over Cromwell's bust, a virtual hallmark for the type, serves to only further confirm its originality, while also adding a secondary degree of visual contrast between the fields and devices. Tied for the second-finest graded at NGC to-date, this sublime rarity is sure to dazzle any collector fortunate enough to experience it in hand.

The visual allure of this offering far transcends its technical quality; its certified grade resides in the lower Mint State category yet its eye appeal takes the viewer's breath away. Whereas one is used to this denomination exhibiting softness to the highpoints, gentle subdued luster and heavy handling, this piece boasts intensely reflective Prooflike surfaces, an immaculate and razor sharp portrait of James and no significant marks whatsoever. A fiery orange-red patina plays across the planchet bolstering the aesthetic effect even further. Truly, the appearance of this piece is leaps and abounds above average for the type and deserves particular collector attention. The last example of this date we handled was graded AU55 PCGS and realized \$40,800 in our August 2019 sale; this far finer specimen must surely elicit significantly keener interest.



32198 James II gold 5 Guineas 1688 XF40 NGC, KM460.1, S-3397A. Struck in the same year as the "Glorious Revolution" which saw James II deposed and William of Orange and Mary II's joint ascension to the throne, this imposing gold issue presents the King's bust in clear detail, both his visage and the reverse arms rendered attractively in a sea of orange-gold. Fantastic Mint State 5 Guineas

32199 William & Mary gold "Elephant & Castle" 5 Guineas 1692 MS61 PCGS, KM479.2, Fr-300, S-3423. A magnificent specimen of scarcely paralleled quality. These large multiple Guinea issues are almost never encountered in Mint State; their size and weight often cause severe friction and edge knocks, and their visual appeal can commonly lead to cleaning or inclusion in jewelry. As such, the present offering is exceptional, and premium even for its impressive grade. Sublime sharpness graces William and Mary's jugate portraits, alongside canary-yellow color simply alive with fresh mint luster. Some minor as-made metal flaws and a scattering of light contact marks define the certification but certainly do not detract from the visual effect this coin commands. The elephant and castle hallmark, denoting the gold for this coin being sourced by the Royal African Company of England, is boldly struck-up and eye catching. Truly worthy of in-hand inspection for an accurate appreciation of its beauty, a marvelous offering sure to appeal to the highest tier collectors of British gold.



32200 William & Mary gold 5 Guineas 1693 XF45 NGC, KM479.1, S-3422. QVINTO edge. Very sharply and centrally struck, an evenly circulated offering but one whose handling has not disguised its high standard of production. Dimly lustrous, brightening in the recesses where it has survived contact, William and Mary's shallowly engraved jugate portraits retaining pleasing detail of a true XF level, or even above, leaving this a fully satisfying type specimen.

32201 William & Mary gold 5 Guineas 1694 XF45 PCGS, KM479.1, S-3422. SEXTO edge. The final Five Guineas of William & Mary's joint reign, its design entirely unique for the series. Pleasing for the grade, with clearly original canary-yellow surfaces exhibiting mild residual luster at the peripheries and crisp striking detail. This example is particularly notable for its lack of the edge knocks which so many others feature. A thoroughly satisfying representative of one of Britain's most popular denominations.



32202 William III gold "Fine Work" 2 Guineas 1701 MS64 NGC, KM507, S-3457. A magnificent coin; the single highest graded example of the celebrated "Fine Work" 2 Guineas certified by either PCGS or NGC. This piece is superbly Prooflike with deep reflective fields, William's portrait perfectly rendered with a subdued, matte texture in contrast to the mirrors behind; splashes of blazing red tone float across the surface further bolstering the eye appeal. Markedly superior to the MS63 Millenia Collection specimen which achieved \$23,000 hammer in 2008, and perhaps the finest of this type extant.





Razor-Sharp Mint State 5 Guineas

William III gold "Fine Work" 5 Guineas 1701 MS61 NGC, KM508, S-3456. Plain scepters. The celebrated "Fine Work" portrait owes its creation to the mintmaster at the time, well-known scientist Isaac Newton. In modernizing the assaying and operations of the Royal Mint, Newton oversaw the engraving of a new portrait to replace the shallow, uninspiring rendition of William III mass-produced since the Great Recoinage of 1696. This new representation of the king was of a level of realism unmatched by any previous British coinage; the lifelike expression on William's face, the delicate treatment of his numerous locks as they fall across his shoulder, an overall level of depth and detail which speaks of considerable care and artistic skill. Needless to say, the type stands in stark contrast to its contemporaries, and remains a jewel in the crown of Five Guineas collections. The present offering is strong even for its impressive grade; the only notable distraction is a scratch to the obverse a 6 o'clock, which cursory inspection can easily mistake for a simple die break. The remainder of the coin is preserved to a superb standard, William's portrait for which this type is given its name as sharp and light-grabbing as could possibly be hoped for, the surrounding fields similarly reflective to a near Proof appearance.





Sharp and Lifelike Portrayal

32204 William III gold "Fine Work" 5 Guineas 1701 AU58 NGC, KM508, S-3456. Plain scepters. Perhaps the finest portrait in the entire British 5 Guinea series, the celebrated 'Fine Work' portrayal of William by Isaac Newton. This piece has encountered minor handling in line with its grade, but has only lost a tiny fraction of its highpoint detail with bold sharpness still prevalent in the designs. Subdued luster gleams across the planchet, the devices haloed by a deep honey tone; an adjustment mark is noted across the French shield on the reverse, as is a small metal flaw before REX. In all regards a beauty, a coveted type and extremely well preserved.





Prooflike 1703 Vigo Crown

32205 Anne "Vigo" Crown 1703 MS65 NGC, KM519.1, S-3576, ESC-1340. Simply put, this is the best Vigo Crown any collector can ever hope to obtain; almost certainly the finest extant, and by far the highest graded on NGC and PCGS's databases. Described in the Whetmore catalogue as "extremely fine, proof-like", purchased from an estate with an original envelope stating "From Aunt, 1703" implying it was put aside before it ever entered circulation - and this theory is certainly borne out by the quality this Crown exhibits. Perfectly and centrally struck, its devices ever-so-slightly matte in comparison to the Prooflike glossy fields behind, its color a storm-gray with bursts of gold and steel blue at the peripheries, its eye appeal unbeatable. Collectors familiar with British Crowns will certainly realize that, despite its gem grade being unprecedented for the type, this specimen is leagues beyond even this lofty technical certification. Extremely Rare Vigo Half Guinea

32206 Anne gold "Vigo" 1/2 Guinea 1703 XF40 PCGS, KM510.2, S-3565. One of the rarest and most desirable types of the entire Half Guinea series, struck from specie captured from the Spanish at Vigo Bay in 1702 as part of the War of Spanish Succession. This haul consisted of 4,500 pounds of silver but only 7 pounds 8 ounces of gold; as such, silver coins bearing the Vigo hallmark are reasonably attainable but gold coins are incredibly seldom seen. The present offering represents one of only three Vigo Half Guineas graded by PCGS or NGC combined; evenly worn but clearly saved from circulation after only moderate handling, with faint mint luster at the peripheries and enthralling blazing orange tone. Arguably the most popular of Britain's hallmarked types, and one which is fully deserving of a place within an elite British collection.



32207 Anne gold Guinea 1709 AU58 NGC, KM529.2, S-3572. An extraordinary offering. Anne Guineas rarely approach Almost Uncirculated grades, being plagued by soft striking and heavy circulation. As such, this superb AU58 piece is surely one of the finest known, and is the single second highest certified example by either NGC or PCGS. Its detail is razor sharp and its fields Prooflike, hints of peach gracing the lemon-gold planchet and bolstering the eye appeal. Only the lightest contact to the high points has prevented this piece from entering Mint State. This very coin realized \$8,000 hammer in the 2008 Millennia Collection sale; we can only anticipate the response it will receive more than a decade later, in a far stronger market.

A highly satisfying 5 Guineas, its surfaces slightly altered and its edge with some scratches from its time in jewelry; otherwise, this piece retains impressive striking detail and hints of original luster behind the butter-yellow color of its planchet blushing with hints of peach tone. Anne's portrait is well-defined and well-preserved, its production standard a clear reflection of this denomination's high value. Fully pleasing, a visually hard-to-beat specimen.



32209 Anne silver "Expedition of Vigo Bay" Medal 1702 MS64 NGC, Betts-94, MI-235/17. 47mm. Obverse signed G.F.N. (George Friedrich Nürnberger) and G.H. (George Hautsch), reverse signed MB in ligature (Martin Brunner, also of Nürnberg). An exceedingly rare historical medal, the reverse depicting the Spanish fleet positioned at the head of Vigo Bay with the allied fleet drawn up in line of battle at the mouth of the bay. Spain's defeat in the battle proved immensely costly, due to both the capture of its treasure and destruction of its fleet, with Britain subsequently striking coinage inscribed with "VIGO" to commemorate this event and the use of the captured bullion for its own coinage. An important medal, and one of the most difficult types of the Betts series to obtain. Sold with old collector's envelope.

32210 George I gold "Prince Elector" Guinea 1714 AU55 NGC, KM538, S-3628. The first Guinea to be struck during George I's reign; bearing perhaps the most highly commended portrait of this Hanoverian King, dubbed the 'Prince Elector' type for its inclusion of PR. EL. at the end of the King's titles denoting his status as Elector of the Holy Roman Empire. The unique style and execution of this variety always grants it considerable popularity amongst collectors, particularly as it remains so elusive in higher grades. This lofty AU55 example boasts a far higher certification than average, light flattening to George's portrait the sole evidence of circulation. The pleasing lemon gold surfaces glisten with considerable luster, boldly struck giving crisp devices and a satisfying dentil border. Scarcely encountered so appealing as this.



32211 George II Proof 1/2 Crown 1746 PR65 NGC, KM584.2, S-3696. An exceptional survivor from England's first Proof Set, 100 of which were produced for the benefit of contemporary collectors. One of the major defining aspects of the 1746 Proofs (besides their central and exact strike and overall high quality of production) is their pronounced edge dentils and razor-sharp rims which give an immensely satisfying appearance. The present gem-level specimen has developed a gorgeous toning, steel-blue and gold cloaking George's bold portrait. Every feature of the design is crisply represented, and no wear nor significant marks have marred its surfaces in the 273 years since its striking. A premium offering of this early Proof type.

32212 George II gold Proof 1/2 Guinea 1728 PR64 NGC, KM565.1, S-3681, W&R-75 (R4). A stunning Proof of Record of near flawless manufacture and subsequent preservation, its surfaces glossy and reflective and its striking detail needle-sharp. Though Wilson and Rasmussen give this type a rarity rating of R4, meaning 11-20 specimens known, this type actually appears to be much scarcer than other types in the W&R reference with higher rarity ratings. We handled a specimen of this type graded PR63 in our January 2019 sale where it realized \$13,200; this superior near-gem is sure to garner even stronger bidding.



George II gold 1/2 Guinea 1745-LIMA MS63 NGC, KM580.2, S-3684. An extreme rarity of the Half Guinea series. The gold used for this piece was part of the £500,000 in specie captured by Admiral Anson (a prominent Royal Navy officer) in his raids on Spanish treasure ships bearing gold and silver mined in Lima, Peru. On their safe return to Portsmouth, Anson was met by a cheering crowd who formed a parade all the way back to London so as to safely deposit the tons of captured Spanish ore at the Royal Mint. To celebrate their victory (and humiliate their enemies), coins made from this treasure were marked 'Lima' beneath the bust of George II, and thus an enigmatic and historic coinage was born. Just one example has received a higher grade than the present specimen from either NGC or PCGS, firmly placing this representative amongst the finest for the type. Even beyond its technical quality, this piece is a visual delight with clouds of vibrant ochre-red tone above seas of shimmering mint luster, devices struck to an impeccable standard. Some minor flecking is noted in the fields, to no aesthetic detriment. For the discerning collector of Guineas and Half Guineas, it would be near impossible to match this offering.

Superb East India Company Five Guineas

32215 George II gold "East India Company" 5 Guineas 1729 MS60 NGC, KM571.2, S-3664. An exceptional specimen of one of the most historical 5 Guinea pieces in British numismatic history, the famed East India Company issue. Chartered under Queen Elizabeth I in 1600, the East India Company was formerly known as the 'Company of Merchants of London Trading into the East Indies'; this group eventually rose to account for half of the entire world's trade, bolstering the financial and territorial roots of the British Empire, and were an integral part of the events leading up to the American Revolution. In fact, the prominence of the EIC during this turbulent time has led some to theorize that the Stars and Stripes were based on the East India Flag, as the two bear remarkable similarities. It was this famed colonial institution which sourced the specie for this present coin from one of their many dominions. Aglow with glossy mint luster, minor bagmarks peppering the fields in line with the grade yet failing to obscure the extent of its brightness or striking quality; bearing few notable detractions, one would believe this piece worthy of an even firmer Mint State grade. Worthy of in-hand inspection for a true appreciation of its visual appeal and a superlative piece of seldom paralleled quality.





An Iconic Gold Issue of George II

32216 George II gold "East India Company" 5 Guineas 1729 AU55 NGC, KM571.2, S-3664. Offering something very near to Mint State appeal, the selection displays noticeably improved luster over what is often seen at this level of certification, the surfaces glistening enticingly while revealing only slight friction, though little in the way of actual circulation wear to the devices themselves. Bright and sunny in its color with light wear to the highpoints, a piece which clearly saw moderate circulation yet did not lose its mint luster nor major sharpness of detail. An issuance from a group unmatched in conjuring up associations with British Colonialism, and an ever-popular type thus.





Lightly Circulated "Lima" 5 Guineas

32218 George II gold 5 Guineas 1746-LIMAAU53 PCGS, KM586.1, S-3665. Decimo Nono edge. Struck from captured Spanish gold mined in Lima, Peru - one of Britain's most popular hallmarked types, and its largest-ever gold denomination. Even cursory inspection will convince the viewer that this piece has been conservatively graded, its detail far sharper than conventional AU53 level; George's portrait is always rather shallow and as such even surface rub can appear as heavier circulation wear. What distinguishes this particular coin is its eye appeal. Whereas even high AU to MS representatives can have somewhat lifeless surfaces, no such fate has befallen the present piece. Its peripheries gleam with reflective luster, a blazing frame for the deep honey toned centers, some slight irregular toning spots present but providing no visual detraction from the superb composition of minimal wear and superlative patina. A perpetually popular type, and a coin which deserves your undue attention for its remarkable aesthetic allure.





Pleasing 18th Century 5 Guineas

32219 George II gold 5 Guineas 1748 UNC Details (Obverse Repaired) NGC, KM586.2, S-3666. The penultimate year for the manufacture of currency 5 Guineas. By the late 1740s, the production standard for these large-size gold pieces had vastly improved, engraving depth perfectly harmonized with the planchet size giving a uniformly sharp strike and superb visual appeal. This representative is no exception, George's portrait beautifully rendered and ever-so-slightly matte in contrast to the luminous fields behind. The planchet color is a rich, aged gold, a light russet toning shrouding the crisp devices; the certified 'repair' takes the form of skillful smoothing to the King's cheek, work which provides no significant visual detriment whatsoever. An undeniably attractive example of this ever-popular denomination.



32220 George III silver Proof Pattern Shilling 1798 PR65 PCGS, ESC-2176 (R5). By Milton. Plain edge. An outstanding Pattern of the highest rarity representing a proposal for the Shilling design. Dated 1798, the same year as the famed 'Dorriens-Magens' Shilling (also by Milton), this pattern displays extraordinary beauty not solely in its design and performance, but also in its remarkable preservation and tone. Cameo worthy, George's large laureate bust colored a deep frosted gray, fields behind oil-slick black with stark white luster; intriguingly, much of the legend appears overstruck over other letters. The reverse shield is wonderfully intricate, far more elegantly performed than on a circulation coin, all the more accentuated through its remarkable lack of wear or contact marks commensurate with its gem-level grade. A pattern which impresses at every turn, excessively rare and one which every serious pattern or George III collector should examine in-hand and deign to make their own.

32221 George III silver Proof Pattern "Three Graces" Crown 1817 PR65 NGC, KM-PnA77, L&S-152, ESC-2020 (R2). Plain edge. By William Wyon. Alongside the famous 1839 Una and the Lion 5 Pounds, the 1817 Three Graces Crown represents Wyon's most celebrated piece of medallic art. His portraiture of George was far finer than the contemporary work by Benedetto Pistrucci, but it is for its reverse design that this Pattern is so beloved; depicting England, Ireland and Scotland anthropomorphized as the Three Graces of Greek mythology wrapped in a circular embrace, these three Goddesses represent the United Kingdom. Its neoclassical beauty, its energy, sensitivity, realism, all embody a talent hitherto absent from British numismatics. This fabulous gem specimen bears no consequential marks or hairlines whatsoever, clearly having been lovingly looked after for the last 200 years; struck to an exemplary standard, and toned to a sublime magenta-gray overlaid with golden elements fringed with blazing red. Exceedingly Rare "British Resentment" Medal

George III silver "Prosecution of the War with America" Medal 1781 MS62 NGC, Betts-584, BHM-239. 53mm. Also known as the "British Resentment" medal. An item of tremendous rarity and historical importance. Its reference to King George as "Georgius III Rex Ang." (King George of England) points to the medal's manufacture outside of England, with some prior postulation that the die work is Continental and possibly, more specifically, German. The reverse depicts a lion struggling to free itself, with a legend that roughly translates to "cannot be trained to submit" (according to Betts). Scholars have theorized that the medal's imagery and message could be a reference to England's overcoming of the restrictions placed upon it by the League of Armed Neutrality, or even that it could be an anti-English message intent on illustrating the folly and persistence of the British in their attempt to control seaborne commerce. In either case, what is certain is this rare item's paramount importance to historical medal collectors, and to those who have long thought it impossible to fill a near-certain gap within the series. 
32227 George III silver Specimen "Indian Peace" Medal 1814 SP62 PCGS, BHM-844. 75mm. By Thomas Wyon. Edge plain, with suspension loop. A fabulous piece of British-American history, a type produced by British forces for presentation to Native American chiefs who agreed to aid them in the War of 1812; this medal represents a direct link to the last significant conflict between the US and Britain whose ending began two centuries of peace and cooperation. Extremely well-struck and impressively untouched for a type which often saw much handling and mistreatment, pleasantly toned with magenta-gray centers and peripheral rings of cobalt blended with seafoam.

32228 George IV gold Specimen "Coronation" Medal 1821 SP64 PCGS, Eimer-1146a, BHM-1070. 35mm. 31.26gm. By Benedetto Pistrucci. Out of the many coronation medals produced for British monarchs over the last few hundred years, few are as fine in their engraving and visual effect as the present example, produced by Pistrucci for George IV. Although George was an overweight and unattractive King, the Italian engraver has managed to give him an intensely noble appearance, and in such a high relief that the leaves of his laureate wreath are thrust forward in a symbolic testament to his Kingship and honor. This piece is far more highly certified than one usually sees, its high-relief combined with its weight commonly leading to strong hairlines in the fields and interruption to the matte frosted devices; this piece, however, is almost pristine with only light touching to the mirror fields and a cameo worthy portrait of George. 32230 George IV gold Proof Sovereign 1821 PR64 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM682, S-3800, W&R-231 (R3). Boasting a perfect representation of the ever-popular Proof contrast between flashy fields and luxuriously frosted devices. Some minor hairlines are noted in the fields, but are extremely light and do not distract from the visual qualities of this superb near-gem.



32235 George IV gold Proof 2 Pounds 1826 PR64 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM701, S-3799, W&R-228. 

William Wyon's artistic accomplishment is plainly evident here, George's depiction sensitively rendered with a pleasing contrast achieved through the juxtaposed smoothness of his cheek to the curling waves of his hair, the entirety bearing a light matte frost. The production of this piece is clearly perfect; it is only denied a higher technical grade for moderate handling and hairlines in the fields, alongside some minor edge knocks. Just 150 pieces of this large Proof-only issue were struck, resulting in their being a hotly-contested commodity amongst collectors, and we have no doubt that this offering will find its place in a premium collection of British gold.

On the obverse, we see the sculptured likeness of the 19-year old Victoria rendered proudly from the reflective fields behind. This example is remarkably unscathed for type, every element of the designs boldly struck and well-preserved, the color a warm flame-yellow with abundant reflectivity.





A truly stellar example of one of Britain's most iconic and beautiful coins, inspired by "The Faerie Queen" of Edmund Spencer. Though a very rare type with a mintage of just 400, there are a number of varieties of 'Una and the Lion' 5 pounds; Wilson and Rasmussen identify a total of nine different varieties. While each has its own rarity rating in their book, ranging from R2 to R7, these are essentially irrelevant to the collector because of the overall rarity of the type. What is certain, however, is that the current example, with its sublime cameo contrast and minimal handling, represents a peak-quality selection of this exceedingly popular type, tying for the absolute finest of any of the varieties seen by PCGS, a mere two examples seen finer by NGC: one a PR65 Ultra Cameo, and another a PR66 Ultra Cameo. Accordingly, very few collectors will be afforded with the opportunity to acquire a finer representative. Auction records continue to demonstrate strong enthusiasm for the type, even in lower states of preservation. A November 2019 auction by Ginza Coins (Auction 31, Lot 923) saw a price of 10,000,000 Japanese Yen (approximately \$92,000 at current exchange rates) realized for an example described as "Cleaned AU", with the same auction seeing a full 15-Piece set, including a "Proof Details" certified 5 Pounds, (Lot 924) for a total of 27,000,000 JPY (approximately \$247,000). Regardless, we are certain that the future owner of this inspiring "Una" will be beyond happy with its inclusion in their collection, where it will likely serve as both a centerpiece and as an item of tremendous pride.



An Exquisite Example of One of Britain's Most Iconic Coins

Victoria gold Proof "Una and the Lion" 5 Pounds 1839 PR61 Ultra Cameo NGC, KM742, S-3851, W&R-278. By William Wyon. Lettered edge. Perhaps Britain's most beautiful coin, and certainly that with the most international acclaim - the celebrated Una and the Lion 5 Pounds. Introduced as part of Victoria's inaugural Proof Set, Wyon chose to represent the young Victoria on this 5 Pounds as Una, the protagonist in the first volume of the Elizabethan poem "The Faerie Queen" by Edmund Spencer. So beloved was this design that collectors were ordering examples from the mint for decades after first production, these examples with a plain edge as oppose to lettered, produced up until 1886. This widespread admiration for Wyon's engraving has been further demonstrated in the multiple proposals to incorporate the Una and the Lion reverse into circulating coinage; first in 1839 as a proposal for a Crown, then again in 1859 as a pattern for a decimal Penny, in 1961 on a decimal 50 Cents, and finally in its appearance on the reverses of commemorative sets issued in both 1989 and 2001. The present offering is a proud representative of this famous issue, entirely embodying its famed beauty of design and production; a decadent honey-gold in color, bearing minor hairlines in the field in line with its grade, its devices immaculate and coated with rich matte frost. A resplendent piece, ranking amongst the most coveted of the British numismatic series and a true delight to behold.

He discovered the Fischer esterification whilst also developing the Fischer projection, a symbolic way of drawing asymmetric carbon atoms. Some die deterioration in the legends and the usual contact marks one would expect to see on such a large high-relief gold medal; otherwise charmingly preserved with deeply reflective fields.





An absolutely extraordinary set! Grade-conscious collectors of British Proof gold will be very familiar with the 1902 matte Proofs produced for Edward VII's coronation, and the problems they face. The sandblasting effect was only ever used for this one set as the official finish, in all others reserved solely for special photographic purposes. This could be, partially, as the process left many specimens of the 1902 coins with swirling hairlines in the fields; an as-made effect, but sadly one which almost always leads to their being conservatively graded. As such, the present offering is wholly remarkable. Three out of the four coins (the Half Sovereign, Sovereign and 2 Pounds) bear the highest grade level for the type assigned by either NGC or PCGS, whilst the 5 Pounds is but one half grade point lower than the finest certified. Careful inspection reveals why. Nowhere to be seen are the significant hairlines, and instead the viewer is met by a sea of calm matte finish of bright butter-gold color, matching across all four denominations. Further, not one of the coins has seen improper handling since, seemingly treated with the reverence that such outliers deserve. We have only sold one comparable set, identically graded save for the 5 Pounds which was PR66, offered at our January 2015 sale where it realized \$32,000 hammer. Rare and Desirable 10 Pesos

Republic gold 10 Pesos 1883 AU50 NGC, Tegucigalpa mint, KM58, Fr-5. Borderline Mint State and attractive for the designation with the extant handling marks well within the confines of the designation, quite lustrous surfaces and limited friction evidence on the higher points. The gold coins of 20 and 10 Pesos minted in Honduras in the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries rank amongst the rarest gold issues of Latin America and - in fact - of the modern world gold series. The confirmed population for these two iconic gold types is similar: 15 specimens for the 10 Pesos and 13 for the 20 Pesos have been confirmed by the cataloger. The former might appear less elusive in the present market but this is due to the fortuitous (but beneficial to the collector community) appearance of a small group of specimens of 10 pesos dated 1883 around ten years ago. Prior to that, no sales for the 10 pesos denomination had occurred in more than 60 years, the sole specimen offered being the ex-Virgil Brand specimen (Glendining's 3/1936, lot 226) later part of the Louis Eliasberg collection. That legendary numismatist was proud enough of this example to display it as a highlight of his holdings in the April 27, 1953 issue of Life Magazine.

The aforementioned group of thirteen 1883 10 Pesos were struck at a slightly later date, as was accepted and legal practice at the Tegucigalpa mint, probably as wedding tokens of a (very) wealthy groom for his future wife. This in indeed confirmed by two almost contemporary and independent reports proving that Honduras did not strike regular issue gold coins until 1888: a testimony from Mr. Consul Herring on the Honduran coinage of 1885 included in the 1888 "Report of the (United States) Director of the Mint" states that "There has never been any gold coined in the country" while Esteban Lazo ("Historia de la Moneda en Honduras", October 16, 1888) indicates that the first gold in denominations of 20, 5 and 1 peso (note the absence of the 10 Pesos denomination) minted in "... May of this year (of 1888) were the first gold coins minted in Honduras and, as such, will represent a milestone in the story of the country". Many of the 13 pieces from the wedding dowry have been harshly cleaned, and most all have at least some evidence of light cleaning. Several have been polished, or have other similar problems. This example is one of the nicer coins from the group of 13, and thus represents an important numismatic item, one which is virtually unattainable to most collectors.

Legendary Year 77 Dinar - The First "Islamic" Coin

Abd al-Malik (AH 65-86 / AD 685-705) gold Dinar AH 77 (AD 696/7) AU53 NGC, No mint (likely Damascus), A-125, ICV-155, Kazan-1, SICA-1, Bernardi-41 (RR). 20mm. 4.24gm. la ilah illa Allah wahdahu la sharika lahu ("There is no god but God alone, He has no associate") in three lines in center; around Muhammad rasul Allah arsalahu bi 'l-huda wa din al-haqq li-yuzhirahu 'ala al-din kullihi ("Muhammad is the messenger of God, who sent him with guidance and the religion of truth that he might make it supreme over all religions"; Qu'ran 9:33) / Allah ahad Allah al-samad lam yalid wa lam yulad ("God is one, God is eternal, He does not beget, nor is He begotten"; Qur'an 112:1-3) in three lines in center; around bism Allah duriba hadha'l dinar fi sana sab wa sab'in ("In the name of God, this dinar was struck in the year seven and seventy"). Nearly perfectly centered on a just slightly out-of-round flan with only slight circulation wear and no waviness. Likely the only certified example and extremely eye-appealing.

Easily the most significant Islamic coin and one instantly recognizable to students of Islamic history and Islamic numismatics alike, the AH 77 dinar stands as a semi-legendary issue—signaling the more concrete development of an Islamic identity and the "standard formula" for Islamic monetary practice for the next half millennium and beyond. As the early caliphate began to expand following the Prophet Muhammad's death, the new Muslim conquerors came to subsume the monetary systems of the territories under their possession, both to expedite the collection of taxes and as the Arabs had no indigenous minting tradition of their own. These systems could roughly be divided into the Byzantine, gold-centric zone in the north and west, and the Sasanian silver-based zone in the east. Both zones continued a long-standing Late Antique numismatic tradition that placed the image of a ruler on the obverse, and a sign of the state or state religion on the reverse, making differentiating between the two faces of the coin simple.

After centuries of conflict between the Byzantines and Sasanians, the arrival of the new conquerors brought the question of assimilating the two monetary and economic zones into one empire. While the caliph Abd al-Malik had attempted this several years earlier through the pre-reform "Standing Caliph" coinage—which attempted to integrate a tri-metallic monetary system across the caliphate—the designs of those issues ultimately failed to stick, though the proposed solution to the problem maintained its validity. The early Umayyad Caliphate had further suffered from a number of crises of authority, stemming back to the Prophet's death, which had resulted in numerous back-to-back civil wars, from which the Umayyads ultimately emerged triumphant. The new designs of the AH 77 reform dinars, in effect, herald that triumph, showing a shift of focus from internal conflicts between Muslim rulers to the teleological struggle between the Islamic and Christian Byzantine empires. Unlike its forerunners, the anepigraphic dinars do away with the distinctions between obverse and reverse and overall use of imagery, instead inscribing citations from the Qur'an on both faces. The inscriptions, furthermore, quite directly marginalize the position of Muhammad—an area of contention in the early wars—recognizing his role as the putative founder of the faith, though placing a more direct emphasis on God's oneness and uniqueness. The caliph further subsumes the same roles as did the Prophet, fulfilling the attributes of distributing justice (hudu) and right belief (din), perhaps suggesting his position as the caliph's successor as God's deputy (khalifat Allah).

As such a historically significant piece, the dinar of Year 77 Hijra has become the ultimate prestige piece in the hobby, and one which continues to occupy a central niche in any serious collection of Islamic coins, frequently featuring on the cover of standard Islamic references, such as Album's *Checklist* and the Bank of Beirut's catalog of William Kazan's collection. This is the first example of the date we have had the privilege to offer, and is a by all means an admirable example at that, appearing to have one of the most well-centered strikes of any example we have been able to locate. Sure to pique intensive collector and scholarly interest, and worthy of a premium bid.

Struck during an incredibly expensive war with the Duchy of Milan, most of the gold ducats from this reign would almost certainly have gone towards financing the war effort, likely leading to many being melted down. As a type, this is one of only 3 certified, with notably few appearing in the Mint State level. An MS62 achieved \$15,000 in Stack's August 2018 ANA Auction, clearly pointing to the intensive rarity of the type and the demand such high grade representatives are sure to garner.

All of his coins are notoriously elusive, the gold especially prized, with just 5 examples of his Zecchinos certified across NGC and PCGS combined. This is the sole example we have ever offered, and is sure to not go unnoticed by the experienced collector of Italian coinage.



Philip IV silver Atocha Shipwreck Recovery Ingot of 62 troy lb 2.88 troy oz ND (c. 1622), Recovered from the famous Atocha shipwreck off the coast of the Florida Keys, these silver ingots (and other specie) were in the process of being transported back to Spain when the galleon of ships it was traveling in were struck by a hurricane. Today, these bars remain one of the most imposing and iconic recoveries from this famous wreck. The bar itself, like all survivors, shows significant evidence of long-time saltwater immersion, with many of the stamps beginning to fade into the bar. It is interesting to note that the original purity stamp remains legible, classifying the bar at 2380/2400 purity. Accompanied by the original certificate of authenticity and for those capable of displaying such a item, a wonderful story-piece!

The *Standard Catalog of World Coins* plate coin for this type sold for \$14,000 hammer in 2010 graded MS63. However, even cursory inspection of that piece shows it has wear to the 'E' and 'S' in PESO, as well as the central stem of the 1 (each representing the highest points of the design). The present offering, in contrast, is absolutely razor sharp even to those highpoints, the planchet glowing with hypnotizing white-gold tone.

The rarest variety of the famed Muera Huerta type, and almost certainly among the finest known, this incredible specimen stands as both the perfect embodiment and perfect exception to all of the usual rules of Mexican Revolutionary issues: the lettering is typically thin, and the dies oversized in relation to the flan, though all evidence of crude preparation ends there. The strike is extremely lustrous and sharp, not a detail underrepresented or flat, with a light topaz patina shimmering across the surfaces as the coin is rotated in hand. A fitting canvass for Francisco "Pancho" Villa's lasting proclamation "may Huerta die" against the draconian dictatorship of his archrival Victoriano Huerta.

32307 Oaxaca. Revolutionary gold 60 Pesos 1916 MS64+ PCGS, Oaxaca mint, KM755, Fr-174, GB-379. Reeded edge. An immense offering, one of Mexico's most iconic gold coinages and one whose popularity makes it almost impossible to obtain for the majority of collectors. What must certainly have been an enormous denomination for the period, with this being the largest struck during the Mexican Revolution, this type would have instantly stood out to its contemporaries, not least due to the relative shortage of gold coinage struck at the time, and its general crudeness when it was minted. Bordering on gem, the surfaces of this example appear perfect buttercup-yellow with velvety tone and little evidence of handling, every element of the strike exceptionally bold and subsequently untouched. Absolutely outstanding for its size, preservation, and aesthetic appeal.

At the present time only 6 Mint State examples have been certified by PCGS, with only one seen by NGC, ensuring that the future owner of this certified specimen will be one of only a select few. This offering admirably represents the type, offering true Mint State appeal with perfectly rendered devices, every minute element fully represented and scarcely touched since striking; the planchet has developed an appealing gunmetal gray color in the fields, darkening to a charcoal ring at the peripheries, touched by just a tinge of golden tone. The last of this type we handled was an inferior AU58 which realized \$19,200 at our January 2019 sale, and we have no doubts that this stunning Silver Rider will attract even more attention from the many collectors appreciative of its beauty.

Considerable Proof reflectivity, toned to vibrant golds and a smokier patina shrouding the sharply-rendered devices. This may be the only example seen at auction for at least two decades, and we can only assume it is likely to be off the market for a similar amount of time. Deeply lustrous with clean, clear fields and a pristine strike, the obverse with a dappled white-gold tone and the reverse eye-catchingly bright. 

Philip V gold 8 Escudos 1708 (Aqueduct)-Y AU58 NGC, Segovia mint, KM277 (this coin), Cal-150 (same), Onza-453 (same), Chaves-695 (same), Cay-9912. 26.87gm. Of the utmost rarity, an incredible Segovian 8 Escudos from the first year of production for the series. Struck only in 1708 and 1717 before the established issue began in 1721, these initial types are considered trials by some and, when examining the fantastic die arrangement and quality of the present offering, this is not a hard fact to believe. Struck ever-so-slightly off-center on an oversized flan yet still bearing full edge dentils, the designs fantastically well-executed with only trivial surface rub defining the grade. Much of the field is matte with die-polish lines, flaring occasionally into dazzling, lustrous brilliance in the recesses. The fact that this very coin is the plate in so many references should serve as testament to its beauty, and without a doubt few can represent the type so finely as this. An amazing and potentially unique discovery piece, this jewel remained in Barcelona until 2017 when it was consigned to our Denver ANA Auction (Sale 3056). After consulting numerous Spanish experts in the field, none recalled having seen a presentation-quality striking of this immediately recognizable type that features the child-aged Alfonso XIII with curly hair. NGC confirmed the outstanding quality, designating it a Proof striking with dramatic cameo features; the grade however only does partial justice to this coin's sublime appearance. Clearly a "special" coin, the fields showcase uniform, albeit slightly rippling, mirrors that frame the perfectly crisp, highly frosted central motifs. Light orange-gold tone blends seamlessly, and although light handling appears upon intense inspection, one wouldn't hesitate to assign the gem moniker to this piece when viewing at arm's length. Truly a marvel of a coin, not only in terms of presentation, but also rarity. For the advanced Spanish collector, a oncein-a-lifetime opportunity to acquire a Spanish treasure of the utmost numismatic significance.
